

Vancouver, April 28 .- The establishment of the British Columbia-Alaska international survey will be completed this summer. Noel J. Ogilvie of Ottawa, the expert in charge of the work, arrived last week.

Mr. Ogilvie states that the work was nearly completed last summer, and that this summer he and his staff will turn their attention to the long "panhandle" extending down from Alaska along the western boundary of northern British Columbia.
