13 FISHING PACK LARGEST IN HISTORY

Reports Taken from Annual Report of British Columbia Fisheries

The fishing industry in British Columbia is in excellent condition. The salmon pack in 1913 amounted to 1,353,901 fish, which is the largest pack in any year in the history of the industry. The Fraser river produced during 1913 one-quarter of the whole pack of the province, while during 1912 its proportion of supply was but one-tenth of that of the province.

The herring catch was much larger in 1913 than in any previous year, having increased in value by more than \$600,000. A similar increase is shown in the value of the halibut fishery. In 1913 the value of the halibut catch in four years increased from \$1,000,000 to \$2,000,000. The number of persons employed on British Columbia sea and shore in connection with the fisheries last year was 15,028.

Carriack-on-Shannon, Ireland. The people in many instances have been isolated from communication with their neighbors owing to the Shannon breaking its banks.

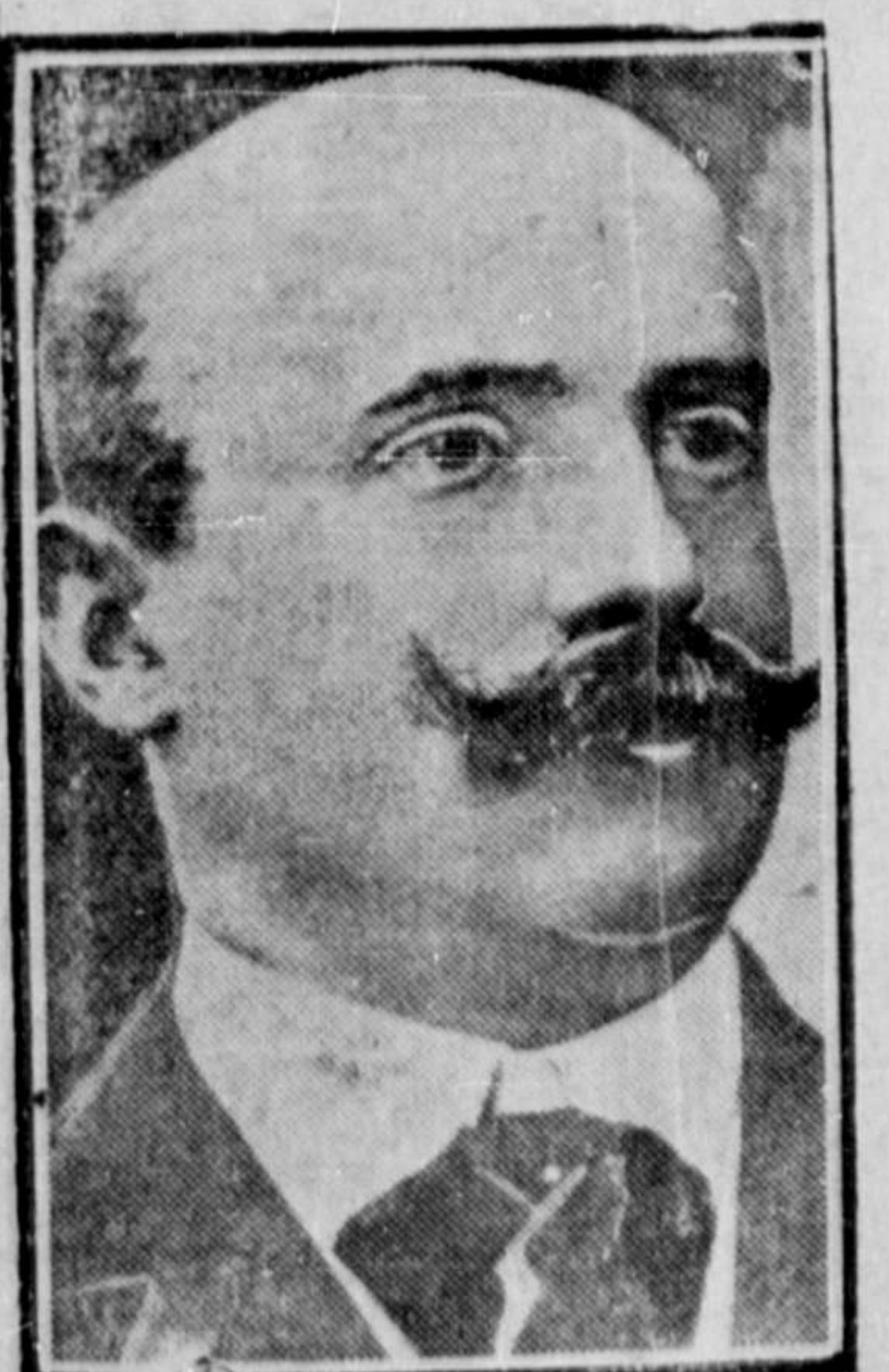
TORONTO WOMEN TAKE THE CIGARETTE CURE

MAKE ANNOUNCEMENT IN MONTH'S TIME

W. P. Hinton Says There Will Be Something to Say About New Hotel for Rupert Soon

W. P. Hinton, general traffic manager of the G. T. P., and Geo. A. McNicholl, industrial commissioner, came in on the Prince George today. They left Los Angeles on Monday, making a rather quick journey. At ten o'clock they took the train for the interior to be at the temporary linking up of the railway. Mr. Hinton said the passenger traffic through to Fort George would not be open until about August, and it will be next year before any transcontinental trains are put on. "What about the new Prince Rupert hotel?" "There will be an announcement concerning this in about a month's time. The plans are all ready for the contractor." Mr. Hinton will go through to Fort George. Several local business men were on the wharf to meet him.

GANG OF POLITICAL ADVENTURERS DENUNCIATION M'BRIDE GOVERNMENT

Liberal Leaders Brewster and Oliver Illustrated Unhealthy Political Condition of Province and Aply Described Men in Control---Splendid Reception

Prince Rupert citizens enjoyed a new experience last night when they heard two of the big men of the provincial Liberal party discuss provincial affairs. It was the occasion of the first visit of the provincial Liberal leader and his worthy lieutenant to this city. The Westholme theatre was filled to the doors and the reception tendered the visitors was a splendid one. The audience was of mixed political complexion, but it was sympathetic in its attitude to the speakers, and enthusiastically applauded the many good points made in the addresses.

While the time at the disposal of the speakers did not permit them to go into more than one or two of the chief issues in provincial politics, they made a vigorous and effective denunciation of the administration of "a gang of political adventurers" who were not Conservatives because they have never attempted to carry out the planks of the Conservative platform.

