UNITED STATES TAKING ACTIVE HAND IN MEXICO

STEFANSSON PURPOSELY MAROONED BY KARLUK CREW--HANGING AT KAMLOOPS YESTERDAY

UNITED STATES TAKES ACTION TO RESTORE PEACE IN MEXICO

AMERICAN WARSHIP THREATENS TO OPEN FIRE AT TAMPICO ON BOTH REBELS AND FEDERALS AND BOTH SUSPEND HOSTILITIES

(Special to The Daily News.)
Mexico City, Dec. 13.—Admiral Fletcher, commander of the American forces in Mexican waters, yesterday ordered both the rebels and the federals fighting at Tampico to cease firing, threatening to open fire upon them with the guns of the gunboat Wheeling if the order was not obeyed. Both sides complied with the order, according to information received

here last night by Sir Lionel Gardner, the British Minister from Admiral Craddock of the British cruiser Berwick, which is lying off Tampico.
The Federals hold the centre of Tampico and the water front. Admiral Fletcher has ordered all foreigners to take refuge on board the ships or to congregate on the waterfront, where they will be under the protection of the guns from the warships.

FIRST PERSON EVER TRIED AT PRINCE RUPERT FOR A MURDER

OSCAR WICKLUND, WHO SHOT AND KILLED A MAN IN A TELKWA BAR-ROOM FOUND GUILTY OF CRIME OF MANSLAUGHTER

After an hour's recess for lunch yesterday the court proceeded with the case of Rex v. Wicklund.

Wicklund is the first person ever tried for murder in Prince Rupert and much interest was shown in the case. The man is charged with the murder of Clarence Howell in the new Telkwa Hotel on November 4th last.

The evidence brought out the fact that the men were entire strangers; that they accidentally met as men do in this new country and began drinking together; that the prisoner even bought a dinner for the deceased and told the waiter to give him anything he wanted and that he (the prisoner) would pay for it. After dinner they met again in the bar-room. From one thing to another they began to quarrel. Howell called the prisoner an insulting name and upon being threatened repeated it. The deceased struck the prisoner and following him up struck him again. The prisoner drew his gun and shot the deceased in the breast, and then made an attempt to escape, but was later caught and handed over to the police.

The prisoner himself was put on the stand and told how he was a Russian Finn, with a wife and child in the old land; he came to New York about three years ago, wandered north in to Port Arthur and thence to the prairies where he remained until about a year ago. He then moved west and worked on the G.T.P. until about six weeks ago, when he proceeded further west and landed at Telkwa on November 3rd, the evening before the day of the murder. While at Fort George he had sent \$150 to his wife at home. He told in a very simple way how he came by his gun. He had never carried a fire arm before. While coming along the track from Fort George he

came in touch with another traveller who said he was broke. Prisoner was cooking his meal at the time, and offered the stranger a share. The stranger wanted to borrow some money and for this reason sold his automatic revolver for \$5.00. Prisoner bought it to help the fellow out and after arriving in Telkwa tried to sell the weapon which was his purpose.

Prisoner said he was drinking hard in Telkwa and knew nothing of his actions after the morning before the shooting.

The judge in charging the jury pointed out that because a man was drunk was no justification for a crime. Getting drunk was a voluntary act. However if the prisoner was so drunk that he did not know the act was harmful, and that could only be decided by the evidence, the jury were to consider it. If there was any reasonable doubt as to this the prisoner was to get the benefit. It was the duty of the crown to show that the man's mind was capable of realizing the seriousness of his conduct. If this was not shown the sentence would be manslaughter and otherwise that of murder.

After a deliberation of about an hour the jury returned a verdict of manslaughter.

The prisoner was brought up for sentence this morning when Mr. Justice Murphy said the court agreed with the finding and recommendation of the jury and was inclined to be as lenient as possible. He then sentenced the prisoner to five years.

