The city engineer, in reply to an enquiry from Ald. McClymont, stated that the bylaw was similar to that used in Seattle and Vancouver, and that other buildings of a similar nature were being erected in compliance with the provisions of the bylaw.

Ald. Morrissey said he had objected to this clause of the bylaw when it had been put through two years ago, and felt like complying with Mr. Abbott's request.

Ald. Montgomery did not remember what Ald. Morrissey's attitude had been at that time. but as he had objected to everything at that time his statement was probably correct. He considered it a serious thing to alter the bylaw and suggested a motion leaving it to a committee of the board of works, the city engineer and fire chief.

Ald. Basso-Bert thought the percentage of light area might be reduced, particularly where the buildings were only of a temporary nature.

The committee as suggested was named to report at the next meeting.



This is the same man who in an unconscious state was arrested, according to the same paper, singlehanded and with consummate courage by a provincial policeman.
