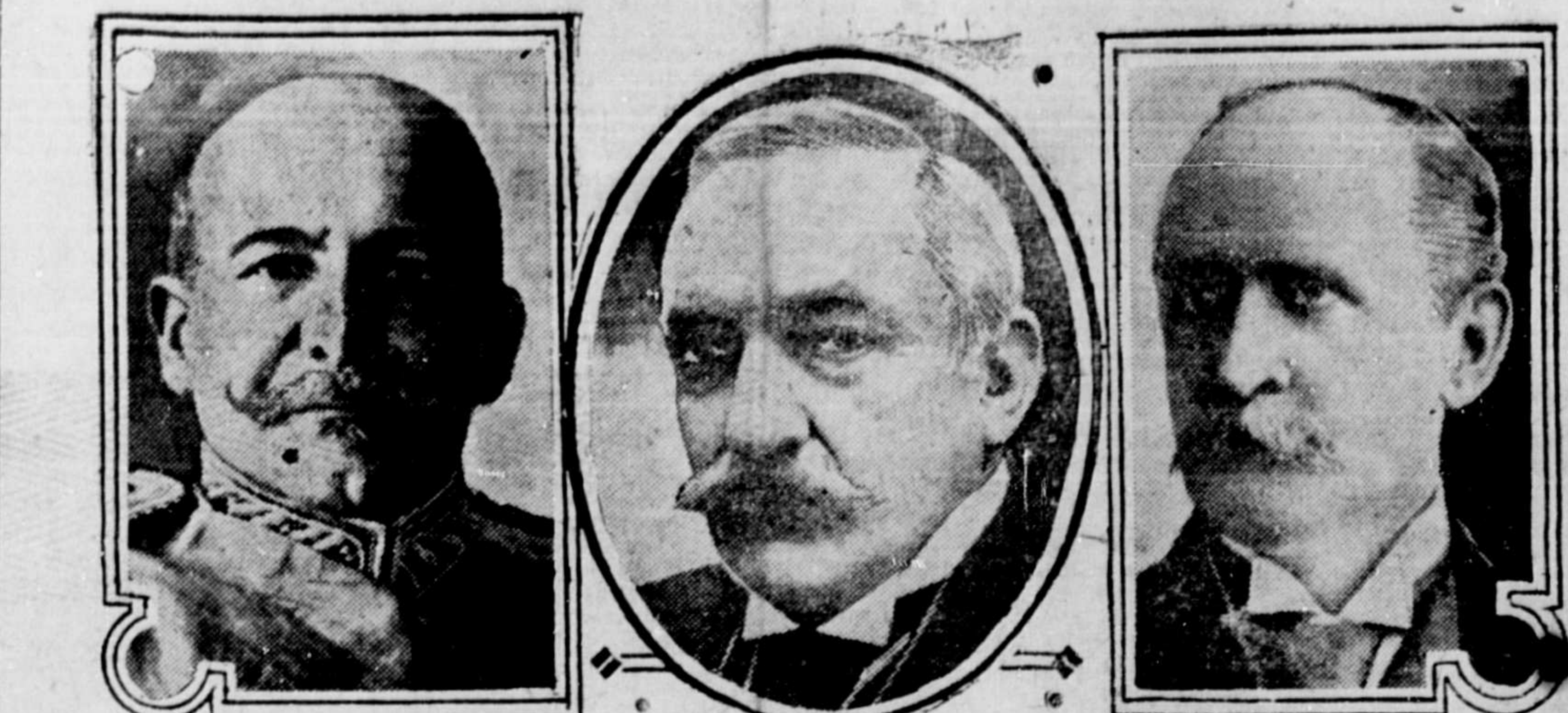
PEACE DELEGATES LEAVE FOR NIAGARA--GRANT \$600 TO BOARD OF TRADE FOR PUBLICITY

BOARD OF TRADE WILL PROTEST ON PRICES CHARGED FOR ICE

LOCAL COLD STORAGE COMPANY TO BE INTERVIEWED--THE BOARD RAISING MONEY TO CARRY ON PUBLICITY WORK

That the local fish and cold storage company is charging more than any of the other cold storage companies on the coast for ice, bait and supplies was one of the statements made in a report of the fisheries committee at the regular meeting of the board of trade last evening. The report gave a schedule of prices charged by several companies, and the local company's price was more than double what fish-boatmen can get ice for at other ports. The report recommended a committee interview the Canadian Fish and Gold Storage company and if a lower price cannot be secured that the matter be taken to Ottawa. The board agreed with the report and put it in the hands of the fisheries committee to proceed.

