

## SKEENA ROAD APPROPRIATIONS ARE CUT IN HALF

### THE GREATEST LIBERAL CONVENTION IN PROVINCIAL HISTORY--SENSATION IN ONTARIO

#### THE PROVINCIAL ESTIMATES HAVE \$150,000 FOR RUPERT BUILDING

##### The Road Appropriation for Skeena District Has Been Cut from \$405,000 to \$216,000--Woman's Suffrage Bill Defeated

(Special to The Daily News) Victoria, Feb. 27.—The provincial government estimates brought down today. The estimated expenditure for the year is \$13,172,000 and the estimated revenue \$10,048,000. The expenditures include: \$3,316,575 for public works. \$2,319,500, public buildings. \$2,861,000, roads and bridges. \$6,075, steamboat subsidies. \$10,000, general contingencies. \$500,000 for university. \$350,000 for education. \$350,000 for Prince Rupert government buildings. The forestry branch shows an increase of \$78,000. Road appropriations include: Atlin, \$20,000; Cariboo, \$40,000; Comox,

\$67,000; Lillooet, \$73,000, and Skeena, \$216,000. The estimates include \$3,000 for clerk and stenographer in new municipal department. The discussion today centered around the provincial election act, the workmen's compensation act, and the new dentistry act. Several new bills of considerable importance were given their first reading. Among them is one to increase the revenue by amendments to the fish act and the land registry act. The woman's suffrage bill was defeated by 23 to 10. When Hon. Price Ellison makes his budget speech he will draw particular attention to the fact that the agricultural pro-

duction of the province is rapidly increasing. The chief feature of the budget is the large reduction in the educational estimates. The net debt, exclusive of the \$1,500,000 treasury bill due May 28, is \$8,500,000, which with the \$10,000,000 loan to be floated, will be \$18,500,000. Against this is the arrears for the sale of lands amounting to over \$13,000,000, which is drawing 6%. The road appropriations for Skeena district last year were \$405,000. This amount has practically been cut in two, proving the premier's threat that road work would have to be deferred, particularly in the north.

By the new municipal act the Bowser government usurps the control of all the hitherto independent legislative functions of a city. Not a money bylaw can be passed or a dollar borrowed on debentures unless Bowser is willing. Bowser also controls the city police and the city liquor licenses. Now he is going further and by another new act is taking all the business licenses. Every business in the city now has to contribute directly to the extravagance of maintaining a Bowser machine. Bowser's great ambition is more power and more money and he is taking them, while the dead ones in the legislature appear silently and sadly satisfied to take the crumbs that fall. Wm. Manson recently boasted that he was a good citizen of Prince Rupert, but no one has heard him pleading Prince Rupert's cause while the independence of Prince Rupert is being stolen. Manson is a better "buttons" to Bowser than he is a citizen of this city.

#### GREAT LIBERAL CONVENTION NOW IN SESSION IN CITY OF VICTORIA

R. have no intention of attempting to evade the provision of the Panama Canal Act which bars railroad owned ships from the canal, has reached Washington through official channels. It declared the C. P. R. would not send fleets through the canal even if there was no question of its right because the officials see no advantage to be gained by changing the present routes across the Atlantic and Pacific.

#### HAD TO CUT FREIGHT RATES ON LUMBER

##### C. P. R. Will Not Be Allowed to Charge Through Freight Higher Than Sum of Local Rates

(Special to The Daily News) Ottawa, Feb. 27.—Judgment has been given by the railway board in the application of the Fullerton Lumber & Shingle Co. of Vancouver for an order directing the C. P. R. to desist from charging a higher through rate than the sum of local rates. The decision against the applicant's application concerned through rates in group "D" lumber from Bellingham, Wash., to points in the Canadian northwest, it being alleged that the through rates were excessive to the extent that they exceed the sum of the local rates.

#### FITTINGS BURNED TO RUN SHIP TO SAFETY

##### Thrilling Tale Told by Crew of Revenue Cutter Which Went to Aid Steamer

Los Angeles, Feb. 26.—By feeding all the inflammable cargo and ship's fittings into the furnaces Capt. Paulse saved the steamer Eureka from being dashed on the Morro rocks in a storm and docked safely in Port San Luis, according to the crew of the revenue cutter Manning, which has arrived here after going to the Eureka's assistance.

