Names of Two of Them Found Out--Well Known in Criminal Circles

Seattle, March 26.--The identity of the two highwaymen who held up the Great Northern passenger train near Bellingham has been learned through the confession of an inmate of the hospital at Victoria. The confession was obtained from a man who went to the hospital for the treatment of a bullet wound which he said he had received in a logging camp fight. The wounded man said that the men who held up the train were Harry Matthews and George Ball. Both men have criminal records and their photographs have been obtained from the Montana penitentiary and the prison at New Westminster.

NEW POST OFFICE IMPOSING BUILDING

Tenders for Five-storey Structure to Be Advertised for Immediately

Mr. George B. Hull, resident engineer for the Dominion public works department, states that the plans for the new Prince Rupert post office are already in Ottawa and that advertisements calling for tenders will be issued immediately. The new building will be five storeys in height. It will be of reinforced concrete with brick side walls and a marble facing. Marble columns will decorate the front and the entrances will be on each of the front corners. The approximate cost of the building will be \$250,000.

Governor-General Signs the Papers to That End--Fines to Be Remitted

Ottawa, March 26.--The governor-general has signed the papers for the release of twenty-one mine strikers of Nanaimo. The release of the men will take place as soon as the papers reach New Westminster. The strikers' fines of \$100 will be remitted.

COL. SEELEY, SECRETARY WAR, TENDERED HIS RESIGNATION

CAUSED BY THE TROUBLE WITH OFFICERS IN IRELAND--ASQUITH WILL NOT ACCEPT RESIGNATION--GREAT EXCITEMENT IN HOUSE OF COMMONS

London, March 25.--Colonel Seeley, secretary for war, has resigned his portfolio as secretary of state for war. Premier Asquith, however, has refused to accept his resignation. After a most sympathetic reception in the house of commons, the secretary for war made an explanation of his action which was one of the most interesting in the history of the house. He stated that he had been unable to prevent the resignation of several officers in the army, and that he had been forced to resign. The suggestion was absolutely without foundation in the broadest sense, he said. Rumors regarding the resignations were rife all day. As might be inferred, the reports were exaggerated and of the wildest character. One had it that the entire cabinet, after a protracted meeting, had decided to resign. Another rumor was to the effect that Hon. Winston Churchill had withdrawn from the cabinet also. Amid all the conflicting partisan comments and rumors, it is difficult to get at the exact truth as to what has occurred since the end of last week. The Unionists are making the most of the situation in the hope that the opportunity will occur by which it will become necessary for Premier Asquith to resign. On the other hand, the Radicals and the Labor men believe that if parliament should be dissolved at such a time as this the country would show its determination not to be ruled by the army nor the aristocratic section of the people. Between the two forces Asquith, they contend, would maintain the balance. The war office statement made by Colonel Seeley may be interpreted in many ways, but the easiest is to imply that the government, acting on the best information, decided to take precautionary measures to prevent either of the parties in Ulster from seizing the military stores. The Nationalists had demonstrated on Sunday, which might have set a match to the powder barrel of the Unionist trained bands. This was only abandoned on Saturday after orders had been given against all demonstrations. The government consequently abandoned its preparations to meet eventualities. The house of commons buzzed with excitement today to hear the announcement in the house. The galleries were crowded to their utmost capacity. Lord Charles Beresford opened with an attack on the government, demanding information as to the naval movements in connection with the situation in Ulster. He asked if it were true that a battle squadron was ordered to steam at full speed from Spanish waters to the Irish coast and had been ordered to embark field guns. Amid ministerial cheers and derisive laughter from the Unionist benches, Hon. Winston Churchill, first lord of the admiralty, admitted that a battle squadron had been ordered to Camlath so as to be in proximity to the coast of Ireland in case of serious disturbances arising. When it has become clear that the military precautionary movement would be carried out without opposition, it had been decided that this move on the part of the fleet should be delayed until after the Easter leave period for the crews would be over.

GOVT. SEVERELY CRITICIZED FOR PARTISAN REPORT N. T. RY.

