

BRITISH HOUSE DIVIDES ON HOME RULE QUESTION

HUDSON BAY RAILWAY DEBATED AT OTTAWA--T. D. PATTULLO ON THE NEW MUNICIPAL ACT

THE PRESBYTERIAN SOCIETY HOLDS VERY LIVELY DEBATE

QUESTION OF LAWYER'S RIGHT TO DEFEND KNOWN CRIMINAL MAKES INTERESTING SUBJECT--LEGAL FRAUD ON DEFENCE

The Presbyterian Literary society met last night and the entertainment for the evening took the form of a debate. The question was: "Resolved that a lawyer is not justified in defending a criminal whom he knows to be guilty." Mr. R. O. Boulton and Mr. Crear supported the resolution, while Mr. A. M. Manson and Mr. W. O. Fulton took the negative.

Mr. Boulton in opening said if a man was guilty it was impossible to prove him not guilty. It might be possible through a technicality of the law to set him free and when this was done the lawyers were assisting criminals by turning them loose on society. Good lawyers refused low fees and they are usually left alone or two unprincipled lawyers in each city, which proved that even the profession did not justify defending guilty men.

Mr. Fulton said the supporters of the resolution would make lawyers to judge whether a man was guilty or not. Few criminals confess to their counsel. The lawyer does not know till he has seen both sides. A man might confess to crime so as to hide himself or through hallucinations. The only safe method is to hear both sides put clearly.

Mr. Crear said lawyers were trained to see loopholes in the law and thus get bad men free. This teaches disrespect for all law. The best legal talent could be secured for money and justice thus thwarted. The legal profession did not stand for a right interpretation of the law, but rather how to beat it.

Mr. Manson began by showing that the arguments of the affirmative were not in the issue. He admitted that there were black sheep in the profession. The question, however, was whether any lawyer was justified in defending a known criminal. Defending meant putting his side of the case before the judge and jury. Every man is innocent till he is proven guilty.

There was no absolute knowledge. It is very difficult to get at the facts and error is so human that the only safe course was to have two experts sift the evidence in order that the court might get at all the truth.

The vote of the meeting was in favor of the affirmative.

After the debate refreshments were served by the ladies. A large crowd was present and augurs well for the future of the society.

