#### CHISHANA STRIKE A FROST SAY WELL KNOWN PIONEERS

ONLY ONE BIT OF PAYSTREAK AND FEW POCKETS--CAMP IS BROKE--GOOD FOR TRANSPORTATION COMPANY

Two well known prospectors of the northern gold fields expressing their opinions of the Chishana gold camp this morning, and their reports are that the field is frost.

Angus Beeton, well known in Prince Rupert as a most reliable prospector, says the camp is no good, that the town is broke and everyone leaving. There are only 10 people left and they are leaving rapidly. The discovery claim located in a canyon about 20 feet wide. This is a natural ice box and it is easy to take the gold. But the pay streak is not continuous. The benches are all on an angle of 45 degrees with an occasional pocket in which color is found. There have been many holes put down but nothing found. A lot of the Dawson boys have done enough work to hold their claims a year and left the country, expecting to return. Connected with the Klondike days it could not be considered a find at all.

The only persons who are making any money are the transportation companies.

Mr. Beeton left Prince Rupert last August and went into the

camp. He is now through, having satisfied himself that it is no good. He walked out a few days ago, making the 330 miles in 11 and a half days. Mrs. Beeton accompanied him on the trip in and also came out at the same time. They are going to Vancouver on the Princess May.

Another old-timer going south this morning from Chishana was Sheriff Eilbeck, formerly of Dawson and now of California. He went in with his son Jack last summer. They put down 16 holes and found nothing. Neither did they find any one else who had got anything. They were disgusted with the country. The sheriff and his son are well known to all old Dawsonites. They are practical men whose word can be relied on. They went south on the Spokane this morning.

The reorganization of the Accounting Department of the city is one of the most important works that has been done by the council in this city. It means a saving of many dollars practically every property holder in the city. If anyone doubts this the Mayor has issued an invitation to any ratepayer to come to the city hall and examine the city books and see for himself.

Ottawa, Jan. 10.—Having failed to secure the approval of the interprovincial conference for their claims for an irreducible minimum for Nova Scotia, New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island, these provinces have appealed to the government here. The case was presented by Premier Flemming of New Brunswick. The government gave him a sympathetic hearing, the premier stating that he fully recognized the importance of the subject, but no definite promise was given.

cheaper than we are now paying rather than undergo the uncertainty of the next two years, unable to supply industries with power or to give any light extensions, and meantime paying a terrific price, as we now are, for electric light and power.

The interest paid to the Bank of Montreal on general fund for 1912 was \$3,284; the interest paid in 1913 \$823. This more than offsets the difference in salaries paid this year and last year with ten times the efficiency. As a matter of fact there was no efficiency last year in the treasury and collector's departments. This year the work is as well ordered as the work of the very best corporations.

This year the administration has opened up a large number of additional accounts at the bank. For instance, all telephone monies go into a telephone account, and all monies paid out on telephone will be paid from that account. Future mayors and councils will not be able to issue cheques against the telephone account for street work without rendering themselves liable to a severe penalty. This is systematizing in the direction of protecting the credit as well as the funds of the city.

#### POLICE DEPARTMENT IS MOST EFFICIENT

Commissioners Commend Chief and His Staff on Good Work

The city police department met yesterday afternoon and transacted general business. The chief's report for the month showed fines amounting to \$173.50. It was an exceptionally good month, there being no serious crimes.

The chief's third annual report showed 542 cases with 476 convictions. Of these 267 were drunks and 23 thefts. The fines collected were \$4,007.50, a slight decrease from last year.

The chief recommended another constable for night patrol, the purchase of a photographic apparatus to make up a rogues' gallery to be used for exchange with other police departments; also a filing cabinet for fingerprint forms, which system is now in use here.

The report was accepted and held for the new commission.

Commissioner Maitland stated there had been no trouble in the commission during the year and no kicking. Everything was straight. He had watched all the members of the police force and concluded it was the best police force in British Columbia. He suggested buying an auto patrol wagon for the department when in funds.

The mayor was pleased to corroborate the remarks on the department efficiency. He had too no complaint concerning them during the year and many commendations. The work had entailed no burden on him as a commissioner or as mayor. The chief had been given complete control of his department and had no interference from himself. He thought the suggestion for an auto patrol a little premature. It was cheaper to call an auto. He expressed a feeling of good will to the other commissioners.

