GRAND TRUNK PACIFIC WANTS 12 MILLIONS MORE

OIL GUSHER AT CALGARY SHOOTS 90 FEET HIGH—GOVERNMENT VOTED C.N.R. GUARANTEE

G. T. P. AND GOVT. DISAGREE MEANING COMPANY'S CHARTER

MAKE CLAIM FOR ADDITIONAL TWELVE MILLION UNDER IMPLEMENTING CLAUSE OF AGREEMENT—MAY BE DECIDED BY THE COURTS

(Special to The Daily News)
Ottawa, May 19.—A railroad conference of an important character has been held between the representatives of the government and the Grand Trunk Pacific regarding the claims of the railway for additional guarantees to complete the British Columbia section of the road. The G. T. P. representatives presented to the government their claim to be an agreement made between the late government and the G. T. P., which provides for a further guarantee of completion of the mountain section. They presented the intention as an alternative to

the government under the implementing clause of the agreement. They say the government is bound to pay twelve million in addition to the amount already paid. The government by no means concurs in the view of the representatives of the railway, who were informed that the government had no objection whatever to the question being submitted to the courts for an opinion. In case the company accepts the government's view negotiations will be undertaken with a view to affording some necessary aid to ensure the completion of the road to the Pacific coast.

DUKE AND DUCHESS AGAIN TO VISIT COAST

Will Make Trip in July Shortly Before Leaving Canada—Election Case in Courts

Ottawa, May 19.—Both appeals in the Chateauguay election case have been dismissed by the supreme court, with the result that the petition and counter-petition will go to trial on their merits.

The arrangements of the Duke and Duchess of Connaught for the coming summer are officially announced and include a trip across the continent to Vancouver about the end of July, making short stops en route at the principal cities. They will return to Ottawa early in September and depart for leave Canada.

G. H. Collins Back

Geo. H. Collins, manager of the Canadian Fish & Cold Storage company, arrived here this morning on the Prince Rupert after an absence of two months, during which time he visited the old country. Mr. Collins has been looking after the market end of the business in the east and will have to sail east again in a week or two. He says the company are anxiously awaiting the time when the G. T. P. will be open for freight, as they want to ship the fish direct to the eastern market from the plant here.