HON. GEORGE P. GRAHAM RIDDLES REPORT OF THE COMMISSIONERS--SAYS THEY HAVE NO REGARD FOR DAMAGE TO COUNTRY AND RAILWAY

Ottawa, March 26.--The debate on the report of the commission which enquired into the cost of the National Transcontinental railway was continued by Hon. Geo. P. Graham, who moved a motion of censure on the government in that the report of the commissioners appointed by the government to enquire into the construction of the N. T. R. was wilfully partisan, misleading and wholly unrefractory. It was the manifest intention, he said, of the commissioners to misrepresent for party purposes rather than to investigate in the public interest, without regard to the serious consequences to the country and to this great national undertaking. For the appointment of such commissioners and the acceptance and endorsement of their report the government deserved the censure of the house.

TORY POLITICIANS FIND ORIENTAL PROBLEM KNOTTY

Ottawa, March 26.--Premier McBride and the members from British Columbia had an important conference with Hon. R. L. Borden on the whole question of Oriental immigration and thoroughly discussed the working out of a permanent solution of the problem. Premier McBride submitted the attitude of the province, pointing out that the province practically did not favor total exclusion. It is understood that the conference has reached no definite conclusion. The various international and imperial aspects of the problem were discussed and a number of suggestions were made, one being that a conference of the overseas dominions interested in the problem be called. This was remarked to be hardly feasible.

RAIN HOLDUP MAN ARRESTED CALGARY POLICE QUICK WORK

GEORGE BALL, NOTED CRIMINAL, ARRESTED--BELIEVED TO BE ONE OF MEN WHO HELD UP GREAT NORTHERN TRAIN NEAR BELLINGHAM

Calgary, March 26.--With \$500 on his head if he is the man whom the police believe him to be, George Ball, well known in the circles in Pacific coast as a desperate criminal, was arrested by Inspector Nutt of the Calgary Messenger office, where he was employed. The suspicion is that he is one of the three men who held up the Great Northern train near Bellingham on the night of February 20. The arrest was made with spectacular speed. Receiving the photograph of Ball at 10 o'clock, the inspector landed his man behind the bars half an hour later. He will be taken to Bellingham for trial.

The policy adopted by the mayor with regard to advertising is the most shortsighted possible. There are even a few business men who say that advertising would simply induce outsiders to come here and open opposition with the present merchants. The obvious answer is that if Prince Rupert does not justify more business houses in the near future it is because her supposed friends will not allow her to expand.

This is the day of advertising and the business man or the city who does not use that medium will soon be relegated to the scrap heap. This was the fact laid hold of by Sir Wilfrid Laurier when he came into power in 1896. He started a persistent policy of advertising Canada throughout the world, and the results have proven that he was right.

It is foolish to think that laborers and storekeepers are the only people who would respond to our advertising. There are thousands of people with capital who are looking for a place to better their conditions, and if we go after them we will get them.

