

British Columbia seems to be the only place in the world where a member of parliament or of the legislature does not wish to represent the whole people. When a member gives his report only the friends of the party are invited. It certainly gives the impression that there are some ugly scars to be covered up which would not stand the light of day. When all the rest of the world is demanding that politics be conducted in the open, the Tories of British Columbia insist on putting on the lid.

It appeared at one time as if the C. N. R. was turned down by the Borden government in their demand for an additional grant of twenty-five million. It looks now, however, as if that was only a stroke of policy. Before accepting the Dominion grant it was probably thought better to take a slice out of the people of British Columbia. Now it appears that they are back at Ottawa with a renewal of their demand, and it is very likely that they will succeed.

NEW DISCOVERY BY FRENCH SURGEON

Professor of Paris University Announces Success Grafting India Rubber on Tissues

Paris, March 16 .- Professor Pierre Delbet, of the surgical clinic of the University of Paris has communicated the Academy of Medicine a report of his discovery on the feasibility of grafting India rubber on living tissue.

Prefessor Delbet described two cases in which experiments had been made and proven successful.

In one of these cases where the flesh of a finger had adhered to the bone, making the finger useless, the professor said he had interposed a thin sheet of s rubber, and that the patient now able to use the finger free-

The other case was an extensive hernia of the large intestine. A thick sheet of rubber Bookkeeping Taught grafted into the abdominal cavity, Professor Delbet said, gave absolute and permanent relief.





Naturalization Bill Introduced

London, March 14-The much heralded bill for the promotion of uniformity of the Empire's naturalization laws has been introduced into the House of Lords and read a first time The measure is designated "The British Nationality and Status of Aleins Bill." The measure is the result of the understanding reached with the Dominion.
