## LIBERAL LEADERS IN RUPERT TOMORROW NIGHT

### IMPERIAL NATURALIZATION TO BE DISCUSSED HOUSE OF COMMONS--MAY ERECT SAWMILL

#### BRITISH POLITICS HAVE AGAIN PEACEFULLY SUBSIDED

RESOLUTION OF HOME RULE ON FEDERAL BASIS HOPED FOR--ASQUITH LIKELY RETURNED UNOPPOSED

(Special to The Daily News)  
London, April 2.—A remarkable pacific spirit has come over the political situation. It is almost certain that Premier Asquith will be returned unopposed. The feeling in favor of a settlement on a federal basis is gaining ground. Mr. Balfour will speak tomorrow and Sir Edward Carson and Mr. Bonar Law on Monday, when a division on the reading of the bill will be taken. The date of the East Fife election is April 15. The possibility of a compromise in connection with the home rule question is the whole talk of the day. There is a feeling that the government is about to make a proposal acceptable to the Unionists and to Ulster. It is even suggested that at this compromise the exclusion of the whole of Ulster may be granted.

The News' reference that many volunteer drills arranged for Saturday have been cancelled may be due to this. Belfast Nationalists say they might as well drop the bill as exclude Ulster. The Liberal leaders have explained that with a general election possible and a Unionist victory not far off there is a chance that the measure would be amended considerably in the next few years to meet the views of the Unionists. In consequence of this chance, therefore, it might be advantageous to consent to the exclusion providing there is an understanding given by the Unionists that the home rule scheme will not be amended should the Unionists be returned to power.

#### SKAGWAY TO DAWSON BY AN AUTOMOBILE

Passengers on Princess May Will Attempt the Trip Over Frost

An attempt to negotiate the frozen trail between Skagway and Dawson by automobile will be made by Mr. C. S. Philp, a prominent merchant of Dawson, and his son, Mr. Bartley Philp, who are passengers on the Princess May, which was here yesterday. Mr. Philp used to be in business in Vancouver. The motor car has been used with some success for short trips in the Yukon and Alaska, but Mr. Philp says the run has not previously been made right through for the entire distance from Skagway to Dawson. Mr. Philp expects to make the trip in two days. He has his own machine with him and it will be transported on a flat car from ship-board to the end of the White Pass & Yukon route at Skagway. Special tires and devices will be used to make the motor car grip the hard trail and to prevent skidding. The experiment will no doubt be watched with the keenest interest by the old sourdoughs who have done most of their travelling in the north by mushing. The Princess May carried over forty passengers for the north, en route to different points in the Yukon and Alaska. Several of whom are going to Dawson. The boat also carried about 75 tons of freight for Atlin, White Horse, Dawson and other places.

#### WILL BUILD SAWMILL WITHIN CITY LIMITS

Western Capitalists Here Investigating Several Schemes for Investment

Mr. M. Michaels of Seattle and Mr. Ellis, an oldtimer of north-western British Columbia, are in the city with a party of five Toledo men. They contemplate investing a lot of eastern capital in enterprises in this district. Mr. Michaels wants to erect a sawmill and box factory and it is possible that a site for it will be secured within the city limits. Mr. Ellis is heavily interested in timber limits in the district and may dispose of some to the city.

The visitors are also figuring on a colonization scheme. Yesterday they visited Port Simpson.

#### IMPERIAL NATURALIZATION WILL BE SUBJECT OF NEW ACT

FOREIGNERS MUST RESIDE IN EMPIRE FIVE YEARS BEFORE BEING NATURALIZED

(Special to The Daily News)

Ottawa, April 2.—The government legislation regarding imperial naturalization which was forecasted in the speech from the throne will probably be brought down next week inasmuch as the imperial parliament is enacting concurrent legislation. The subject of the bill will be based on negotiations concluded last summer for the removal of the anomaly whereby a naturalized subject of one part of the empire is not recognized in another. The bill provides for five years' residence in the empire and the last year in the dominion in which the papers are to be taken out.

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#### HOME RULE FOR IRELAND MAKES LIVELY DEBATE

Presbyterian Literary Society Hears Paper on Subject and Many Join in Discussion

There was a crowded meeting in the Presbyterian hall last night to hear Mr. C. R. Murray give a paper on "Home Rule." This momentous question was discussed by Mr. Murray from a north of Ireland Protestant point of view. He made a point of the religious feeling, and how the north and south of Ireland were divided over this question. He also pointed out that a big percentage of the industries of Ireland were located in Ulster, and that it was the north of Ireland which paid the largest proportion of the taxes of the whole country. He contended that an Irish parliament in Dublin meant the ruin of Ulster industry and that the only feasible solution was to grant home rule with the exclusion of Ulster.

As one would naturally expect Mr. Murray's paper brought out a strong opposition. The opposition pointed out that if we believed in the popular form of government, that is the majority rule, then the majority of the British parliament were in favor of home rule for Ireland, and that she should have it. They also contended that the refusal of the army officers to fight in Ireland only lessened the faith in the British army, both at home and abroad.

Those supporting Mr. Murray were Mr. Puseh, Mr. Ledley and Dr. Clayton. Those taking up the opposition were Ald. Montgomery, Mr. G. R. Naden, Mr. Wilson and Miss Eason.

The Rev. Mr. Fortune was entirely for conciliation and advocated time for more consideration of the question. The chairman announced that Ald. McLymont would give a paper on "Socialism" next Wednesday night.

At the last Dominion election the manufacturers frightened, the artisans and workmen into the belief that if Laurier were elected all the factories would have to shut down. The result was that thousands of men dependent upon the daily wage for support for themselves and families voted against the Liberal government. This appeal to the stomach is an old dodge.