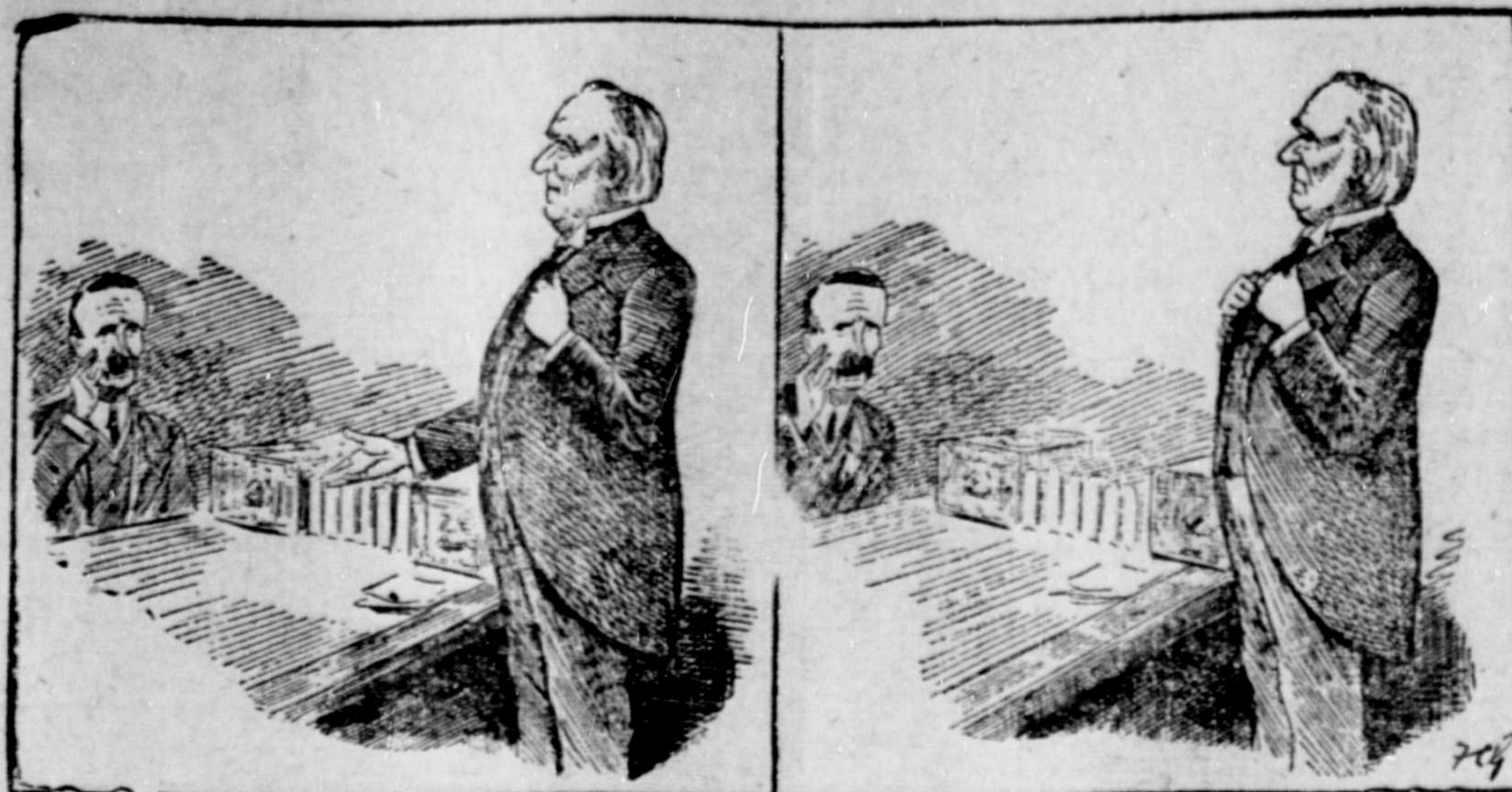
Once we decide on advertising it will be time enough to seriously consider the method. The program should be laid broad enough to include the whole northland. Attention should be called to the undeveloped resources of this country and the opportunities to be had by getting in on the ground floor. A wise, sane and persistent campaign of that kind would do an immense amount of good, and it is to be hoped that some means of carrying it out will be found.

The condition of Prince Rupert's waterfront is one of the biggest scandals that has ever perpetrated on a civilized people. In older communi-

ties in the east it goes without saying that a city shall own at least a good portion of its own waterfront. When the C. P. R. grabbed all the waterfront in Vancouver it was considered one of the biggest steals ever pulled off. Yet when it came to settling the waterfront in Prince Rupert the city was left with not even one outlet to the water, and with all its street-ends abutting on private property. This, too, was arranged by a paternal government that is all the time telling us how much it likes us.

The provincial government and its abject sycophant followers are fond of telling us that they are the trustees of the whole people and give that as a reason why Prince Rupert should not get her waterfront and many other advantages to which she is rightly entitled. The strange thing is that local business men can be got to sing that tune. If that were true why even then stand in the way of this city getting all the advantages possible? The other parts of the province certainly get all they can. But why should the other portions of the province share in the profits of our waterfront? By what law in equity or in fact can they have the slightest claim to it?

The only explanation possible is that the government sold our rights for party funds. No wonder the McBride machine is able to keep all these road bosses and inspectors all over the country getting votes. No wonder they were successful in subsidizing powerful interests all over the country to keep themselves in power. This could not be done out of the ordinary revenue. Money does not grow on the bush-tops, and the people of Prince Rupert have been robbed of their waterfront to pay the bills.

