SMALLPOX PATIENTS **RUNNING LOOS**

Barber Shaves One of Them and Is Now Among the Numerous Victims

Walla Walla, Jan. 1.-That the smallpox patients of the country pesthouse, recently numbering half a dozen men, left the premises and came to this city at will, in addition to raiding nearby chicken houses and enjoying midnight feeds and card games. were the complaints made to the county commissioners in session this afternoon.

It was alleged that one patient came into a barber shop here. got a shave, and gave the disease to the proprietor of the shop and exposed himself to many others.

Three more cases were discovered and sent there today by the health authorities, and now the commissioners are considering placing an armed guard over the premises to maintain a strict quarantine. This brings the total number of smallpox cases discovered in this city during the past few weeks up to about 20.