Whist Drive and Dance With Several Musical Selections

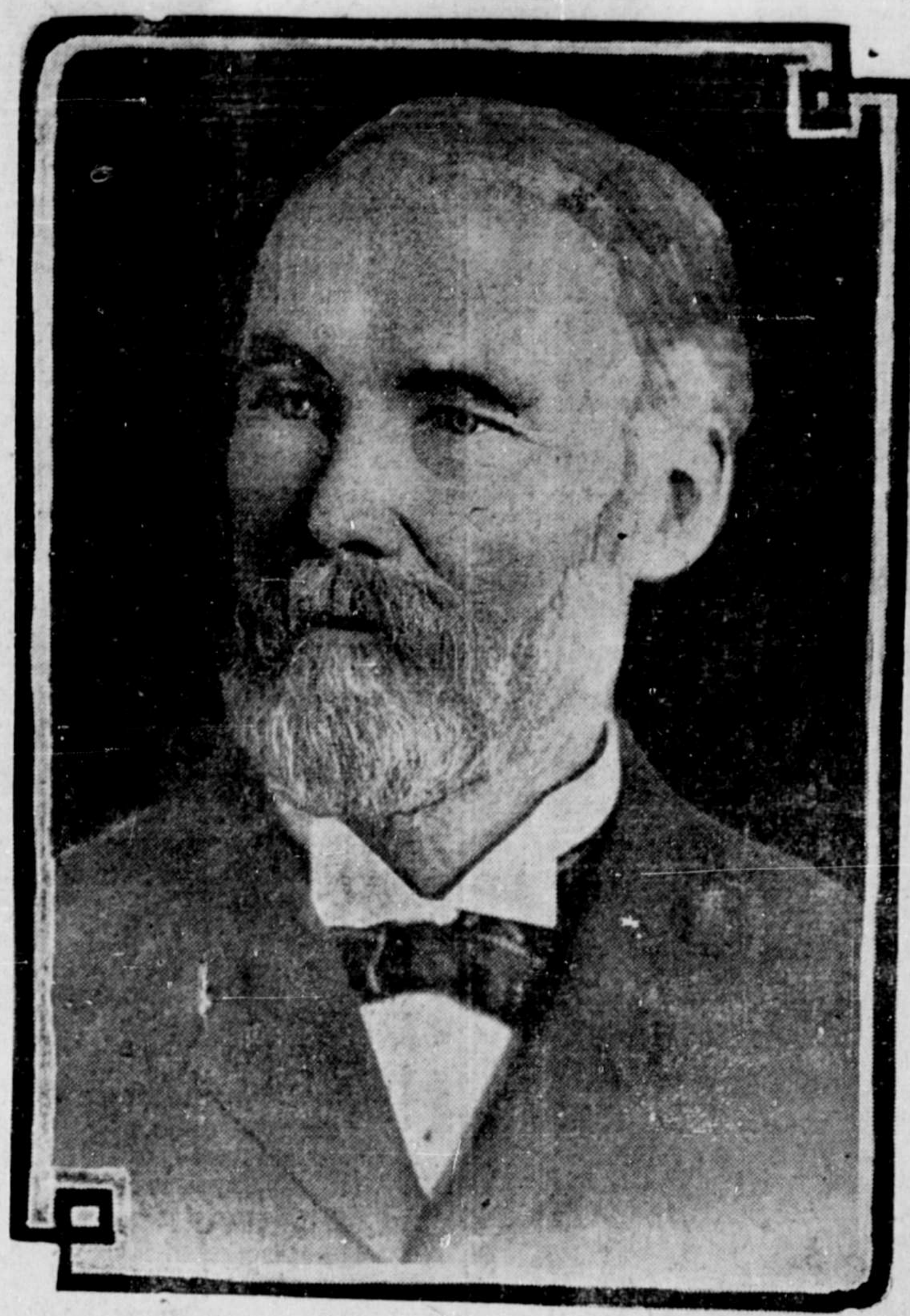

HOLDS HIS FAITH IN RUPERT COMPARISON WITH CITIES SOUTH

T. D. PATTULLO TALKS OF PROVINCIAL AND LOCAL ISSUES--THE NEW MUNICIPAL ACT INIQUITOUS LEGISLATION--MISTAKE TO PAY TEN PER CENT. TO PAY GOVERNMENT

Yesterday the Daily News interviewed T. D. Pattullo, upon his arrival from the south where he spent several weeks. Mr. Pattullo is always optimistic, and always has something to say of public interest. He was first asked about the general business situation.

"It would be useless to deny that one can see a decided difference in the Vancouver and Victoria of today as regards activity and the Vancouver and Victoria of eighteen months ago, nevertheless they are coming through the financial storm in good shape and have every reason to look forward with optimism to the developments which are certain to take place on this coast in the immediate future.

"As far as Rupert is concerned I have never seen any reason to change the opinion at which I had arrived before the original sale of lots here, namely, that this is a city of splendid resources which is bound to go ahead under any circumstances, but which of course can be accelerated in her onward march by a united and intelligent effort upon the part of her people."

"What about this new Municipal Act?" asked The News.

"I have not had time to read the whole act, but I have perused that portion of it having reference to the appointment of inspectors of municipalities and the duties and powers which may be conferred upon him by the lieutenant-governor in council. A more iniquitous piece of legislation than that proposed it would be hard to conceive. If this legislation goes through no municipal council will hereafter have any more independence of action, indeed far less than the present police and licence commissions. In fact all municipal councils will be under the direct dictation of the attorney-general.

"I have no doubt whatever that an approval by the provincial government of a municipal issue would be of benefit to the issue, even although the government do not guarantee the issue, but the new proposals are entirely subversive of the right of local self-government and repugnant in the extreme to any one who values our boasted liberty and freedom.