SCHOONER MEYER IS OFF FOR CODFISH TRIP

Prince Rupert Boat Sailed from Port of Vancouver on Tuesday

Vancouver, March 26.—The largest of the codfishing fleet to operate in North Pacific waters, and first of her type to operate from British Columbia ports, the schooner Albert Meyer sailed from the Great Northern docks on Tuesday for the north on a codfishing venture. The Albert Meyer sailed with a crew of fifty men all told and will take her catches into Prince Rupert for the Canadian Fish & Cold Storage company.

This is the first codfishing vessel to operate from British Columbia, and great interest is attached to her cruise. San Francisco, Tacoma and Seattle have sent out codfishing fleets for many years, but the fishing industry of British Columbia has hitherto been confined to halibut and salmon. Occasionally a few cod have been taken, but no definite scheme for codfishing has reached maturity until the Albert Meyer was equipped and manned for the purpose.

If she makes a success of the venture a number of other vessels are likely to be fitted for the business and follow her to the grounds.

The Albert Meyer has capacity for 1,000 tons and is said to be the largest craft engaged in codfishing in the North Pacific. The Vancouver arrangements were looked after by Mr. George H. Collins, general manager of the company.

HOLD UP PRICES AT BELL IS. HOT SPRINGS

Those Who Go to Ketchikan Springs for Treatment Pay Big Prices—Bad Accommodation

According to an article in the Ketchikan Miner the Bell island hot springs, located about fifty miles from that city, is no longer a poor man's proposition. For many years these springs, which are owned by the United States government, have been the popular rendezvous for the men of the north, and particularly the working men who wanted to get "boiled out" in the hot spring. Many cases of rheumatism and other troubles have been cured at these springs at a moderate cost.

Bell island is in possession of a man who located a homestead there but who never got a patent, as the government is reserving the spring. The holder of the island, however, controls all the bathrooms, the store, the cabins and the supplies. It used to be possible to rent a cabin a \$15 a month and buy supplies at a reasonable price. Today every one has to pay \$15 a month for a bunk and live in cabins with strangers and possibly diseased persons. Store prices are outrageous. Wood is sold at a profit of 87 1/2 per cent and coal at \$1.25 a sack.

Those who have been there recently claim the bath houses are dirty and neglected and the steam pressure improperly handled.

Unfortunately the many who go there do not find out conditions until after the boat has left and then they are stuck for a week before another boat comes.

Those who anticipate going to these springs should be warned of the conditions there.

May Back Next Week

It is announced that the steamer Princess May will resume the C. P. R. service to Northern British Columbia ports and Alaska next Saturday, replacing the Princess Maquinna, which has maintained the service while the May has been on the Nanaimo run. The Princess Patricia will be ready to resume the Nanaimo schedule this week, and the May will revert to her old service. Captain McLeod, who has been navigating the Maquinna on the northern service, will revert to his old command, the Princess May. Rumors that the Princess Alice is to make a series of northern trips this summer is not confirmed at the C. P. R. headquarters.

This influx of settlers is evidently the advance guard of a much larger number to that ideal spot of British Columbia during this summer.

