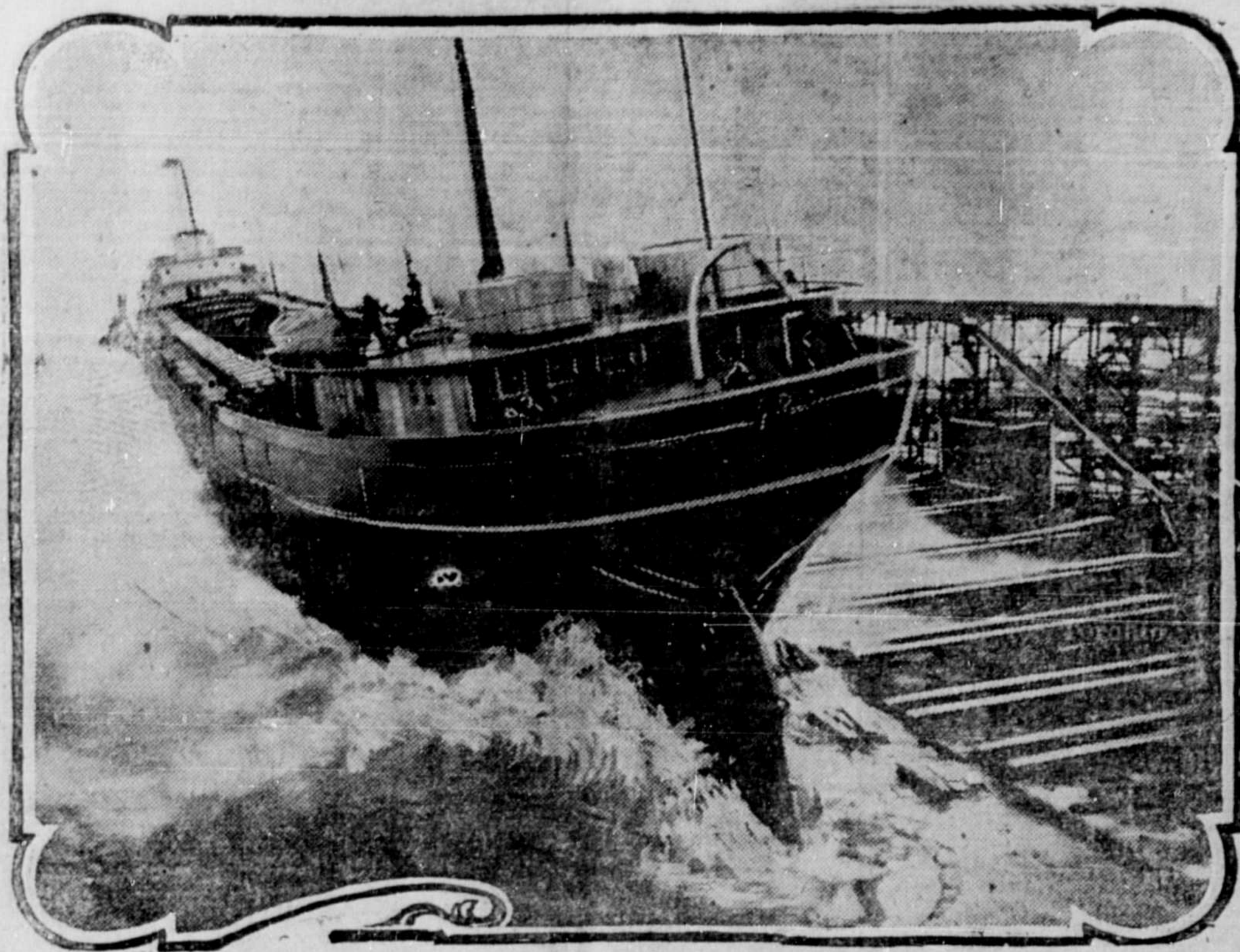
U. S. CONSUL HAS ARRIVED AT VERA CRUZ—BRITISH ENGINEERS THROWN INTO MEXICAN JAIL

