As an additional evidence that the McBride government is incapable of handling conditions in a growing country, the following will suffice: Large sums of money are being spent every year to induce foreigners to come to Canada. Many of these find their way to British Columbia, and when they get here they are not allowed to enter even the primitive calling of a fisherman. According to the government regulations they must become British subjects, before they can secure a license, which means that they must lie around for three years before they can enter their chosen calling. There are a large number of such cases to be found in the vicinity of this city and nothing is being done for them. This is surely a stupid way to develop a new country.

This also shows the insincerity of the Conservative governments. When the Liberals were in power at Ottawa the great cry was for a white British Columbia. Now that they are in power, however, very little is being done to wrest the fisheries from the Japanese. It is repeatedly said that white fishermen cannot be had. If this is so the most of the blame lies with the government, when they allow conditions to exist whereby new arrivals are not allowed

to fish. If we are going to invite white foreigners to our shores let us give them a chance to make good and throw away this foolish notion of saving jobs for the man who has a vote.

In a speech in parliament on April 16 the New Zealand minister of defence said that the government had decided that in future its duty was not to contribute five hundred thousand dollars a year to the British admiralty, but instead to utilize the money on training New Zealanders to serve both New Zealand and England. Was New Zealand, he asked, ready to rely for protection on a mere trade alliance with Japan? Was she to have no voice in the expenditure of her contributions, and was she to have no say in questions of peace or war? It would appear that New Zealanders, like Canadians, feel the throb of mainhood in their veins and will insist on playing their own hand in this game of nations.

That trite phrase "the member for the district" seems to have dropped out of local print. That is just a forerunner of what will soon happen the "member."

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




