DISTINGUISHED CLERGYMAN MEETS VERY SUDDEN DEATH

MEMBER OF BRITISH HOUSE OF COMMONS—WAS DELIVERING LECTURES AT YALE—DROPPED DEAD ON STEAMER

London, May 4.—Within a short distance of Toronto, as he was coming to deliver an address to the Canadian Methodist church at the Metropolitan Hotel, Rev. Sylvester Horne, a member of the British House of Commons, fell dead on the deck of the Niagara on Saturday night at the feet of his wife. He was a distinguished visitor to the American continent, his visit being for the purpose of delivering a series of lectures at Yale university. These were concluded last week and his visit to Toronto was the result of an invitation from the Canadian Brotherhood.

LOYD GEORGE'S SIXTH BUDGET SEVENTY-SEVEN MILLIONS SHORT

EXPENDITURE IS MUCH GREATER THAN ESTIMATED—TAX REVENUES INCREASED TO FIVE MILLIONS

(Special to The Daily News)
London, May 4.—Lloyd George, presenting his sixth annual budget, faces an expenditure of £222,000,000, which is variously estimated at £200,000,000 to £222,000,000. Published figures show that the revenue falls £77,000,000 short of this year's estimated figure. The national growth of tax revenues should be four or five million pounds, but it is expected that the chancellor will apply five million pounds to the relief of the local rates, and it is also suggested that he may sacrifice another three million pounds of revenue in order to secure a free breakfast table. It is generally anticipated that the income tax will be remodelled in order to make up the deficit.

CATCH HALIBUT FOR COLD STORAGE CO.

Yesterday was the record day for the port of Prince Rupert for receipts. The Canadian Cold Storage company landed 270,000 pounds, or over 100 worth of fish. It gives an idea of what means to this port. Carruthers brought in 80,000 pounds from a ten days' trip.

BARNHISEL LOSES SUIT FOR DIVORCE

Judge Mitchell Refuses Decree to Prominent Tacoma Clergyman

Tacoma, May 2.—The sensational divorce suit of Rev. A. H. Barnhise, former pastor of the First Presbyterian church of this city, against his wife Olive, which drew throngs of socially prominent Tacomans to the superior court for weeks, has been decided by Judge John Mitchell of Olympia, who tried the case in Tacoma. Judge Mitchell refuses to grant the divorce, and orders the case dismissed.

Rev. Mr. Barnhise asked for a divorce, alleging his wife was extravagant and was the cause of his being now hopelessly in debt because of her social ambitions and desire to send their two children to high-toned schools.

Mrs. Barnhise denied the charges and resisted the application for a divorce, but did not file a counter bill.

The court holds that a wife's extravagance is in itself no cause for divorce.

TEXAN RANCHER WAS MURDERED BY MEXICANS

Laredo, Tex., May 4.—The body of Porfirero Laurel, an American rancher who disappeared last November, was recovered today from a grave near Neuve Laredo, Mexico. Laurel had been arrested by the Mexican federales, who persistently denied reports of his execution, and until the body was exhumed today the mystery of the Texan's absence was unexplained.

WANTS TO CUT OFF FOOD SUPPLY OF VERA CRUZ

Mexican Governor Threatens Execution of Any One Taking Food Into That City

Vera Cruz, May 2.—A strained situation at Tampico and an effort on the part of the Mexican governor of the state to cut off the food supply from Vera Cruz is now dividing attention in Mexico.

The reported massing of rebel forces at Tampico is regarded as an important move. There is a feeling that the fall of that city will have some bearing on the immediate policy of the United States towards Mexico. Persons well informed on the federal preparedness are very skeptical with regard to the predictions of an early success by the rebels. It is pointed out that three federal gunboats so far have easily repelled all attacks on the place.

Just now the only food supplies reaching Vera Cruz are coming from small ranches near enough to the city to allow the farmers to feel assured of United States protection. If the order of the Mexican governor of Vera Cruz threatening the execution of anyone bringing food to the city becomes effective this small supply will also be cut off.

