

## PROTEST AGAINST SHUT-DOWN-THE-CITY POLICY

### MEXICAN ARMY RUSHED TO PROTECTION OF U.S.—TWO FOR MAYOR AND 17 FOR ALDERMEN

#### MAYOR PATTULLO ENDORSED BY A SPLENDID AUDIENCE

IS POLICY OF SAFETY, SANITY AND PROGRESS MEETS WITH  
POPULAR APPROVAL—BEST MEETING OF CAMPAIGN

"That was a splendid audience; the best I ever faced in Prince Rupert," said a public man after Mayor Pattullo's meeting in the Westholme Opera House Saturday evening. The house was crowded with citizens, men and women who wanted to hear the issues of the campaign discussed by the mayor, the aldermen and the candidates. The meeting was enthusiastically for Mayor Pattullo, and after the meeting a number of his opponents admitted that Mayor Pattullo would be elected.

There was an array of speakers on the platform behind Ald. McEwen, who acted as chairman. Mayor Pattullo opened the meeting with a brief but vigorous speech. He dealt with the by-laws, advising their adoption. Many of the citizens have water, telephone and light, but they could consider those who have received these services. If outlying sections want these utilities they must pass the by-laws. It was proposed to house a telephone department in a fireproof building which would also have a public library. He urged the passing of recreation grounds by-law. The city is negotiating with the T. P. for grounds back of 4th Avenue between Fulton and Bridge. If the by-laws are defeated and those already passed rescinded the city cannot have extension of the public utility for a long time to come. If the city hydro scheme is developed it means that the city has got raise \$200,000 more and there is no guarantee that such a by-law would pass. But assuming the by-law would pass, it could be impossible under the most favorable circumstances to have power before a year from September. To defeat the by-laws means that while the G. P. and the governments are spending millions here we would get that \$1,500,000 was the cost of our city. If that is true, it is justification for the governments and the G. T. P. to go with their enormous expenditure.

We should fittingly celebrate the opening of the new railway. According to our city engineer, Collins scheme to take power in the cold storage is only a joke.

If you want safety and security support our policy. If you want to stick in the mud I don't want to be with you.

Prolonged applause and cheers followed the conclusion of the mayor's address.

Were They Betrayers?

Ald. McCaffery said the city planning plant had reached its maturity and the council had to make some provision for more power. To develop the Wood Lake meant passing another by-law for \$200,000. They tried to try and get a satisfactory agreement with the Prince Rupert Hydro-Electric Co.,

and having got that to submit it and an alternative scheme to the electors. Was that betraying the city? He had warned Mayor Pattullo against submitting the agreement at the civic elections, as the prejudice against the company would be used against the mayor. In reply Mayor Pattullo had said: "If we can get an agreement that I believe is in the best interests of the city I will stay with it whether elected or not."

No other mayor has had the courage to submit a proposition of this kind. The cry is to keep out the corporations. We are keeping them out.

Vancouver is using 125,000 h.p. Don't we expect to be as big as Vancouver? In four years we will be using 3,000 h.p.

J. H. Kelly compared the two candidates for the mayoralty, taking a common sense view of their accomplishments in office. He claimed Wm. Manson had a bee in his bonnet on the city hydro-electric scheme. If we do without sewers we endanger the health of the city. It would be a serious state of affairs. The Lord has sent us copious showers to wash away the filth, but we cannot depend on Him all the time.

Ald. Dybbavn said he was accused of knocking Newton. He was knocking no one. He had believed it his duty to correct Newton's misleading statements. He would correct false statements from either mayoralty candidate. He advocated the light and water-works extension by-laws. He is opposed to the power agreement because he does not believe it is the best agreement that can be got. He did not like the clause about the 3,000 h.p. He preferred the terms of an agreement made earlier in the year.

The alderman exploded the election talk that December light bills were made extra high in order to scare people into voting for the power agreement.

In closing he said that it seemed that the people had been educated to knock the administration. You must cease knocking and get on with the municipal work. Let us fight the issues at election time and let that settle them. Give the council loyal support.