Mr. Brewster won the confidence of the audience by his business manner and logical arguments of the public issues. His speech was free from bitterness, but his criticism was most effective.

Mr. Oliver demonstrated in his manner the origin of his nickname "Honest John." He has a strong personality; he is a born fighter, and wins his audience by ready wit and repartee.

The chairman of the meeting was Mr. T. D. Pattullo, president of the local Liberal association, who introduced Mr. Brewster, the next premier of British Columbia.

Mr. Brewster opened with a brief mention of the fact that he had visited Prince Rupert 17 years ago and that he now found well graded streets and progress being made toward a great city where towering trees and rocky hills then existed. Evidently the people here were not frightened by trifles. He was glad to welcome the ladies because his advocacy of woman suffrage was everywhere received with enthusiasm. He found in his tour of the province that on every hand the people are demanding arguments and reasons where they formerly accepted McBride's word. They have become human interrogation points. The purpose of this visit made at a time when there was no political excitement was for the purpose of explaining the Liberal platform and showing the political drift that is detri-

mental to the welfare of the province. He had no bitter attack to make, but had a right to criticize the public actions of those with whom he did not agree. The present administration had never put one of the planks of the Conservative party of 11 years ago into operation. He asked for the people to put on the treasury benches men who would give the province honest administration. The Conservative press laud the ministers of the government and he asked a scrutiny of the other side of the glowing picture.

The speaker dealt at some length on the land question. The land is what the country must build on. It must be started producing. If our cities were living living off the production of our land instead of off speculation a money stringency in Europe would not bring stagnation to our cities.

Year after year twenty millions of our money, taken from the industries of this province, is sent out of the province to buy farm produce which ought to be raised in the province.

When McBride came into power he had unprecedented opportunities. There were the wealth of lands, timber, minerals and fisheries. After 14 years of office what has become of this wealth? The lands have been alienated.

Along the lines of the G. T. P. and the P. G. E. 144 syndicates have secured 1,284,720 acres of the best agricultural lands. These lands are held by specu-

British Columbia, says the scheme is tainted with fraud and no land staker need bring those kind of cases to him for he will throw them out. With rulings like this in the courts, what will become of the 13 millions owing on such lands? The land holders will get uneasy about their titles. Will they pay up?