#### ALD. DYBHAVN MADE MEETING BOOMERANG FOR NEWTON

ERSTWHILE ALLY SHOWS OF DELIBERATE MISSTATEMENTS OF EX-MAYOR--DEBUNKED STRONG LANGUAGE

The Newton meeting at the Westholme last evening drew a big audience, but it did not have the same enthusiasm for the

mayorality candidate as his previous meeting. Wm. Manson, M. P. P., was chairman.

The first speaker was Ald. Tom Maitland, who said he was accused of being prejudiced against the contract system. He said his prejudice was against the system in which the contracts were given. He credited Contractor McMordie with being the smartest man of all because he sold his Section Two debentures. He read a city official's report which showed day work to be 30 per cent. higher than contract work, but by a process of reasoning he reduced that to a few cents difference, and what is a few cents for day labor? In discussing the power agreement he said it would be necessary to spend \$15,000 for a station to receive the power and \$45,000 for extensions. In the two candidates for mayor one wants to give away the city franchise and the other to keep it for the next generation.

Fred Shaw, an aldermanic candidate, stood for a policy of progress and maintaining all public utilities. H. Douglass was glad to state that he was back. He was here to protect the interests of Prince Rupert. Pattullo said there had been a deficit of \$30,000 last year. "There was not—we broke even. I wrote Mr. Pattullo a letter about it and he replied. I responded to it and he did not answer, which shows I am right." He is in favor of a policy of building up Prince Rupert and

wants to see every one fix up their homes and yards.

A voice—Clean up your own back yard.

Frank Salter was an independent candidate who pledged himself to study the best interests of the city regardless of who is mayor. He would use every effort to get the city hydro-electric scheme going or the Diesel oil plant. He didn't think the Prince Rupert Hydro-Electric Company could get the money to carry out the Falls River scheme. The local labor men could hope to get no work out of them.

D. W. Morrissey mentioned the industries which were already here without the assistance of the Hydro-Electric Company. The city could get along without them. This year's council had spent \$15,000 for public works. Last year's bunch of agitators had spent \$125,000. What you don't understand vote against.

W. H. Derry said that from a workman's point of view both mayorality candidates were gentlemen. He was running because he lived in Section Eight and could not get water. Pattullo did not care a rap for the workman. He didn't know much about the power agreement, but the way it looked to him, if the city bought power it would pay \$60,000 a year for it and all they would get would be electric light, but if the city developed their own power that \$60,000 would all be spent in the city.

S. M. Newton said it was clear they would hold up all public work. That was for the purpose of making it appear that all opponents were in favor of stagnation. It was a red herring

The meeting last night was the best Pattullo meeting yet. It was called by S. M. Newton and his supporters, but the result demonstrated beyond the shadow of a doubt that his case is lost. Men who previously to that were saying that the contest would be close were most enthusiastic in their belief that Mayor Pattullo has already won.

Several speakers preceded Mr. Newton, and while their remarks had nothing of enthusiasm in them, the crowd remained in silent expectation for the chief event. When that had come, however, it fell terribly flat. Mr. Newton had none of his old-time fire and before he was speaking fifteen minutes the crowd began to drift out, and before he was through the theatre was half empty.

The first mistake of the ex-mayor was in refusing to meet his opponents face to face. Mayor Pattullo had invited him to his previous meeting, but he refused to attend. When the Newton meeting was called he showed the white feather again and no invitation was sent either to the mayor or his supporters. His own followers were quietly asked to be present and the impression has got abroad that the old man is afraid to face the music.

Another noticeable feature of the meeting was the apparent discomfort of some of the gentlemen on the platform. This was particularly plain in the

attitude of the chairman, who, whatever his faults, at least likes to be in good company. There can be no doubt but that he regrets very much the embarrassing position in which he was placed, and it is doubtful if they will be able to rope him in again.