MEXICAN FEDERAL TROOPS FIRE ON UNITED STATES CITY

SEVERAL KILLED AND WOUNDED AND MUCH DAMAGE DONE TO PROPERTY—U. S. TROOPS DID NOT CROSS BORDER

Laredo, Texas, April 24.—Three Americans were killed and seven wounded by forces of Mexican federals from across the Grande river in Neuvo Laredo, on the Mexican side. These were fired pointblank into the American city at noon. Following that, the federal prison began to blow up their city of Neuvo Laredo across the river. The post office, telegraph office, roundhouse, and most of the rolling stock of the railway there, the municipal buildings and numerous costly residences were destroyed by dynamite by the federal forces. The American consulate was burned to the ground. An artillery force barricaded behind the ruins commenced to sweep the approaches to the Mexican end of the two bridges that joined the places. The railroad bridge, a costly steel struc-

ture, has been mined on the Mexican side ready to be blown up at the first sign of activity on the part of the American troops at Fort McIntosh. A rifle fire was directed towards the heart of the American city by the Mexican regulars, which constituted the first warning of trouble. A hail of bullets on the unsuspecting crowds of Americans was sent from the opposite side of the river. A border patrol was called out, and, without waiting for orders, poured a deadly fusillade into the Mexican ranks. Reinforcements from the barracks hurried to the river's edge, and only the orders of the officers, who were awaiting instructions from Washington, prevented the eager soldiers from rushing across the bridge on to Mexican soil and dealing out punishment.

NORTH ATLANTIC RATES HIGH SUGGEST GOVT. COMPETITION

DELAY IN CONTROLLING RATES CAUSES DISSATISFACTION—PRIVATE COMPETITION ONLY SOLUTION

Ottawa, April 25.—During the consideration of steamship subventions in the commons, Dr. Steele expressed dissatisfaction with the proposal to delay action on the North Atlantic rates until the Dominion trade commission enquired into the matter. An effective method would be to put government-owned boats into commission, which would effect cheaper transportation and control of rates.

Hon. Geo. E. Foster said if the government went into the business of carrying agricultural products they would have to do the same for other Canadian industries. While it was comparatively easy to control the coastwise trade, it is a different matter to control the seagoing commerce. The ultimate hope is to control by private competition.

Precept and practice do not go hand in hand under the present government. The "sins" which Messrs. Gutelius and Lynch-Staunton charged up against the Laurier government in connection with the sub-letting of government contracts by the main contractors and in connection with changes of contract prices without calling for new tenders, are being countenanced by the present government under the very noses of the scandal-hunting commissioners.

Two instances of this character, much worse than anything Messrs. Gutelius and Lynch-Staunton discovered to have been committed under the Liberal administration, have come to light. In the commons, recently, Hon. Dr. Reid, acting minister of railways, tabled official documents dealing with a change of contract prices for earth excavation in connection with the St. Malo car shops at the Quebec terminals of the National Transcontinental railway.

At the time the contract was entered into the understanding was that the ground was not frozen. But Hon. L.

P. Pelletier found that there were several hundred men out of employment at Quebec last winter and that it would be politically advantageous for them to be employed on government work. He suggested to the National Transcontinental commission that the work of excavation for the St. Malo shops should go ahead during the winter time. Contractor Gosselin was quite agreeable, but wanted, of course, a much larger price for excavating frozen earth. The government consented, and an order-in-council was passed increasing the contract price from 85 cents a yard to \$2.30 per cubic yard.

The total increase in the cost of the work is estimated at \$36,000. It is not shown in the correspondence that there is any very great hurry for the St. Malo shops, and this extra expenditure charged up to the cost of the National Transcontinental is primarily merely to give employment to the men out of work in Mr. Pelletier's district. According to Messrs. Gutelius and Lynch-Staunton, this \$36,000 must of course be classed as "waste." This additional cost, it may be further noticed, was incurred without even bothering to ask the consent of the Grand Trunk Pacific, the other partner to the agreement, as to what the road

would cost. And this was done at the very time when Messrs. Gutelius and Lynch-Staunton were putting the finishing touches on their report.

Another and still more striking contrast between what Messrs. Gutelius and Lynch-Staunton say the Liberal government should have done and what the present government is now doing is seen in connection with the \$10,000,000 contract awarded to the Norton Griffiths Company at Courtenay Bay. St. John, in connection with the National Transcontinental railway terminals and harbor improvements there. The contract price for rock excavation agreed to by the company was \$2.50 per cubic yard. That amount the company is collecting from the government. But some time ago they sublet the contract to the Courtenay Construction company at \$1.47 per cubic yard. According to Messrs. Gutelius and Lynch-Staunton this would represent a "rakeoff" of over 100 per cent. for the main contractors.