"If the government would appoint a board, say, of three, who would and could reasonably be expected to act as conscientiously and as fearlessly as say, the board of railway commissioners, not with a view to giving the

Liberals Will Have Three on the Committee, Choosing Chief Party Whips

Ottawa, Feb. 12.—The redistribution bill will get the second reading next week. There is much speculation as to the personnel of the special committee of seven to whom it will subsequently be referred. The Conservatives will have four and the opposition three. It is understood that the Liberals have selected their chief whips, Pardee of Lambton, E. M. MacDonald of Pictou and Dr. Beland of Beauce. The government has not reached a conclusion as to who will represent it, but there will be one from Ontario, one from the west and one from the Maritime Provinces.

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BRITISH HOUSE DIVIDE ON QUESTION HOME RULE

Bonar Law Predicts Civil War if Bill Put Through--Ulster Must Be Left Out

(Special to The Daily News.)
London, Feb. 12.—The Hon. Walter Long moved as an amendment to the speech from the throne that it would be disastrous for the house to proceed further with the Irish bill until the measure was submitted to the judgment of the country. This was defeated by a vote of 333 to 255. The announcement was received by the opposition and shouts to resign. Mr. Bonar Law predicted a civil war the moment the bill passed. He urged that the danger could only be averted by leaving Ulster out of the home rule bill or submitting the bill to the judgment of the people.

HUDSON BAY RAILWAY MATTERS SUBJECT OF VIGOROUS DEBATE

MR. McLEAN OF HALIFAX SEEKS INFORMATION RE LOSS OF STEAMERS IN HUDSON BAY--SAYS GOVERNMENT WAS NEGLIGENT--MINISTER COCHRANE REPLIES

(Special to the Daily News)
Ottawa, Feb. 12.—The operations of the department of railways and the department of marine and fisheries in connection with the work at Port Nelson was under review at a short sitting of the house. Mr. McLean of Halifax introduced the discussion by moving for information in connection with the work of establishing suitable terminals for the Hudson Bay railway at Port Nelson. He reviewed the reports of mishaps to steamers and other trouble which developed during the season. He charged the minister of railways with not exercising due care in making arrangements and contended that the big mistake was in not making proper provision for unloading vessels. He contended there had been neglect in the establishment of aids to navigation.

Mr. Cochrane replied by saying that undoubtedly some had

luck had been experienced during the season, but this was not unusual in pioneer work. The reports of the loss sustained were exaggerated. Despite the difficulty experienced a good start was made in the work at Port Nelson. He maintained that choosing Port Nelson as the terminus of the railway by the government was a wise choice. He fully justified the course and expected that much would be accomplished next season.

The new Municipal Act, the result of the municipal commission's report made a year ago, has been introduced into the legislature by the attorney-general. It provides many radical changes and gives unto the attorney-general more of that attribute which he desires above all things—power.

The most striking feature of the new bill is the establishment of a municipal department to be under the control of the attorney-general. This department will oversee all municipal management.

This scheme did not originate in British Columbia. A similar plan exists in England. The province of Saskatchewan has also recently adopted a plan of controlling municipal loans.

At the present time the at-

torney-general controls absolutely the liquor licenses and the policing of every municipality. These functions are paid for by the municipalities and rightly belong solely to them.

Bowser is not satisfied with that power. He now proposes to control the borrowing power of municipalities, which means the very life of any city or town.

Another wicked feature of the new bill is the clause which gives the attorney-general power to control the establishment of public utilities within an incorporated municipality. Mr. Bowser has many friends who have public franchises throughout the province.

Whereas the new bill purports to give many new powers to a municipality, as a matter of fact the whole bill is a nonentity. A city cannot do anything without Bowser's permission.

HEAL DISSENSION REQUESTS HIS MAJESTY

Opening of Imperial Parliament and the Speech from the Throne

London, Feb. 10.—What is likely to prove the most important session of parliament for years was opened by the king this afternoon. The king, accompanied by Queen Mary, drove in the state coach drawn by eight of the historic Hanoverian cream-colored horses.

