



ON HANDLING WHEAT Saskatchewan Member Thinks Three Canadian Railroads Hold Record in Efficiency

COMPLIMENTS RAILWAYS

Regina, Dec. 23 .- Demonstrating that the three railways of Canada, in handling the grain crop of the west during the present season have surpassed 'all previous records in efficiency, R. J. Phin, member of the assembly for Pipestone, in moving a resolution expressing the approval of the house of the efforts put forth by the companies to solve the full transportation problem, cited remarkable statistics of the season's traffic. In the resolution, which was carried by an unanimous vote of the legislature, especial reference was made to the expeditious and efficient manner in which the C. P. R. has carried out its traffic undertakings.

Mr. Phin's statement showed that in a single day the C. P. R. had loaded 2,000,000 bushels and up to December 6, 105,500,000 bushels. Their best previous record showed that during the same period 67,000,000 bushels had been loaded. The three great railways of Canada had forwarded for inspection in September, October and November of last year, 75,246 cars, while this year they handled in the same time 116,385, or more than 50 per cent in excess of the total of 1913. Of these the C. P. R. handled 60 per cent, the C. N. R. 28 per cent, and the G. T. P. 12 per cent.


