## DISBANDED MILITIAMEN CONDEMN TORY MACHINE

### GREY MAKES CONCILIATORY SPEECH ON IRISH QUESTION -- INCREASED CUSTOMS RETURNS

#### LIBERAL LEADERS FRIDAY GOING INTO THE INTERIOR

MR. BREWSTER AND OLIVER WILL ADDRESS PUBLIC MEETING HERE FRIDAY EVENING -- TERRACE, HAZELTONS AND SMITHERS LATER

The final arrangements for the Brewster-Oliver tour have been made. They will address a public meeting in Prince Rupert on Friday evening. Saturday morning they will leave for Terrace, where a public meeting will be held that night. On Monday they will arrive in Hazelton by the new railway and will leave there that night, April 6.

On Tuesday they will visit Old Hazelton, where a meeting will be held on the evening of the 7th. They will then proceed to Smithers, and will address the citizens there on the evening of Wednesday, April 8. Great interest has been manifested in this tour of the Liberal leaders, and it is expected that they will receive a great reception.

#### ROADING PROBLEM FULTON AND FIFTH

Commission and Petition Asks for Original Plan to Be Altered

A delegation headed by A. J. Thomme of the Savoy hotel and a petition were presented to the city council last evening in connection with raising the grade of Fifth street and lowering the grade of Fulton street in order to make the two connect. The board of works presented a report recommending the raising of Fulton street on the present plan with the idea that the lower grade to allow for the extension of Fifth street could be made later if desired. The cost was estimated at \$25,606, which \$2,000 is chargeable to the city and the balance to the property effected.

#### G. T. P. STEAMSHIPS IN PINK OF CONDITION

Captain Nicholson, Manager of Steamships, Arrived on the Prince Rupert Today

Capt. Nicholson, manager of the G. T. P. steamships, arrived on the Prince Rupert this morning. He expects to accompany General Superintendent W. C. C. Mehan up the line and may remain for the temporary linking up of the railway.

"Both the Prince Rupert and Prince George have undergone the Lloyd's inspection this year, and were found to be in the pink of condition," said Captain Nicholson. "What about the Blue Funnel liners calling at Prince Rupert?" asked The Daily News. "Well, I expect that not only the Blue Funnel but other boats will call here but several other trans-Pacific lines as well are making arrangements to call at this port."

#### Settled With Province

The city finance department has made a settlement of the provincial government claims, and the city gained all its claims for overcharges. At the present time the city is to get only \$109,000 cash, being the net amount raised on the sale of their portion of the treasury notes. A note for the balance, \$11,184, is given in lieu of cash. It is due on November 1. This latter sum represents the discount the city had to accept on the sale of the treasury notes below par, together with interest to November 1.

Architect Gilmore has taken out a building permit for a \$17,000 apartment house to be erected on Fourth avenue. Messrs. Mitchell & Curry have the contract for the carpentry work.

#### SIR EDWARD GREY'S CONCILIATORY SPEECH

Suggests Establishment of Federal System Within Six Years

(Special to The Daily News) London, April 1.—It is generally recognized that Sir Edward Grey's speech in the house of commons has lifted the Irish question to a higher and calmer plane. It was a firm but conciliatory plan to resume negotiations on a basis of establishing a federal system within six years. There is little doubt the opposition would adopt the plan if the time limit is withdrawn.

#### PRISONER IDENTIFIED AS ONE OF HOLDUP MEN

#### EARL GREY'S RIFLES DISBAND AMID SHOUTS OF PATRIOTISM

Company Attend Banquet and to a Man Stand With Their Gallant Commander---Introduction of Party Politics Deplored--- Will be Difficult to Form New Unit

The dinner given by the officers to Earl Grey's Own Rifles last night proved to be a magnificent affair. The company was out in full force and as many civilians as could be accommodated were present. After the toast to the King, which was drunk in hearty style, Captain Stork intimated that he was going to take this occasion to explain the steps that led up to the disbandment of the company. On November 17 last he was notified from headquarters that the Earl Greys were to be made a four company battalion. On December 14 this was again confirmed, and he was asked to select a regimental number. With that he proceeded to look up officers for the new regiment. He had got the consent of nearly all the military men in the city, many of whom were staunch Conservatives. This move started the inner ring of the Conservative association to try to offset the movement and oust Capt. Stork from the leadership. Two members of the Veterans' association gave away the scheme in a moment of weakness. Shortly after this a letter came from headquarters saying that nothing further was to be done for the time. On February 10 a letter was received saying that the Earl Greys were to be disbanded and the officers placed on the reserve list. Three days before this official letter was received members of the Conservative association had been passing the news about town. Meanwhile the usual orders were being received from headquarters, and a week ago a letter was received asking when the annual drill was to be commenced. This led to the recent turnout, but another order from headquarters was received on that very day saying that the company was disbanded. One of the officers, who has been a lifelong Conservative, told of what he knew of the matter. When he heard of the disbandment he went to the inner ring of the party and they told him it was all to get rid of the Liberal officers. Hadn't Fred Stork sent a wire to Frank Par-