In the house of lords the king read the speech from the throne, outlining the government's programme for the session. The speech from the throne was mostly a colorless recital of the events already recorded.

Referring to home rule, the speech expressed regret that the efforts which had been made to arrive at a solution by agreement of the problems connected with the government of Ireland had not succeeded.

In this matter his majesty said that with the hopes and fears of his many subjects he was keenly concerned and which unless handled with foresight and judgment in a spirit of mutual concession threatened grave future difficulties.

VERY HUNGRY WOLF RUNS AMUCK IN CITY

Attacked Ladies and Other Pedestrians—Finally Killed by Police

Kansas City, Mo., Feb. 11.—A large half-starved grey wolf, after biting two persons, frightening a score of others and spreading consternation through a staid and fashionable south side residence district, was shot and killed on Linwood boulevard here today.

The wolf sprang upon Miss Anna Harrison as she waited for a street car. Miss Harrison screamed, threw her fur muff at the animal, and while the muff was being torn to shreds, escaped into a house.

The wolf ran down the boulevard, pursued by a milkman, who hurled bottles as he ran. Two blocks from the scene of the first attack the wolf snapped at a domestic, causing a painful wound in the arm.

A number of grocery boys, business men and servants from boulevard homes, joined in the chase. A riot call was sent to police headquarters and an automobile with half a dozen patrolmen hurried to the scene.

The wolf had run 15 blocks and attacked another pedestrian before a policeman ended the chase by sending a bullet into the animal's head.

The police pronounced the "killing" a fine specimen of the grey wolf, but were at a loss to know how it found its way to the heart of the city's residence district.

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No Clemency for Strikers

Victoria, Feb. 11.—The minister of justice at Ottawa has refused to extend clemency at the present time to the miners undergoing imprisonment for participation in the recent trouble in the mining districts of Vancouver Island.

The announcement follows the forwarding of the petition from the families of the imprisoned miners, which was presented to Sir Richard McBride on the opening day of the present session of parliament.

Memorials were also sent during last month to the minister of justice from the trades unions and from labor organizations all over the country, while cables were forwarded to his majesty King George and to the home secretary in the imperial parliament.