When every other effort failed to rouse enthusiasm, the ex-mayor decided to fall back on his old methods. The following are a few of the choice epithets which he used against his opponents: "Rascals," "robbers," "swindlers," "thieves." The use of such terms are enough to place a man behind the bars if he made his charge direct, but he knows that they are not true and therefore makes them in a general way. If any of our public men come under those classifications the people should know it, and Sam Newton or any one else would be backed up in his effort to rid the city of them. If he knows the facts the easiest way for him to get elected is to make his charges straight and expose the guilty parties. The people are weary of these veiled insinuations and will soon lose faith in a man who will not speak out.

The Hydro-Electric agreement is still uppermost and a big vote may be expected on that issue. The strangest kind of arguments are used against it. One man said that it is a scheme to boost Port Edward. As a matter of fact the more

little towns there are about Prince Rupert the better, and only the narrowest of minds will entertain such foolish notions. Indeed if this city refuses the company's agreement it is only natural that they might turn more of their attention to Port Edward than if they were admitted to this city. The Prince Rupert Hydro-Electric Company are in this district to stay. They have already a large outlay in capital, and if they can show that cheaper power can be had at Port Edward than here they are sure to attract business there that would otherwise come to this town.

We hear it said that the company want a monopoly from the city. As a matter of fact the city is offered a monopoly from the company. They are ready to give us an option on their first 3,000 horsepower. In this way the city can prevent outside points competing with us for power. This monopoly can be ours if we want it. We are giving away no franchise. A franchise is a concession granted within the city; the right to come in and sink perpetual power. Whatever defects the agreement may have, two things are clear. The period of the contract is twenty years; the maximum amount of power they ask us to buy is 3,000 horsepower, and these are the two most important clauses in the agreement.

Those who say the company should compete at the city's gate are trying to turn down the best part of the contract. If the agreement does not pass what the company is likely to do is to sit down till Rupert has a market worth going after, and then they will demand their price. We have a chance now to bind them down to a reasonable price, and if we don't take it we are sure to rue our action. The acceptance of the agreement means cheap power, and that almost immediately.

The ex-mayor went into a terrible rage about the city advertising. He says thousands of dollars were paid out for this purpose. Instead of that sum, this paper finds on its books a few paltry hundreds, which any citizen can verify. Besides this, the price paid by the city varies only from a third to a half of the price charged to private business men. And then, Sam Newton was offered his share of this work, but he turned it down flat. He would have nothing to do with it at the price the others papers charged. He wanted an increase of 20 per cent., and now he has the audacity to take the stand he does. His conduct clearly shows him to be devoid of all moral and social virtue.

## Mining Machinery Coming

Two carloads of pipe and mining machinery have arrived at Skeena Crossing for the Rocher de Boule mine and there is a lot more on the way. The Continental Development Co. have had a big force of men on right along and they are ready for most of the plant. Frank Brown recently returned from a trip to Butte and Supt. Twenty-eight towns in Ontario buy power in bulk at the city limits with a less favorable agreement than the Prince Rupert Hydro-Electric Co. agreement and all these towns are in favor of municipal ownership.

## FOREST FIRES MINIMIZED

Co-operative Protection Prevents Large Losses.

The forest fire loss on Dominion forest reserves in Western Canada was smaller during the last season than ever before. On several of the reserves in Manitoba and Saskatchewan fire occasioned no damage whatever, and on the Dominion reserves in the railway belt, B. C., the only green timber injured by fire was four acres of young lodgepole pine.

That the fire loss on Dominion reserves in the west has been so remarkably small is due in large measure to the fact that the government rangers unceasingly sought, and obtained, the co-operation of all with whom they came in contact, whether settler, Indian, hunter, tourist or packer. The new fire posters ask for this co-operation instead of demanding it as previously; a plea for it is printed on railway time tables and on hunting licenses; it is secured from homesteaders by providing them with firefighting tools and by connecting rural telephone lines with ranger stations on the forest reserves, and even the Indians, many of whom were careless with fire, are now induced to assist in its prevention by being presented honorary metal badges by the Dominion government. Carelessness is the chief cause of forest fire and by its elimination the greatest difficulty in forest fire protection is overcome.