It will be remembered that in the case of sub-letting on the National Transcontinental Railway a 10 per cent. "rake-off" for the main contractors in cases of sub-letting was regarded as scandalous. Apparently the rock excavation at Courtenay Bay could be done for less than one half of what the government is paying for it.

But of course Messrs. Gutelius and Lynch-Staunton are very careful to point out the mote in the Liberal eye and pay no attention to the beam in the Conservative eye.

LONDON CONCERN TO DEVELOP B. C. OIL

Old World Capitalists Interested in Ten Million Dollar Corporation

Both London and Californian capital is interested in a ten million dollar corporation formed for the purpose of investing in and developing oil wells in Western America. British Columbia and Alberta oil fields will be thoroughly investigated by the company, whose western representative is Mr. Donald MacGregor, member of the leading stock exchanges of the west.

Mr. MacGregor has confirmed the announcement but will not at this time discuss the company's plans. He confirmed the statement that the Canada Oil & Venture corporation, backed by London capital and advised by Californian experts, was the company concerned.

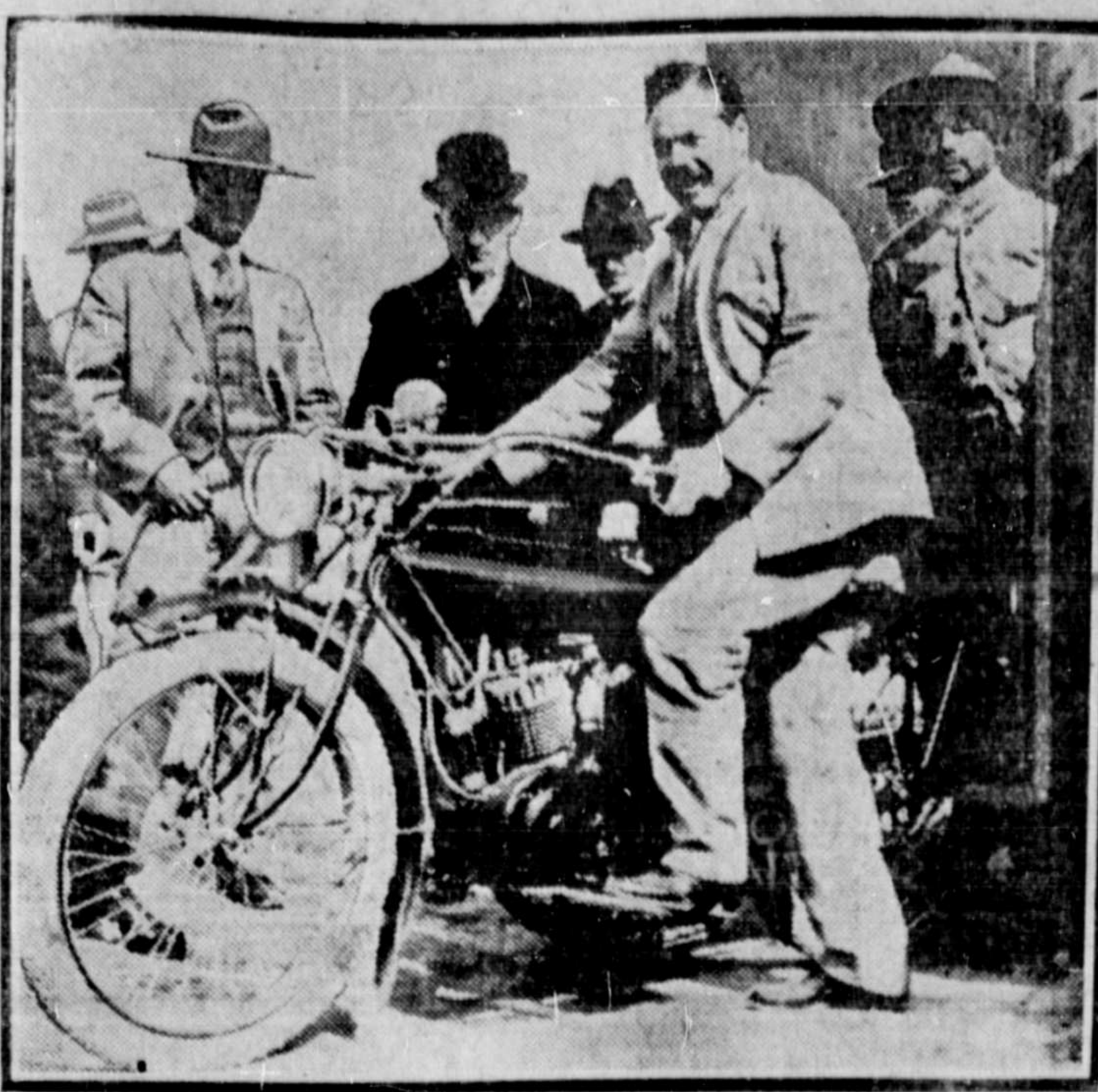
The company has for some time been interested in Mexican oil fields. As a result of the Mexican wars, it has widened the scope of its operations to take in oil fields in both Canada and the United States. The oil situation in Canada at the present time is attracting world-wide attention.