The government say they have no official knowledge of this fraud. "It is time you voters gave them official notice." The chairman of the agricultural commission went over to Europe to find how to improve agricultural conditions in the mountains of British Columbia. "I can imagine him walking down Piccadilly conjuring his brain on how to grow more potatoes in the Skeena river valley." Other members had gone to other parts of the world, spent a lot of time and a lot of money and then brought in a report recommending the same thing as the platform the Liberals adopted three years ago.

The speaker dealt at some length with the amendments to the elections act and showed how it affected naturalized men within the province and how difficult it would be for them and their children to get on the voters' list. He suggested the motive was largely an attempt to keep a lot of voters off the list in districts where there was great discontent with the administration.

Throughout the province he finds there is a growing feeling of dissatisfaction and lack of confidence in the administration. It was not a party feeling or a political movement, but a patriotic movement.

Honest John Oliver
John Oliver was greeted with hearty applause. He is one of the oldest and best informed politicians in the province. He opened his speech by inviting Wm. Manson, the member for Skeena to come forward; he wanted to talk to him.

The transcontinental railway and the city of Prince Rupert owe their existence to the Liberal party and Premier McBride used his influence to try and defeat the Laurier administration when the were inaugurating the railway. The speaker said he had fought to give Prince Rupert a square deal when the provincial government and the G. T. P. were making a deal for Prince Rupert. "Did you get it?" "A voice—"No."

"Well, who deprived you of it but the men whom you supported at the last elections?" You have only four street ends going to the waterfront in the whole city. The reason you did not get more was because McBride refused the request of the Liberals to give you more. Within the lifetime of some of

WOMAN DISAPPEARS BELIEVED MURDERED

Vancouver, April 3.—A mystery which the police department believes includes the murder of Mrs. C. J. Millard is baffling the detective force of the city. Mrs. Millard, wife of the chief ticket agent of the Canadian Pacific railway, has disappeared and not a clue of what became of her can be found.

The police has arrested a Chinese servant employed at the Millard residence, whom they believe can solve the mystery. Mr. Millard went to Victoria to meet the steamer Makura. Mrs. Millard remained in town, apparently intending to visit at the home of her sisters. When Mr. Millard returned he found that his wife was away.

After telephoning Mrs. Millard's friends and relatives without success, he became alarmed and called the police. The detectives worked all night to solve the mystery without success.

No signs of any struggle can be found around the house. The Chinaman refused to say anything when questioned. The house and grounds have been searched, but no trace of the body has been found.

The addresses delivered last night by the Liberal leaders were of a kind that will appeal strongly to the people of this country. From beginning to end they were fair, strong and convincing. There was a vigorous criticism of the government in that they broke every pledge given to the people upon their first election, and combined with this there was ample evidence of a constructive nature that should convince the electors that the Liberal leaders understand the situation thoroughly and can well be trusted with the responsibility of government.

It is rumored that Premier Borden will visit Prince Rupert this summer. That in itself is a very commonplace event. On occasions of that kind, however, it is customary to have a military guard of honor, and what is Prince Rupert going to do in order to hold her head up with the rest of the world?

Suppose they try to organize a military corps here in the meantime, what will be the

result? Men of honor and respectability will have nothing to do with it. The leading military men of this city have been insulted and dismissed without cause. No soldier with any esprit de corps would ever think of taking charge under present conditions. He would be immediately branded as a "scab." He could never expect to have any further standing with military men, who are all men of honor. Accordingly it would seem that we shall have no guard of honor with which to welcome our pliant premier.

Of course it is said the Tory bunch can do anything. Perhaps they will go down to the government rock cut or to the post office excavation and draft men into the service. There is no denying that in those places there may be good men, but they don't long for a military career, and the only way the bunch can get them is to force them into service. The Tory boss would make a rather stunning colonel, although the commissary department would be more to his liking and better suited to his genius.



HOW FROM THREE TO FIVE LIVES WERE LOST IN A CANADIAN HOTEL SUPPOSED TO BE FIREPROOF

There is to be a rigid investigation by civic authorities into the Woodbine hotel fire, when at 7:30 in the evening, on one of the main streets of Toronto, several lives were snuffed out, in the burning of a new and supposedly fireproof structure. The victims were Max Cohen of Toronto, Fred Levison of New York, and Charles Wilmot, the well known horseman of Belleville, Ont. Within a few minutes of the discovery of fire, the whole building was a mass of flames. A number of actors and actresses playing at nearby theatres were fortunately on their way to their night's work when the fire started, but they lost most of their belongings. Four other people were seriously hurt.

