SKAGWAY TO DAWSON BY AN AUTOMOBILE Passengers on Princess May

Will Attempt the Trip Over Frost

An attempt to negotiate the

frozen trail between Skagway and Dawson by automobile will be made by Mr. C, S. Philp, a prominent merchant of Dawson, and his son, Mr. Bartley Philp. who are passengers on the Princess May, which was here yesterday. Mr. Philp used to be in business in Vancouver. The motor car has been used with some success for short trips in the Yukon and Alaska, but Mr. Philp says the run has not previously been made right through for the entire distance from Skagway to Dawson. Mr. Philp expects to make the trip in two days. He has his own machine with him and it will be transported on a flat car from shipboard to the end of the White Pass & Yukon route at Skagway. Special tires and devices will be used to make the motor car grip the hard trail and to prevent skidding.