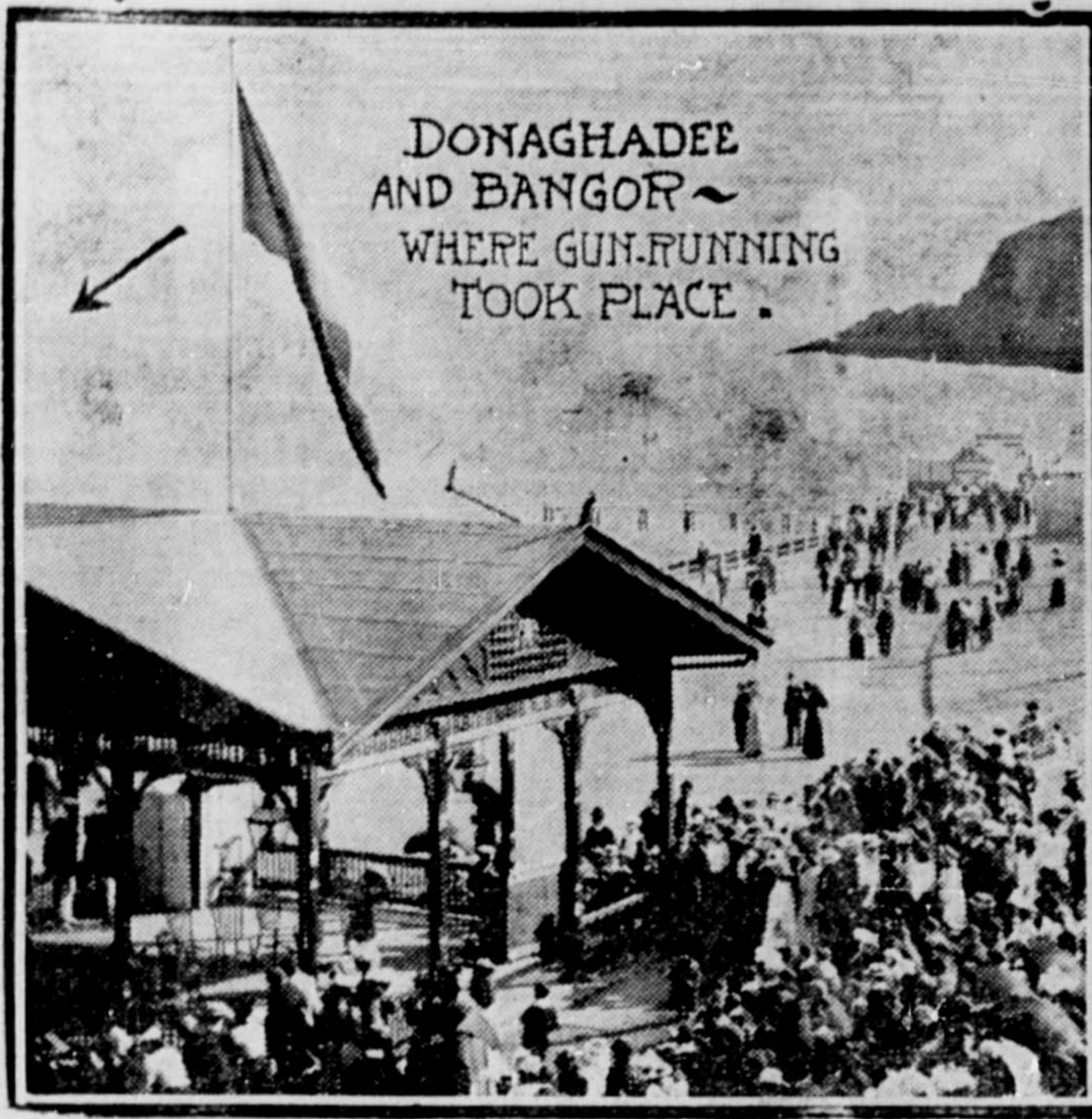
Appointed Receiver

GOVT. GOES THROUGH WITH C. N. R. GUARANTEE

Two Prominent Conservatives Vote With Opposition but Amendment Lost

Ottawa, May 19.—E. M. McDonald's motion to give the six months' hoist to the government's C. N. R. guarantee proposals was defeated by a vote of 141 to 64. Two Conservatives and one Liberal bolted as anticipated. R. B. Bennett and Mr. Niekke voted for the amendment and Mr. Charlton, Liberal, voted with the government. After the announcement of the vote on the amendment the resolution was declared carried by the same majority. Consideration of the proposals will be taken up in committee.