HENCOOPS IN BEDROOM WAS INDEED TOO MUCH

Seattle Man Seeks Divorce Because of His Wife's Fancy Fowl Fads

Seattle, April 2.—Hatching chickens in his bedroom and keeping poultry in all parts of his home, even though a cherished whim of his wife, made no hit with Alexander V. H. Pemberton. Neither were his feelings smoothed when on remonstrance he was told he could go, as "he was only a boarder anyhow."

In a complaint for divorce Pemberton declared to the superior court that he was so humiliated by these acts of his wife that life with her is no longer endurable. Since 1891 he has had to put up with and humored the whims of his wife without protest until she was suddenly seized with the idea of raising chickens in the house. "She had neglected her home," the complainant told the court, "and devotes her whole time to a fanciful taste for poultry raising, and has used the bedroom as an incubator for the hatching of chickens, and has kept poultry in all parts of the family home to the discomfort and inconvenience of the defendant and over his protests."

EATING APPLES MAKES TAFT LOSE 75 POUNDS

Minneapolis, April 3.—The secret of William Howard Taft's loss in weight lies in the one word, "apples." The former president has become an apple eater.

Two things are contributing factors in the system whereby he has lost seventy-five pounds since he left the White house—dieting and exercise.

When Professor Taft eats an apple he does not do it in a professional way. He polishes it a little and then devours it, peel and all, and not stopping for the core. He eats from six to eight a day.

THE GERMAN KAISER PLANS BIG WAR GAME

German Military Manoeuvres in August to Be on Gigantic Scale

Berlin, April 3.—Count von Moltke, a nephew of the famous strategist during the Franco-Prussian war, and the general staff of the army are planning the largest military manoeuvres the world has ever seen in time of peace for next autumn.

Six army corps and twelve divisions, approximately 300,000 officers and men, and 50,000 horses, will take part in the manoeuvres. The kaiser will be the chief umpire in the final three days' battle. The woods, hills and valleys of the west side of the Rhine will reverberate with 1056 field guns and 500 machine guns.

The field of operations will cover a large area of a triangle between Frankfurt, Giesen, and Coblenz. The problem is evident to check and defeat a French army.

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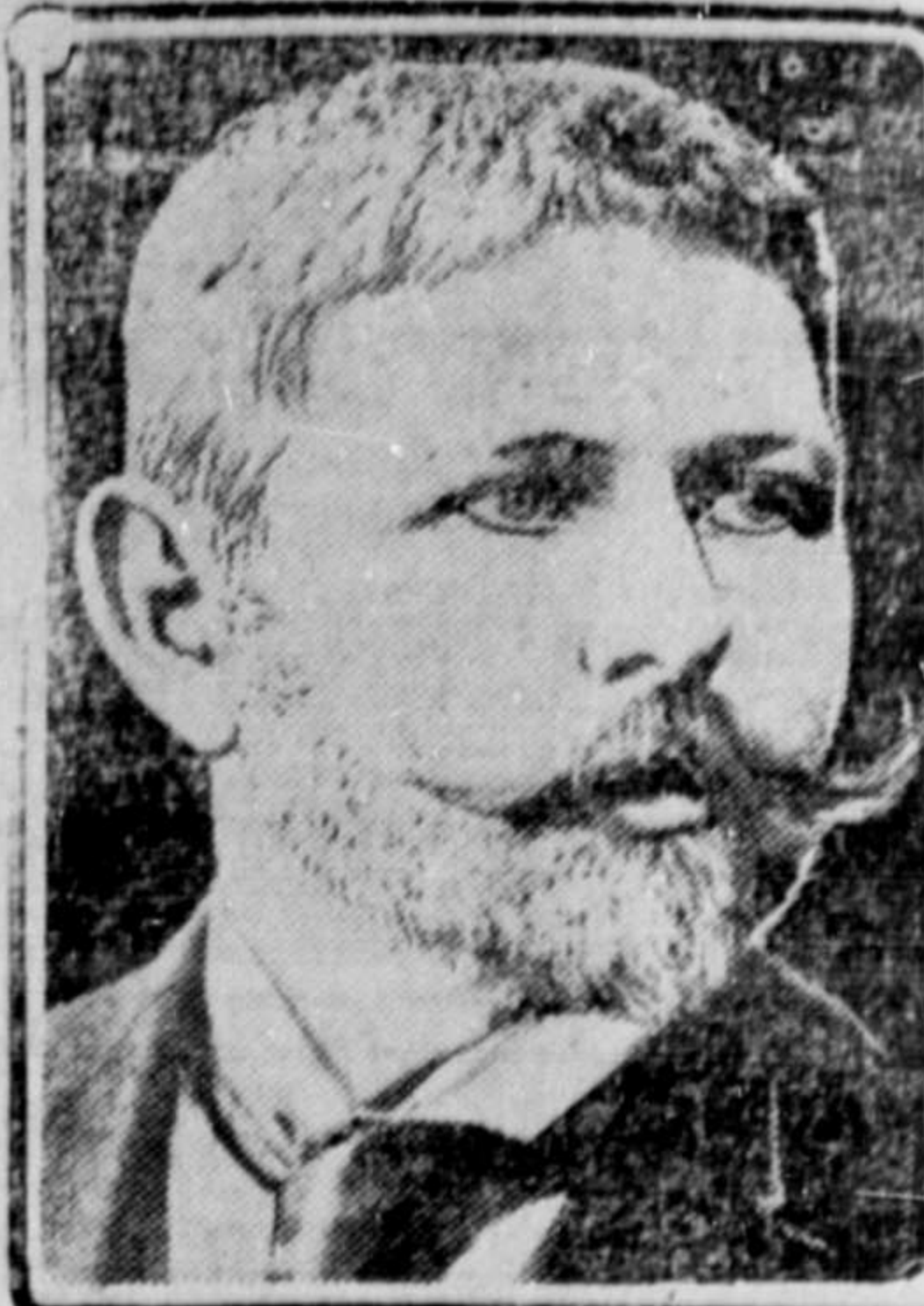
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FIGURES IN CALMETTE CASE THAT HAS THRILLED ALL FRANCE