The fisheries report also said that another effort be made to have an appointment made of a resident of this city as member of the fisheries advisory board. A vote of thanks for the able and full report from the fisheries committee was passed. It was pointed out by Mr. Patterson that the Canadian Fish and Gold Storage company was subsidized by the Dominion government and ought to furnish fish-

New York, May 9.—No trace has been found by the White Star liner Adriatic of the third lifeboat of the freighter Columbian, which was burned at sea. A double watch was kept while passing the scene of the disaster.

NATIONALISTS WILL OPPOSE THE EXCLUSION OF ULSTER

WILL NOT STAND FOR MORE THAN SIX YEARS' EXCLUSION—UNLESS ASSURANCES GIVEN MAY OPPOSE GOVERNMENT

London, May 9.—Sixty-five Nationalists have prepared an ultimatum to Premier Asquith saying that they will make no further concessions to Ulster in the direction of exclusion other than the six years already offered. Failing acceptance of this the home rule bill should be passed as it stands under the

parliament act, at the latest before the end of May. In the event of the government postponing the passage of the bill the Nationalists will try to obtain a division. If Asquith's assurances are unsatisfactory they will refuse to extend further support to the government even to the extent of not supporting the budget.

PEACE DELEGATION STARTS TODAY FOR NIAGARA FALLS

WILL COME OUT VIA VERA CRUZ—HIGH TENSION AT WASHINGTON—NO NEW ORDERS TO TROOPS ISSUED

Washington, May 8.—The South American mediators have been notified that the Huerta delegates will start from Mexico City tomorrow en route to Niagara Falls via Vera Cruz and Key West.

High tension has marked the Mexican situation here in both military and diplomatic circles. No orders for troops have been issued so far as known, but the sending of additional troops to Vera Cruz will probably be carried out.

SUPREME COURT RESERVES JUDGMENT IN DAVIS CASE

MAN WHO IS ACCUSED OF SHOOTING CONSTABLE ARCHIBALD STILL HAS A CHANCE FOR HIS LIFE

Ottawa, May 9.—The supreme court reserves judgment in the criminal appeal of Davis vs. Rex. Davis with his companion Clark was sentenced to death for the shooting of Constable Archibald. A reprieve was granted to allow

the case to come before the supreme court. The question to be decided is, was Davis entitled to a separate trial or did the trial justice properly direct the jury, especially failing in caution and careful consideration of the evidence of an accomplice.

The people have been told all along that there could never be the slightest chance of the province being called upon to meet the guarantees given to the C. N. R., and the people were foolish enough to believe it. Everybody now realizes that it is a practical certainty that the province will be called upon to make good its guarantees, and the pap fed organs of the government are now praying that the Dominion government will become so involved in the deal that it will have to relieve the provincial government of the burden of meeting the guarantees given.

The truth is that the people have been misled and misinformed by the Bowser-McBride administration, and that iniquitous administration has been supported in this course by numerous government supported papers whose self or party interests always come before the public welfare. Now that the inevitable is about to happen, these deceivers of the public are running for cover, and the sheltering wing of the Dominion government looks a pretty good place to crawl under.

The public should not forget that at the very moment at the last sitting of the legislature when Sir Richard McBride was asking the provincial legislature to further

pledge the credit of the province to assist the Canadian Northern interests, he must have known that the Mackenzie and Mann people were in financial difficulties and were not in a position to complete their transcontinental system without further assistance from the Dominion government. Notwithstanding these circumstances, Sir Richard did not hesitate to put the whole future of the province in jeopardy. Today the Tory party is looking to the Dominion government to protect this province against the folly of the Bowser-McBride administration.

Sir Dick is like the wayfarer son who took the plunge in the hope and expectation that his father would have to help him out in order to save the family name. Sir Richard is altogether too expensive a luxury for this province to maintain, and the sooner this great native son is retired to private life the better for the province.

Is this city going to get the Wark channel power or is it not? What is the reason of the delay? Why should it be necessary for this city to have to put up a fight to get the only remaining water power in the district? Why does not the local member see that the Wark channel power is given

to the city immediately so that the money now being spent on the electric end at Woodworth lake could be spent at Wark channel instead, and thus save the city what will amount to several million dollars during the next fifty years, which is the life of the debentures covering the cost?

