

SIX MILLIONS OF WORK FOR RUPERT THIS YEAR

BOWSER MEETS MORE OPPOSITION AND GROWS ANGRY--ANOTHER BIG REAL ESTATE DEAL

OLD AGE PENSION SYSTEM PARLIAMENT NOT YET READY

SUGGESTED THAT RESOURCES OF THE DOMINION ARE REQUIRED FOR TRANSPORTATION AND DEVELOPMENT--ALSO NEED OF STRONG PUBLIC OPINION

Ottawa, Mar. 5.—Public opinion in Canada is not yet ready for introduction of a system of old age pensions declared Hon. T. White in the commons. A declaration followed the decision on a resolution introduced by George Kyle advocating the establishment of a federal old pension system. Hon. Mr. White said that while the disposition was to favor any proposal which would result in the amelioration of the condition of the aged, he was satisfied that

the force of public opinion back of the proposal was not sufficient to warrant the government in taking any action at the present time. He thought the resources of the Dominion would be required for some time to come in providing transportation facilities and for the completion of other national undertakings. He pointed out that fact that the introduction of old age pensions in Great Britain had been preceded for many years by an agitation backed by a very decided public opinion.

LOCAL HOUSE PROROGUED REGRET DEATH OF MINTO

AND REGISTRY BILL PASSED IN CLOSING HOURS--ATTORNEY-GENERAL PUT ON THE DEFENSIVE AND SHOWS HIS TEMPER

Victoria, March 5.—The house prorogued. The lieutenant-governor read the speech from the throne, thanking the members and expressing profound regret on behalf of parliament and the people of British Columbia for the death of Earl Minto.

Opposition to the land registry bill made itself heard in the legislature. Mr. Hayward wanted the bill laid over till next year so that the members could have time to consider its contents. He said Mr. Bowser might understand the provisions of the bill but no one else did. The attorney-general defended his department and said that any time he was unable to run it without outside help he would resign his portfolio. In the end the resolution was defeated.

Ottawa, March 4.—Canada is mourning two of her staunchest friends, whom the hand of the grim reaper has touched, one Lord Minto, former governor-general of the Dominion, and the other Hon. Charles E. Devlin, minister of mines and fisheries in the Quebec government.

SILVER CUP MINES LEASED BY COMPANY

Clothier Bros. Will Organize a Development Company to Operate Mines

A meeting of the shareholders of the Silver Cup mines and of the Sunset and Sunrise group of properties adjoining on Glen mountain, Hazelton district, was held in Patmore & Fulton's offices yesterday. The principal business of the meeting was the discussion of the proposed lease of the company's property to Messrs. Clothier brothers, well-known mining men of the Boundary country. The meeting decided to accept the lease on conditions slightly different from those proposed.

Messrs. Clothier brothers, if they accept the proposition, will form a development company and open the property. The financial statement of the company shows \$198 in the treasury and liabilities of \$6500. There was about \$28,000 of the company's stock sold locally and this capital was used for development purposes. The present company purchased from a syndicate some three years ago. The vendors took \$600,000 worth of shares for the property and they control the company at the present time.

There were a number of local shareholders at the meeting. Under the proposed agreement the company will get 20 per cent of the net profits from the ore taken out by the development company.

SUFFRAGETTES OPPOSE THE LABOR LEADER

Still Show Old Fighting Spirit--Great Up roar at Political Meeting

London, March 5.—Militant suffragettes gave further proof that their bitterest animosity is reserved for the Labor party, the only political party which has espoused their cause. As soon as Ramsay MacDonald, chairman of the Labor party, started to speak at a Labor rally in Memory hall, the suffragettes in all parts of the chamber, aided by their male supporters, started to howl him down. For nearly an hour a fierce struggle raged in the hall. There were frequent free fights between men, while women grappled one another by the hair, scratched faces, tore clothing and smashed chairs. Eventually the police restored order and Mr. MacDonald got a chance to finish his speech.