Appeals to reason are now, however, waking up the people to a realization of the mistake they made in putting the Borden administration in office.

People collectively, like people individually, are forgetful at times. For a moment they forgot all that the Laurier government had done for the country and the great prosperity that prevailed during that entire administration.

Now, however, when they see the falsity of the promises which Borden made out of office, the criminal recklessness and waste which he has allowed while in office, and when they contrast the prosperity under the Laurier administration with the hard times under the Borden regime, they see things with a new light.

The people realize as never before that the great good of

all the people was always uppermost in the mind of the Liberal chieftain. They know now as never before that the Old Chief was always the master and not the servant of a circle of financial pirates. They see that while Laurier was for the whole people, Borden is hemmed in by the financial interests which put him in office, whose will he must do, and whose determination to prey upon the people the leader of the government has not the moral courage to resist.

## SCIENTISTS CLAIM EARTH'S CORE IS RIGID

Ancient Beliefs in Molten Mass Are Exploded by the Professors

Chicago, April 1.—Ancient and popular beliefs that the core of the earth is a molten mass have been investigated by scientists of the University of Chicago, who announce that the planet is more rigid than steel, that it could not explode or be destroyed by a fire within itself.

The experiments were designed by Prof. Albert A. Michelson, head of the department of physics, at the instigation of Prof. T. C. Chamberlin, of the department of geology, and Prof. F. R. Moulton of the department of astronomy.

"The experiments," said Prof. Michelson, "show that the interior of the earth is not a fiery mass, but resists the tidal forces of the moon about as it would if the earth were made of solid steel. Nevertheless, the earth, in spite of its rigidity, behaves as an elastic body; not liquid nor of the same substances as the oceans which form a part of it. 'That the solid surface of the earth is subject to the same ebb and flow as are the tides of the ocean, although to a lesser extent, is a statement that will astonish the average person, who is prepared to assert with all the assurance of conviction that the earth is an immovable body. The fact that there are tides of about a foot in the surface of the earth has been demonstrated as a scientific fact.'

"Mr. Alexander Ogilvie, B.Sc., presided at a meeting of the Royal Scottish Society of Arts, held at 117 George street, Edinburgh, last night, when Mr. H. M. Cadell, B.Sc., F.R.S.E., of Grange, gave an account of a visit he had paid to the seaward terminus of the Canadian Grand Trunk Pacific railway. Prince Rupert, named after the distinguished first president of the Hudson's Bay company, was, he said, only about four years old, and had now a population of 6,000 and a debt of £300,000 to boast of, which would soon be doubled if all the proposed schemes of municipal development were carried. The city was situated on an island, most of which was mountainous, and the town site was on a shelf of rocky ground at the foot of the steep mountain slope. The area available for building was about 2,000 acres, and this was being levelled up and down on a tremendous scale, and at great expense. There was a splendid natural harbor, and water for the largest vessels. The city would be a commercial centre of great importance to Canada before long, as it had many natural advantages to attract industry and traffic."

### WORKING OUT DREAM OF GOLD MINE SITE

Spokane Contractor, With Faith in British Columbia, Believes Dream Will Come True

Nelson, April 1.—C. Olsen, a Spokane contractor, dreamed of the location of a mine near Nelson, later staked the claim, carried out development work, and will continue operations in order to bring the workings to the stage in which, in his dream, he discovered a vein of wondrous wealth, says Mayor John J. Malone of Nelson, who recently inspected for Mr. Nelson the Dream mine near Hall Siding.

Years ago, the story runs, Mr. Olsen, before he visited this section, one night dreamed that he was operating a mine developed by a shaft. He saw the surrounding scenery in such detail that it was stamped on his memory and toward the end of the dream he began to shovel out ore rich in gold.

A year or so after the dream he came to Nelson to inspect some timber limits and was surprised to recognize a spot on Hall creek as that which had opened before him in his dream. The timber, the creek, the contour of the mountains, the size and condition of the trees and all other conditions, he told Mayor Malone, coincided exactly with what he had seen in his sleep. He looked around and located the spot on which, in his dream, he had seen the shaft, at the bottom of which he had dug out the rich ore and around it he located what is now known as the Dream mine.

Placing men to work, he sunk a shaft ninety feet. In his dream he looked down the shaft and was just about able to see a candle glimmer on a shovel, and it is estimated that the depth at which he would be able to see such a light would be about 100 feet, and he has now decided to sink the tunnel further, in the belief that he will surely uncover the vein.

"The property is a prospect, but I never laugh at any ideas of a man who is mining, no matter how strange they may appear. Gold, you know, is where you find it," said Mayor Malone.

### TWENTY-TWO YEARS OUT OF CIVILIZATION

Father Guoy Reaches Edmonton After Long Period at Fort Smith

Edmonton, April 1.—"It seems good to be in civilization again after twenty-two years of voluntary exile among the Indians of the north."

The speaker was the Rev. Pierre Edouard Guoy, father superior of St. Esadore mission at Fort Smith, who arrived in Edmonton recently after being away from the city for nearly a quarter of a century.

"I saw at Athabasca an automobile for the first time," said Father Guoy. "Such things were not dreamed of when, as a young man of 25, I left for the north to work among the Cree Indians. Edmonton was then but a village. Of course I have kept track of its growth through the newspapers, although we received papers only during the summer by canoe and an occasional steamboat, the winter mail carriers by dog teams confining themselves to letters."

Father Guoy will rest in Edmonton a few days and then, after a short trip to St. Albert, he will start for Nantes, France, where he will visit his aged parents. On his return to Edmonton next September, he will go once more to Fort Smith—perhaps to spend the remainder of his life in his self-sacrificing labors for the education and uplifting of the Indians.