Buffeting the storm exhausted the regular fuel supply and the vessel began to drift helplessly toward the rocks. "All hands to the box shoos," ordered the captain, and this part of the cargo was fed into the furnace, followed by fittings which were nearly all gone when the Eureka reached shore.

#### TASSO MINING SYNDICATE WILL SOON BE SHIPPING ORE

##### TRAMWAY 2300 FEET LONG JUST COMPLETED FROM MINE TO TIDEWATER—COPPER PROPOSITION THAT HAS BRIGHT OUTLOOK

Mr. E. T. Crawford, representing the Vancouver Machinery Co., is in the city, having just returned from Queen Charlotte Islands, where he has been employed for the past five months

erecting an aerial tramway for the Tasso Mining syndicate. The Tasso mines are located on Tasso harbor. They are a copper proposition with big blocks of profitable ore in sight. The tramway is for the purpose of carrying the ore from the mine to tidewater, a distance of 2300 feet.

On the harbor there are now being erected bunkers holding 1200 tons. These will be completed very soon and active operations will commence.

The ore is not being treated in any way locally, but will be shipped in 1200-ton shipments to the smelter. The first of the shipments will probably be made in two weeks.

CANADA'S FRONT DOOR IS ON THE PACIFIC

Minister of Trade and Commerce Predicts Big Things for Pacific Trade

Ottawa, Feb. 23.—In reply to a question in the House from Hon. Frank Oliver as to Canada's trade in the Orient, the Minister of Trade and Commerce said that the feature of this year was the very marked growth in the Canadian flour trade over last year.

China was naturally one of the richest countries in the world, and yet was one of the least developed, this being principally due to the lack of transportation.

It would create a great market for machinery and tools, and far beyond this in importance would be the food supplies of the four hundred million of Chinese and the sixty-five million of Japanese.

This was because all the better quality of rice was exported. All that was left was inferior grades. They were now getting the idea of eating flour products and even though the increase might be but fractional it amounted to a tremendous volume when it was among a population of more than four hundred millions.

"We have a great front door on the Pacific," said Mr. Foster, "and we must keep our eyes open and every string attached that will hold this trade. No country has a better chance to take advantage of that trade than Canada.

The government should come to the country and seek endorsement of its policy of reckless aiding of railway promoters. As it is, the feeling is strong, alike among party supporters and opponents, that the policy must be

abandoned. On a railway policy, as we have said, the present administration rode into power. The present railway policy, we are convinced, will end in disaster for the government, in spite of the most complete party organization that may be devised.

The forcing of this latest bill on the house, without so much as the preliminary of discussing it by the party in caucus, is the beginning of the end.

It remains to be seen whether the house will tamely submit to this railroading of railroad measures. The voters in the province will not stand for it.