The domestic water supply of this city was given away to a Vancouver man who at one time was president of the Conservative association of Vancouver. All of the water powers adjacent to the city with the exception of Wark channel were given away to private interests, and Wark channel itself is claimed by a private corporation and it is not known yet that this private corporation will not succeed in getting this Wark channel power.

Why should this city be left in such a precarious position? At a time when this city had no means of making itself heard and before it was a city at all, it was the duty of the government to see that the future interests of the city were protected. The government failed lamentably in this respect, and now that we have representatives who should be able to voice the sentiments of the people we seem to be very little better off.

It is time that we had somebody with a little ginger and backbone to represent us, some one who will insist upon the rights of the city and district being protected. The unsympathetic administration at Victoria which has squandered the public patrimony and is now of a mind that the north "particularly" shall pay the penalty should be given to understand that northern British Columbia will no longer tolerate the injustices practised at her expense.

Son Kills Millionaire Father

New York, May 8.—Hiram Duryea, 81, retired millionaire starch manufacturer and civil war veteran, was murdered here early today at his home in the Bay Ridge section of Brooklyn, by his son, Chester Duryea. Seven shots were fired by his son into the father's body, causing instant death.

The murder occurred on the porch in the rear of the Duryea home, where both father and son were in the habit of sleeping.

Chester, who is 43 years old, slipped from his cot into the house, where he kept several rifles, revolvers and shotguns for hunting purposes. He selected an automatic pistol and a magazine rifle.

Chester Duryea would give no reason for killing his father when taken into custody. For the past few days, servants told the police, he had been acting very strangely, and they had feared a return of a previous breakdown.

