#### MAGNIFICENT SCENIC TRIP WILL PLEASE MANY TOURISTS

GENERAL MANAGER DONALDSON OF THE G. T. P. COMMENTS ON INTERIOR COUNTRY—THE LINE MAY BE LINKED UP IN MAY

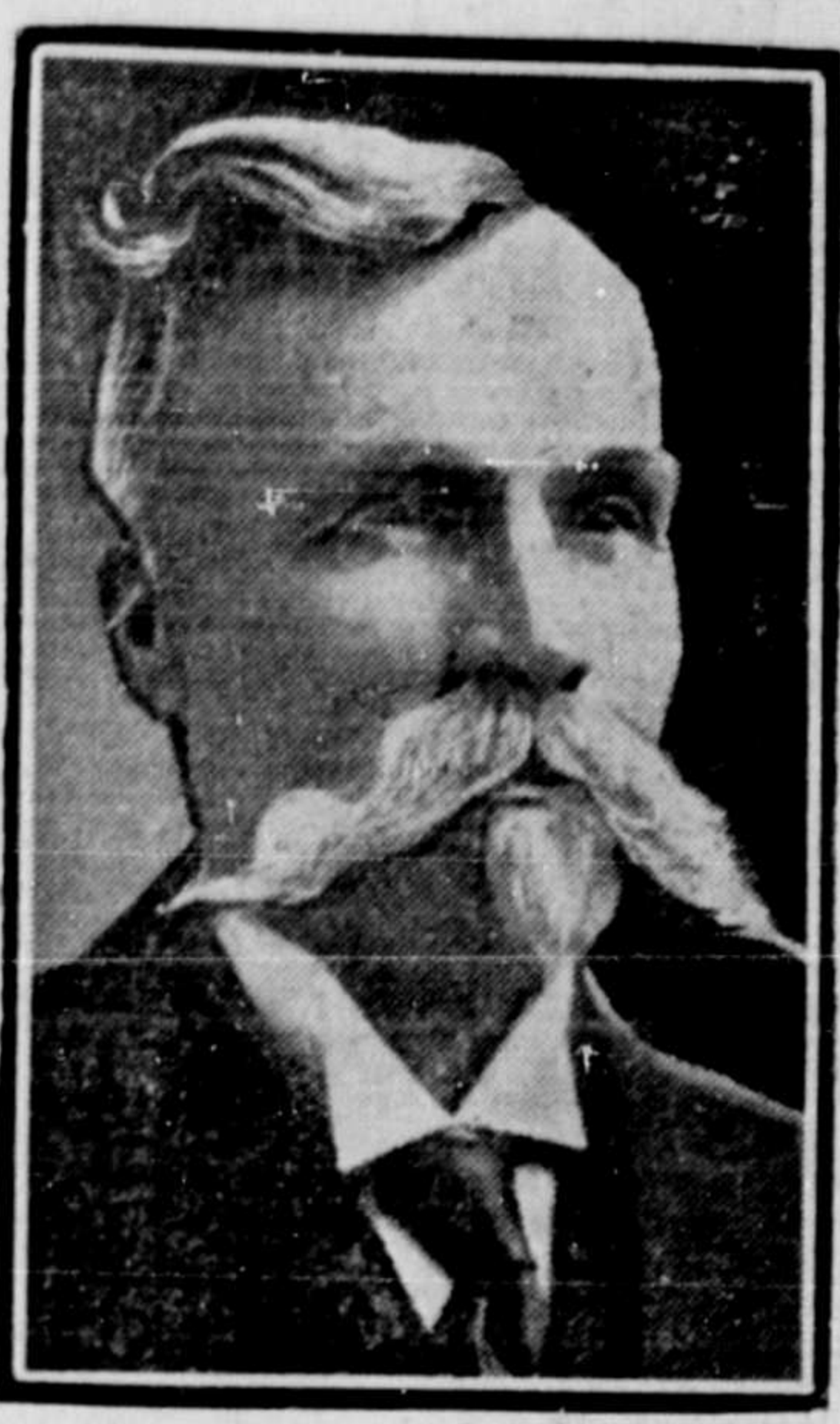
"The ride on this new railway from the Lower Fraser Lake down to Prince Rupert is going to bring many pleased tourists to your city." This was the comment of Morley Donaldson, general manager of the Grand Trunk Pacific, on his return yesterday from a trip to the end of steel. Mr. Donaldson and party had been four days on the trip and thoroughly enjoyed it. They were charmed with the magnificent scenery in endless variety which unfolds itself in the 300 miles between the placid mountain lakes and the tide water. "I consider it is the prettiest stretch of scenery on the continent," said Mr. Donaldson, and he predicts a tremendous tourist traffic in the years to come.