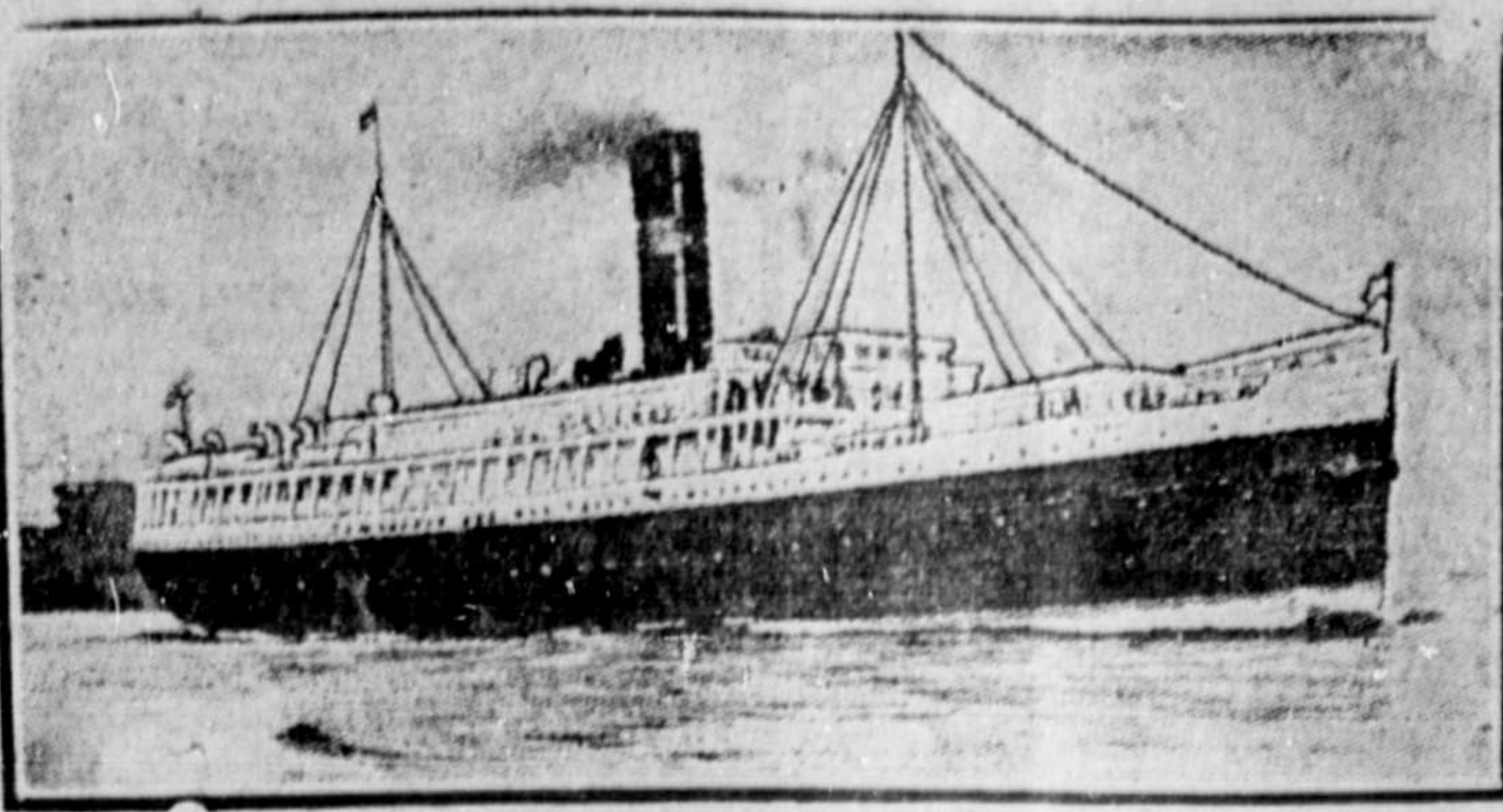

Breach of Promise Suit Started for an Ardent Wooer

New York, Feb. 9.—Octavio Guinle, a wealthy young Brazilian, and a member of a New York exporting firm, has been arrested in an action brought by Miss Monica P. Borden to recover \$500,000 for alleged breach of promise of marriage. Guinle, who was released on \$50,000 bail, was to have been married to Miss Borden today, she asserts. Miss Borden declares in her complaint that after promising to marry her and going so far as to have the banns published and the date for the wedding set, the young man had made preparations to leave the country, complying in this with the cabled wish of his mother. She further claims that the defendant had been an ardent wooer, and had told her that he inherited five million dollars from his father, who died recently, and one million from his father's partner, giving him an income of \$300,000 a year. Of this amount she was to get annually \$50,000, Miss Borden alleges. Guinle's firm maintains offices in Paris, London and Rio de Janeiro.

STRATHCONA AIDS FIRST WIFE'S SON

J. H. Smith, Who Recently Said He Would Put in No Claim, Benefits by Will

New York, Feb. 10.—James H. Smith of Brookline, Mass., who recently announced that he intended to put in no claim for part of the estate of his stepfather, the late Lord Strathcona, benefits by the will. The income of \$125,000 is placed in trust for him, and he receives outright real estate in Pictou, N. S. This was disclosed when the text of the will was made public by the late peer's attorneys here. Smith was the son of Lady Strathcona by a former husband.

