

And still there isn't a decent road in the district. The road bosses who spend so large a portion of their time in Prince Rupert have seen to that.

There is no doubt whatever but that many of the recent bank robberies must be laid at the door of the department of justice of this province.

In the Hazelton district murderers go unpunshed, thieves remain uncaught, while others who have been caught escape, and the people look with disdain and contempt upon the administration, or rather lack of administration, of law and order in these parts.

Recently at New Hazelton the people were forced to take the maintenance of law in their hands, and two killed and four wounded was the price that had to be paid for the laxity of the department presided over by the attorneygeneral of this province.

Quite properly the people of New Hazelton held an indignation meeting to voice their protests.

From past experience i seems quite certain that the only remedy for the whole situation is to drive out of office an administration which has become so corrupt as to bring shame and disgust to rightthinking people of every political shade.

Everybody knows that politics is at the bottom of the disbanding of the Earl Grey's Rifles. It is perfectly useless for the local politicians responsible to protest that such is not the case as nobody believes them.