## Reports Not Holy Writ

Great stress is being laid by the opponents of the power agreement bylaw on the reports of Engineer Thompson and Electrician Ross of Seattle. These men were brought in by the city. They looked over our hydro-electric proposition and made reports. These reports contained valuable technical information and good advice. They are probably worth every bit of their cost, but they must not be considered as holy writ. For instance Engineer Thompson made an estimate on the cost of the combined hydro-electric and waterworks scheme. The result of the work up to the present time shows his estimate to be at least \$200,000 out, or about 35 per cent too low. This is not to be charged as a blunder on the part of Mr. Thompson. He did not understand conditions in this country.

When Mr. Ross says the rates of power under the proposed agreement are too high he is probably sincere in his opinion. They may look high in Seattle, but they don't look high in Prince Rupert. If the citizens can cut 50 per cent. off their electric light bills they can afford to let the company make some profits.

## Mounted Police Party Safe.

Regina, Jan. 7.—All fears as to the safety of Sergeant Harper of the Northwest Mounted Police and party were set at rest Saturday when Commissioner Perry received a wire via Edson stating that all hands, safe and well, were returning to Saskatoon Lake with their prisoner.

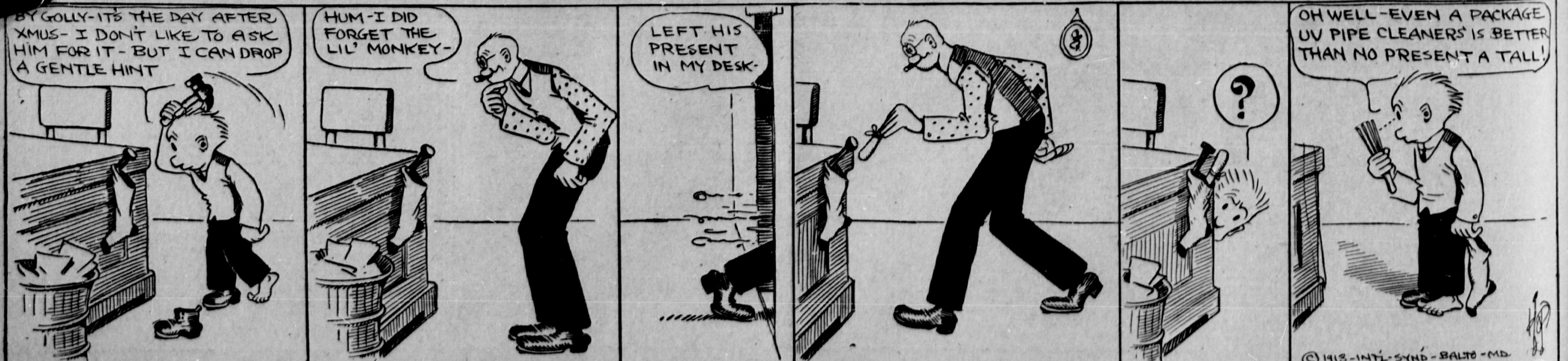

**CANADIAN ROUTE BEST TO CHISANA STRIKE**

**Cordova-McCarthy Route Not to Be Compared with Road Via Canadian Territory.**

According to Dr. L. S. Sugden, who has spent the past fifteen years in the Yukon, and has travelled extensively during that period through the north, the Canadian route via the White Pass & Yukon Railway to Whitehorse and the Klane trail, or the White River, is the only practicable way of getting into the Chisana gold diggings. He spent the last summer near the scene of the big strike, and went over several trails to and from the fields in an effort to locate the most feasible route. His views are said to have been endorsed by Mr. Ernest Bryson, of the international boundary survey, who has also done considerable travelling in the north.

In an interview, published recently in the Whitehorse Star, Dr. Sugden relates some of his experiences while negotiating the allegedly dangerous trails on the Cordova-McCarthy route, comparing the American road into the diggings very much to the favor of the Canadian route. He was accompanied on his trips by a moving picture photographer, who took views along the various trails, which are declared to substantiate the assertions as to their reputed inaccessibility.