UNITED STATES AGENT RELEASED BY MEXICO

Mexican War Office Makes Explanations—Hostilities Have Ceased

Mexico City, May 4.—Dr. Ryan, the confidential agent of the American State department, who was arrested a few days ago and whose release was demanded by Secretary Bryan, has arrived at Mexico City today with a heavy escort. The authorities here offer an explanation as to his arrest. Huerta's minister of war has officially notified the Brazilian minister before Dr. Ryan's arrival that Americans would be delivered to the Brazilian legation. The Mexican war office sent a telegram yesterday to the Federal military commands to suspend hostilities against Americans and rebels on account of the armistice.

MEXICAN SHIP SANK MINED FOR AMERICANS

(Special to The Daily News)

Mexico City, May 2.—A despatch is said to have come from Manzanillo on the Pacific coast which announces that the Mexican steamship Luella was sunk today in the harbor by the explosion of a mine which had been planted to ruin the United States protected cruiser Raleigh. No loss of life is mentioned. The steamer belonged to the Pacific Railway company.

UNIONISTS BELIEVE GOVT. WILL MAKE ANY CONCESSIONS

DEMANDING UNCONDITIONAL EXCLUSION OF ULSTER—THE FEDERAL SOLUTION IS SCOUTED

(Special to The Daily News)

London, May 4.—The Unionist journals this morning, following Mr. Balfour's lead, are unequivocally demanding the unconditional exclusion of Ulster from the operation of the home rule bill, declaring this is the only means of averting war. Many prominent Unionists write to the newspapers alleging that the government is acting in bad faith and scouting the proposed federal solution. The general attitude of the Unionists suggests their belief that the government is on the run and is prepared to make the fullest concessions to secure peace, which the Morning Post says will not be the result of any round table conference.

LIBERALS WANT ACCOUNTING FROM MACKENZIE AND MANN

WILL OPPOSE NEW C. N. R. BILL UNTIL THEY GET IT—THE SESSION AT OTTAWA WILL BE PROLONGED

Ottawa, May 2.—A Liberal caucus has been held to consider the government proposals. It was announced when the gathering broke up that the party had reached an agreement to oppose the plan announced by the government, which means that the session is likely to be prolonged well into June, and that it is about to enter one of its most interesting phases. It is understood that the opposition members agreed to demand that Mackenzie and Mann give an accounting of how money given to them in the past has been spent. Just to what distance the opposition proposes to carry the fight is not known. The more aggressive Liberals say that the legislation may have to go through under the closure rule, but this probably depends upon the developments of the next ten days.

UPTON SINCLAIR ARRESTED

Paraded in Front of Standard Oil Building in New York

New York, May 2.—Upton Sinclair and four women arrested with him yesterday in front of the Standard Oil building, while they paraded as "mourners" protesting against John D. Rockefeller, Jr.'s, policy in the Colorado mine war, were found guilty of disorderly conduct, and each was sentenced to pay a fine of \$3 with the alternative of three days in jail.

Sinclair, Mrs. Donie Listner and Mrs. Elizabeth Freeman refused to pay the fine. Mrs. Belle Silverman and Mrs. Margaret Remington Charter said they would pay.

Sinclair made a speech in court, saying that he was on the verge of a physical breakdown, but that notwithstanding he would go to jail and begin a hunger strike. He was promptly locked up.

Mrs. Sinclair joined the "mourners" in the rain this afternoon. She said she had heard her husband had been sent to jail, but she considered it more important to march in front of the Standard Oil building than to visit him.

French Defeat Moors

Fez, Morocco, May 4.—A desperate battle between the French troops and the followers of the native pretender to the Moroccan throne today resulted in the defeat of the Moors, who suffered enormous losses. The French casualties were none killed and 25 wounded. Early in the morning the French troops consisting of a column composed of all arms attacked the natives in their mountain stronghold, which they carried at the point of the bayonet in spite of the tenacious resistance of the natives. The Moorish camp was destroyed.

