There is an agitation going on in several parts of the riding to have the government road money handled by a competent head. In the past this money was put into the hands of government favorites, and as a result the money was wasted and no roads are left to show for it.

In Bella Coola they have brought these matters several times to the attention of William Manson. At each time he has promised to give the matter his attention, but so far nothing has been done.

The same demand was made in the Queen Charlotte Islands. A movement was even started to get the islands incorporated as a separate municipality in order to get some results from the funds expended. It appears, however, that the presence of Bowser in the way has melted their hearts and up to the present time they have dropped the plan.

If William Manson was anything but a politician he might be expected to give some help. He is a good hand at making pretty speeches and at pretending to be very democratic, but when the test comes he is never there. If he was any friend of the people he would insist on an impartial handling of the government funds and would see

that proper roads were built instead of the mud holes to be seen all over the district.

The recent decision of the government to remove the reserve on the water of Kaien Island and Tsimpsean Peninsula shows up William Manson in a very bad light. He has frequently boasted about the action of the government in that respect and at the late municipal contest he said all those waters would be held for the city's use. Now it appears that the reserve is thrown off. Is it that Mr. Manson was not sincere in his promises or that he has no influence with his party? There are only two interpretations possible, and neither of them are very flattering to a man of spirit.

This cancelling of the water reserve lends color to the city council's refusal to seek the Wark Channel power in preference to Woodworth Lake. Of course they were told that it was useless to seek that stream. The government must keep its pledges with the speculators and turn over the last item of local resources. It will not come as any surprise to be told one of these days that the Wark's Channel power has been handed over to some private individual. What will William Manson have to say about that?

HOLDING WIFE BY THE HAIR  
SAVED HER FROM DROWNING

HERO OF THE STEAMER MONROE WRECK HAD A TERRIBLE EXPERIENCE WITH HEART RENDING SCENES

The hero of the wreck of the Old Dominion steamship Monroe was Thomas R. Harrington, a young man of Bridgeport, Conn. For two hours he swam in the almost icy ocean off the Delaware coast dragging along his unconscious wife by holding her hair in his teeth. Her arm was broken in the collision of the Monroe and the Nantucket, and she cried out to him that rather than undergo the pain of his holding her arm she would rather die.

"But when they got me aboard the ship they put her in a stateroom and left her and put me in

Here is Harrington's story of the struggle in the water: "At first I tried to hold the poor girl up by her arm, but it pained her horribly and she screamed and wrenched so that I saw it would not do. She was faint one minute and in shivers and struggles of pain the next. I twisted her hair into tight rope as close to her head as I could, and then took it in my teeth and tried to keep her head above water by keeping it in on my chest while I swam on my back. That must have hurt her, too, but she didn't say anything except, 'That's better, Tom.' "We had been getting along that way for about fifteen minutes—it seemed like two or three hours—when a lifeboat came along. They went within ten feet of us. I asked them to take the girl aboard. They never even answered—just looked at us and rowed away. Strength seemed to go out of me after that, and out of her too. I got lower in the water and her face was under at almost every wave. "After a long time—they tell me it was two hours, but time didn't seem to count one way or the other—another boat came along. I held Margaret up to them and a sailor said: "Let her go. She is dead." "She is not dead," I said to him, "and you take her aboard if