The general manager's party went out to the end of steel, where track laying is still in progress. The grading is pretty well completed on that section. There is one heavy piece which will be finished about January 10, when track laying will continue to Mile 244. Mr. Donaldson expects the grading to be completed about the first of April and a month later the tracks will probably be linked up. It will take all summer, however, to get the roadbed in shape for traffic. In fact Mr. Donaldson does not anticipate that the company will run any high class transcontinental trains before the beginning of 1915. If the traffic demands it they put through a limited service in the autumn.

Asked about the mud slides east of Hazelton, Mr. Donaldson said they were not serious. A railway company expects difficulties of this kind in going through new country. There will be more or less trouble for some years, but these are easily handled.

There are only temporary bridges being put over the Fraser and Nechaco rivers in order to rush construction. These will have to be replaced by steel bridges, and that work will take some months. Mr. Donaldson says there are now about 7000 men on construction work, but this number will drop off automatically from now on.

#### LIGHTHOUSE TENDER HAS ROUGH CRUISE

Captain of Estevan Says Weather Was Worst He Ever Encountered.

"Never before have I experienced such dirty weather as on the recent cruise," said Captain Barnes, master of the Dominion lighthouse tender Estevan, when he landed in Victoria a few days ago, after being away for six weeks attending aids to navigation and the lighthouses along the British Columbia coast as far north as Langara Island.

For the greater part of the time she was away the Estevan was exposed to the full force of the southeasters that have been sweeping the coast for several weeks past, and on numerous occasions the skipper of the lighthouse tender was forced to head his vessel for the shelter of some nearby cove. In spite of the rough weather the Estevan succeeded in finishing all the work she set to do in addition to rescuing the crew of the wrecked steamer Jeanie. When the big tender left Victoria six weeks ago her officers stated that they would be back in time for the Christmas holidays, and they kept their word.

The Dominion tender Quadra, Captain LeBlanc, has also been on a long outing to Portland Canal, and she also is fully due back to remain in port during the festive season. The fisheries protection cruiser Newington, Captain Bilton, came in yesterday from the west coast, and it is not expected that she will again put to sea again in search of the poacehr before the end of the year.

#### Madame X Proves Great Success

#### HOPE TO MAKE BIG SHIPBUILDING INDUSTRY

Morley Donaldson Thinks Dry Dock Will Attract Business—Expensive Waterfront

Yesterday afternoon the general manager of the G. T. P. visited the dry dock under construction and noted the good progress being made. "We have the most expensive waterfront on the continent," commented Mr. Donaldson. "It has cost us a tremendous amount of money for wharfage and dockage. I don't think people realize how much it has been necessary to put in here. I don't think we get the credit we deserve for this."

Mr. Donaldson expected that next fall the G. T. P. boats would be laid up in the dry docks here. By having the best dock and by doing work at reasonable prices the company hopes and believes it will build up a great shipbuilding and repairing industry here.

#### PASSED READING WITHOUT DISSENT

Money Bylaws Aggregating \$200,000 to Be Submitted to the Electors

Money bylaws aggregating the expenditure of \$200,000 were passed their second reading at the council meeting last evening and sent forward to be prepared to be submitted to the electors on January 15th. There was no dissenting voice. The bylaws included the Hydro-Electric agreement, one for the providing of a recreation park, the extension of the telephone system, the extension of the electric lighting system, the installation of a Diesel engine as auxiliary to the permanent system that might be installed if so decided upon and the erection of a municipal building on Fulton Street.

The mayor drew attention to an alteration in the hydro-electric agreement as announced yesterday. Section 22 is now altered so that the last clause of the section, reading: "that is supplied to the city of Prince Rupert," was now made to read "that is supplied to the customers of the city of Prince Rupert."