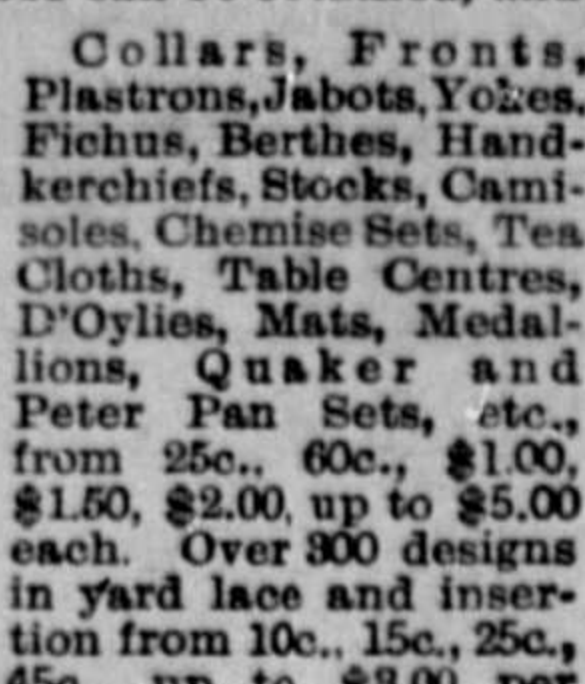

## DYBHAVN MADE MEETING BOOMERANG FOR NEWTON

(Continued from Page 1.)

for the purpose of shielding the rascality of the past year's council. They would hold up nothing. Referring to his opponents, he said had he fallen to the dangle of gold he would have had less insults hurled at him. He would have been patted on the back and been a good fellow to join in and swindle the city.

The standing committees this year were arranged so that three men controlled the city. Members of the council had no proper conception of what has taken place. Six thousand dollars could have been saved on the Section Two contract if the city engineer had been given a part of the work. It was a council of secrecy. Even when the mayor was hobnobbing with the nobles and spending your money on tips he was secret. Isn't it better to do business in the open and burn midnight oil as we did? Trying to get the province to endorse our bonds is no new thing. We tried it in 1912.

"Are you going to be led around like suckers by a few lines of type?"

The court of revision came in for considerable criticism. In 1912 the council had not reduced the assessment one dollar. In 1913 the assessment was reduced \$177,000. The speaker insinuated that favoritism was shown in the court of revision. It was deliberate rascality. They soak you and soak me and then turn screws off some other fellow.

An officer of the city who had done his duty had been reduced to a common clerk. This rascality would put to shame New York's Tammany.

He denied that he had ordered the removal of the Morse Creek pump 6 months before he left office. He had ordered that a flat car be secured to remove the pump when necessary.

The city was overrun with experts. They had an expert to see if the 1912 council had stolen anything. Matthews had been sent south for expert information and then it was of no use because he resigned as electrical superintendent. Then there was an expert for putting in the water pipe over the passage. We would have had that in if it had not been for a storm. Then Ald. Dybhavn had gone to the Union of Municipalities convention or some other fan dangled thing. He did not blame Dybhavn. He was sent. But it was a waste of money. It was also an outrage to send the city solicitor to negotiate the power agreement outside the city.

The council is supported by a subsidized press. There is nothing too dirty for them to say about me, miserable tools that they are. They are deceiving you

and trying to sell you body and soul to private interests.

Capt. Babington got \$4000 out of the city this year and the others on the waterfront got from \$100 down to \$6.

The council should not have advertised for tenders for firemen's uniforms. The shops could have been called up by telephone.

The Rupert Marine Iron Works got the contract for installing the machinery at Shawatlans. Naden and Babington were members of that company.

If elected I will dig down deep into the financial situation and find out where we are at.

### Newton Unmasked

Ald. Dybhavn, who had been eulogized by Mr. Newton spoke at the finish of the meeting and at a very late hour, but he threw the sensation of the evening when he quietly proceeded to unmask the man whose wild and dishonest statements are turning his own supporters against him.

Ald. Dybhavn did not like Mr. Newton's strong words altho he believed the man was sincere. He carried his contentions to an extremity for election purposes. He realized he was up against a strong opponent. Concerning Newton's criticism of the Union of Municipalities convention, he claimed Prince Rupert ought to be the very first to attend it. It was a mistake not to have gone before. This convention discusses the problems confronting municipalities and makes recommendations to the legislature.

In the criticism which had been made against the court of revision he claimed part of that honor belonged to him. He wanted to tell Mr. Newton that they had gone to the revision just as conscientiously and honestly this year as they had last year. If Newton would compare the two assessments he would find a different problem.

