

RANCHER FOUND BUTCHERED ON KISPIOX TRAIL

EXCLUSION OF HINDUS CAUSING UPRISING IN INDIA--SUTHERLAND'S OFFER TURNED DOWN

RANCHER FOUND MURDERED WITH 17 CUTS IN HIS BODY

KISPIOX RANCHER VICTIM OF HORRIBLE SLAUGHTER--INDIANS BLAMED FOR THE DEED--THREATENED WHITE SETTLERS

(Special to The Daily News.)
New Hazelton, Dec. 14.—With his jugular vein cut and his mouth slit from ear to ear, Ernest George Kennett, a Kispiox rancher, was found brutally murdered last Thursday on the new Kispiox road, near the junction of the Glen Vowell trail.

It is apparently the work of several Indians.
Kennett's body was found by Glen Vowell Indians Thursday. They reported the murder to the New Hazelton Indians. The following day Rev. Robt. Tomlinson, of Kispiox, reported the crime to Government Agent Hoskins, at Hazelton, who sent out and had the body brought in.

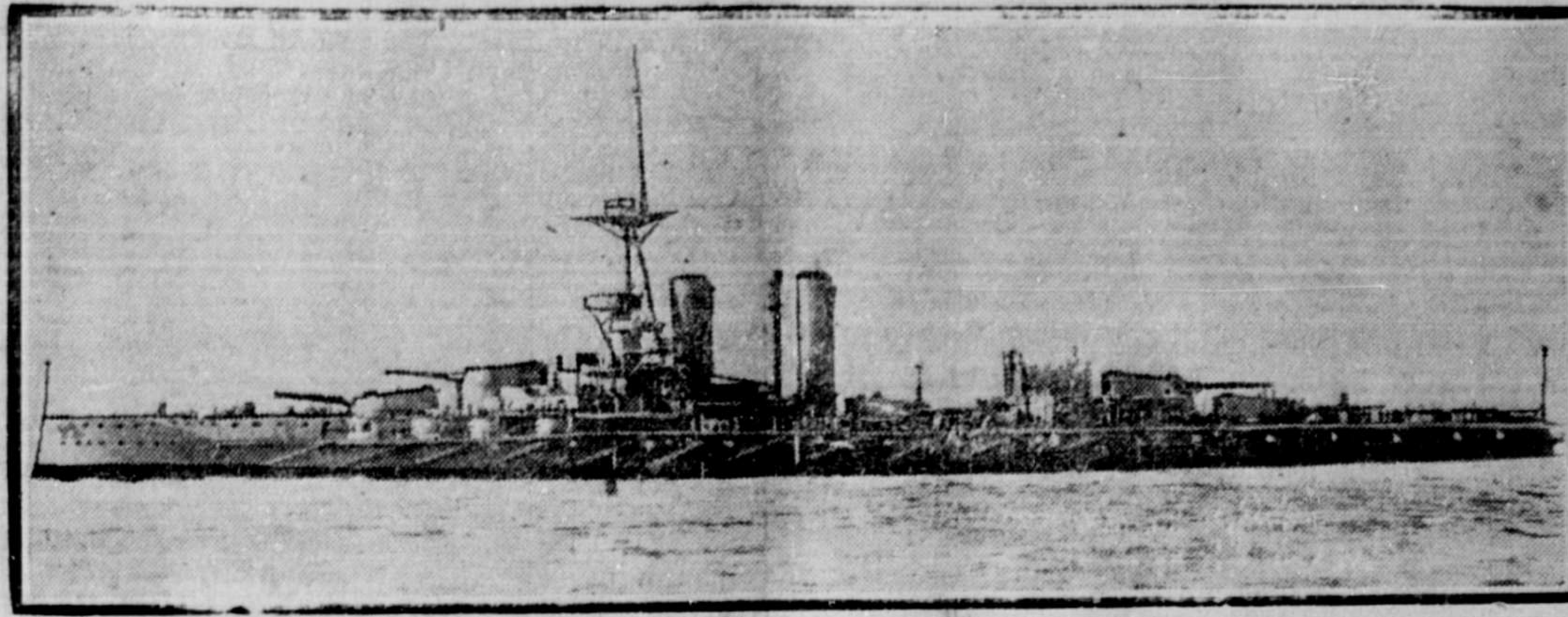
The murder was most vicious and horrible. Kennett was walking toward Hazelton when attacked from the rear. There are seventeen cuts in his body. One is five-eighths of an inch in width and three inches deep, in his back. The man evidently put up a good fight as his hands were badly cut, and one thumb was severed. The snow was

much trampled and blood-stained. Afterwards the body was dragged face downwards off the road.