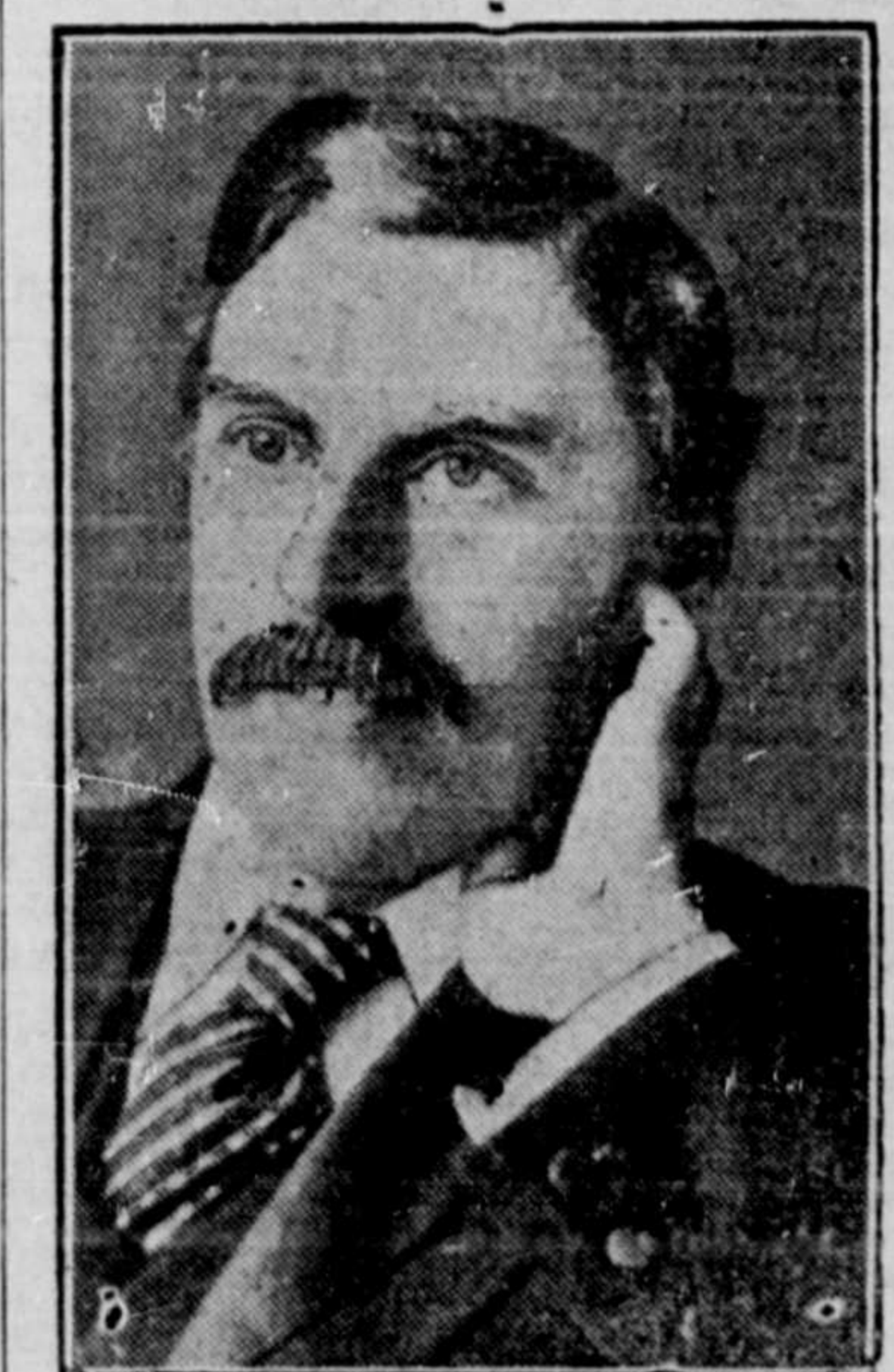

Mackenzie & Mann, Ltd., took contracts from the Canadian Northern approximating close upon a quarter of a billion dollars. Nearly one-fifth of this huge sum was guaranteed by the government.

How much money did Mackenzie & Mann make out of these contracts? Did they get all the profit or did they have to pay part of the profits to somebody else? If they had to divide the profits, with whom?

These are questions the people have a right to have answered. Bowser and McBride are reputed to be rich men. As public men acting as trustees for the people of the enormous resources of the province, the public has a right to have knowledge of how they made the money which they have acquired. They could not get rich out of their salaries. How then did they get it if they are as rich as reputed?

Supposing that Mackenzie & Mann were able to make a profit of twenty per cent, upon their contracts. Or cut it down lower than that and say in round figures five million dollars out of construction work in British Columbia. Wouldn't this be a nice tidy sum to cut up?

There might be enough in it

to justify aspirations to the high commissionership.