Concerning the \$4000 paid to Capt. Babington he wanted to point out that the biggest portion of that expense had been incurred by the 1912 council, of which Mr. Newton was Mayor. Mr. Newton ought to know that.

The contract for installing the Shawatlans Lake machinery was let without tender because there was only one firm equipped to do the job. The city engineer had made an estimate and the contract

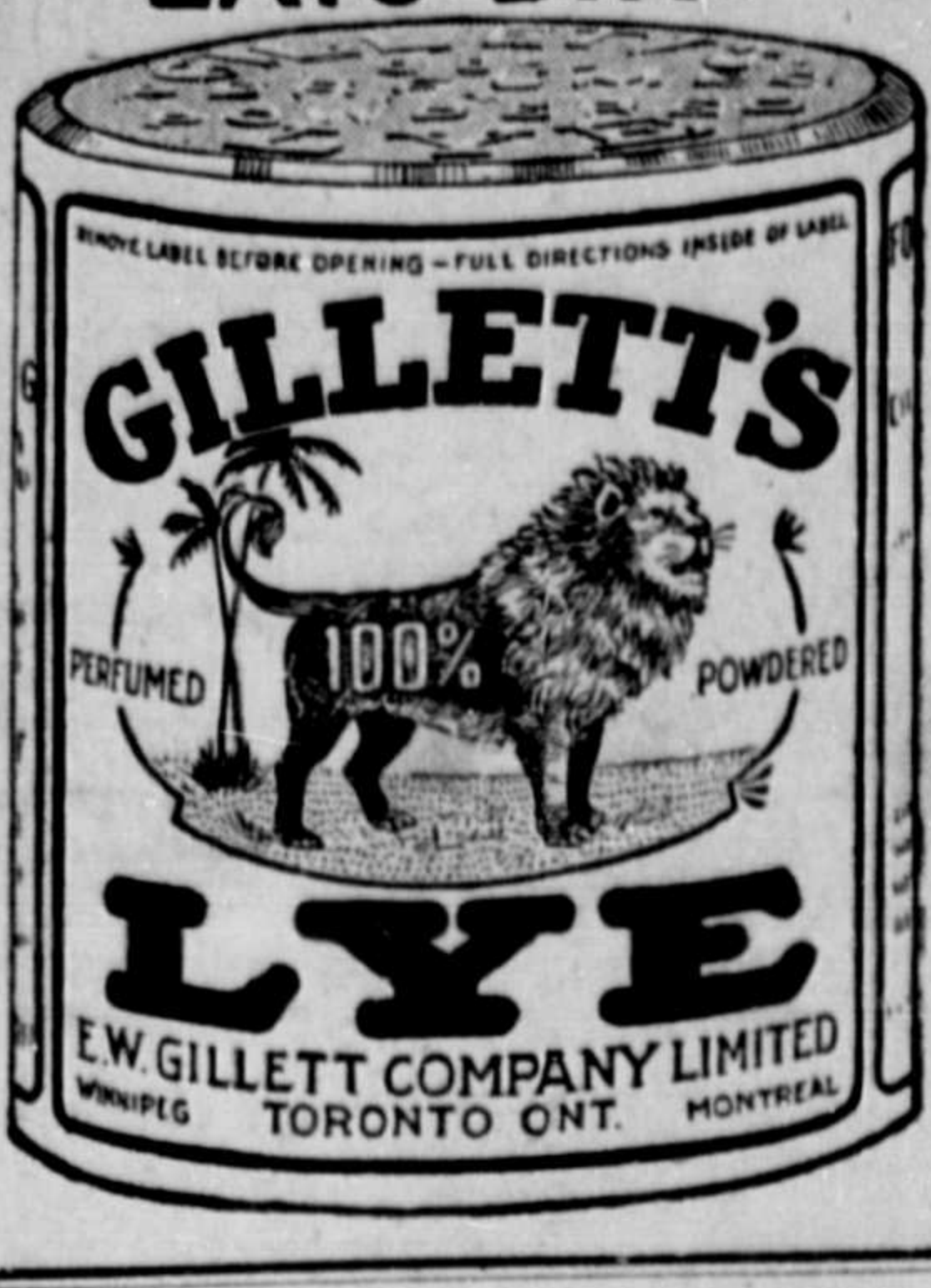
