CONSTABLES SHOT BY DESPERADOES

One Everett Policeman Fatally Injured--One Holdup Man Caught

Everett, March 27.--Three men were shot last night in connection with a holdup in this city. One of them is, perhaps, fatally wounded. One of the assailants later surrendered himself, while the other is still at large.

Patrolman Williamson met two suspicious characters. As they were unable to give a satisfactory account of themselves he took them to a patrol box, where he was joined by Shallcross. While pulling for a patrol wagon, one of the men grabbed Williamson's revolver and drove the patrolman and shallcross down the street a block, where the party was joined by Frye Robinson.

Williamson tried to grab his revolver, when his assailant opened fire. Williamson was shot through the body, over the right hip.

Robinson was next fired on, but was not seriously injured. Shallcross was shot through the abdomen. He is believed to be fatally injured. The three men were conveyed to the hospital.

Later one of the assailants, Paul Putman, gave himself up. He said he did not know his companion's name. He knew that he had formerly been a convict in British Columbia.

WHITE PROMISES BUDGET ON APRIL 6

Debate on Transcontinental Report Continued but Nothing New Is Said

Ottawa, March 28.--The debate on the Transcontinental report was continued last night, but little was added to the subject, which was thoroughly dealt with from opposite sides by Hon. Geo. P. Graham and Hon. Arthur Meighen.

Mr. Armstrong of East Lambton led off for the Conservatives yesterday and was replied to by Mr. Kyle of Richmond, N. S. Mr. A. L. Davidson was the last Conservative speaker and he was followed by Mr. Pius Michaud. It is expected that the debate will be continued until next Wednesday. The first speaker on Monday will be Hon. Robt. Rogers, who moved the adjournment of the debate.

Hon. Mr. White, minister of finance, announced that the budget speech will be made on April 6.

Newcombe of the Malaspina and Mr. George Ford were present at the marriage, and Mrs. and Miss Dean were witnesses.

Mrs. C. Chapman announces the marriage of her daughter, Miss Kate Elizabeth Chapman, to Mr. Cyrus W. Peck in Kansas City, Mo., on March 11. Mr. and Mrs. Peck will be at home in Prince Rupert after May 1.

Mr. and Mrs. D. McLeod of New Hazelton, who have been visiting in the city, returned to their home by today's train. Mr. McLeod expects to remain in New Hazelton at least till fall, when it is possible that the headquarters may be removed to the Peace river country.

\$217,500 REAL ESTATE DEAL ON PROPERTY ACROSS HARBOR

TWO ENGLISHMEN BUY 764 ACRES FROM GRAND TRUNK -- BLOCK INCLUDES SALT LAKES -- WILL PROBABLY BE USED FOR AMUSEMENT PARK

The biggest real estate deal put through in this district for some time was registered in the Provincial land registry office this week. It involves some 764 acres at \$217,500.

The land is situated immediately across the harbor from the G. T. P. docks.

The purchasers were Moreton Frewen and Sir Edgar Vincent, two Englishmen. The vendors were the Grand Trunk Pacific Development Company.

Seven hundred and sixty-four acres is quite a good sized piece of property. The block includes the salt lakes, known officially as Douglas Arm and Russell Arm. The purchase includes the islands in front of the block and all foreshore and riparian rights. The terms are \$72,500 cash and

the balance in two annual payments. The agreement of sale was made out February 3rd.

It is not definitely known what the purchasers intend doing with the property, but it is surmised that they intend damming the lakes to keep them full at low tide and turn the grounds into an amusement park, with possibly some summer cottages. The grounds are particularly adapted for such a purpose.

Mr. Frewen has always had an investor's eye on Prince Rupert. Before the original sale of lots he endeavored to make a deal with the Grand Trunk for a large section of the townsite and a big lawsuit resulted which the G. T. P. won out on. Mr. Frewen had not been in the city since the townsite was first opened.