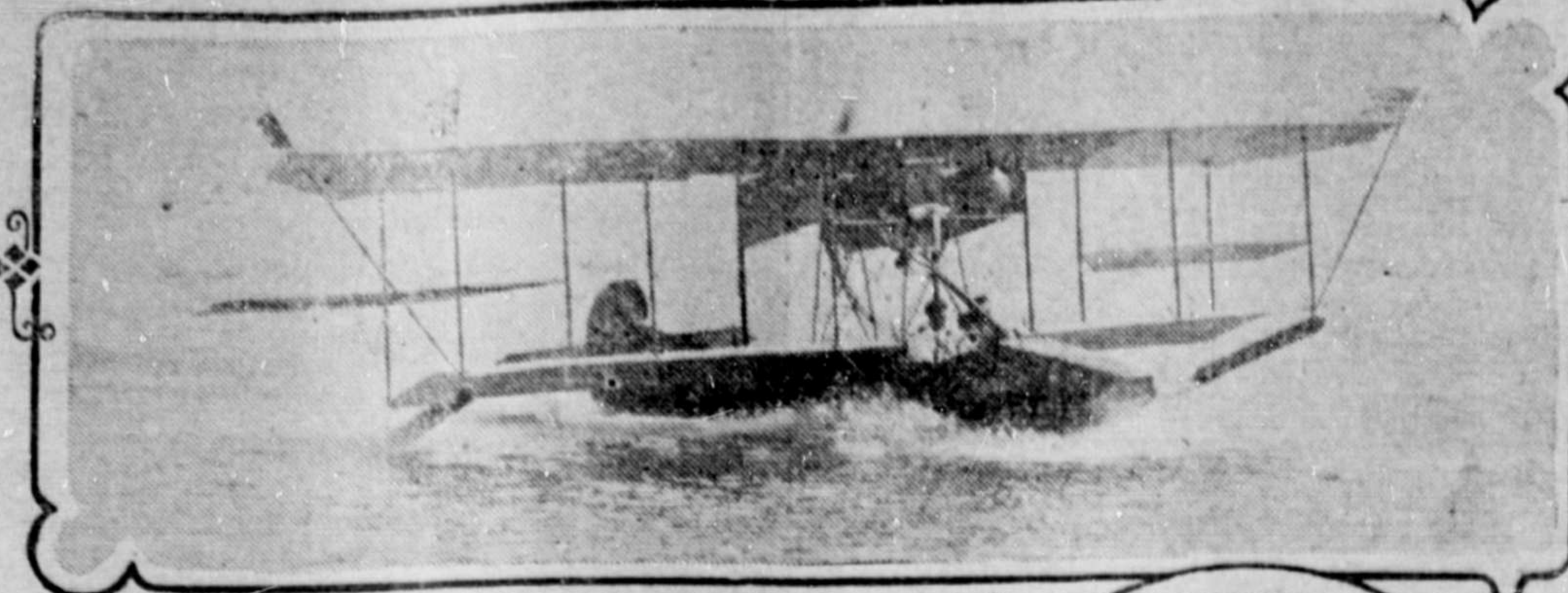
The people want to know the whole Canadian Northern story. The more that is learned of it, the more does it look to be the biggest financial jobbery ever pulled off in Canada, rivalling some of the stupendous manipulations of the United States.

The United States with its enormous population can easily bear the strain. Canada with her comparatively small population is likely to find the load a heavy one.

With much justice the interior towns are offering strenuous objections to the manner in which they are being treated by the Provincial Government.

The interior has always contributed heavily to the provincial exchequer but nothing like as much has been spent in public works as has been collected and these newer districts which require money for development purposes and which are such heavy contributors to the older portions of the province from which meantime they must buy all their supplies, feel that more consideration should be shown to their needs.

The whole trouble is that the voting strength of the north is not yet strong en-

NEW HAZELTON DOES ITS OWN ROAD WORK

Disgusted With Provincial Government Service They Make Up Public Pot

(Omineca Herald.) The citizens of New Hazelton are a real live bunch, and they have some money, too. At the regular monthly meeting of the Citizens' association last Monday night it was decided to expend a considerable sum of money on the main roads in town and have them in good shape before Victoria day celebration.

New Hazelton is still an unorganized community and is directly under the care of the provincial government, which collects all the taxes, in return for which roads, sidewalks and bridges and other necessities are supposed to be provided. To date the citizens and townspeople owners have provided practically everything in that way in New Hazelton. The government's share has been almost nil.

This year, again, the citizens were notified that there was no government money for this town, but that cannot stop the march of progress in a live town and community.

BECKER HAD TO HAVE AN ALIBI

Knew Something Was to Happen in Times Square Night of Rosenthal Murder

New York, May 19.—Charles B. Plitt, one time press agent and adviser for Charles Becker, on trial for the murder of Herman Rosenthal, took the stand today and corroborated in many details the story of Jack Rose and others that Becker was the instigator of the murder plot.

