

It would seem that the council proposes' to spend upon Acropolis Hill the thirty thousand dollars voted by the ratepayers for recreation grounds. Last year the city engineer reported that owing to the nature of the ground on Acropolis Hill it was doubtful if very much could be accomplished towards making suitable grounds for thirty thousand dollars, and negotiations were opened with the Grand Trunk company looking to the acquirement of a piece of ground on the flat back of Ninth avenue, between Fulton and McBride streets, as this location would lend itself more readily to improvement at much less cost.

This year nothing has been done regarding the site back of Ninth avenue.

The council should move carefully in the matter, otherwise the city might wake up to find that the thirty thousand dollars had been spent and still no suitable ground provided for sport.

What is the reason of the silence of the mayor and the chairman of the finance committee as to the sale of the city's debentures? Why is the public being kept in the dark as to what is being done? What is there to hide?