BRITISH CABINET HAVE ISSUED NEW ORDER FOR THE ARMY

GENERAL FRENCH AND GEN. EWART RESIGNATIONS STAND IN SPITE OF ALL INFLUENCE -- ASQUITH MAKES ANNOUNCEMENT TO EXCITED COMMONS

(Special to The Daily News)
London, March 28.--Field Marshal French and Adjutant-General Ewart have stood firmly by their resignations in spite of the efforts of the King and cabinet ministers to induce them to retain their posts. After a long cabinet meeting Premier Asquith announced to an excited house that neither the chief of the general staff nor the Adjutant-General would give way. He announced the issue of a new army order intended to prescribe the duties of both the war office, and the officers on service in contingencies such as Ulster. The order forbids superiors asking the officers and soldiers what they will do in hypothetical contingencies. It is designed to prevent a repetition of Page's action. It also prohibits officers and soldiers asking assurances. Its sets forth the duties of the

army almost in the words of the statement which Col. Seeley amendments added, and became the crux of the whole controversy. The inclusion of soldiers with the officers in the terms of the order is a result of the attitude taken by the labor members in the debate. It is intended as a compromise.

The leader of the opposition declared the new order is the result of a blunder by the cabinet minister, Col. Seeley.

The political situation appears unchanged. Another cabinet council will be held this morning and no official declaration regarding the French-Ewart resignations is expected until after the meeting.

Carson has left Craigavon for London, but the report that Gen. Gough is coming to the capital is premature. He is still at Curragh.

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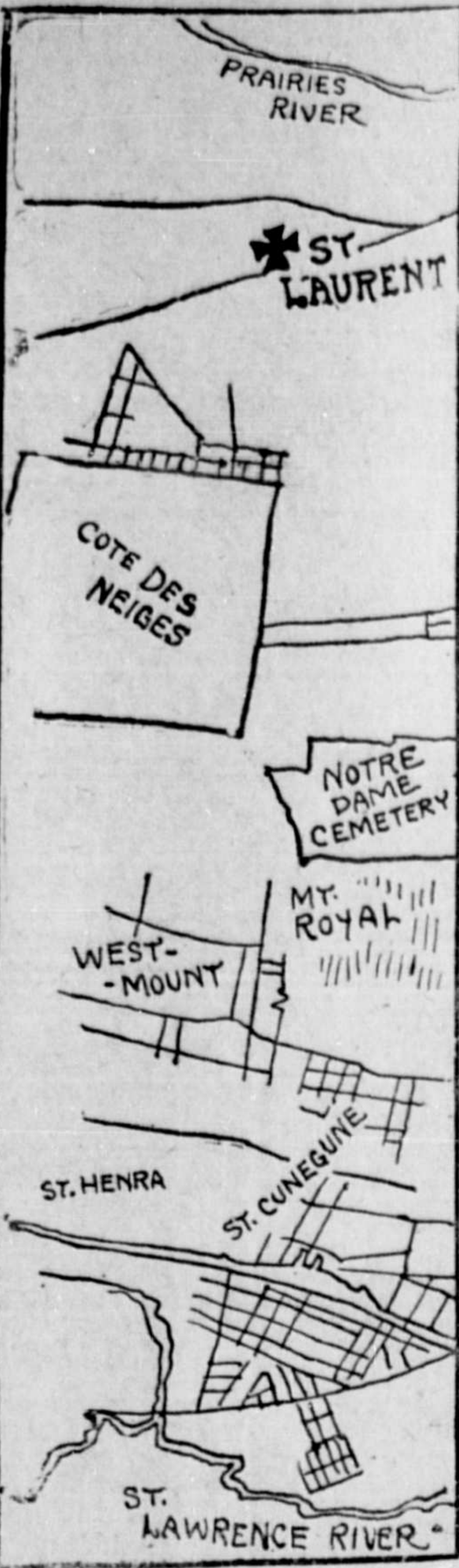

Seattle, March 27.—Harold Wells, 20 years old, interrupted a friendly game of cards in the fore-castle of the fishing schooner Fanny Dutar. The enterprise netted him five cents, and he is now in the city jail. Ludwig Snow, Clyde May, George Rockwood, and John Jetterby, members of the crew, were absorbed in the pursuit of straight flushes and similar pictorial designs when young Wells stepped before them.