SIR RICHARD M'BRIDE MAY BE COMMISSIONER

His Early Visit to Ottawa Coupled With Raise in Salary Suggests His Appointment

Ottawa, March 5.—The evening press says it is understood that the supplementary estimates will increase the salary of the high commissioner to \$30,000, making this the highest paid office in the gift of the Canadian people. Sir Richard McBride will be in Ottawa in a fortnight, and his visit may have something to do in the way of a successor to Lord Strathcona.

TWO THIRD AVE. LOTS BROUGHT \$42,000 FOR FIFTY FEET FRONT

LOTS ADJOIN NEW POST OFFICE SITE--SALE INDICATES HEALTHY CONDITION OF THE REAL ESTATE MARKET IN THIS CITY

Another big realty deal was completed here yesterday when two Third Avenue lots were sold for \$42,000. The purchasers were western Ontario men, represented by Messrs. Westenhaver Bros. The owner, Mr. V. W. Smith, was represented by Messrs. Harrison, Gamble & Co. The two lots sold are lots 14 and 15, block 34, section 1. They have a fifty-foot frontage adjoining the post office property, now being excavated for a federal building. The price paid for these lots shows a healthy condition of real estate in the city. Recently there have been numerous enquiries for business and residential lots in Prince Rupert, and the real estate men look forward to a good year.

\$6,000,000 CONSTRUCTION WORK IN SIGHT FOR THIS YEAR

PRINCE RUPERT WILL FIND 1914 A BUSY YEAR--SOME FIGURES WHICH OUGHT TO GIVE EVERY CITIZEN ABUNDANCE OF FAITH

"Do you know there is close on six million dollars' worth of construction work to go on in Prince Rupert during the year 1914?" said a city official to a News man yesterday. "The building permits of this city are going to astonish the whole continent this year. I don't believe there will be a city in the west equal it, and certainly none on the coast." Then he gave some figures, and they certainly shown an astonishing total that ought to please every property holder and business man in Prince Rupert. Here is the estimate: Provincial government building, \$150,000. Post office building, \$200,000. Grand Trunk hotel, \$2,000,000. Armory, \$100,000. Dry dock complete, \$2,750,000. Quarantine station work, \$60,000. City hydro-electric plant, \$300,000. Section Two bridge, \$100,000. Apartment houses and private residences, \$100,000. In addition to these is the mountain road work and numerous private enterprises which have not yet been made public. Considerable of the dry dock appropriation has already been spent, but practically all the construction work is being done this year. Certainly the amount of work to be done should make this a good healthy business year.

The first thing that strikes one on visiting the House at Victoria is the bored look of Premier McBride. The fascination of power and position has passed away as well as the desire for great wealth. All these passions he has glutted to the full and he longs for new worlds to conquer. Consequently the tame position of a provincial premier is getting on his nerves.

It is a well known fact in well informed circles that the premier would bolt at once if it were not for the pressure of his friends. They know too well that it requires Dick's smoothness to keep the mob from open revolt. Everybody knows that McBride is anything but a strong man. He has, however, the same influence of a good cook in the home. He can dish the coarse products of Bully Bowser in such a way that many people cannot see that they are eating to their own damnation.

Sir Richard has had great ambitions to become premier of Canada. Some of his friends at Ottawa, too, once thought him a possibility. But he visited the capital and the moment he opened his mouth he put his foot in it. Of late he has been casting longing glances toward the high commissionership, but his friends won't let him speak. The powers at Ottawa perhaps would be glad to see him securely placed on the shelf, for their own position is not too secure. The Tories of British Columbia, however, won't let

him go, so Dick sulks and looks bored.

Perhaps this explains his recent railway policy. Certainly such conduct can only be explained as courting defeat. Bob Rogers turned down this request of the C. N. R. and Bob Rogers no doubt still likes his price. It remained for smooth Dick to take on the most unpopular issue in Canada. He has tied down the people of British Columbia to a railway liability of almost two hundred millions. He did this against the most bitter protests of his friends. Why did Dick do this?