Prince Rupert friends of Johnny O'Leary, the fast coming young boxer, have received a newsy letter from him, written at San Francisco, and addressed to Jockey Madden here. O'Leary is a Seattle boy who, during the past three years startled the Seattle fans by his many sensational performances. His manager, Frank Purcell, then entered him in the four-round game in San Francisco, and immediately Johnny began to bowl them over. He took all comers in his class and has never yet been set back, although his contests include some very clever boys.

He looked so good that Billy Naughton proclaimed him the "coming lightweight of the world," and as many of the fans know, the much lamented Naughton seldom gave way to any wild bursts of enthusiasm. In his letter, O'Leary particularly mentions Lem Kegg, and asks if there would be any chance of a fifteen-round match in Prince Rupert between Kegg and himself. This of course is up to the fans—it would necessitate a substantial guarantee, but if a Class A contest will stimulate any real interest and then bring

them out, this match could be put through very nicely. O'Leary meets Johnny Kilbane on May 16 for the world's featherweight championship, and Lem Kegg is also showing top-notch form, so a fifteen-round go between this pair would not only be a genuine treat, but is should attract a bumper house. It is now up the local fans.

Willie Hoppe, champion of the Pacific coast, won the decision in a four-round bout with Joe Bayley, champion of Canada, at the Pavilion rink in San Francisco for the championship of the Pacific coast. Bayley weighed in at 133 pounds at 6:30 p. m.

Official announcement of the selection of the name "Resolute" as the title of the New York Yacht club flag officers' syndicate defence candidate has been made by G. A. Cormack, secretary of the syndicate. The yacht is the second of the three defending candidates to be named. The Tri-city yacht has already been named Defiance, leaving the Cormack yacht the only one as yet unnamed.

Playing against fifteen of South Canterbury cricketers recently, the Australian team, which is touring in New Zealand, scored 922 runs for nine wickets. J. N. Crawford, one of the players who visited Victoria last season, made 354, at one time hitting up 50 in ten minutes. The remarkable score in New Zealand by the Australian team must take equal rank with the 922 put up by Carlton against Melbourne university at Carlton in 1895-6. A total of 922 has only been beaten once, the biggest score ever made in minor cricket being 1,094 by Melbourne university vs. Essendon, on the university ground in 1897-8.