The remains were brought to Hazelton where an inquest is being held. The hearing has been adjourned until Tuesday night.

Kennett has been a rancher living about 10 miles from Hazelton. He has occupied the land several years, and was a quiet man who apparently had no trouble with anyone. Two years ago he was shot in the neck while drinking from a stream, but it was never discovered who did the shooting. It is presumed the Indians resent his settlement in the district. There is considerable unrest among the Kispiox and Glen Vowell Indians and they have been credited with two murders in the past four months. They have several times threatened the white settlers.

Kennett was a young Englishman 23 years of age. He leaves a mother and two sisters in the old country. He has been up here for six years.

SEDITION SEETHING IN INDIA TROUBLES IMPERIAL POLITICS

HINDUS GOING RELIGIOUS FORCES IN PROTESTING AGAINST EXCLUSION FROM EMPIRE'S DOMINIONS

(Special to The Daily News)
London, Dec. 15.—The British government is seriously concerned with the Indian troubles in South Africa. South Africa not only restricts immigration of Indians but refuses those now in the country to have any share in the government. For a time the press succeeding in suppressing these reports in India but now they have gained circulation and the Indians are furious. Great excitement prevails and they are starting a movement to secure equal rights for the people in all British dominions. They even go so far as to hint that unless this is obtained they will withdraw from the Empire. The authorities realize that it would take little to fan the fire into rebellion. The most serious part is the fact that the Hindus and Mo-

ammedans are uniting in the issue, a thing they hardly ever do, as they belong to distinct castes.

The recent action of the Canadian government in taking such a drastic measure to prevent Indian immigration has added to the movement. The whole subject is making a very nasty problem for the British government.

Should the British Government oppose this action of Canada it might entail other serious difficulties, including a refusal of the assistance promised for the navy.

The Anglo-Japanese alliance is also causing the Empire a lot of trouble. All the dominions are seeking population to build up their countries and at the same time insist on keeping out all Orientals.

Latest Despatches

El Paso, Dec. 15.—A thousand refugees who have arrived at Chihuahua bring stories of the atrocities practiced by the rebel leader Villa. He has confiscated a large amount of private property and ill-treats all foreigners within his reach. The German consul has protested the confiscation of German property.

London, Dec. 15.—There is great rejoicing among the Unionists here over the result of the election in Lanark. The Graphic warns, however, not to place too much confidence in the result of that bye-election. A general election over Home Rule might be favorable to the Unionists, but if unsuccessful, would be their entire undoing.

THE AUXILIARY PLANT

The question has frequently been asked as to whether the present steam electric plant could not be used as an auxiliary plant. Supt. Duncan says it would be too expensive to maintain. It would require constant attendance and a large consumption of coal to keep the boilers warm. If it was required in case of emergency it would take it one hour to throw it into work and even then it would only take care of part of the power which the city will soon be using. A diesel oil plant can be thrown into operation in eight minutes.

TWO BOATS A WEEK

The Prince John Will Go Into Direct Route After January First.

It is announced from Vancouver that after the taking of the Prince George the winter service of the Grand Trunk Pacific steamships provides for two sailings a week between Prince Rupert and the south, the boats leaving on Monday and Thursday nights, the Monday boat being the Prince Rupert and the Thursday sailings being taken by the Prince Albert and Prince John alternately.

On Thursday night, January 1, the John will take the run direct from Vancouver to Prince Rupert. The Prince George will go into drydock to be repaired and overhauled. The Stewart and Queen Charlotte Islands will be given a fortnightly service.