THOSE BRITISH TITLE SCANDALS KEPT ALIVE

Publication of Article by Gibson Bowles Stirs Up More Mud—The Alleged Price

London, Feb. 10.—The scandal in reference to the purchase of titles and other honors which was first broached by Sir George Kekewich, and reiterated by F. A. Thomas of Cardiff, has received additional flavor by the publication of an article in the *Canid Review*, by Thomas Gibson Bowles, a former M. P. on both sides of the house, and who has long been a thorn in the side of each party, in which he gets down to details as to the scandal. He asserts that the Conservative fund, which in 1874 totaled £20,000, rose to £80,000 in the nineties. The Liberal funds, which were very low in 1886, reached £7,000 in 1907, stood at £500,000 in 1901 and are now estimated at £400,000. He asserts that the tariff for honors is £50,000 for a baronetcy, with anywhere from £150,000 to £400,000 for peerages.

He declares that correspondence passed between a party whip and a would-be peer, who refused to pay the contribution. Thereupon the party whip expressed a fear that a claim for the peerage would not be considered. The would-be peer, however, threatened to publish the correspondence if his name was not included in the next birthday honor list, and the name appeared.

He also asserts that there are city brokers who tout for baronetcies, their terms being £4,000, with £6,000 more lodged in the bank if the honor is given, as well as 10 per cent commission to the man who introduces the business.

According to a story told here a party of prospectors from the Colorado gold fields were returning in 1805 with treasure when the men were attacked and all but one of their number killed by Indians. The survivor buried the gold.

RANCHER DUG UP 40 POUNDS OF GOLD

Thinks It Was Buried by Prospector Attacked by the Indians

Jetmore, Kan., Feb. 11.—A box of gold nuggets weighing forty pounds and estimated to be worth \$12,000 was found buried in a hill near here by Ralph Chesney, a homesteader. The nuggets were deposited in a bank and Chesney went back after more of the precious metal he believes is hidden in the hill.

CONSPIRACY TO FORM LABOR GOVERNMENT

Details of Alleged Plot Expected When the Session Begins

London, Feb. 10.—It can now be stated practically officially that no matter what will be the effect on domestic politics, the imperial government does not intend to take the slightest action in connection with the deportation of the labor leaders from South Africa.

It is stated in circles which claim to know that the colonial office has been assured that the deportations were only undertaken upon absolute proof of a plot by the labor leaders in South Africa to capture the ministers of the union government and declare a labor republic. If that be the case, it is asserted that international law as well as practice would support every act of the Botha government.

The details are not likely to come out until parliament has been in session a short time, but it is certain that when the subject is discussed the government here will be able to make statements which will completely change public opinion and place the defenders of the labor leaders in a very different position.