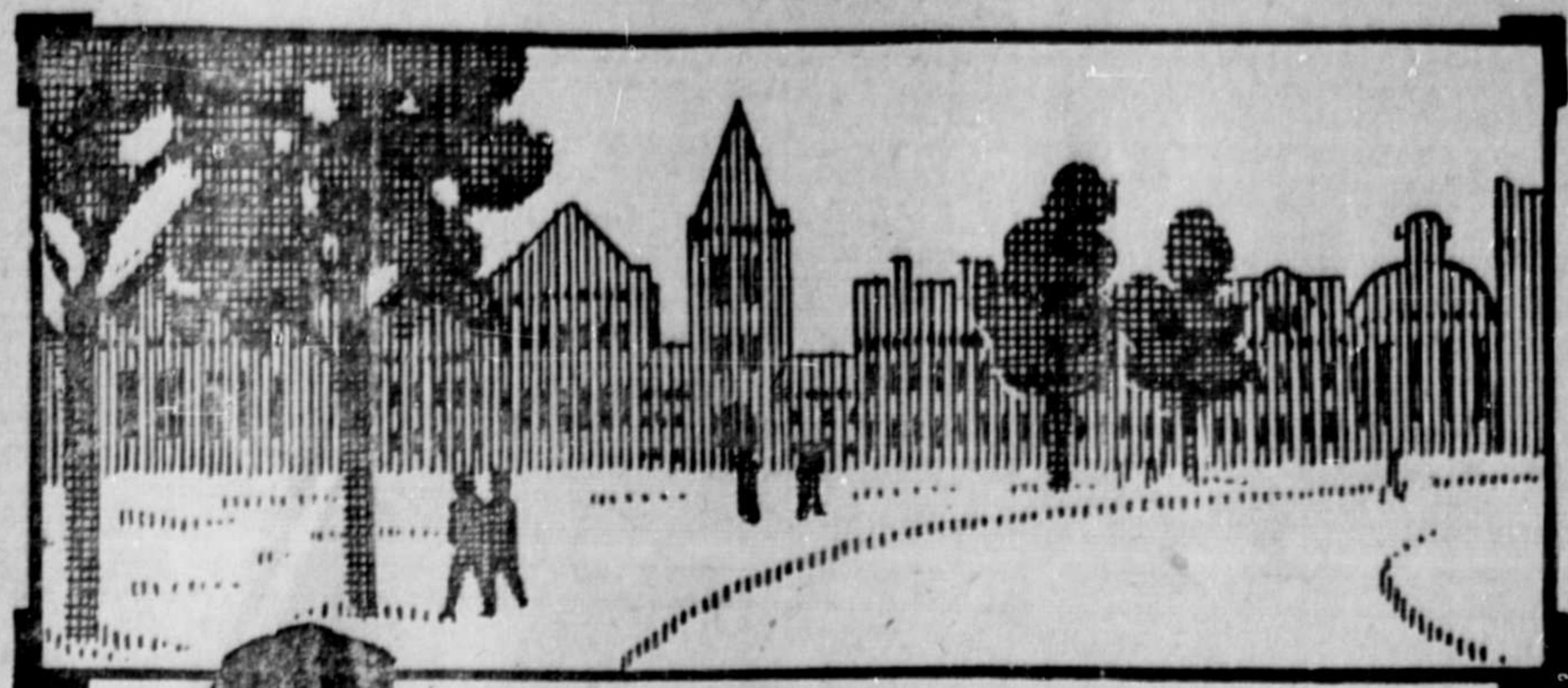

Kling, c, traded to Boston. Overall, p, back to minors. Brown, Reulbach and Pfeister, the other Cub pitchers of that series have also been disposed of. And that brilliant 2-0 victory was earned only five years ago! Would any other big league magnate dare wreck a machine like the 1906-8 Cubs in such a mercilessly quick time?