COAL NOW \$10 TON

Rogers & Black Cut the Price \$1.00 a Ton on Wellington Coal

GRAHAM ISLAND OIL.

J. G. Johnston, who is well known as a pioneer of the Queen Charlotte Islands, more particularly Graham Island, has left for Toronto, New York and London. Mr. Johnston claims that he has located oil and coal of excellent quality on the northwestern portion of Graham Island and North Island, almost facing Prince Rupert, and it is his intention to interest financial and mining magnates in these Eastern centres with a view to the commercial development of Graham Island mining properties.

GARDE vs MINOR

A Local Mining Man Obtains Judgment Against Frisco Capitalist

A case of interest to local mining men was up this morning before His Lordship Judge Murphy and a special jury.

Mr. A. C. Garde asked for judgment against Colonel Minor, for salary, expenses and damages to his professional reputation. Williams & Manson appeared for the plaintiff and Patmore & Winton for the defendant.

The case is more or less familiar to Prince Rupert people and as the judge said was more an arithmetical problem than a question of law.

Colonel Minor engaged Mr. Garde as consulting engineer to take charge of the development of some placer leases on Graham Island, and gave him full authority to install machinery and open up the properties at a salary of \$250 a month with expenses at \$400 a month.

Mr. Garde came to Prince Rupert and had the machinery here when suddenly the Colonel's exchequer played out. Several urgent telegrams failed to bring forth anything but promises and Mr. Garde found himself stranded in Prince Rupert with his professional reputation seriously damaged as a result of his connection with a defunct mining company.

The machinery was advertised in his name by the Grand Trunk Pacific and sold to defray expenses.

Unfortunately for Mr. Garde he took upon himself to adjust a difference between Mr. Pearson, who was associated with him in this enterprise, and Col. Minor by turning over to Mr. Pearson five hundred dollars worth of the Colonel's quicksilver.

This the court decided he would have to pay for and with the exception of this \$500 the whole claim was allowed. Judgment for plaintiff \$918.63 and costs.

QUEBEC LIBERALS ARE READY FOR HOT FIGHT

Meeting Held in Montreal Decides to Contest Every N Seat in Province

Montreal, Dec. 11.—"We will make a vigorous fight in every county of the province of Quebec."

This was the statement made after the caucus of the Liberal party held yesterday at the Windsor Hotel, attended by every member of the Montreal district.

There were present at this meeting Sir Wilfrid Laurier, Sir Frederick Borden, Hon. George Graham, Hon. Sydney Fisher, Robert Bickerdike and the Montreal members of the caucus.

Much enthusiasm was expressed at the meeting and the presence of Sir Wilfrid Laurier developed a fighting spirit.

The chief point of the meeting was the decision that the Liberal party should contest every seat in the province of Quebec.

Meanwhile no suggestion was offered as to the seat for Mr. Fielding. Mr. Bickerdike denied that he contemplated retiring to make room for the ex-finance minister.

"I intend to take my seat at Ottawa when Parliament opens next month," he added.

DAWSON AUTO ROAD READY NEXT YEAR

Another Year's Work will Make Road Available at any Season

Dawson, Dec. 12.—C. S. W. Barwell, the engineer who was employed this year on the overland trail improvements, is back in Dawson after an extended trip. He says that he traveled practically the whole of the way from Dawson to Whitehorse and return on foot, and can say that another year's work like that of 1913 will put the road into such a condition that it can be travelled at any season of the year by wagon or automobile. There is much yet to be done but the finish is in sight.

"On the whole, you may expect an auto road from Dawson to Whitehorse by the end of 1914."

OPPOSITION TACTICS

The forces opposed to Mayor Pattullo are doing all in their power to make an issue of the Hydro-Electric proposals. They want the mayor to father the scheme, and then they will come along as the supposed protectors of the people.

Any fair minded citizen will see that these men are not sincere for then they would not use it for political purposes, nor to make an exhibition of spleen. A sincere opponent of the scheme would start an agitation to defeat the bylaw as such, and would keep so far away from its political aspect that no one could charge him with ulterior motives.