During his remarks on the power agreement Ald. Dybbavn had stated that Seattle had been

Pretoria Nearly in State of War  
Over Threatened Railway Strike

Pretoria, Jan. 11.—Not since the Boers laid down their arms to Britons has the Rand been as near as state of war as tonight. Martial law may be declared at noon tomorrow. Many who predicted the failure of the strike have become alarmed and are pleading for white unity to protect the women and children from the horrors of a native uprising. Johannesburg is like a besieged city.

The chairman of the Newton campaign has several times advertised the information that he himself would take the chair at the meetings referred to. He has not yet appeared, and it looks as if he was ashamed of his company.

#### Strike Is Probable

Capetown, Jan. 12.—A strong conflict as to the advisability of a strike was displayed at the meeting here which began in the theatre and adjourned to the parade square owing to inadequacy of the former accommodations. The younger element favored a strike, but the predominance of feeling was against it. It was impossible to carry any resolution. Following the conclusion of the meeting it resolved itself into a laborite meeting and adopted a resolution demanding that the leaders be released and defending their demand for the forces to be disbanded and that the policy of railway retrenchment be changed. #### Want General Strike

(Special to The Daily News.)  
Johannesburg, Jan. 12.—Prospects for a general strike are favorable. The mass meeting held was orderly and martial law was not proclaimed. Restricted service continues to all points. Warrants for Bain and Mason, two labor leaders, were not executed owing to the vigilance of their followers. A speech of Bain's urged that there is still time for a compromise and suggested the formation of a conciliation board. Others counselled respect for the law. A resolution was adopted supporting the federation and favoring a general strike.

#### Brussels Flooded

Brussels, Jan. 12.—A terrible flood has swept this city, but the temperature has dropped and the danger is temporarily considered over. Subsidence of the Vedre leaves a deep coating of mud. Thousands of homes and miles of railways are washed away and sidewalks have disappeared. The streets are strewn with the bodies of cattle and dogs. Machinery mills are ruined and it means a long suspension of operations. The prospects predict great suffering.

#### FEDERAL ARMY IS DEFEATED FLEE TO U. S. FOR PROTECTION

SITUATION WITHOUT PRECEDENT—GREAT MEXICAN ARMY  
AND CAMP FOLLOWERS IN CUSTODY OF U. S. GENERAL

(Special to The Daily News.)  
Presidio, Jan. 12.—Twenty-eight thousand soldiers, six generals, two million rounds of ammunition, two cannons, four field pieces, 15,000 civilians and refugees are in the custody of the United States army following the evacuation of Ojinaga. The distress of the refugees is appalling. With scant food and no shelter, men, women, children, dogs, chickens and cattle are packed together in a space which covers several acres. Scores of women camp followers who lost their children are without clothing and drenched by wading the river. The United States commander is a federal army with nine gen with such numbers. From a military standpoint the situation is without precedent.

Presidio, Jan. 11.—The Mexican federal army with men generals evacuated Ojinaga at 10 tonight, and the triumphant rebels under General Villa immediately

occupied the village. Led by General Villa the entire rebel forces advanced on Ojinaga firing rifle shrapnel into the trenches, causing the flight of non-combatants to safety on the American side. Deserters from the federal soldiers were arrested by the United States troops as they crossed the border. The thundering of the cannon and the withdrawal of the federals from the outer trenches indicated that the battle had resumed and were steadily creeping toward the federal forts, which were shrouded with great clouds of dust. The rebels occupied positions within four miles of the village before they met with resistance. The rebel fire overwhelmed the federal soldiers completely. They attempted to retreat in disorder, but fifty were captured, while seven jumped in to the river and swam to the other side.

Returning Officer Brown received some 22 nomination papers properly prepared today. Two of these were for the mayoralty, eighteen for alderman, and two for school trustees. The two latter are elected by acclamation.

Mr. Barry's nomination was not accepted, as the property on which he offered to qualify had not been registered a sufficient length of time.

Eight aldermen are to be elected.