Ald. Kerr said the company was advertising power at Port Edward at \$35 a horse power. The information is obtainable at the company's office.

The mayor said the language of the agreement that the company was prepared to enter into was clear. It was that there would be no power furnished at a lower rate than was supplied to the customers of the city of Prince Rupert.

The steamer Prince Albert is laid up at Vancouver and will not arrive here until January 3. She will cut out one trip and her next arrival in Prince Rupert will be on Jan. 6 at 8 a. m. The special trip to Massett on Jan. 4 will be taken by the steamer Vadso.

#### G. T. P. WILL ACCOMMODATE RUPERT BUSINESS MEN

General Manager Replies to Query About the Special Train East

When asked about the special train from Prince Rupert east to be used as a Prince Rupert advertisement immediately after the line is opened, General Manager Donaldson told The Daily News that this matter had been brought to his attention some time ago. "While it is impossible to make such a promise at the present time," said Mr. Donaldson, "when the time comes if it is going to be an accommodation to the business men of Prince Rupert we will try and arrange it."

#### Larkin May Go to U. S.

Dublin, Dec. 27.—James Larkin, the labor leader, it is stated, will start for the United States next week. Larkin, however, declines to say whether he is going or not. When it was suggested that the American authorities might exclude him he said: "If I wanted to enter the United States all the governments you ever heard of could not keep me out."

#### CHRISTMAS DAY STORM IN THE GULF OF MEXICO

SEVERAL SHIPS LOST, OTHERS WRECKED AND SEVERAL ARE CAUSING ANXIETY—TUGS OUT IN SEARCH

(Special to The Daily News.) Mobile, Ala., Dec. 30.—Three vessels are lost and several missing as a result of a storm on Christmas day in the Gulf of Mexico. The greatest anxiety is also felt for the brig Motley, and schooners Glenafton and Schorn, which sailed from this port shortly before the storm broke out. A despatch from Tampa tells of a schooner in distress 120 miles west of Cedar Keys. Several tugs are out searching for the disabled vessels.

#### THREE MOUNTED POLICE LOST IN PEACE RIVER DISTRICT

LEFT SASKATOON NOVEMBER 13—ALARM RAISED WHEN A TRAPPER FOUND THEIR GUNS IN WILDS

(Special to The Daily News.) Regina, Dec. 30.—Two members of the Northwest Mounted Police, Sergeant Harper and Constable Stevenson, together with a packer by the name of Richard Harrington, are lost in the Peace River district in the wilds of northern Saskatchewan, according to reports received by the police commissioner here. The three men constituted a patrol which left Saskatoon Lake November 13. The alarm was raised when trappers discovered their guns in the woods. A search party will be sent out immediately.

#### USE STEAM SHOVELS TO STOP MUD SLIDES

Will Work This Winter at Duncan and Mud Creek—Ballast Starts in Spring

The Grand Trunk Pacific railway has decided to avoid further trouble on account of mud slides at the big cut at Duncan, a few miles east of here, and at the big sidehill cut at Mud Creek, a few miles further east. It was at these two places the most trouble was caused a couple of weeks ago, and in the spring there would be more slides if left in the present condition. Today two steam shovels will come down from the east, one to Mud Creek and the other to Duncan, and these will work at those places all winter, widening the cuts several hundred feet. The job will be difficult, as all the material will have to be blasted before the shovels can work.

In the spring the company will put all their gravel trains on the second hundred miles east of Prince Rupert and ballast the track up to its standard grade. The second hundred miles is from Kitselas to Smithers. New Hazelton will be the headquarters for the gravel trains, and this will be an important railway point all next summer.—Omineca Herald.

The winding up of the C. H. I. C. has given another jolt to the average man's confidence in new forms of investment. This company started out with fair promises and it was believed that the men behind it were honorable and competent. After apparently having made a splendid start and having advanced many loans to their contract holders they suddenly suspended operations and transferred all their assets to a new concern.

