TWO HUNDRED MINERS LOST LIVES IN EXPLOSION

CANADIAN NORTHERN GRABS FORTY MILLIONS FROM DOMINION-- FISHERMAN DROWNED

CANADIAN NORTHERN GETS FORTY MILLION DOLLARS

DETAILS OF AGREEMENT MADE PUBLIC — ASSETS OF COMPANY GIVEN AS SECURITY — GOVERNMENT WILL SUPERVISE EXPENDITURE

(Special to The Daily News)
Ottawa, April 29.—The details of an agreement with the C. N. R. is announced by Premier Borden which will surprise the country to the extent the government assumes the control of the system comprising the C. N. R. system, including thirty companies, comprising the C.N.R. system. The consolidated stock of the whole concern is reduced from one hundred and forty millions to one hundred millions, whereof the government receives out forty millions. The government is protected by a mortgage on the C. N. R. and the assets of each of the subsidiary companies on which money was spent by the Mackenzie-Mann company and Mackenzie and Mann in dividually. They agree absolutely to release all claims against the C. N. R. for profits in construction or commissions or other consideration. In the transfer of the stock provision is made for the supervision of the proceeds of the guaranteed securities and to make certain that it will be applied on the completion and betterment of the system. In case of default the road will become the absolute property of the Dominion, subject only to its bond indebtedness.

SOME TORIES WILL NOT STAND FOR C. N. R. DEAL

Three Prominent Members of Parliament Walk Out of Conservative Caucus

Ottawa, April 28.—R. B. Bennett and W. T. Nickle walked out of a Conservative caucus called to consider the Canadian Northern railway proposals today, it is reported. J. H. Burnham followed them. The three left after hearing the proposals, which they considered were in the interests of the railway promoters. They frankly stated the proposals were unsatisfactory to them and that they would vote and speak against the proposed legislation in the house.
Bennett is the Calgary member, one of the big men of the west, and a talented speaker. Burnham is a newspaper man from Peterboro, Ont., and Nickle is the member for Kingston. All three have always shown more or less independence of party ties.

FISHERMAN DROWNED OFF PORT ESSINGTON

Boat Capsized and One Man Never Came to Surface Again

Fred Foote, a Porcher island rancher and fisherman, lost his life in the Skeena river on Monday. Foote and a companion named Bates, also of Porcher island, were in a fishing boat off the rock from Port Essington when the boat capsized and dumped both men out. Bates scrambled ashore, but Foote never came to the surface again. The current in the river is strong at that point and the water is very cold. The body may never be found.
Both men were fishing spring salmon for Balmoral cannery. They had been drinking.

TWO HUNDRED MINERS LOST IN TERRIBLE EXPLOSION

GAS EXPLOSION WAS THE CAUSE — MINE TOOK FIRE AND ATTEMPTS AT RESCUE ARE ALL FUTILE

(Special to The Daily News)
Eccles, W. Va., April 29.—All hope of rescuing the two hundred and three entombed miners in the New River mine explosion is abandoned. The rescuers are unable to force their way into the burning shafts. Fifty men, all burned severely, were rescued alive and four bodies were recovered in No. 6 shaft.
The disaster was caused by a gas explosion on the 600 ft. level. No. 5 shaft followed five minutes later and the second explosion wrecked the mine and partly demolished No. 6. The mine immediately caught fire and all attempts to rescue were futile.

CHARGES OF GRAFT ARE MADE OVER BUILDING N. B. RAILWAY

B. CARVEL IN HOUSE OF COMMONS TELLS OF CORRUPTION — LARGE SUM OF MONEY NOT ACCOUNTED FOR

Ottawa, April 29.—The recent developments in New Brunswick in connection with the construction of the St. John Valley Railway was the subject of a debate in the Commons yesterday. Mr. B. Carvel made a charge of scandal against the Federal government and said that there was boodling in connection with the building of the line; the road was badly constructed and did not cost nearly as much as was claimed, and claimed that the balance of the money should be accounted for.

