According to a despatch from Ottawa, the carving up of the B. C. constituencies to work in six new members has commenced. On the present draft Vancouver gets two members at large. North Vancouver and district one and South Vancouver one, New Westminster one, the Delta one, Vancouver Island will get three members instead of two. Yale-Cariboo will be divided in two and Kootenay will remain the same. The Skeena and Atlin district will have one member. This distribution merely cuts Comox off the present constituency. It will leave it as probably the biggest constituency territorially in the Dominion and one which will long before the next redistribution be the largest numerically. This constituency reaches from Rivers Inlet on the south to the northern boundary and from the coast half way across the province. It is growing in population faster than any other part of the province and probably before the next election will have sufficient population to warrant two members instead of one.

### GEORGE FRIZZELL BOOSTING FOR GREAT BULKLEY VALLEY

**TRAVELLERS CANNOT SEE THE VALLEY FROM THE RAILWAY -- MANY FINE RANCHES AND PROMISING MINING PROPERTIES -- COUNTRY WILL SUPPLY PRINCE RUPERT.**

George Frizzell, one of the biggest men the north country has produced, is now boosting for the Bulkley Valley, and when George boosts there is always something honest and substantial behind it. George considers the Bulkley Valley has not had the amount of advertising it deserves. This reason is that the people of the district surrounding have never seen the valley. "I have gone through on the train several times, but I never saw Bulkley Valley until last week," said Mr. Frizzell. "Then I saw some of the finest ranches and the best looking mining prospects it has been my pleasure to see."

Mr. Frizzell visited the Carr Bros. ranch, six miles from the railway. It has 800 acres of cleared land and a lot of it will be in crops this year. There are all kinds of grain and vegetable and hay on the ranch. At Jack Seeley's ranch he saw over 75 head of cattle, and fine looking animals. The Hudson Bay Company also has a big ranch with much cleared land and there are a number of smaller ranches just getting their lands opened up.

"It is the prettiest country I have ever seen," said Mr. Frizzell, "and that country is in a position right now to start in supplying Prince Rupert with hay and farm produce. The ranchers are planning to supply the Rupert trade."

In the Aldermere mining country Mr. Frizzell claims there are scores of mining propositions that are practically ready for opening up and the mineral resources alone will mean a great future for the district. There is one copper and galena property owned by Colonel Steele which has a 350 foot development tunnel driven in and work will be continued this spring. A big sum has already been offered for the property. Messrs. Carr Brothers have a claim which has ten million tons of three per cent. copper ore blocked out. It also carries gold and silver values. Other mining properties in the district are held by Harry Howson, Wm. Hunter, Martin Sanders, C. E. Thoman, Jack Holly, Dan Simpson, F. M. Dockerill, A. McLean, D. Carroll, D. Rogers, James Cronin and P. McPhee. More or less work has been done on all these properties and several have interested representatives of development companies. The government is now building a wagon road from the railway into this mining district, which will be completed this summer and will open a lot of these properties for development work. With a period of mining and investment coming on this country should attract a lot of capital and industry within the next few years.

On the next trip of the John it is expected that 25 more pre-emptors will go in. Recently considerable land covered by timber limits has been thrown open for pre-emption and some 25 were taken up. These are the settlers expected next week.

Quite a number of the settlers are from Oregon and Washington and the old settlers are getting many of their friends to join them in the development of the Gem of the Pacific.

Graham Island has particularly good land and an excellent climate and all the settlers are enthusiastic over their prospects.

### UNITED STATES RETALIATES FOR B. C. EXCLUSION ORDER

**LABORERS FROM BRITISH COLUMBIA CANNOT NOW ENTER U. S. OR ALASKA UNLESS THEY HAVE \$100 IN POCKETS -- ORDER TO STEAMSHIP AGENTS.**

That hasty immigration order passed by the Dominion cabinet at the solicitation of B. C. politicians is being resented by the U. S. authorities and a retaliatory order has been passed. The Canadian order was made some time ago, when all laborers and citizens were excluded from entering British Columbia. This was to be in force for six months and since then an extension was asked for. Under the working of the act many men were turned back at the border and seaports. Even at this port mechanics coming from Alaska to Rupert were refused a landing. Today J. H. Rogers is in receipt of a telegram from U. S. officials ordering him not to sell laborers tickets to the north or U. S. ports unless they have \$100 in their pockets. It is a retaliation for the Canadian exclusion order.

The early opening of spring is bringing with it many enquiries from the outside for Prince Rupert opportunities and it is indicative of an influx of investors to the city during the present year. Although we enjoy a spring climate here all winter it is still far from springtime in the greater part of Canada and the United States. The eastern investor hibernates during the cold weather and the mere fact that enquiries are already coming in is a most encouraging sign for a busy summer. Prince Rupert should take advantage of this opportunity to cover the east with facts concerning this city and the natural resources surrounding it.

Some of the government organs are making excuses for the incapacity of the Bordeu administration to handle the affairs of the country by stating that the administration has been handicapped by reason of a legacy left over from the Laurier administration. Supposing that same plea is applied nearer home.

Stop and think for a moment of the stupendous task which will confront the administration which steps into office when the McBride administration goes out next provincial election.

The whole rotten mess will have to be cleaned up. The public conscience, which becomes calloused by long continued outrage, must be brought to its normal state. It must be sensitive to the things which make for the public good and it must insist that honor and integrity in the conduct of the public business are vital to the welfare of the body politic.

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### MOST REMARKABLE MEMORY KNOWN TO SCIENCE.

At the starting lever of a Toronto hotel elevator is a complete weather chart for the past 24 years. It is not a book, but the brain of the elevator man, William McNair. People travelling up and down in that elevator can find out what the weather was on a certain day in the past 24 years. Mr. McNair is gifted with an uncanny memory. He can recall without hesitation the minutest details of his daily life on any given date. The above picture shows a number of professors whose experiments with McNair, who is also in the group, have revealed the amazing development of memory. From left to right: R. F. Stupart, chief director of the Meteorological Department in Toronto; Rev. Prof. Cotton of Wycliffe College; Wm. McNair; B. Webber and Dr. A. H. Abbott, professor of psychology in the University of Toronto. Mr. McNair has been asked to go to New York and Baltimore to be examined by physicians there, but has not yet consented. He is about 35 years of age and absolutely normal in physique and mentality except in his memory.

An iron frame has been invented for displaying bunches of bananas in full view in stores yet which protects them from injury.