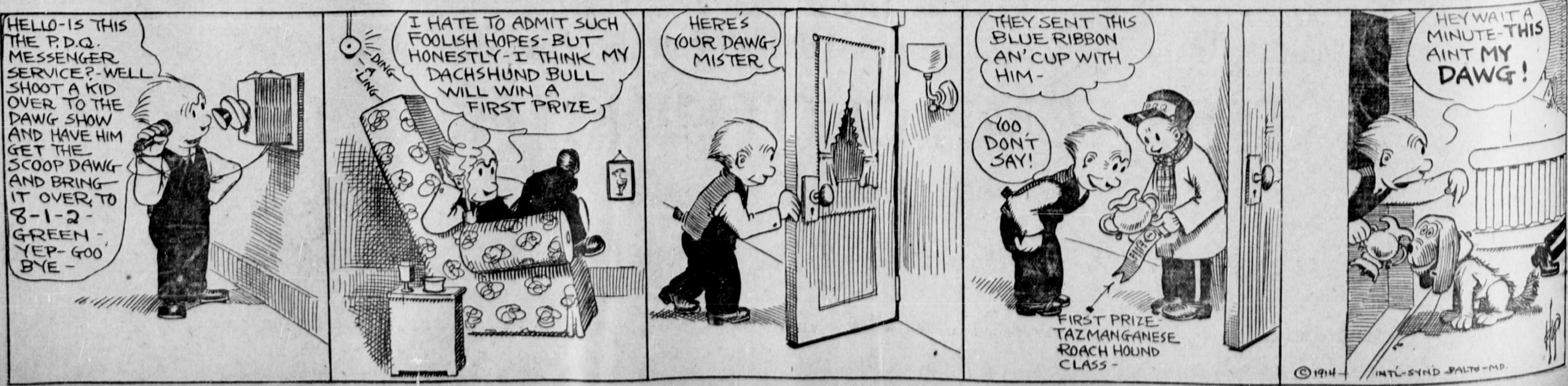

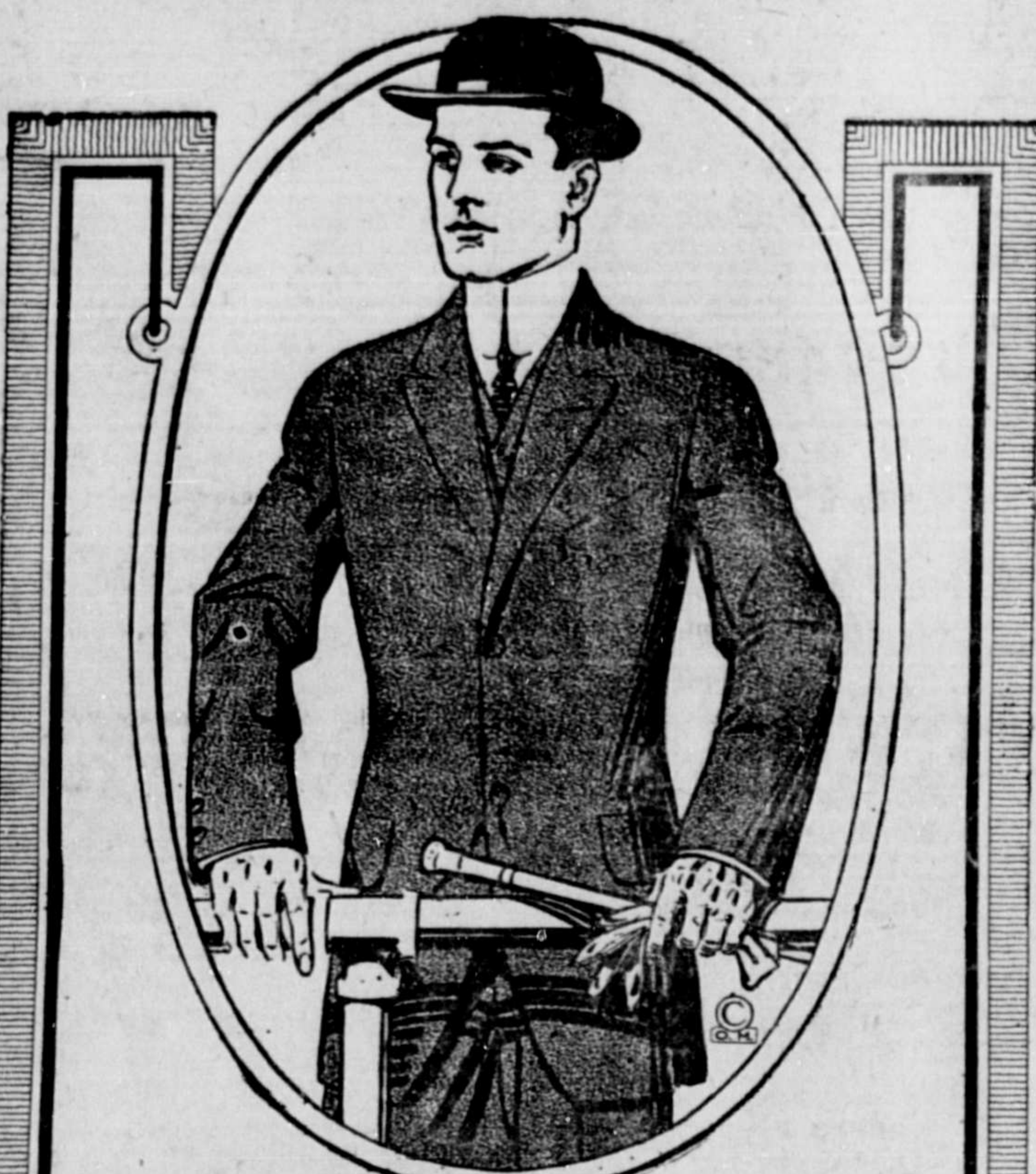