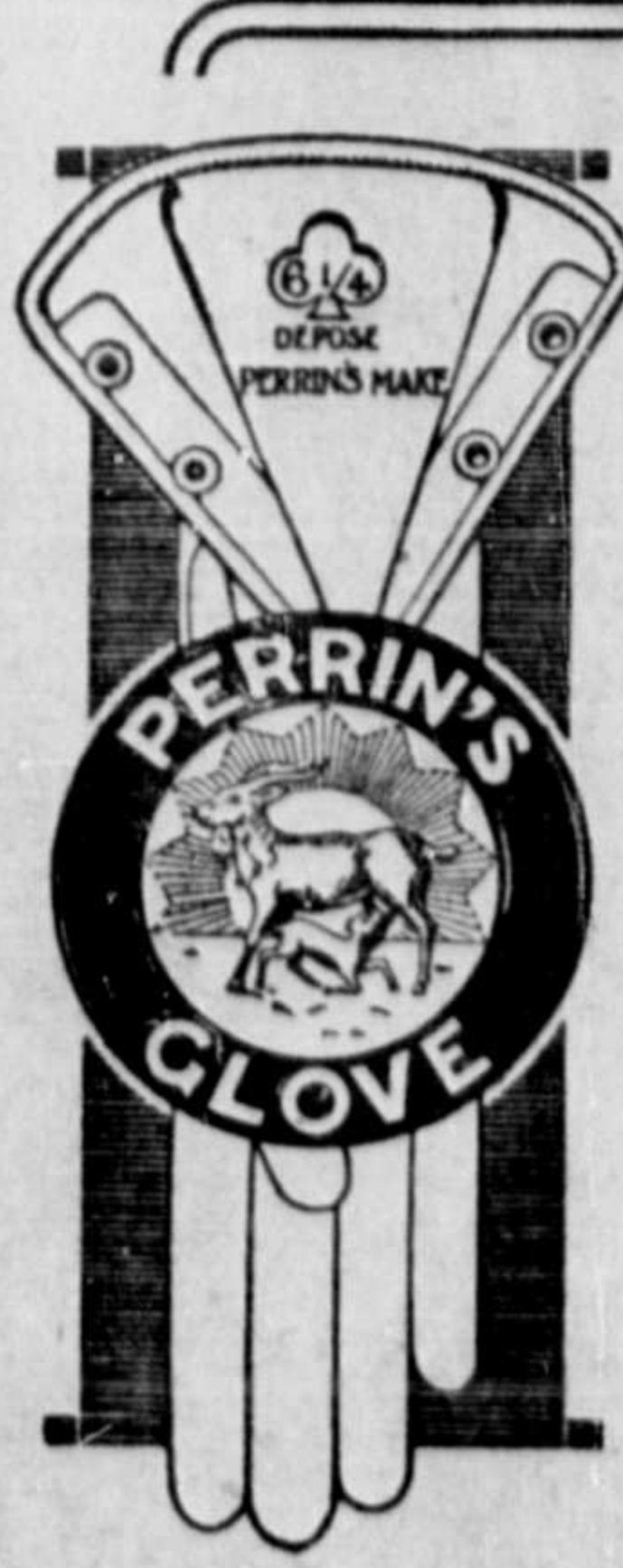

board any direct control over the municipal councils, but simply to pass its opinion upon any issue contemplated by a municipal council, this would have the effect of satisfying financiers as to the desirability of any particular issue, while at the same time it would afford any municipality all the protection needed. No municipality could afford to overreach itself, while at the same time it could conduct its business with self-respect, which it cannot do under the proposed act. We have had enough experience in this province to know just what will happen. Every municipal council will be used as a weapon to further provincial or Dominion political considerations.