There can be only one explanation. Sir Dick wants to quit British Columbia politics. If he left at present the party would blame him for defeat. Accordingly he is boring holes through the hull in order that he may strand the old Tory ship, and then he will be free. In the meantime the country must suffer from the unpopular and suicidal legislation that he is using to bring about his own downfall.

The best element of the Conservative party is up in arms against the McBride railway policy. Besides that the British financiers have expressed their entire disapproval. A British banker at present in Victoria has consented to take the platform in opposition thereto. With all these discordant elements it is no wonder that friends of that party have the gravest fears for its early downfall.



CANADIAN PACIFIC WRECK AT MOUNTAIN, ONT.

The upper picture shows the ditched coaches of the C.P.R. Montreal-to-Toronto express, wrecked at Mountain, Ont., about 100 miles west of Montreal, on the 17th of February. The only passenger in the cars hurt was Mr. E. Bowles of New York. The lower picture shows the engine, which turned a complete somersault. Robert Grant, of Montreal, the engineer, was found dead with his hand on the throttle.

British and Foreign News

The English courts have found the White Star line liable for losses due to the sinking of the Titanic.

Paoul de Reals, a French aviator, was killed at Versailles on recently by a fall from a height of 600 feet when he was experimenting with a new biplane.

The Montreal Daily Mail says: Sir Ernest Shackleton announces a secret gift of \$175,000 for his polar expedition. Which kills the story that Andrew Carnegie gave the money.

London news agents complain of increasing difficulty in getting boys to deliver morning newspapers. It is stated that the school authorities will not allow boys of school age to take the papers around.

A memorial tablet has been erected in Second Presbyterian church, Chicago, to honor a deceased sexton of that church. For fifty-one years this faithful church officer performed, as a sacred duty, the work of keeping the church comfortable for worship.

Glasgow is to have a memorial of Carlyle in the shape of a large block of Dumfriesshire granite, bearing a profile medallion and the inscription "Thomas Carlyle," with the titles of his most celebrated books.

Farmers in Devonshire and West Somersetshire, England, are again organizing for a combined shoot next month of wood pigeons, which are said to do

great damage to the early crops in that part of the country. It is expected that 1600 men will take part in the shoot in one Devon district alone.

At South Bethlehem, Pa., Monday, Mrs. Bridget Dougherty Curran celebrated her 107th birthday at the home of her daughter. She enjoys good health and is in possession of all her faculties. Mrs. Curran, who was born in Ireland in 1807, has four sisters living, the youngest of whom is 82. Her mother lived to be more than 102 years old.

A lunatic at Richmond asylum declared he had hidden £200 on the shore of Balbriggan, but the statement was regarded as evidence of his disordered mind. He was so persistent in his assertions, however, that the authorities took him in a taxi cab to Balbriggan, where he went to a recess in the rocks and disclosed two bags containing £183 in gold.

The Carnegie library at North Field, Worcestershire, six miles south of Birmingham, was destroyed last week by an arson squad of militant suffragettes. All the books were burned and only the shell of the building was left standing.

If the divers fail to find the body, another search will be made of the coast from here north to Point Conception. If that fails steps will be taken in the courts for the administration of the large estate, relatives have announced.