Since the Borden government came into power they have been accused of some of the coarsest deals ever pulled off in any country. Postmasters and office holders of all kinds have had their official heads drop so fast in the basket that a cry of protest rang throughout the ranks of the better element in that party from the east to the west of Canada. The inhuman conduct of several by-elections and the scandals of money wasted in the purchase of government sites—in Prince Rupert—has stamped that government as the most cold-blooded and corrupt administration that ever held office in any country.

It has hardly ever been known in any civilized country however, that political corruption has entered into the official administration of the army. The commercial side of the army may indeed be made the butt of party greed, but the British soldier has always been considered a man of honor and a gentleman, and no politician has ever dared to trespass on his integrity.

It has remained for Colonel the Hon. Sam Hughes to attempt to degenerate the militia of Canada. At the head of Earl Grey's Rifles in Prince Rupert was a man who could hold his head up with the greatest in the land; a man who was honored with the position of first mayor of

Prince Rupert; a man who had previously been elected first mayor of Fernie; a man who has held many positions of honor and trust throughout the Dominion, and who is physically of that kind who is fit to stand before kings. This man has also held many positions of military trust, and to his enthusiasm and patriotism is due the formation of that splendid military corps which has been the pride of Prince Rupert. Associated with him were Lieutenants McMordie and Agnew, men who are also typical of the best of Canadian manhood, and who have specialized in military matters. In view of these facts the abrupt disbandment of this company without any excuse or explanation creates a very serious condition for the people of this country.

According to reports which are current on the streets, the local Tories became jealous that men of Liberal leanings should be in charge, especially in view of the fact that the company was to be increased to a battalion and that a fine armory is to be constructed. Accordingly steps were taken to have them removed, and it appears that as no valid excuse could be given the disbandment of the company was resorted to.

This brings up an issue so serious that the average man can hardly realize it, and the men who are playing politics

in this city must be so frightfully ignorant that they do not know what they are doing. The result will be that in order to be a soldier a man must be a Tory of the most degenerate type. Surely it will be impossible to get a man with the necessary qualifications to take charge again. The officer who will take charge must be a man of honor, a gentleman and a soldier. Could such a man be found who would countenance the insulting dismissal of brother officers? Assuredly not, and if the attempt is made to organize a battalion with officers who would stoop to such practices it will be a sad day for the militia of Canada.

The core of Canadian patriotism has been attacked. If these conditions prevail no more can we hold up our heads and believe that in our army there exists the best traditions of the British race. The army, like the rest of the civil service, would be seething with political graft. No longer could a man serve his country as a loyal subject of the King. He must first bow his head to Canada's political boss and put partisanship ahead of patriotism. This is what the Borden government is about to do for Canada. This is what the local coterie of Tories would do to the fair name of Prince Rupert. This is what our "popular" member Mr. Clements has been doing in those silent hours when he did not even break forth into local print. Citizens, what are you going to do about it? Will you still support the Tory machine or will you raise a protest up to high heaven that will bring down in fragments this structure they have raised up on their false heads?

**GOOD FUR CATCH NORTH OF PRAIRIES**

Edmonton, March 31.—Colin Fraser, who has been trading in the north country for the past twenty-six years, has arrived in Edmonton with a catch of furs which, he said, was the largest he had made in ten years. His pack included pelts of 17 silver, 70 cross and 45 white foxes, 56 otter, 30 lynx, 460 marten, 21 wolverines, and several bear skins. He made the trip south from Fort Chipewyan to Fort McMurray with four dog teams, and from the last named point to Athabasca with horses.

D. S. McKenzie of Fort McMurray, who accompanied Fraser on the down trip, brought these pelts: Red foxes, 189; silver, 24; mink, 479; lynx, 9; rats, 113; bear, 9; wolves, 14; wolverine, 2; weasels, 137; otter, 20; skunk, 15, and two coyotes. The value of the fur catch in northern Alberta for the season is placed at several million dollars.

A proper survey of the Skeena river estuary has never been made, but this summer a complete survey of the waters round the mouth of the Skeena, including the entrance to the stream, will be made. This is to enable large vessels to navigate this area whenever occasion for doing so arises.