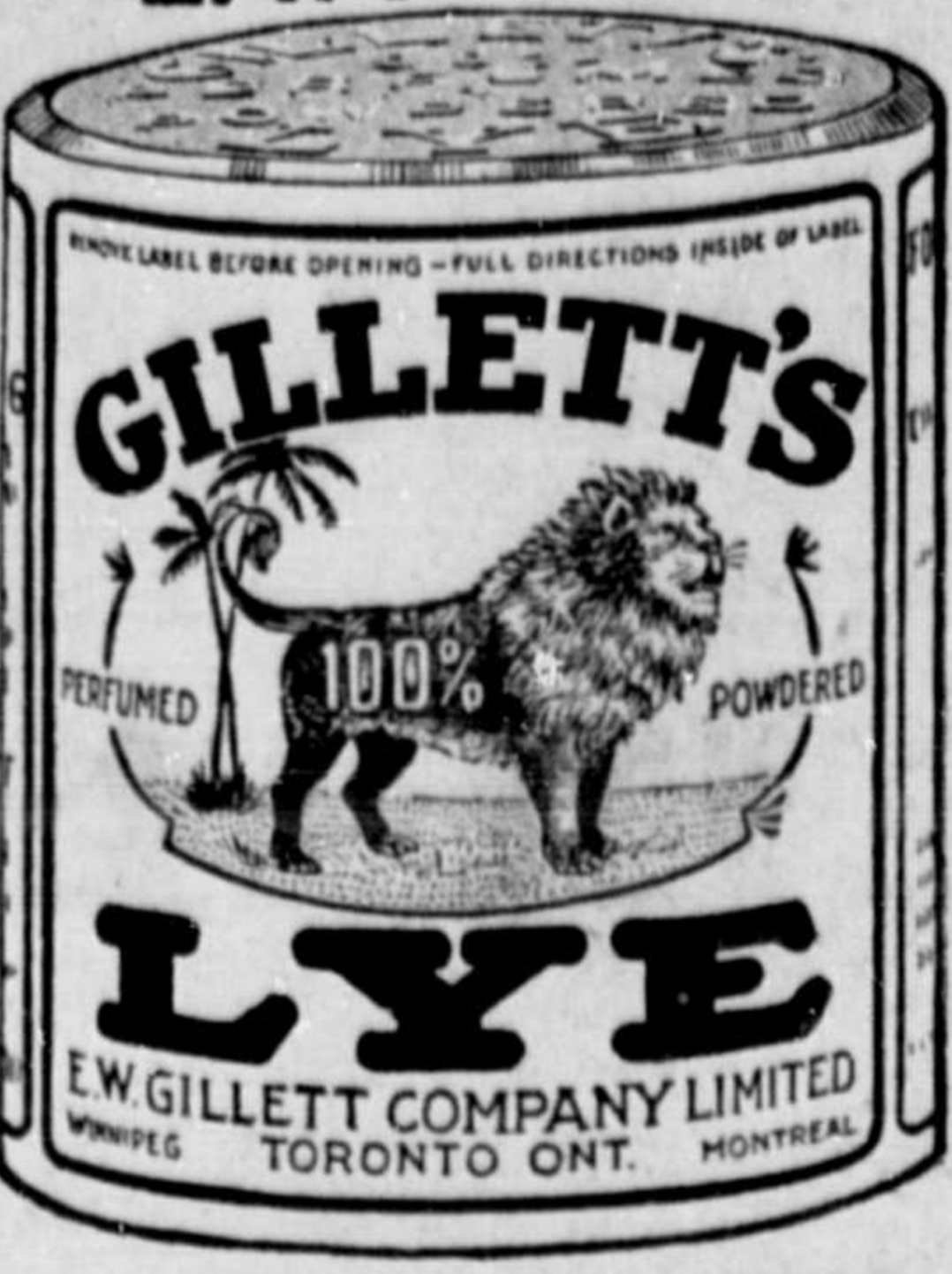
"However, the Bowser-McBride machinations are becoming a joke in the south, though a serious one. On my recent visit south I met many Conservatives to whom two years ago one dare not say a word derogatory of the Bowser-McBride machine. Today it is different. Most of them are ready to turn out the government. All of them are of the opinion that the government must have some opposition."

"The new city council has been busy since you left," suggested The News man.

"Yes, I notice that the city council are selling some treasury notes maturing in June, 1915, at a price costing close upon ten per cent. I may be permitted to say I think this a great mistake. The city is going to lose thousands of dollars through this transaction. It would be infinitely better to place long term issues at some sacrifice. Many people will recall that the present mayor took the first council to task for paying the bank six per cent instead of selling our debentures, yet apparently he now cheerfully pays ten per cent with another big discount in sight when the final flotation is made. Our friend, the present chairman of the finance committee, also inveighed against the sale of treasury notes as recently as last year, yet apparently he, too, is changing front."

"I notice from the papers that the mayor is going south to interview the government with regard to a postponement of the payment of the amount due the government by the city and, according to reports, the application of the money to the purposes of the Woodworth lake scheme. I would like to point out that it is not within the power of the government, except by act of parliament, to allow the application of this money to any other purpose than that for which the sale of debentures is made and covers. No additional sum of \$115,000 raised by sale of treasury notes covering indebtedness to the government, can be applied to performing additional work at Woodworth lake without such amount first having been passed by a vote of the ratepayers. If the council has agreed, and I understand that it has, to the sale of treasury notes covering the indebtedness to the government, it has made a serious mistake. What it should have done if it sold certificates at all was to sell only the portion cov-

ering the hydro-electric project and put upon the government the onus of refusing to consent to the sale unless the government were first paid. Under no circumstances whatever should the council sell treasury notes to pay off the government. The government should only be paid when a sale of the long term debentures is effected.

"I hope that the city will not be foolish enough to delay the sale of its long term issues. It is well to get the money in hand as soon as possible and not take any chances upon eventualities which may again tighten the market."