"I want a smoke. Got any tobacco?" the youthful stranger asked, and when the men stuck their hands in their pockets in search of the tobacco, Wells drew a long revolver and snapped: "It isn't tobacco I want; it's cash. Throw up your hands and be searched."

The quartette, with five cents between them, readily threw up their hands and let the bandit seize their entire wealth. He took the nickel without even commenting on his poor luck, and left the boat. The members of the crew pursued him and pointed him out to Patrolmen D. J. Sullivan and Chas. Meyer, who arrested him. At the station Wells broke down and cried.

"I didn't want to rob anybody," he wailed. "I only wanted to see how easily a thing like that could be pulled off."

Too Green

By winning the Rugby international from Scotland last Saturday the English fifteen have won the international honors for 1913-14, thus repeating their last year's performance. In addition they have won the triple crown, having beaten Wales 10 to 9 and Ireland 17 to 5. The Calcutta cup is only for competition between England and Scotland.

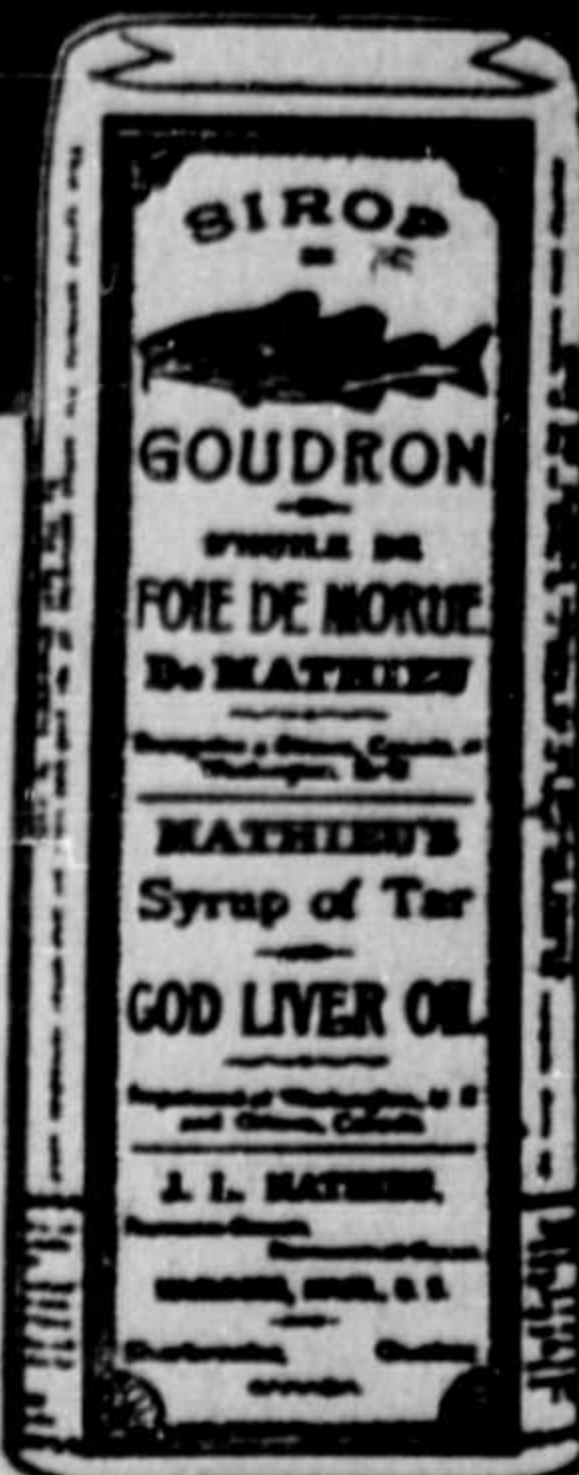
