





SENT TO JAIL FOR SETTING DOG ON BOY

Schoolboys Snowballed Man and Dog Bit One of

New Westminster, Feb. 16.-'Any man who sets a dog on a school child is a beast," said Magistrate Edmonds when sentenced Charles Snazel serve three months in jail for such an offence.

The complaining witness against Snazel was William Kennedy, 15 years old, son of a storekeeper, who was bitten in eight places by a hound owned by the defendant.