The mayor realizes as few do the seriousness of the power situation and he evidently believes that the Hydro-Electric proposals is the only speedy solution in sight, and surely we all have a right to our opinions. However the Council is submitting another alternative proposition to the people in the form of a municipal diesel oil plant. This might later become an auxiliary (and this will be necessary) and in the meantime serve the city very economically, while we are endeavoring to secure a stronger water power than the one we now have at Woodworth Lake.

It might indeed turn out that the people would turn down both of these schemes.

Perhaps the citizens would sooner stand a shortage of electricity and use the present expensive plant as an auxiliary than tie up with a private corporation, and in that case no time should be lost in developing the best water power available. Should that be the decision of the people at the polls there is no one who would quicker carry out those wishes in that respect than the present mayor.

The people must first consider however, whether or not this can be done. There is an amount something over a million standing out in short term treasury certificates that must be shortly financed. Besides this the first care of those in authority should be for the health of the citizens. Should there be a large inrush of people within the next year what about our water and sewers. We are even now badly in need of sewers, but with our population doubled the conditions would be serious. To settle the question of water and sewers will require anywhere from a half million to a million dollars. If we take even \$150,000 at present for our electric problem, what about the other million and a half, or two million that we must have. This is not intended as an argument in favor of the proposals. It is rather a concrete statement of the difficulties of financing our own scheme, and if those who favor it would explain this away a good many people would be brought to their way of thinking.

NATIONALISTS ARE WILLING TO SIGN TREATY WITH UNIONISTS

JOSEPH DEVLIN SAYS NATIONALISTS READY TO GO ANY LENGTH SHORT OF SACRIFICING PRINCIPLE OF IRISH PARLIAMENT

London, Dec. 10.—The urgency of the problem of financing the new naval expenditure to which Mr. Asquith's latest speech bears witness, makes it more than ever imperative to settle the Irish problem by consent. Mr. Joseph Devlin's conciliatory speech on Sunday at Rathdrum, close to Avondale, the birthplace of Parnell, gains importance from the fact that he is regarded as Mr. Redmond's most pronounced Nationalist advisor.

Mr. Devlin said he welcomed Sir Edward Carson's latest attitude. The Irish Nationalists were willing to go any length short of sacrificing the principle of an Irish parliament to conciliate their fellow Unionist countrymen. They were willing to go a deal further than half way and to sign a lasting treaty of peace and goodwill.

Irresponsible politicians like Mr. Joynton-Hicks, M.P., who ousted Mr. Churchill from his Manchester seat are, however, busy keeping up the hearts of the party men. Mr. Joynton-Hicks said on Saturday at Warrington: "The people of Ulster have, behind them, the Lord God of Battles. In his name and their name I say to the Prime Minister, 'Let your armies and batteries fire. Fire if you dare. Fire and be damned.'"

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WILL HUNT FOR PLACER GOLD BEYOND MEZIADEN LAKE

STEWART PROSPECTORS HAVE LONG HAD THEIR EYE ON THIS COUNTRY—A TRAIL IS NOW OPEN

As soon as the heavy snowfalls are over and the crust permits travelling by dog team several parties will be leaving Stewart to prospect for placer in the country which lies about eighty miles northwest of Meziaden Lake. This land of promise has been the goal gazed at with longing eyes by the prospector for years past, but until the opening up of the country by the Groundhog trail it has by lack of transportation facilities been rendered practically impregnable.

Hence lead those alluvial streams, the Unic, the Chimen, the Iskut and Stikine, from all of which at various times placer gold has been sluiced, but with Port Simpson or Telegraph Creek as the only bases from which supplies could be taken in, it has always been found impossible to prospect for any length of time, and the country has remained unexplored. The theory which is maintained by Bob Quinn and other prospectors of widespread experience who propose to test

this territory is that the alluvial deposits are to be found north of the shale and sandstone contact. As examples, they point out the shale existent on the Taltan and Tuya rivers, north of which lies the old Cassiar diggings. Again, south of Atlin is shale and coal croppings. Again it is found at Fir Fingers on the Yukon, beyond which lies Dawson; and in each case the auriferous region is equidistant from the contact. They therefore contend that when once north of the shale on the Naas, they will find themselves in a gold-bearing formation.