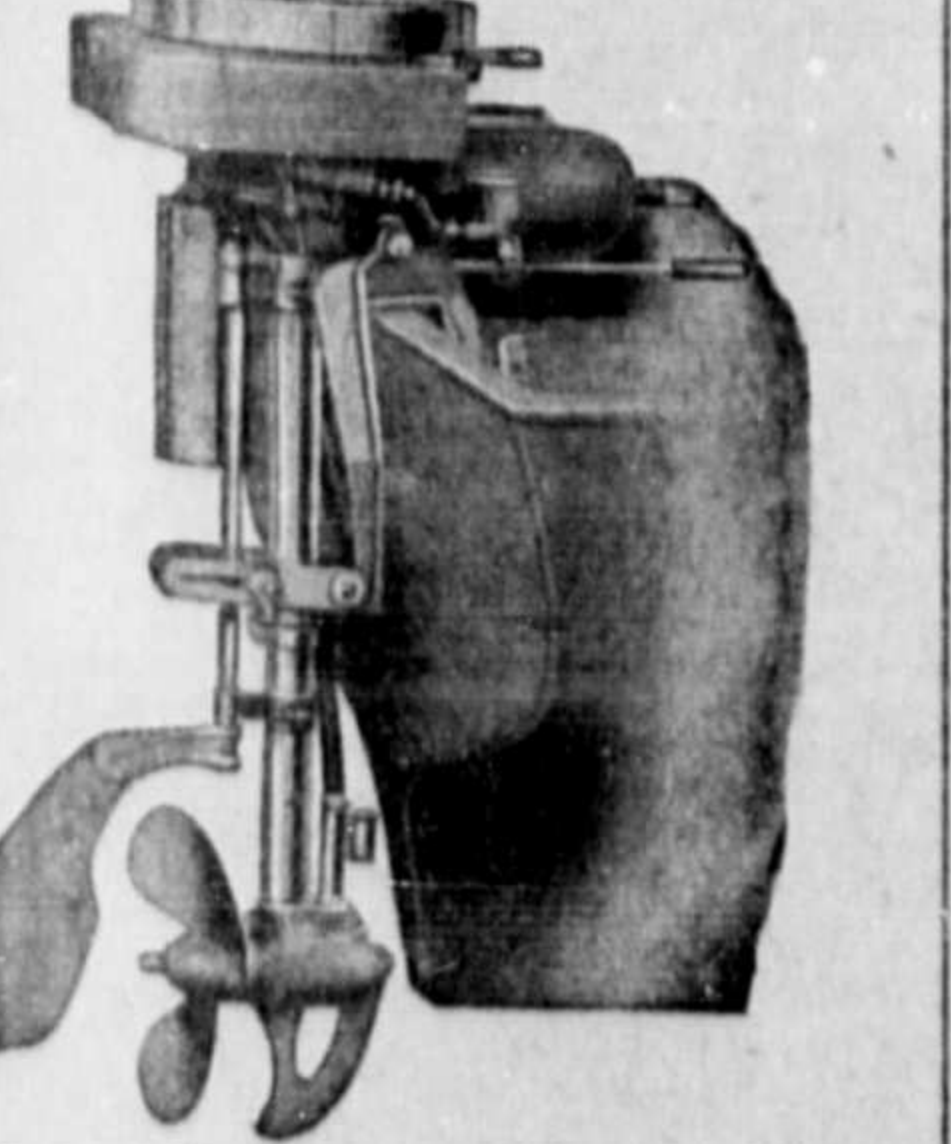

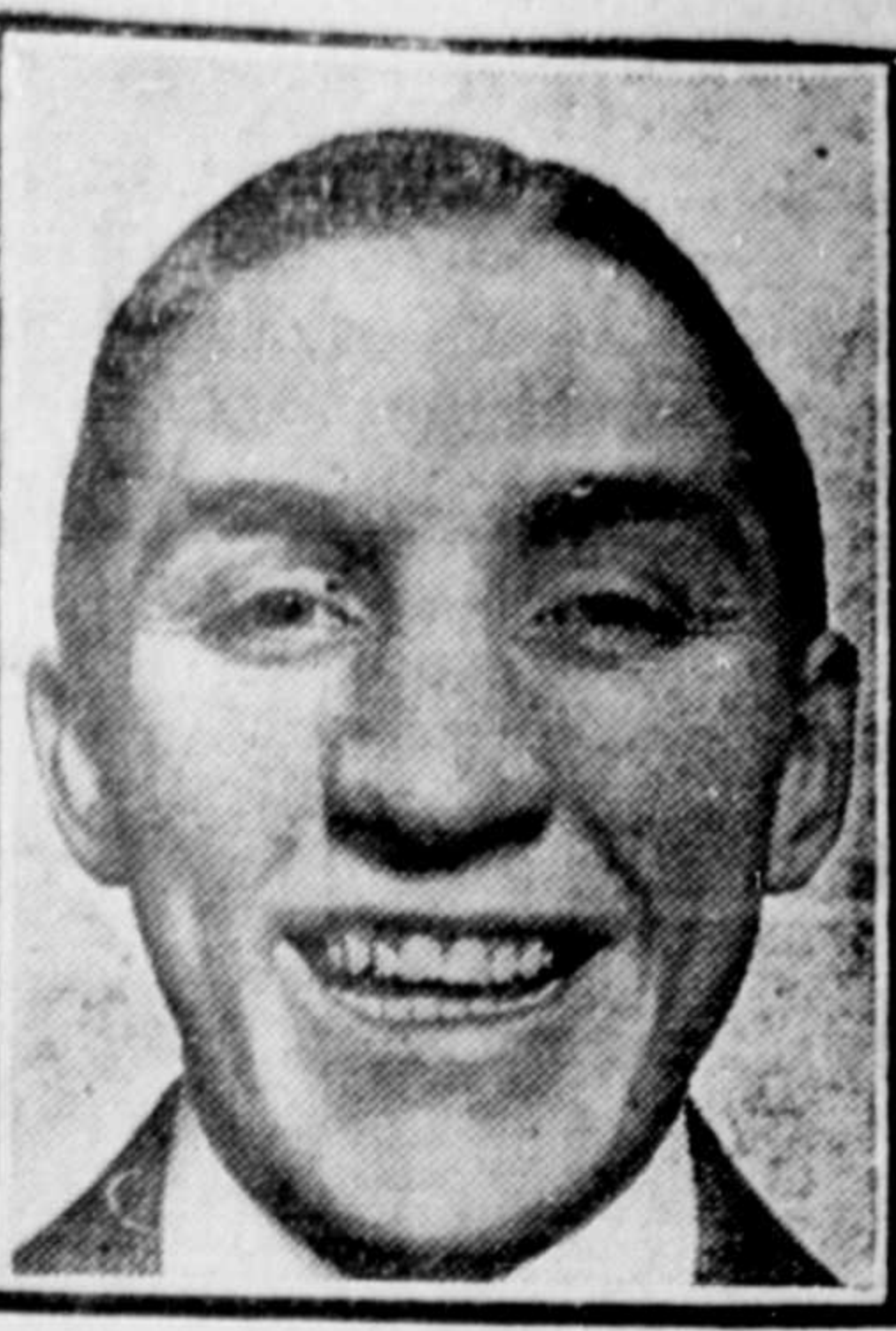

At a meeting of the Football association selection committee in London, Eng., last week, it was agreed to play an amateur international match, England vs. Scotland, in Scotland next season. The following international matches have also been arranged: England vs. Denmark, at Copenhagen, Friday, June 5, and two matches, England vs. Sweden, at Stockholm, Wednesday, June 10, and Friday, June 12. A letter was read from France agreeing to play an amateur international match, England vs. France, at Dover, on September 26. It was also arranged to play matches: England vs. Austria, at Vienna on May 27 and two matches, England vs. Hungary, on May 30 and June 1, one at Budapest and one at a ground to be nominated by Hungary.

A correspondent, writing to the sporting editor of the Toronto Star, asks: "Is it possible for an expert cricket batsman to hit a cricket ball, with a cricket bat, as far as an expert baseball batter using a baseball and baseball bat?" The answer follows: The question is one frequently discussed on the cricket field, but I have yet to learn that it has ever been decided by actual test. I think the baseball would win out if it came to a contest, but I know many cricketers who hold a decided opposite opinion. Readers may be interested to know that the greatest distance a cricket ball has ever been struck is 175 yards. The achieve ment was performed by the Rev. W. Fellows, on the Christ church grounds, Oxford, the distance being measured from the bat to the spot where the ball touched the ground. The record baseball hit is 419 1/2 feet. The batter was Ed. Walsh of the Chicago Americans, who performed the feat fungo hitting on September 30, 1914.

BOB FITZ TALKS OF THE RING LEADERS

Lauds Willie Ritchie and Likes Kilbane and Mike Gibbons

Bob Fitzsimmons, the only fighter in the history of pugilism who has ever held three titles at the same time, and who is one of the greatest exponents of the sport, cannot resign himself to the fact that he is through as a fighter. He still has the desire to do battle, and he still is peeved over the verdict of the New York boxing commission, which refused to allow him to engage in contests in the empire state.