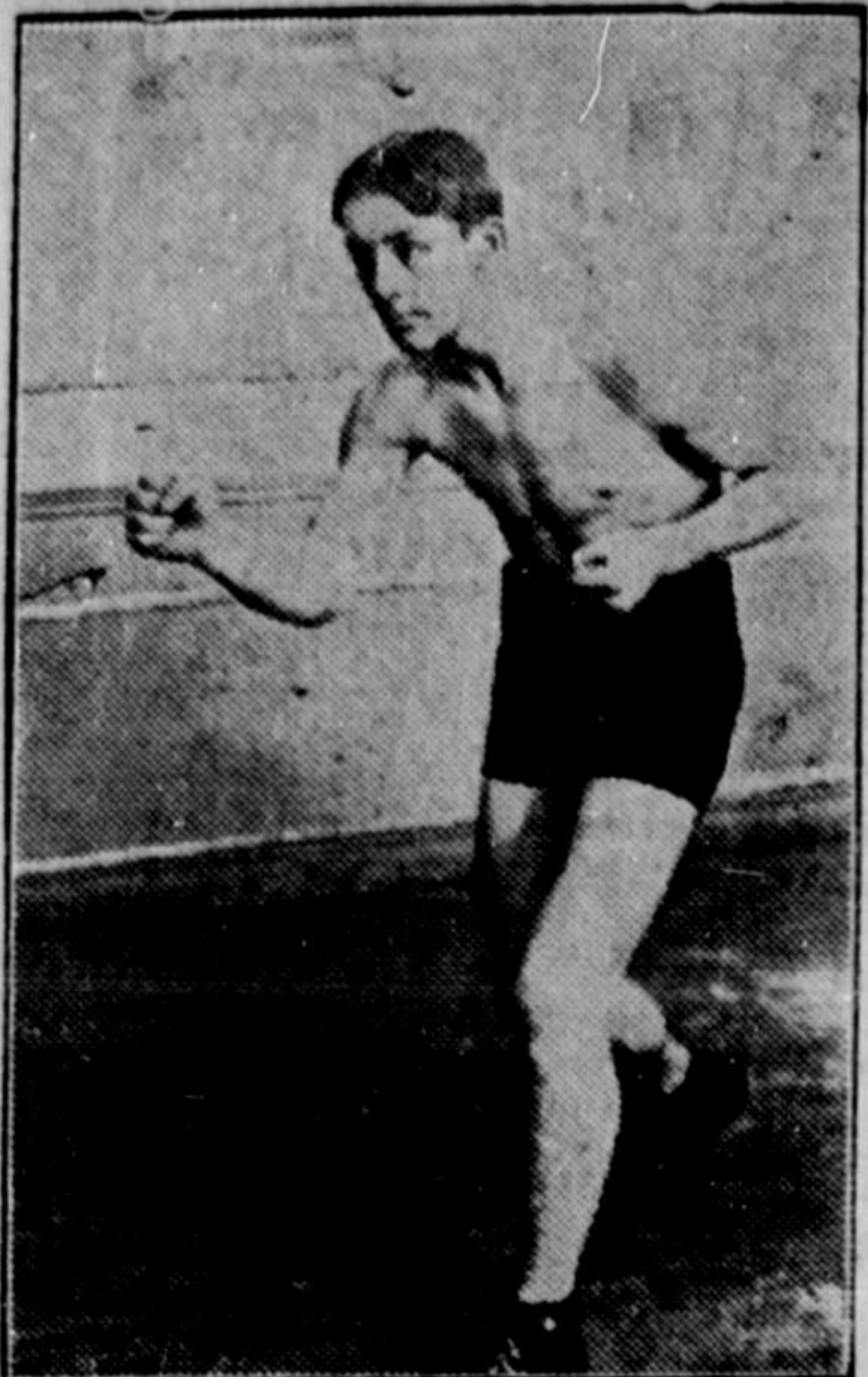
The original contract supplied to investors was a very stable document and made ample provision for their protection. Just before announcing the determination to dissolve, however, it appears that they succeeded in convincing the contract holders that a change of contract was necessary and would be to their advantage. A great many of them fell for this and they are today reaping their reward in tears.

It now happens that the surrender value of these contracts is worth only about fifty cents on the dollar. Preferred shares in a new company are of course offered to the shorn lambs who are not in a mental attitude for further confidences, but even then they would not receive anything

like par value for the cash paid in.