TAMPICO HARBOR MINED TO KEEP OUT U. S. NAVY

Two Weeks Ago City Was Under United States Guns but is Now Protected

(Special to The Daily News)

Washington, May 4.—Reports to the navy department from Rear-admiral Mayo indicate that the Mexican federal forces have mined the Panuco river, the inlet to the city of Tampico from the Gulf of Mexico. The river is navigable to Tampico for only comparatively light draft vessels. Two weeks ago the scout cruisers Chester, Gunboat and Dauphin and two other American vessels were lying in front of the Tampico river. The entire city was directly under their guns and Admiral Mayo was convinced he could have taken the place without the loss of any men. He deemed it advisable, however, to order the ships from the harbor to the gulf. This had scarcely been accomplished before the Mexicans placed mines in the river to prevent the ships again entering.

One Robber Dying

One of the Russian bank robbers at Hazelton hospital is dying. This man was shot in the hip by a soft-nosed bullet and a tremendous hole was torn out of the groin. The wound was getting along nicely until blood poisoning set in and the man will now die.

Carranza Won't Mediate

El Paso, Tex., May 4.—Carranza has formally declined the suggestion of the mediators that he cease hostilities against Huerta pending the outcome of the plan of mediation. His note was sent to Washington yesterday and made public here today.

The people cannot be too frequently reminded that the old tactics of the McBride government are to cancel the voters' lists just before dissolution. According to a new law passed last session, any naturalized subject cannot be replaced on the voters' list without a copy of his naturalization papers. Not one in a hundred can comply. This should be looked into and all who would be affected by this ruling should get a copy of their certificate.

The new blood which has come into this province within recent years are more apt to be independent in their voting and the machine wants to "get" them.

The strength of the Conservatives in this town is not indicated by the number of names on the roll of the local association. There are scores of men on that roll who have been forced to pay their dollar and join in order to get a job. Necessity may compel a man to join, but it is not likely to make him vote. A contract agreed to under adverse conditions need not be lived up to. The working men who are compelled to join the Conservative association or lose their jobs can vote as they please when election comes, and many of them will take advantage of that independence. There is a hard day coming for the oppressors. Cave canem.

The largest lake freighter in the world was launched at Port Arthur on April 14, six

months after the keel was laid. Between the time of keel-laying and the date of launching upwards of 5,000 tons of steel were used in the vessel's construction and employment was given to four hundred men. In length the freighter would overlap a dreadnought by two hundred feet.

Canadian workmen, using as far as possible Canadian material, have built the world's giant freighter. Directly, the building of the vessel has given employment to four hundred men; indirectly, it provided work for many hundreds more who were engaged in the production of the steel and other materials entering into the construction of such a ship.

Yet Premier Borden and his associates and supporters have ridiculed the suggestion that Canada could undertake the construction of naval ships. These advocates of the "Canada Can't" idea have laughed at the Liberal belief that it would be possible for the Dominion to build cruisers and other vessels. They have denounced the Liberal policy of building in Canada, as far as possible, out of Canadian material by Canadian labor. They have condemned this policy with which there would necessarily go provision for the establishment of great Canadian shipyards both on the Atlantic and Pacific coasts.

The figures which show the quantity of material used in the construction of this vessel and the number of wage-earners to whom employment was given suggest the great benefit to Canadian industries and Canadian artisans which would flow from the adoption of the Liberal policy under which the construction of cruisers and like vessels would be actively taken up in the Dominion. Under Mr. Borden's policy of "contribution," however, Canadian money for naval purposes would not be spent in Canada but for materials and wages in another part of the empire.

Seattle, May 2.—Augusta J. Lamb has been granted a divorce by Judge King Dykeman from Herbert Lamb, who, the wife told the court, owed her a five-year board bill when she married him on September 27, 1911, and deserted her three months later. It was charged that Lamb quit work as soon as he was wed, and that Mrs. Lamb bought him a new suit of clothes and got him a job on a San Francisco boat. When he arrived at San Francisco, said Mrs. Lamb, Herbert sent word for her to get a divorce, that he was not coming back. The husband told the court that there had been much drinking and carousing about the house after the marriage. He told the court that he was now a janitor on a steamboat.

