G. E. LET THREE CONTRACTS SOUTH OF FORT GEORGE

IDENT STEWART SAYS THAT CONTRACTS FOR PEACE RIVER EXTENSION WILL BE LET BY MAY 1

Vancouver, March 14.—The announcement was made at the survey offices of the Pacific Eastern railway today that contracts have been let south of Fort George. These contracts are being built this

year. The contracts cover for miles south of Fort George. The contractors are: H. P. A. E. Griffin & Co., for the 25 miles; Burns, Jordan & Co., for the 25 miles. The firms awarded the contracts have just completed portions of the Grand Pacific into Fort George. Their forces are already ordered, they will be in a position to start the new work immediately.

with reference to the construction plans of the company for the year, Mr. Stewart stated when the work on all the sections to be started soon under way employment will be provided for more than 2,000 men. The P. G. E. now has 5,000 men at work north of Kamiah and Clinton, and this force will be augmented so as to 10,000 distributed along the entire route between the Pacific terminal and Fort George this season. The other 2,000 would be placed on the Peace river extension of the line. It is to be started just as the contracts are let. We expect to award the contracts for the construction of a portion of the Peace river extension by May 1," Mr. Stewart announced. "We figure on covering 400 miles of the new line this summer, and on having 1,000 miles on the entire section of the line under way in the summer of 1915. The extension is to be completed and ready for operation through to the Alberta boundary in 1916. Grading will be rushed on a line 150 miles from Fort George to connect with the portion now under construction at Clinton, and on the contracts to be let this year," Mr. Stewart added.

Mr. McCutcheon is starting on what will be a regular tour through Prince Rupert and the towns of Alaska. Tom Stewart, Formerly of This City, Will Be in Charge of New Venture

ONLY FOURTEEN MILES TO NECHACO RIVER

Western Section of G. T. P. Will Reach Connecting Point in Ten Days

"Track laying is going on with a rush now," declared General Superintendent W. C. C. Mehan this morning. Last evening the track was at Fraser Lake, or Mile 359, and there only remains fourteen miles more to reach the Nechaco, where the line will be linked up. That will take only a week or ten days.

Just now the weather is very favorable. There has been considerable snow, but it is going away rapidly now.

Mr. Mehan had been up the line for a week. At the end of steel he met Mr. B. B. Kelliher, the chief engineer of the G. T. P., who came through from the eastern end. Mr. Kelliher said the track was then 50 miles west of Fort George, with only 46 miles to go. With the track laying gang making the same speed as they are on this end, the eastern end should reach the Nechaco in three weeks. By that time the temporary bridge over the Nechaco will be ready and the line can be linked up early in April.

At two places where cuts are being made the track has been temporarily laid around the cuts. The contractors are working night and day to finish these. It will be May before they are ready for the permanent track.

Ballasting will start as soon as the tracks are laid. There will be four or five steam shovels at work at the various gravel pits.

Mr. Kelliher went back to Fort George, where he is watching the building of the big bridge. He is anxious to get several spans of the permanent bridge in before the spring freshets come.

HOME RULE MUST GO THROUGH GRAVE RESULTS ARE FEARED

CHURCHILL ISSUES WARNING AGAINST ATTACKING BRITISH SOLDIERS—BIG PREPARATIONS IN IRELAND TO CELEBRATE FREEDOM

(Special to The Daily News)
London, March 16.—The settlement of the home rule difficulty is apparently little advanced by the concessions to the Ulsterites. The deadlock remains as immovable as before Mr. Asquith's speech. Signers of the covenant declare that nothing less than a permanent exclusion of the Protestant counties of Ulster will satisfy. The more radical element wants a total exclusion of the province of Ulster. Mr. Churchill speaking at Bradford said these concessions were the last the government can and ought to make.

The newspapers are filled with pictures of Ulster in civilian clothes and rifles and belts drilling like trained men. Mr. Churchill commenting again says that the first British soldier of the coast guard to be attacked and killed by Orangemen will raise such an explosion as to shake the foundations of society. The government has decided that nothing can stop the passage of the home rule bill. Big preparations are being made in different parts of Ireland to celebrate the passage of the bill and the freedom of Ireland.

SUFFRAGETTES INVADE BIRMINGHAM CATHEDRAL

Placards Placed All Over Church—Invoke Assistance of Clergy

Birmingham, Eng., March 16.—Worshippers in the cathedral found the walls and floors covered with the suffragette proclamation painted in white and a foot high, "Votes for women" and "The clergy must rise in our behalf and stop the torture of women prisoners." Every foot of space except the altar had a sign.

SEATTLE PREACHER ON CHRIST'S TEMPTATIONS

Was Urged to Pursue Wrong Means for Right Ends, Says Trinity's Rector

Seattle, March 16.—"Christ Tempted by the People" was the subject of Dr. H. H. Gowen's sermon Sunday morning at Trinity Parish church. "Christ," he said, "was not so much tempted to do wrong things as to pursue wrong means to right ends. The heart of the people was genuinely possessed with the idea of the coming of the kingdom, but they looked for its establishment through force and in a moment of time.

CHISANA SNOWSLIDE KILLS TWO HUNTERS

Former Klondikers Caught in Avalanche While After Sheep

Dawson, Y.T., March 14.—Otis Jenkins, who arrived today from Chisana, reports that Kenneth Whitehorn and Charley Anderson, former Klondikers, were killed under a snowslide on the mountain near Chisana City while hunting sheep. The bodies were recovered and taken to Chisana for burial.

LOYALTY OF THE DOMINIONS HIGHEST IN EMPIRE HISTORY

SUCH IS BELIEF OF LORD EMMOTT AFTER TOUR—SAYS PROPRIETY OF UNITED STATES IS AFFECTING DEVELOPMENT OF CANADA—DOMINIONS VENERATE THE IMPERIAL PARLIAMENT AND RESPECT ITS TRADITIONS.

London, March 14.—Under the auspices of the Royal Colonial Institute, an important assembly of representatives from every part of the British Empire gathered together at the White Hall rooms tonight to listen to a paper by Lord Emmott, the under secretary of state for the colonies, giving his impressions of the empire tour which he made last autumn.

Lord Emmott said that the warmth of their welcome in the dominions was due far more to the fact that they were representing the imperial parliament than to anything else.

Among other things, Lord Emmott noticed that there was the same tendency in the dominions as in Europe for people to herd in cities. In Canada the propriety of the United States was affecting the dominion's development and even its outlook on some imperial problems.

With regard to South Africa, in comparison with the other dominions he could not do better than to quote Gen. Smuts' remark at one of the entertainments they attended at Pretoria that "everything is pitched in a different key in South Africa."

They had a native question and a "poor white" question, the two matters which were co-related.

Summing up his impressions, Lord Emmott said that the imperial outlook was one that filled him with hope and confidence. He saw no signs in the dominions of any general desire for closer organic union.

NEW DISCOVERY BY FRENCH SURGEON

Professor of Paris University Announces Success Grafting India Rubber on Tissues

Paris, March 16.—Professor Pierre Delbet, of the surgical clinic of the University of Paris has communicated the Academy of Medicine a report of his discovery on the feasibility of grafting India rubber on living tissue.

Professor Delbet described two cases in which experiments had been made and proven successful.

In one of these cases where the flesh of a finger had adhered to the bone, making the finger useless, the professor said he had interposed a thin sheet of rubber, and that the patient is now able to use the finger freely.

The other case was an extensive hernia of the large intestine. A thick sheet of rubber grafted into the abdominal cavity, Professor Delbet said, gave absolute and permanent relief.