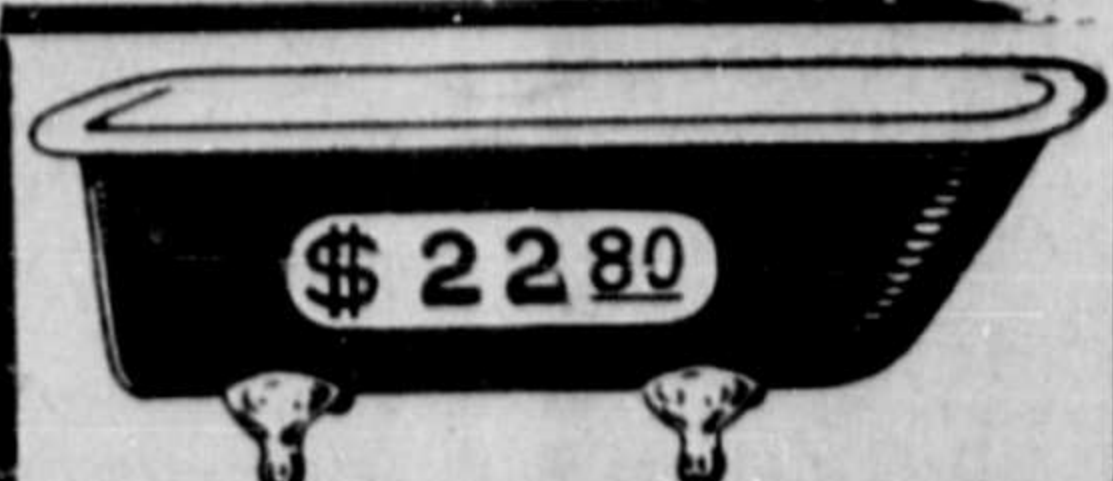

GANG OF POLITICAL ADVENTURERS IS DENUNCIATION McBRIDE GOVT.

(Continued from Page One)

you there will be a city here of half a million people, and you have only 100 feet of waterfront for your city. That is the deal you got from the government you support.

The policy of the Liberals is to give to the people such crown lands as are necessary for the development of the city or district.

"The present administration is a gang of political adventurers."

They are not Conservatives. The Conservative party in the first plank of their platform advocate government ownership of railways and control of rates.

Instead we have government ownership by the railways. The railroads have obligated the province to the extent of 200 million dollars on guarantees of bond, principle and interest. The C. N. R. has an authorized indebtedness of \$130,000 per mile for every mile of their line in British Columbia and there is not a line in all the railway legislation to prevent Mackenzie & Mann from diverting money to other industries. The government have provided the legal machinery whereby these men can rob the widows and orphans and your member has approved of it.

The Conservative platform advocates legislation for the amicable adjustment of differences between employers and employees. Are you not ashamed of the way that plank has been carried out?

We are told we have not constructive ability, yet their agricultural commission reports in favor of a policy we have had before the electors for some years.

This government is now carrying out a railway construction policy we advocated in 1909.

The present conditions of pre-emption lends itself to speculation. It is cheaper to acquire lands by putting a pre-emptor in than by purchasing outright.

One hundred thousand acres of the best timber lands of the province are held under pulp leases at two cents per acre per annum.

Number seven, plank of the Conservative platform says the party shall persevere in its efforts in the exclusion of Asiatic labor. In the last two years since the Conservative government got in at Ottawa the receipts from Chinese head tax has more than doubled that of the last two years of the Laurier administration. How long will it be before we have the white British Columbia we talk about? A voice—"Never."

"Well, we are going to change the administration."

In criticizing the new timber legislation the speaker pointed out that the timber owner could escape the increasing royalty on timber by shipping his lumber out in rough state instead of as dressed lumber. The difference between rough lumber and dressed lumber is represented by the labor. That labor is taxed forty per cent. How is that for encouraging the manufacture of raw material in the province?

Woman suffrage was one of the Liberal planks. Under man-made laws there was documentary evidence to show that votes were sold at \$10 each. We give votes to men who will sell them, but we do not give votes to the women who train the children. Is it logical? Where woman suffrage is in force there has never been a proposition to go back on it.

The attorney-general has taken eleven cases to the privy council and spent a lot of money on litigation, but never won a case. He spent \$140,000 in four years on this litigation. His new fisheries tax law means that the lieutenant-governor in council can do anything they like and it is all right. They can tax a man



one place and exempt him another. They can prohibit fishing in one harbor and allow it in another. Your member supported that legislation.

Surely you Conservatives can pick out men who can administer the affairs of the province honestly. If you cannot, give the Liberals a chance.

For the sake of your offspring leave conditions in this province at least as good as you received them.

T. D. Pattullo

T. D. Pattullo spoke briefly at the conclusion of the meeting. He drew attention to the fact that none of the four street ends mentioned in this city went to the water. The provincial government had given our water supply to the president of a Conservative association. They gave us no water power; the public domain has been debauched. But what was worse the power of the machine was working in the city creating enmity among the citizens. To get a pick and shovel job one had to pay a dollar and become a member of the Conservative association. The machine has even entered the militia. It is a war of extermination. The citizens should wake up to an appreciation of their duty.