WEST'S INTEREST IN MEXICAN SITUATION

Good Canadian Dollars Invested There While Western Canada Needs the Money

(Edmonton Capital.)

As there are many thousand Canadians in Mexico, and as the outcome of the struggle is certain to have a very large material effect upon Canadian prosperity and development, every move down in that country will be watched on this side of the line with quite as much interest as on the other side. The uncertainty of the tenure of any investment in Mexico has already been demonstrated very effectively and those Montreal magnates who poured good Canadian dollars into the development of Mexican tractions, water powers and mines will no doubt have realized very fully by now that while governments such as those in Alberta and Saskatchewan may not be willing to permit the same ruthless exploitation as is the custom in Mexico, it is the very ruthlessness of the Mexican system of exploitation which makes the investment unsafe.

The Mexican government might be willing to permit capitalists to gather the shekels as they could, but it was powerless to guarantee permanency of that privilege.

When this idea thoroughly seeps in there will be less anxiety on the part of our Eastern Canadian millionaires to rush into South and Central American investments and to ignore the possibilities of their own country here in the west.

90,000 Rooms at 'Frisco

Two hundred hotel proprietors of San Francisco have agreed not to raise their charges above the rates now prevailing during the year of the Panama-Pacific international exposition. Kirk Harris, manager of the association, said that 90,000 rooms will be available at prices between \$1 and \$3.

London, May 2.—Lord Lansdowne will probably represent the Unionists at the forthcoming conference with ministers on the home rule question. 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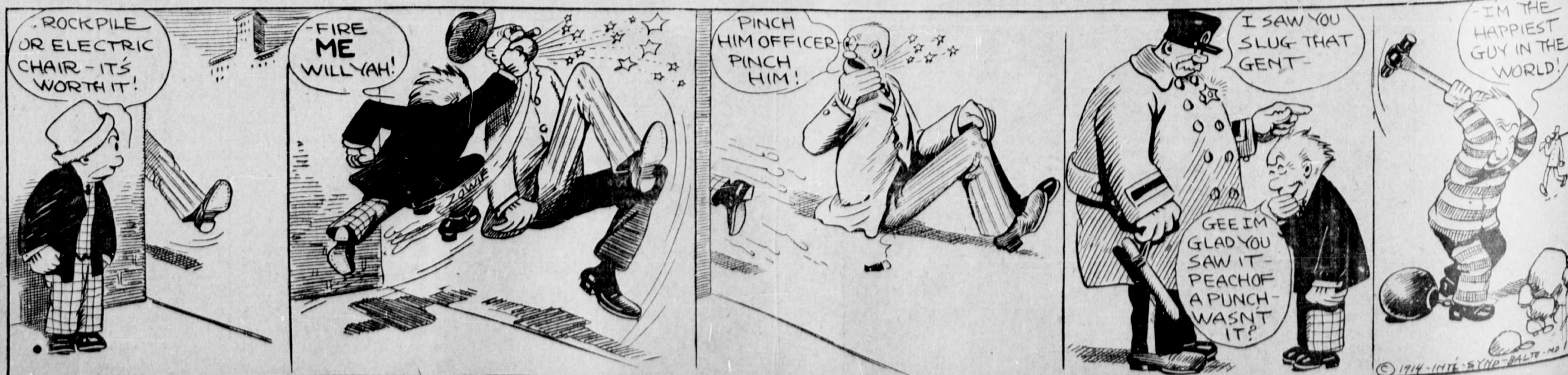

The Chelohsin arrived at 1:30 this morning and then sailed for Granby Bay. When going into Haysport last week the Chelohsin ran aground and damaged her bottom. She will be laid up at the end of the present trip for repairs. This will take her off the run for a week or two.

The deputy minister of works and the provincial architect today have been looking over the site of the new court house on Market place, the site of the Morse creek bridge, and of the road around the island. No definite information as to when these works will be started is available as yet.