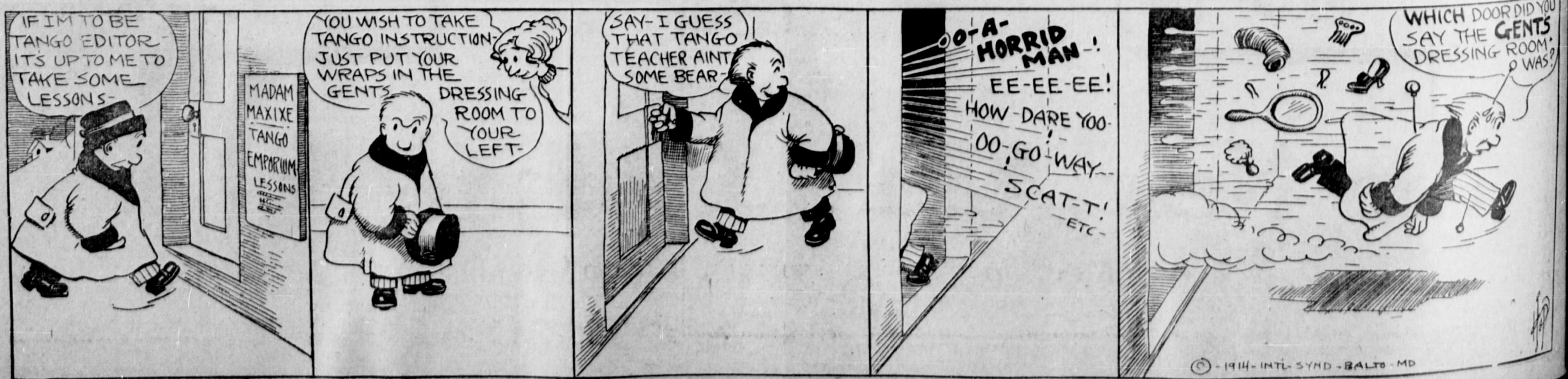

OCEAN FALLS PLANT WILL OFFERED FOR SALE BY TENDER

DEBENTURE HOLDERS WANT TO SELL TO SAN FRANCISCO SYNDICATE—SHAREHOLDERS HAVE NEW SYNDICATE ORGANIZED TO TAKE IT OVER

Vancouver, March 26.—With two rival and powerful interests fighting for the purchase of the big pulp and lumber plant of the Ocean Falls company, the future of that great concern is considered to be exceedingly hopeful, despite the abortive auction sale held this week. While thirteen persons were assembled at the board of trade rooms at the auction of the property as a going concern, the real interest and issue was being fought out in the supreme court, during which it was divulged that while the debenture holders have entered into a tentative agreement to merge the property into other great pulp and paper enterprises controlled by the Fleishhacker Brothers of San Francisco, Mr. Lester David, acting on behalf of the shareholders and creditors of the company, has organized a syndicate in London to take over the enterprise.

Mr. Lester W. David, who was the promoter and first president of the company, is by far the largest shareholder, having accepted a considerable portion of

the sale price of his properties four years ago, in stock of the Ocean Falls company. Practically none of the shares were sold on the market, the capital being raised by debenture issues which were taken up by English capitalists. The total list of unsecured creditors have claims for \$310,000, of which the Molsons bank is the largest single creditor with two judgments for \$105,000.

In fixing the reserve price for the property in the auction at \$675,000, Mr. Justice Murphy protected the English debenture holders, who have claims for \$2,900,000, and the unsecured creditors who have claims for \$310,000. The shareholders were, of course, left without protection in fixing the reserve price.

For reasons which they kept carefully to themselves none of the thirteen men present at the proposed vendue of the property of the Ocean Falls company made a bid when the property was put up for sale by the order of the supreme court. Auctioneer John S. Rankin, after failing to get an offer, announced that the property would be offered for sale by tender.

The property in question is situated at Cousins Inlet, B.C., and comprises over 500 acres of crown granted land, pulp leases, water rights, logging camps, pulp mill and electric power house, sawmill and power house, machinery, one steam tug, eight gasoline launches, two scows, wharf, three warehouses, two six-roomed and twenty five-roomed cottages, two large bunk houses and quarters for Orientals, offices, penstock and dam store, large hotel, hospital, school house, post office and wireless telegraph system.

In spite of the auctioneer's eloquence and persuasiveness the nearest that anyone came to show an interest was to enquire what was the reserve price. This Mr. Rankin said he was not at liberty to reveal.

MALAKWA DANCE ENDS IN TRAGEDY

Two Men Dead — Eight Others Taken Violently Ill

Revelstoke, March 24.—Provincial Constable Rothwell has returned to town with the bodies of two victims of a peculiar tragedy which occurred at Malakwa near here. It appears that liquor was purchased in Revelstoke by a Malakwa man for consumption at a dance at Malakwa.

As a result, apparently, of partaking of this liquor, ten of the guests at the dance were taken ill during the next two days, and two, a married man named Labeau, of Malakwa, and Olof Johnson, a casual laborer, died on Monday in terrible agony. Others, including Pat Labeau, brother of one of the deceased, were very seriously ill, but are now recovering. Constable Rothwell holds the bottle containing a small quantity of the liquor, which is labelled "Canadian Spirit." The tragedy has caused a great sensation throughout the district.