This is certainly a case that should be investigated by the government and the guilty parties brought to justice. Laws should be immediately provided that would keep fakirs of this class out of the channels of legitimate business. As for the public, it would appear as if they enjoyed an occasional holdup, but the government should extend their paternal influence and save the people from themselves.

Everybody knows the little boy who refused his supper and then cried because he didn't get it. It is not often that we find this trait in grown up men, but that distinction belongs to one of our local editors. He had the same chance that other newspapers had to secure the recent advertising. Indeed he was urged to accept it at the same price paid the other papers, but if he did this he wouldn't have a chance to howl. "Cut off your nose and spite your face" seems to be his motto, and from all appearances he seems to be getting results. No doubt he will declare one of these days he refused the advertis-

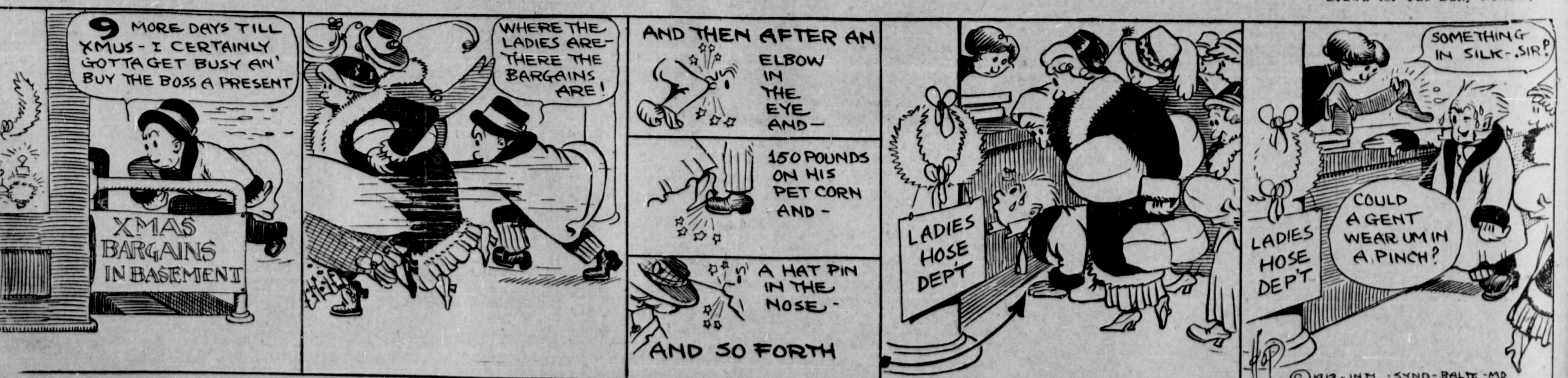

Lord Kitchener's dilemma, as seen by the artist of the London Graphic. A rumor is abroad that Kitchener is to succeed Viscount Hardinge as Viceroy of India. The gallant Kitch will find it a trying ordeal to choose between two fields, in both of which he has made separate and splendid reputations. The theory is that the British Government feels the need of Kitchener's strong presence in India, during this time when the Hindus are restive, under the expulsion of their fellow countrymen from Canada and South Africa.

GENERAL NEWS NOTES

The Dominion Government recently purchased three miles of waterfront at Quebec and will make big terminals there for the National Transcontinental Railway. Quebec will be tested as a winter port, as the route is much shorter than to Halifax.

German engineers are planning two new railways in China to cost \$20,000,000.

The Calgary oil fever continues unabated. Recently a California expert investigated the field for Vancouver parties. They took up several sections near Brooks, Alta. A few days later thirty-six citizens of Brooks invaded the Calgary land office and filed on thirty-six neighboring sections.

Since the closing of the hotels in London, England, at a fixed hour every evening, a number of night clubs have come into existence where society spends its time after the theatres. The big hotels, which can no longer serve supper after the theatre are making a protest about these night clubs, and the question of their licensing will come up at the next session of parliament.

The city of Seattle won a suit against the city traction companies who objected to exchanging transfers on a fifty per cent basis. The street car companies will now have to give the transfers.