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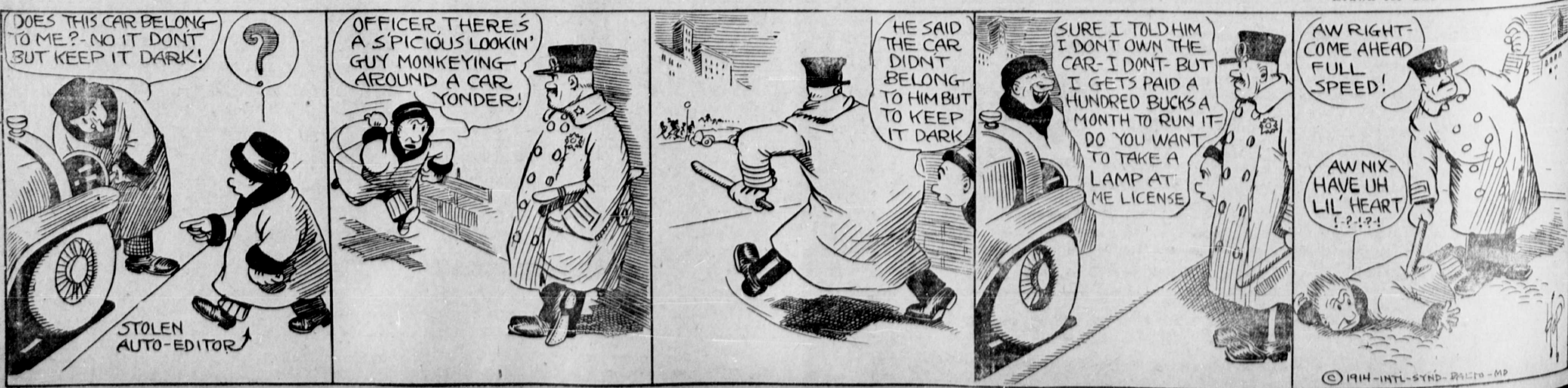

MILLIONAIRE FACES WHITE SLAVE CHARGE

Bond Fixed at \$10,000—Declares It Blackmail Game

San Francisco, March 2.—J. Parker Whitney, the millionaire clubman accused in a warrant issued yesterday of violation of the Mann White Slave Act, was arrested early today on his ranch in placer county. His bond already had been tentatively fixed at \$10,000 and he was allowed to remain in charge of the arresting officer on the ranch for the remainder of the night.

Whitney took his arrest calmly. He asked for particulars and when told that he was charged with having transported Genevieve Hannan from New York to San Francisco for immoral purposes, he said:

"I have been expecting this trouble for some time and I am glad things have come to a climax. It is simply a case of blackmail."

Shipped Boy as Hog

Lincoln, Neb., March 4.—A boy created and shipped as live stock was the discovery made by a veterinary here when he was called upon to inspect a carload of goods billed from Bertrand, Neb., to Burke, South Dakota. The way-bill of the shipment included household goods and "one hog valued at \$10." Being an interstate shipment inspection was required. The veterinary found the household goods but no sign of a hog. A careful search, however, revealed a boy curled up in a corner of the car, none the worse for his trip. By billing the car as part live stock the shipper is allowed the low rate on the household goods, and in the absence of a hog the boy was sent by the shipper as a substitute.

GOLD SEEKERS ON THE TRAIL AGAIN

Miners Are Leaving for the Omineca and Ingenica Gold Fields for Another Season

The winter was breaking up and the snow was going fast. All the Ingenica and Omineca prospectors and miners got busy immediately hit the trail for the old gold fields of those famous districts. The Royal Standard Investment Co., and Otterson's parties are expected to arrive from the south at any time to hit the trail for their gold dreams. This year will be the biggest since the rush some forty odd years ago, and it is predicted on all sides that more gold will come out of those districts than since the early days.

MILWAUKEE WILL TRY OUT ELECTRICITY

Engines in Rocky Mountain District in Montana Are to Be Changed

Butte, Mont., March 3.—Definite word has been received in Butte that construction work on the electrification of one engine district of the Milwaukee road between Three Forks and Deer Lodge will be started in a few weeks.

This is a part of the project to electrify the Milwaukee road between Harlowtown, Mont., and Avery, Idaho, 440 miles across the Belt, Rocky and Bitter Root mountains, a total distance of four engine districts, with maximum grades of 2 per cent.