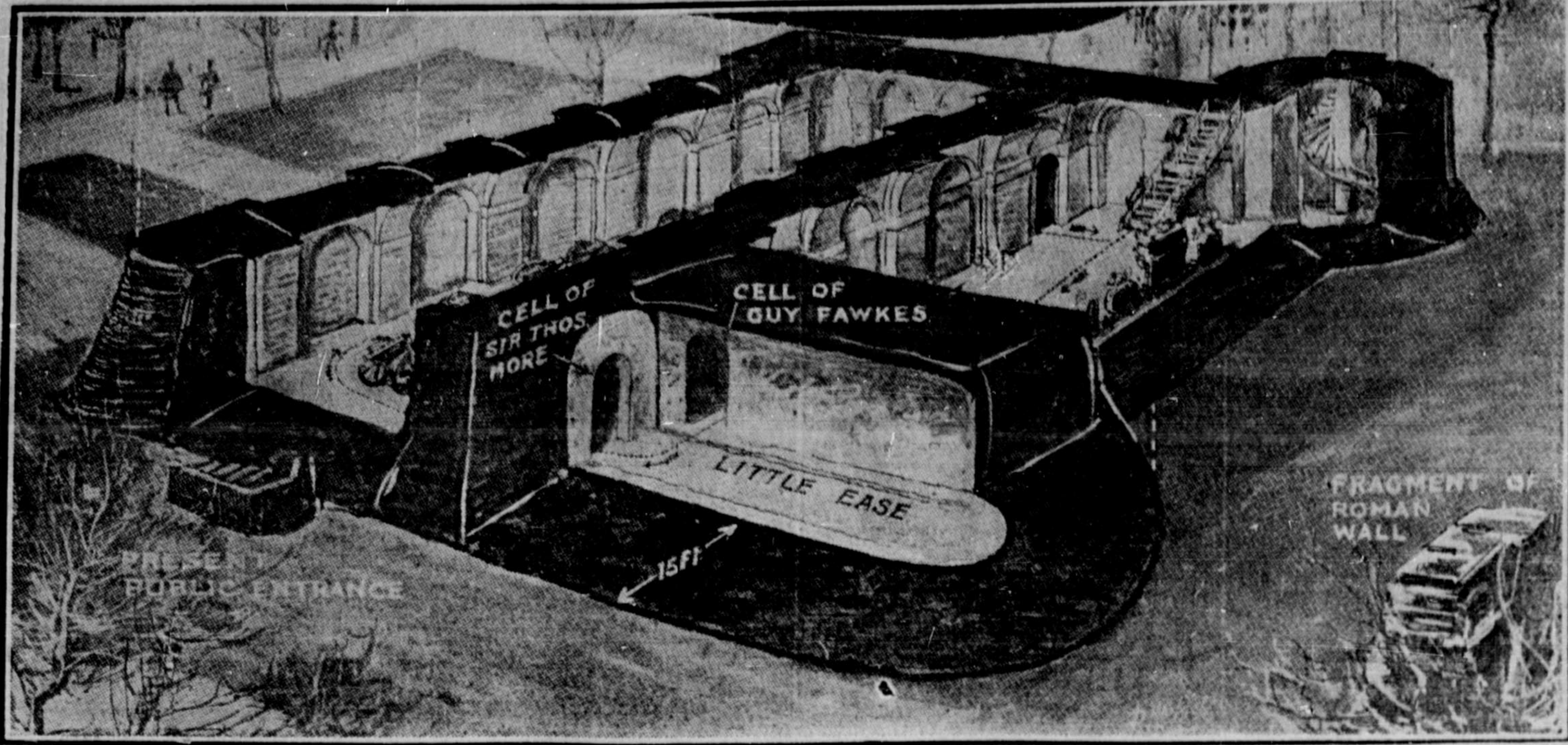

### SECTIONAL VIEW SHOWING THE POSITIONS OF THE DUNGEONS AND PARTS OF THE WHITE TOWER

Public may penetrate new parts of the Tower. Further portions of the Tower of London are to be opened to the general public. The portion which is shortly to be thrown open is chiefly the basement section of the Tower, which consists of three large rooms separated by enormously thick walls. This basement portion contains the cell of Guy Fawkes and also the little space in which Sir Thomas Moore was confined. Both these will now form entrances to the Little Ease, the famous dungeon in which Jewish money lenders and others were confined at times in the middle ages. The two large apartments, which at present contain guns, were possibly occasionally used for torture rooms, but were not regularly used for this purpose. The upper portion of the Tower has been elevated in the above drawing in order to show the disposition of the lower rooms. The positions of the cell of Sir Walter Raleigh, the chapel crypt, the chapel of St. John, and the various armories are also indicated. The present public entrance is shown on the extreme left.