Examined British Empire

Capt. McCroskie, harbor master, made an examination of the steamer British Empire of the Northern steamship line and gave her permission to proceed south. The British Empire struck a rock when coming up the coast and stove in her bows. The plates buckled up badly but the boat is very staunchly built, with many heavy watertight compartments in her bow. The fore compartment holds all the leakage and is strong enough to carry the ship without danger. She leaves today for the south.

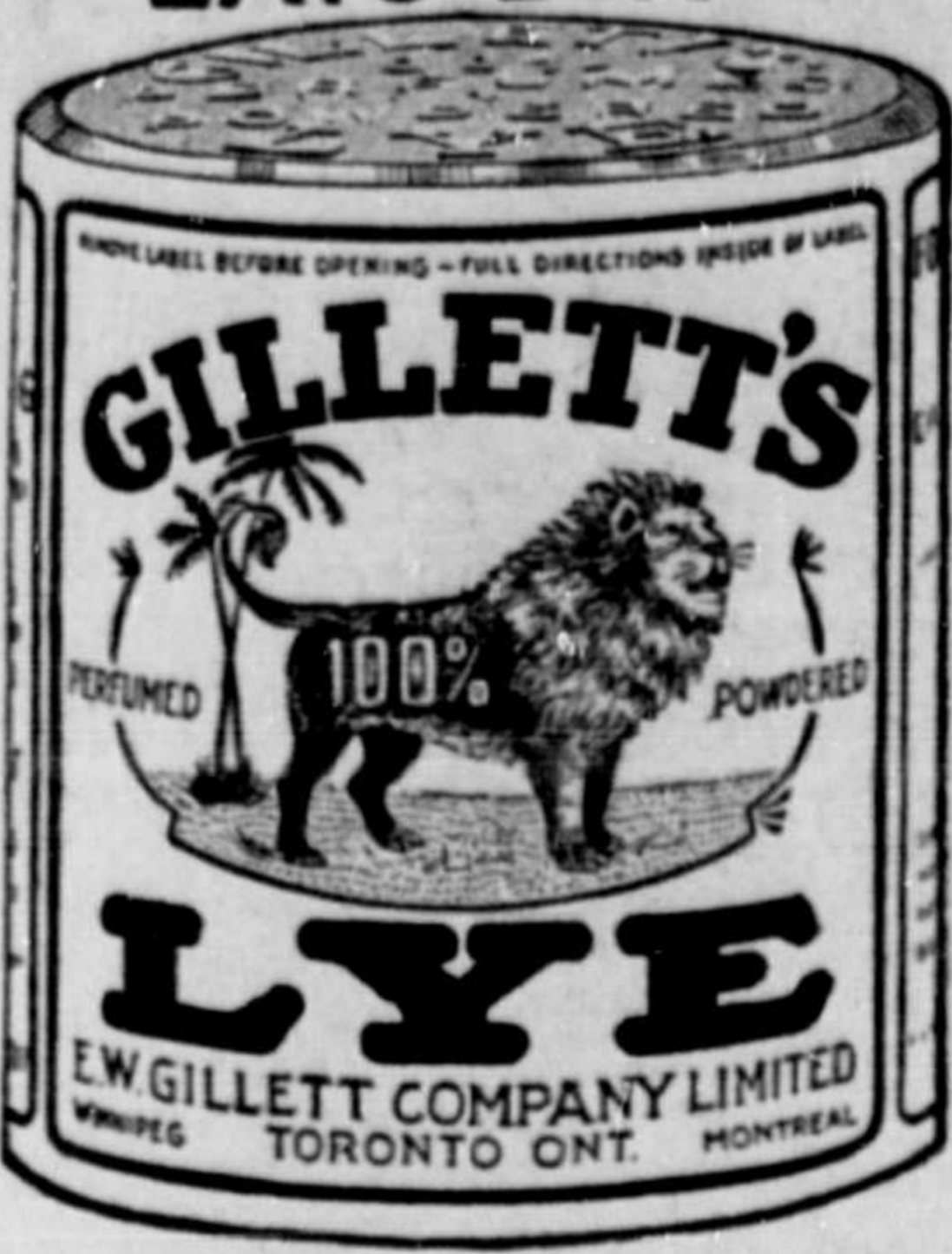
G. T. P. Purchasing Agent Dead