After Rosenthal had been murdered, the witness swore, he met Becker, who was indignant at the way the killing had been accomplished.

"What is the matter with Jack Rose and the bunch?" Plitt quoted Becker as having said, "To pull the stunt the way they did was very bad. You would suppose it was being done for the moving pictures."

July 15, the day before the murder, Plitt said he saw Becker at police headquarters. "Becker told me," said the witness "that he and I had to have an alibi for that night. 'Keep away from Times square tonight,' he told me."

"What's coming off?" I asked.

"Never mind," said Becker. "Do as you are told. We've got to have an alibi. Tomorrow you'll know why."

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NEW PRINCESS MARY AGAIN READY FOR RUN

Thirty-eight Feet Added Amidship—Increased Cabin Accommodation

The steamer Princess Mary of the C. P. R. line is again ready for commission. She has been in equiptment since January undergoing extensive alterations.

It has yet to be decided what route the Princess Mary will be assigned to following her return to regular service, but in all probability she will be operated in the Victoria-Vancouver service.

This trim craft is now 38 feet 4 inches longer than when she was hauled out at the Esquimalt yards in January. The cutting of the vessel in two parts was a most interesting operation, and a large force of shipbuilders and mechanics has been engaged on the contract, which is the second of its kind carried out at Esquimalt.

As built by Messrs. Bow, McLachlan & Co., Paisley, Scotland, the Princess Mary was 210 feet in length, and as lengthened by Yarrows, Limited, she is exactly 248 feet 4 inches. The lengthened steamer now has a beam of 39 feet 11 inches, whereas she was originally 39 feet 9 inches in breadth.

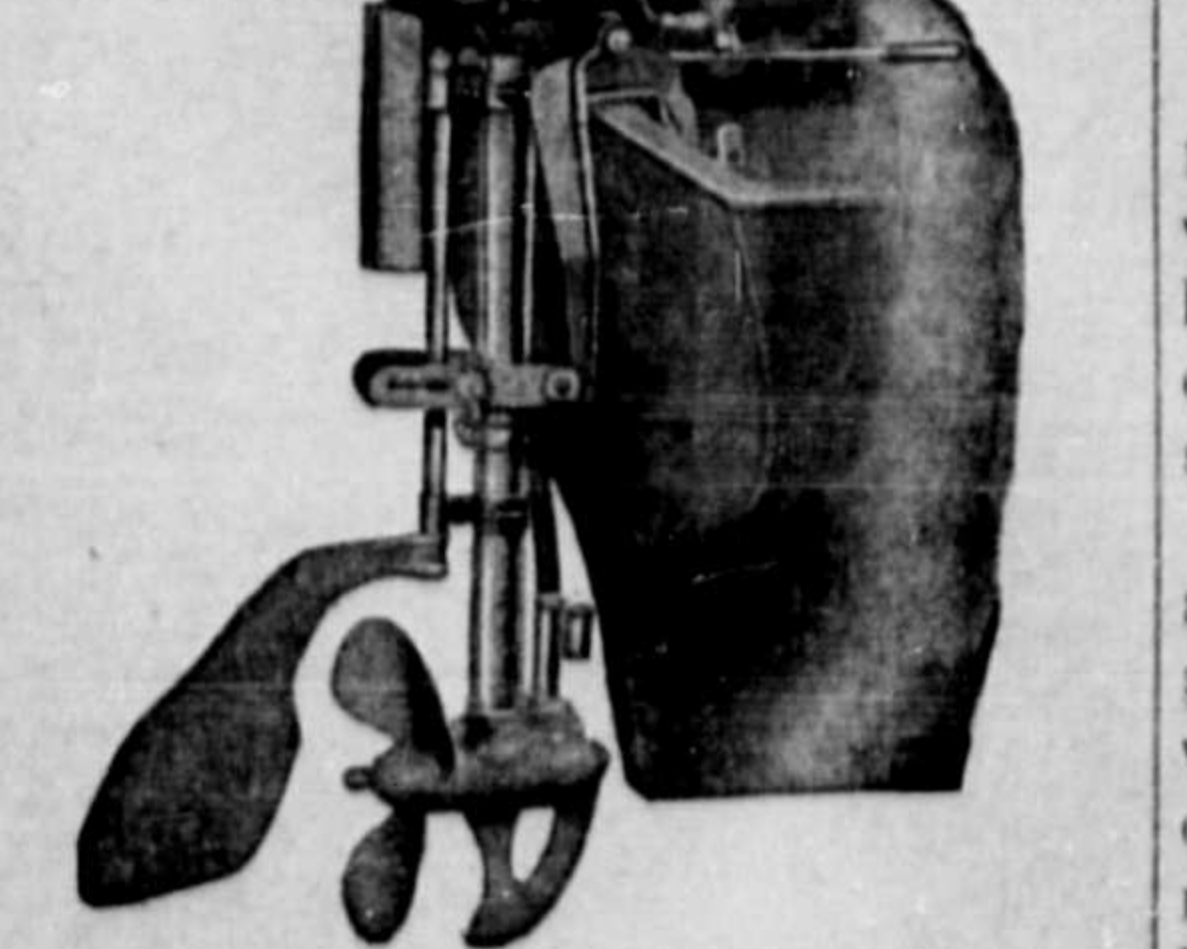
The additional length gives the vessel greater stability, and also provides for more passenger accommodation on two decks and greater freight space on the lower deck.