The Vancouver Progress Club is in financial difficulties. It is over \$9,000 behind and no prospects of recuperating the treasury. The members now propose to have it taken over by a new organization to be called Greater Vancouver Chamber of Commerce.

S. H. Meyers, president of the Western Federation of Miners, was badly used up when he was deported Friday from the scene of his recent agitation among the strikers at Calumet. He was beaten with the butt of a revolver and shot in the back. He now lies in a Chicago hospital, claiming he will go back as soon as he gets well.

According to a local paper 50 cases of smallpox are recorded at Goodlands, Man. Many other cases are said to have been located in East Cartwright.

A large gasoline launch belonging to the East Bella canoe club was completely destroyed by fire last week.

Government engineers state that in four years the Columbia River will be made navigable from Revelstoke to the Pacific coast.

A Royal Northwest Mounted Police expedition will leave Dawson the day after New Year's for Fort MacPherson and Herschel Island on the Arctic coast, carrying

advice and mails for explorer Stefansson. The expedition will also try to discover him and look after any needs that he and his party may have.

FUR MARKET IS LOW CATCH WILL BE BIG Promises to Be Good Season for Trappers in Bella Coola District—Lost Silver Foxes. The fall catch of fur is beginning to arrive at Bella Coola, says the Courier. Charlie Hendricks, who is trapping on Dean Channel, came in last week with a good catch of beaver and mink. Antoine Capoose, the well-known Indian from Anaham Lake, brought down a big bunch of fine Interior furs, including three beautiful silver fox hides, in addition to which he had a live cross fox. The cross fox, which was a full-grown male, and a very fine specimen, was purchased by Mr. O. T. Landry, who shipped it to Vancouver by the last Chelohsin.

Reports from the Interior state that fur of every kind is very plentiful this winter. Owing to the demand for live fur-bearing animals, many of the Indians are keeping their catches alive. One Indian had three fine silver foxes but lost them through carelessness. The winter so far has been exceptionally favorable to the trapper and big catches are being made.

## LETHBRIDGE ADOPTS COMMISSION GOVT.

Elected Three Engineers as Commissioners—Charter Contains All Modern Policies

Lethbridge is about the first Canadian western city to adopt the modern system of commission form of municipal government in its most radical form.

The Lethbridge charter provides for three commissioners. The mayor, who is also the commissioner of finance and safety, will have a salary of \$4,000. The commissioner of public works and the commissioner of public utilities will each receive salaries of \$3,500. Each department is clearly defined and each commissioner is responsible for its administration. The commissioners sit as a council to enact bylaws, etc.

The initiative, referendum and recall are included in the plan, as are also woman suffrage and preferential voting.

The first election for commissioners was held on December 8, resulting in the choice of the above. There were altogether 15 candidates for the three positions. To win a candidate must receive a majority of all votes cast. In case the first choice of the voters does not elect, then the second choices are regarded and so on until one has the required number. In this election it was necessary to count to the fourth choices in two of the three cases.

Those elected are all engineers. The mayor is a civil engineering engineer. The commissioner of public works is a civil engineer. The commissioner of public utilities is an electrical engineer.

The new Lethbridge government will become effective on January 1, 1914.



Want Government Guarantee

Guarantee of the bonds of the Burrard Inlet Tunnel and Bridge Company to the amount of \$750,000 is to be asked of the Provincial Government as a result of the decision of the directors, made last week, this course being taken in consequence of the government's refusal last week to agree to the request that it should take over the \$750,000 raised by the municipalities, the \$350,000 donated by the Dominion Government, the \$400,000 contributed by the province, to give another \$1,000,000 and to erect the \$2,500,000 structure.

### Civic Election Officers

At the council meeting last night it was decided to appoint F. R. C. Brown returning officer for the civic election. The various deputy returning officers were also named as follows: W. J. Greer, J. W. Potter, W. R. Martin, Peter McLachlan, P. J. Gibbons, Gilbert Burrows, H. V. Scott, G. C. Emmerson and Charles Dennis. The nominations for mayor, aldermen and school trustees will be held in the police court in the City Hall on Monday, January 12, from 12 noon to 2 p. m. The polling will be on Thursday, January 15, from 9 a. m. to 7 p. m.