MEN OF THE KARLUK DESERTED BECAUSE OF MEAN TREATMENT

AFTER TURNING CORNER ON ALASKA STEFANSSON AND A FEW COMPANIONS WERE ASHORE AFTER BLUBBER AND WERE THUS MAROONED

(Special to The Daily News.)
Ottawa, Dec. 13.—Reports have been received by the government from the Northwest Mounted Police in the far north telling of a rumor that Explorer Stefansson was purposely deserted on the shores of the Arctic ocean by the men aboard the Karluk. It is stated there was trouble aboard the Karluk over food and other details of ship life, which culminated in a decision to desert Stefansson and permit him to shift for himself. It is feared Stefansson will not see the expedition again for a very long time. It is said the trouble on board the craft ever since she left Nome arose from the views of these men not coinciding with those of Stefansson. When Arctic waters were reached there was a disposition to challenge the authority of Stefansson. After turning the corner of Alaska the first thing Stefansson did was with a few companions to go ashore for blubber.

Within two days the vessel had disappeared and he was left to face the wilderness as best he might. There is no suggestion that Stefansson was deliberately abandoned, but it is believed the party aboard were not sorry for what has happened and did not regret losing the disturbing element among his recently discovered blonde Esquimo.

FORMER PRESIDENT OF THE UNION LIFE GIVING EVIDENCE

The management of this concern has been severely criticised all over Canada because of its operation with the aid of British capital followed by a complete collapse. This, it is stated, severely injured Canadian credit in the old land.

OCEAN FALLS PLANT PASSES INTO SAN FRANCISCO HANDS

MEANS AMALGAMATION OF SEVERAL LARGE CONCERNS ON THIS COAST—THREE MILLION DOLLARS PROPOSED FOR DEVELOPMENT

A reorganization of the Ocean Falls Co. in an amalgamation of Pacific Coast paper interests, that will put the Ocean Falls pulp plant in active operation again and in addition mean the building of a \$3,000,000 paper mill, is now in process of settlement, according to advices from London. A provisional agreement has been entered into by the bondholders of the Ocean Falls Co. with Messrs. Herbert Fleishhacker, Mortimer Fleishhacker and Wm. Pierce Johnson of San Francisco, whereby the Ocean Falls plant is to pass into the hands of a big combine of Pacific Coast pulp and paper interests.

It is proposed to form an amalgamation of the Powell River Pulp and Paper Co., the Crown Paper Co. of Portland, the Quatsino Sound Pulp Co. and the Ocean Falls Co., thus consolidating the Ocean Falls Co. with the three largest pulp and paper properties on the Pacific Coast.

The group of the Pacific coast capitalists, have agreed to guarantee 50 per cent. of the bonds of the Ocean Falls Co. in

addition to the guarantees on the property, and to spend a sum of \$3,000,000 on developing the plant and in erecting a paper mill at Ocean Falls. The proposal was endorsed at a meeting of debenture holders recently held at Salsbury House, London, E.C.

Mr. I. Hamilton Benn, who was recently in Vancouver and who engineered the proposed amalgamation with the San Francisco capitalists—while visiting the city—was present at the meeting in London, and has been despatched back to San Francisco with authority to bind the debenture holders to the proposed agreement.

In order to validate the agreement, a meeting of shareholders must be called and their consent obtained. No difficulty is experienced from this quarter. If the plans of Mr. Benns and Mr. Fleishhacker and Mr. Johnson are carried out as at present arranged, it will mean that the big plant at Ocean Falls will shortly start up again with renewed vigor, and greater works and development in that district will follow.

TWO RAILWAY PROJECTS THAT AIM TO TAP THE PEACE RIVER

ONE CLAIMS TO BE THE SHORTEST TRANSCONTINENTAL LINE ON THE AMERICAN CONTINENT—ALBERTA GUARANTEES BONDS OF ONE

Edmonton, Alta., Dec. 8.—Private advices from London are that financial arrangements have been completed in England to build the Alberta, Peace River and Eastern Railway from Hudson's Hope to the Pacific Ocean, 2,300 miles, by way of Edmonton and Peace River Crossing, with a branch to Fort McMurray. The promoter of the railroad claim it will be the shortest transcontinental line on the North American continent. Surveyors have been over the proposed line between Edmonton and the Peace River country, and it is announced that everything is in readiness to begin work.