Probably no railroad electrification scheme has aroused such interest in the engineering world as this stupendous task which the Milwaukee has placed before it. It has been decided to adopt the 2,400 volt direct current system of propulsion, utilizing the regenerative electric braking feature, which will take the place of the air brakes on the mountain grades.

WESTERN STATES WILL HAVE 'SALMON DAY'

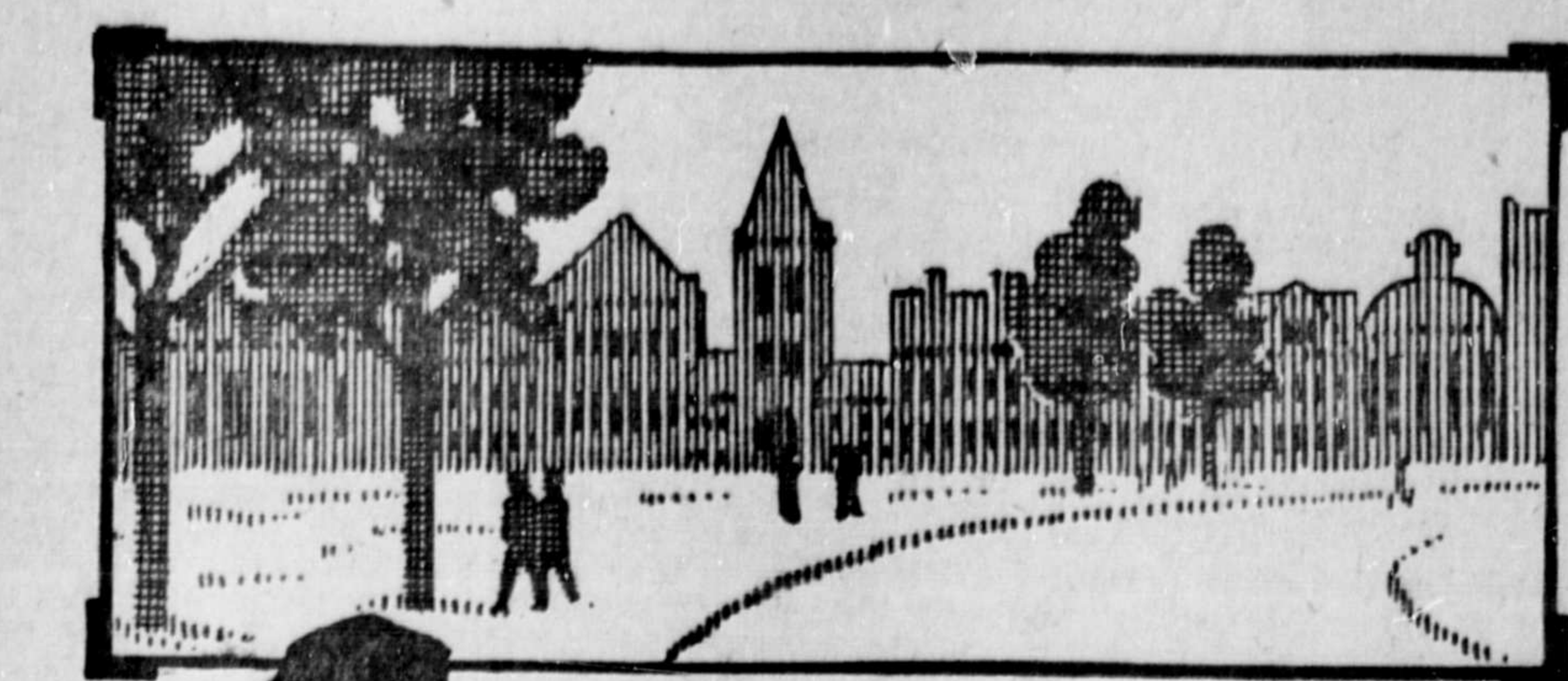
Culinary Possibilities of King of Fish to Be Exploited in Northwest

"Salmon Day" is the latest institution in the celebration line to be introduced in the northwest.