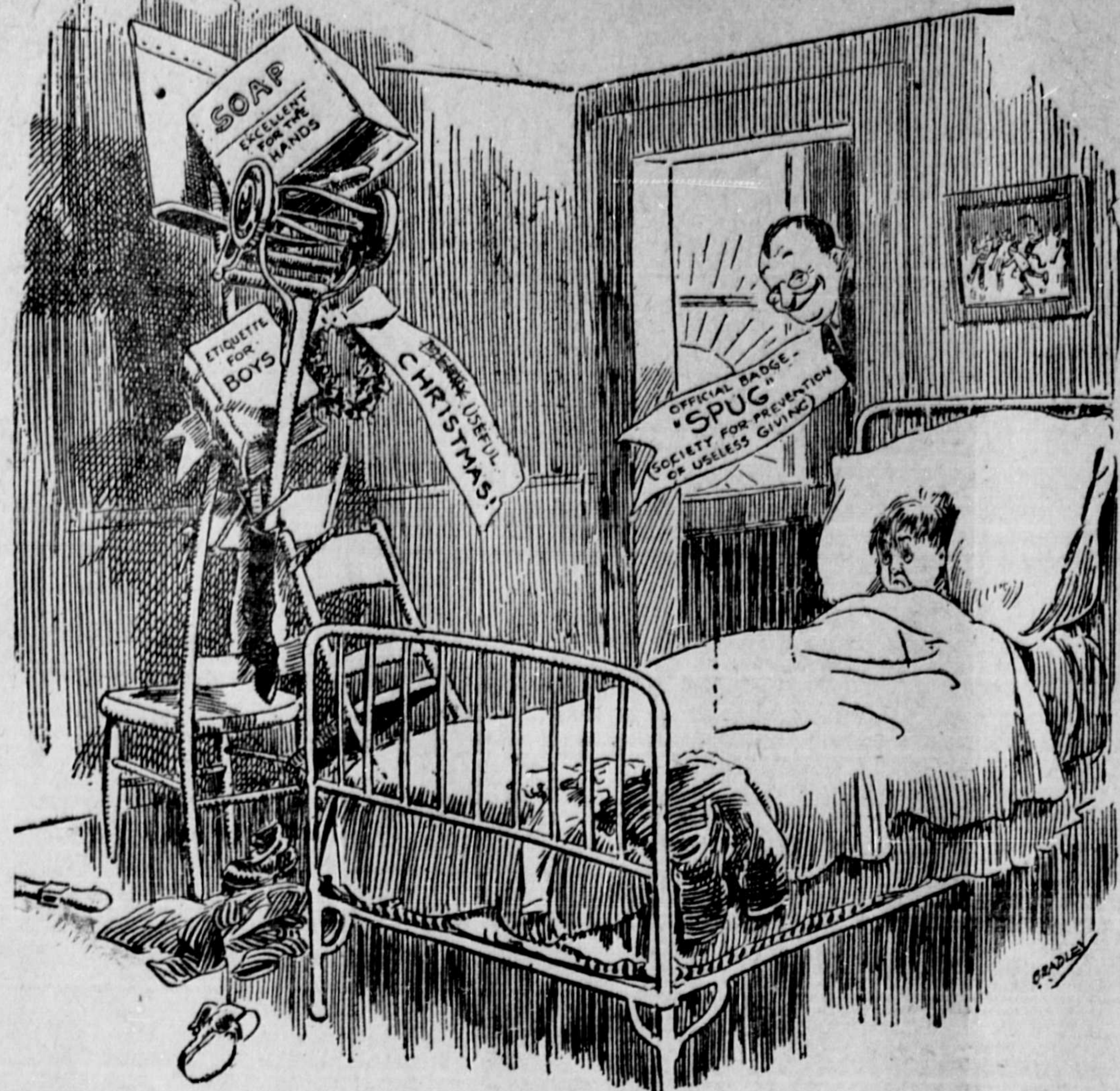