Official announcement was made in Edmonton today by J. D. McArthur, president of the Edmonton, Dunvegan and British Columbia Railway Company that two parties of surveyors are in the field on the route of

the Alberta and Great Waterways Railway and that construction work will begin in a few days at a point 12 miles north of this city, where the line to Fort McMurray will branch from the main line of the Edmonton, Dunvegan and British Columbia road. Mr. McArthur will build the Alberta and Great Waterways line the bonds having been guaranteed by the government of Alberta for a road of 250 miles, the pledge being \$25,000 a mile.

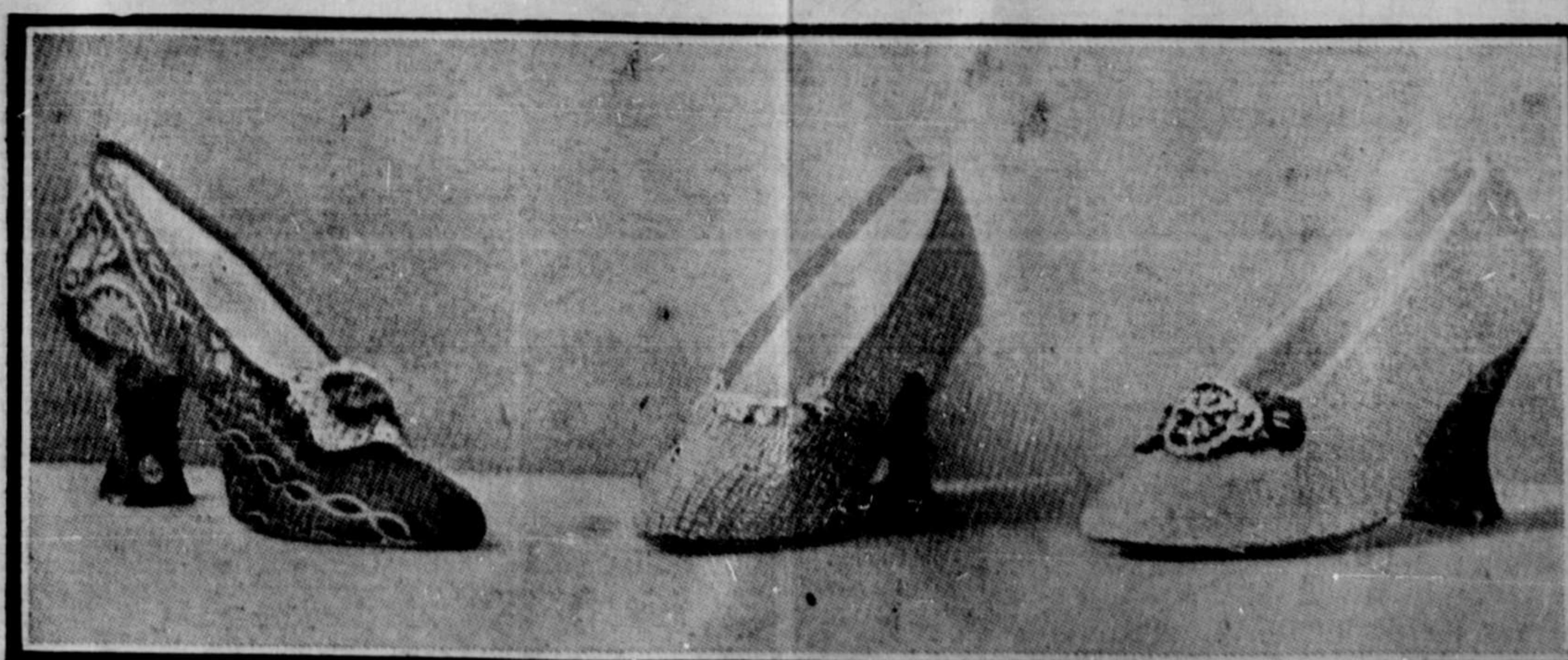