Prior to the lengthening operations, the Princess Mary had fifty-six cabins. Twenty-four additional cabins have been fitted, twelve on each deck, giving the vessel practically the same passenger space as contained in the Princess Sophia.

As the fine steamer Princess Alice is to be temporarily withdrawn from the Vancouver route to enable her to make several trips to Alaska in the excursion trade, it is highly probable that the Princess Mary will replace her in the gulf trade.

Twenty-six men, the crew of a French fishing schooner, were rescued thirty miles off Cape Breton as their craft was sinking.

Following the attempts of the governor of Mecca to suppress certain ancient privileges, a revolt has broken out in the Mohammedan city.

The St. Catharines carpenters, after being out on strike for two days, have accepted an increase from 40 to 43 cents an hour, taking effect on July 1.

The cost of maintaining a British battleship during the last ten years has risen from less than half a million dollars to nearly a million a year.

For thirty-three years rector of the Church of St. Alban the Martyr, Ottawa, Venerable Archdeacon J. Bogert has concluded his ministry at the church.

A German giant, Eugene Arceau, already eight feet in height, 19 years old, and over 200 pounds in weight, and still growing, has appeared in a circus at Madrid before King Alfonso of Spain.

Frank Kazol of Ford City, Ont., was arrested at Windsor charged with a serious offense against a 15-year-old girl, alleged to have been committed under promise of a pair of roller skates.

After bidding his wife goodbye and declaring she would never see him again, Henry Campbell of Sarnia, Ont., inspector of the steamer Huronic, died at Fort William when he cut the artery of his arm with a razor.

A big Halibut Catch The following item, clipped from the Seattle P.-I., shows what that city calls a big halibut catch. Prince Rupert can almost equal it and has hardly started in the business yet.

Nine halibut schooners which arrived yesterday brought a cargo aggregating 679,000 pounds, which sets a new mark for receipts during the past several months. The catch was distributed as follows: Kadiak, 55,000 pounds; Athena, 75,000 pounds; Uranus, 15,000 pounds; Lister, 25,000 pounds; Liberty, 70,000 pounds; Magnolia, 17,000 pounds; Vansee, 42,000 pounds; Independent, 190,000 pounds, and Chicago, 190,000 pounds. MOLASSES AND WINE BOUGHT FOR OPIUM

Los Angeles, Cal., May 19.—Molasses and port wine is what many Chinese have bought as opium smuggled into the United States, according to the statement of treasury officials. Labels of well known opium manufacturers in China, it is alleged, have been forged and pasted upon the cans, some of which were said to have been sold for as high as \$50 a can. Officials said the purchasers, not daring to report, were compelled to suffer the loss in silence. Forty-one cans of the decoction were seized at Calexico recently.