INDEPENDENT LICENSES ARE ALL APPLIED FOR

Inspector Williams of Dominion Fisheries Department Visiting Canneries of District

John T. Williams, chief fisheries inspector of District No. 2, arrived here in his boat the Falcon yesterday. He is making a preliminary inspection trip over the district. When seen by The News Mr. Williams said the department this year would make special efforts to protect the spawning beds of the sockeye. On the Upper Naas river fisheries officers will be located at Aiyansh and Greenville to prevent the Indians poaching on the spawning beds.
"We are having good success with the independent white fishermen's licenses this year; 175 have been issued on the Skeena and they have all been taken up. On Rivers inlet there are 195, on the Naas 50, and at Bella Coola 25."
While the applications for these licenses have to be in March 1st, the fishermen do not take them out until June 1.
Mr. Williams says the canneries are all making preparations for a big season this year, and with the price going up the canners ought to make some profits.

NO CHANCE FOR BILL IN BELLA COOLA

(Bella Coola Courier)

There appears to be some difference of opinion among the settlers of Chicken Lake regarding where a certain road should be started from. Mr. Manson, addressing a public meeting at that place, suggested that a vote be taken on the question. Acting on his suggestion a vote was taken and the matter is apparently settled.
Mr. Manson at Hagensborg last fall refused to allow a vote to be taken on a similar matter. Bella Coola valley is an older settlement than Chicken Lake, and the settlers have probably a better knowledge of local conditions and requirements. The reason for this discrimination is that while Mr. Manson may still have hopes of some votes at Chicken Lake, he can clearly see his finish in Bella Coola valley.

A few days ago one of the city aldermen wanted to stop the system of fines in connection with the denizens of the underworld. This is but the occasional attempt to reform a great evil without getting at the root of it. Why not dispense with the whole system? It is foolish to say that an energetic police force could not expel them. It is equally foolish to say that such conditions are a necessity. Other cities are dispensing with these segregated districts and the commissions appointed to study the question have reported that the system is wrong. It is now up to the city council to cleanse the city from its notorious condition and make it a place where a man can bring up his family in decency and self respect.

There seems to be no doubt that Sir Richard McBride is planning to make a quick getaway from British Columbia. Sir Richard has always had a keen scent for public opinion, and nobody realizes better than he does that public opinion is running strongly against his administration. He knows, too, that his administration has gambled recklessly with the resources of the province and that the debts which his administration has so rashly contracted will soon be presented for payment.

Sir Richard is essentially a fair weather fighter, and the prospect of several millions of annual obligations to meet and an empty treasury to meet them has no allurements for the doughty knight. Then, too, life in London with the dazzling dream of a peerage must appeal very strongly to one of Sir Richard's superficialities.

When the people of British Columbia are sweating blood to meet the annual interest charges upon the enormous interest charges to which Sir Richard has committed this province, he himself will be enjoying the sights of old London, while old London will have the extreme pleasure of gazing upon our Dick and thinking what a wonderful province we must have to produce such a magnificent specimen as he is. At the same time London will be calling for the interest on payments due, and if the province happened not to be overly prompt, possibly Dick's billet might not be so comfortable in London as he imagines it will.

At all events, it seems that we are about to part with a very expensive luxury in Dick, and it is not likely that we shall do so with reluctance. In fact, it seems certain that the hills and valleys which have reverberated with lauda-

tions of this great native son for the past ten years will resound with execrations of himself and his associates for the manner in which the public resources have been prostituted for personal gain.

The Bowser-McBride administration at the last session of the legislature arranged a schedule of charges upon raw and dressed lumber that is going to put a great burden upon the people of this province for the next forty years.

This humbuck of an administration forgets that it is the people who have to pay any penalties upon the lumber industry and not the lumbermen.

Besides, the heavy burden placed upon dressed lumber will result in all lumber sold for consumption outside of British Columbia being sent out in the raw instead of being manufactured in British Columbia.

