The financial papers contain reports of many Canadian cities, particularly of the northwest, having made floof their permanent issues in London since the first of the year. A considerable number of these have been made by the Bank of Montreal. What is Prince Rupert doing?

Prince Rupert is allowing the market to absorb the issues of other places and sits idly by while the many pressing works, such as sewers, remain unprovided for.

Why does Prince Rupert play second fiddle to all these other cities? Prince Rupert should get busy and insist that the bank when placing the long terms issues of other cities must also place Prince Rupert's issues. This is a case where aggressiveness counts. Every other city is pressing for the money. Prince Rupert ought to do the same. The bank will naturally want to hold the city down, but the city should not be held down. When the bank can get a city to wait, it certainly will do so until it can take care of the other cities which are more importunate. Our local wizards of finance had better get busy.

When is the mayor, who preaches but fails to practise publicity in the conduct of the public business, going to advise the people as to how many offers for our issues have been turned down this year? What about the offer of 86 for the long term issues? Where also is the money coming from to finish the hydroelectric undertaking? The people want to know.

While he is about it, the mayor might also itemize his itemized account of expenses upon his recent visit to Victoria, where he accomplished nothing and had to be requested by the council to come home.