Of the younger fighters of the present day Fitz has the following to say: "In regard to the champions of other classes, I believe Willie Ritchie is one of the best in the game since the days of Joe Gans. The lightweight champion is the combination of boxer and fighter. Such a man is hard to beat, and I think Ritchie will hold the crown for years to come.

"Johnny Kilbane, the featherweight champion, is another good boy who will be hard to dethrone. So far as Johnny Coulton is concerned, it is my opinion he cannot go the long route with a tough, rugged fighter. If he carries out his plans to meet Kid Williams of Baltimore on June 9, there will be a new bantamweight champion.

"Mike Gibbons looks to be the best of the welterweight division. The middleweight title is a toss-up between Jimmy Clabby and Eddie McGoorty. Sam Langford is easily the best of the light heavyweights. The heavyweight class is a joke. I never could see Jack Johnson as a champion, and so far as Gunboat Smith, Jess Willard and the rest of the heavyweights are concerned, Gus Ruhlin could have whipped any of them."

IMMIGRANTS COMING WITH RUSH TO CANADA

Five Thousand Land in Twenty-four Hours, Breaking All St. Lawrence Records

Quebec, May 8.—The navigation season has opened here with a great rush of immigrants, no less than 10,000 having arrived so far by this port, and half of these in twenty-four hours in seven different steamers.

Over 1,400 landed yesterday morning from the cabins and steerage of the Megantic of the White Star Dominion line, while Cunard liner Ausania brought 600 more a few hours later, quickly followed by the Allan steamers Sicilian and Grampian, with more than 2,000 newcomers, who arrived in the order named, and the Donaldson steamer Athenia with another contingent of 400, the steamer Willebad of the Canada line, having contributed 750 passengers earlier in the morning. Thus is completed the enormous figure of over 5,000 immigrants arrived in seven steamers in less than 24 hours. This is a record for the season, but it might be broken before the end of the present month, when the Empress and Royal liners will come in two at a time with an average of 1,500 passengers each.