Instead, therefore, of the provincial exchequer being full to overflowing with "profits shared with the lumbermen," as Billy Ross would say, none of this profit will go into the treasury as the lumber will not be manufactured in the province, the province will lose just that much industry, the people in the province will have to pay more for their lumber, and the people outside of the province who buy our lumber will profit at our expense. As a political economist Billy Ross is a wonder. He knows as much about the lumber business as Balaam's ass knew of Hebrew grammar.

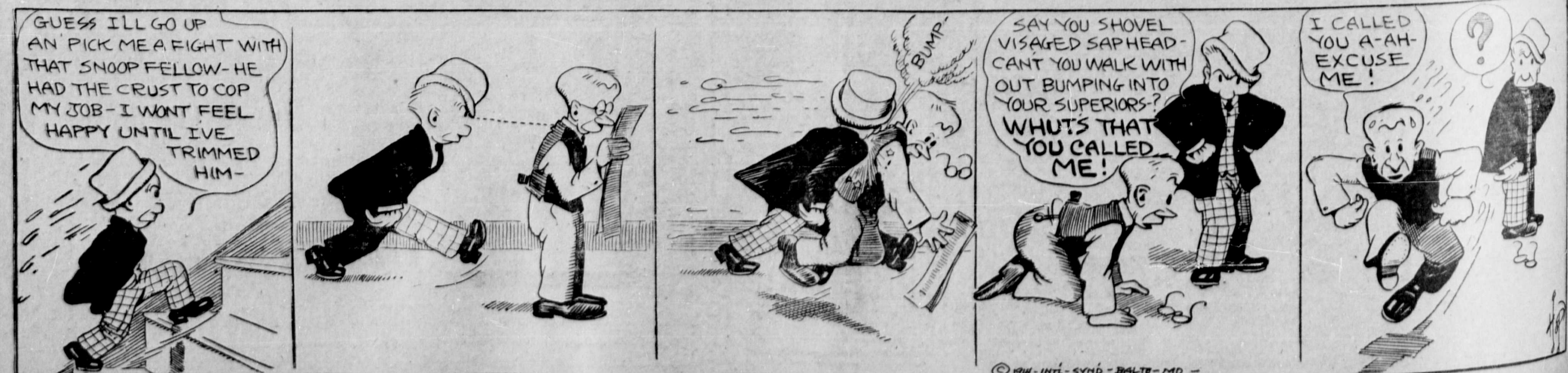

NEW C. P. R. STEAMERS WILL CALL AT MANILA

Can Make Faster Time Than Any Boats Now Running From American Ports

Significant in its indication of possible future policy is the inauguration of a new Canadian Pacific transpacific service from Vancouver to Manila, Philippine islands, via Japanese and Chinese ports. On June 11 the Empress of Russia, sister ship to the Empress of Asia, the two largest and fastest steamships on the Pacific, will be sent to Manila from Vancouver via Yokohama, Kobe, and Nagasaki.

A sensational feature is that these steamers will cut the time from Pacific coast of North America to Manila to 17 days, against 28 days, the fastest time on any existing schedule from a port on the Pacific coast.

The Empresses of Russia and Asia are each 593 feet in length and 68 feet in breadth and have a gross tonnage of 16,850, with a displacement of 30,625 tons. They have developed more than 22 knots on the measured mile and have a sea-going speed of better than 19 knots. The Empress of Russia has the record for the fastest trip across the Pacific, having done the trick in nine days and five hours, against nearly eleven days, the record of the Empress of Japan. No other steamers on the Pacific, sailing from points south of Vancouver, can approach this record by a week.

The Empresses are especially designed for carrying passengers and fast freight, such as silk, with which commodity each is laden on its return to the occident. The passenger accommodation is palatial, and ample provision has been made for the rapid taking on and discharging of cargoes. These steamers were completed about a year ago at a cost of over \$3,000,000 each.

They were designed especially for transpacific trade. The mails which these steamers are carrying now for the United States will, no doubt, be largely increased with the extension of their trips in the orient.