The Alberta oil wells and oil indications in British Columbia are now said to be attracting the attention of the company.

The federal government by its bonus of fifty-five cents a barrel for oil has given a great impetus to the industry and prospectors are eagerly scouring the country for oil seepage and indications.

This company holds fifty claims on the west coast of Graham island and it is likely that some development work will be done this summer.

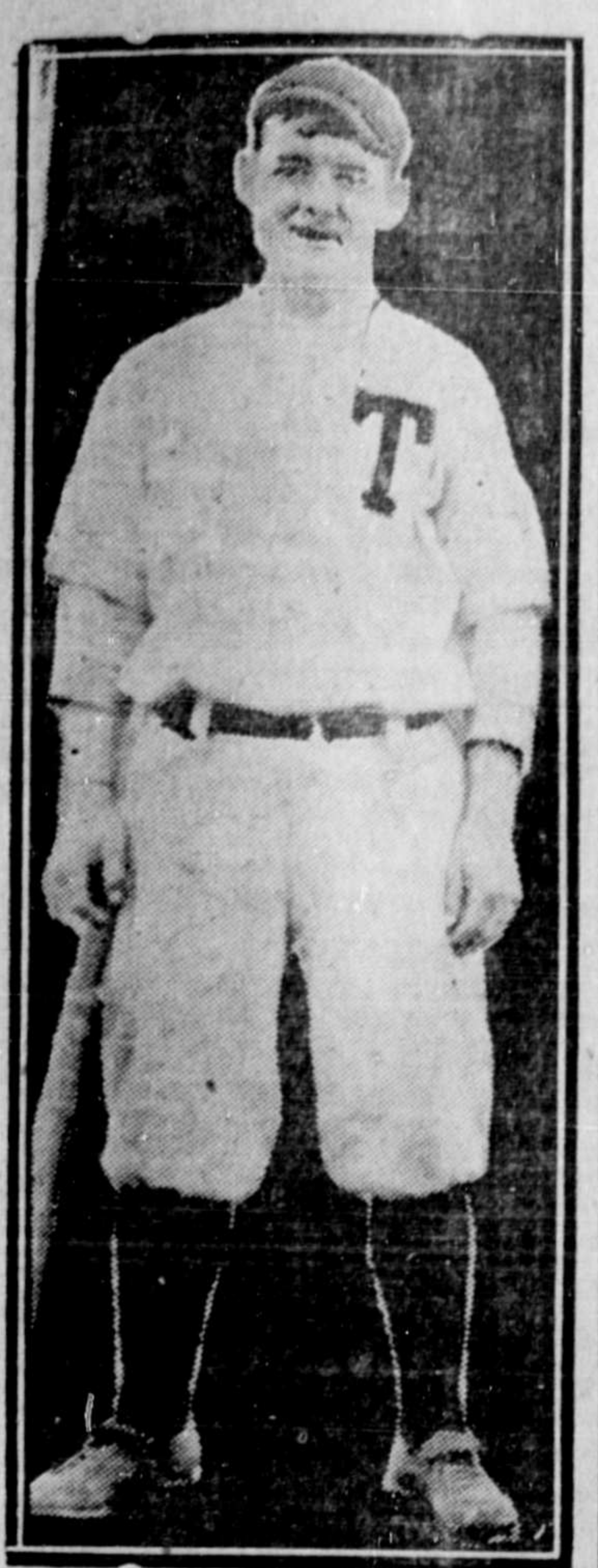
