## HOME RULE BILL HAS PASSED ITS FINAL READING

### BUSINESS HEART ATLIN BURNED OUT—MEDIATORS WANT COMMISSION GOVT. FOR MEXICO

#### ATLIN ALMOST WIPED OUT BUSINESS CENTRE BURNED

HEART OF BUSINESS SECTION WIPED OFF THE MAP BY FIRE—PRACTICALLY NO INSURANCE CARRIED—HOTELS AND CHURCH GONE

Friday witnessed a disastrous fire in Atlin. Practically the entire business section of the city was wiped out. The central block was burned to the last timber and many of the biggest buildings in the city were included in the conflagration. There was no loss of life, but the monetary loss is heavy, as there was practically no insurance.

The fire started in Pillman's store and a strong wind quickly spread the flames along the street until the whole block was built up as a mass of flames. The little manual fire engine was entirely incapable of coping with the fierceness of the fire. One store or building after another caught, and so rapidly did it spread that practically nothing could be saved.

The buildings burned include Pillman's store, Jules Eggert, jewelry store, Kershaw's hardware store, McIntosh's bakery, Local drug store, Koolenay hotel, Vancouver hotel, Presbyterian church, Federal building with post office and telegraph office, Leland hotel, And many residences.

The federal block was a handsome three-storey building. The post office and telegraph office will probably locate in one of the vacant bank buildings which escaped the conflagration.

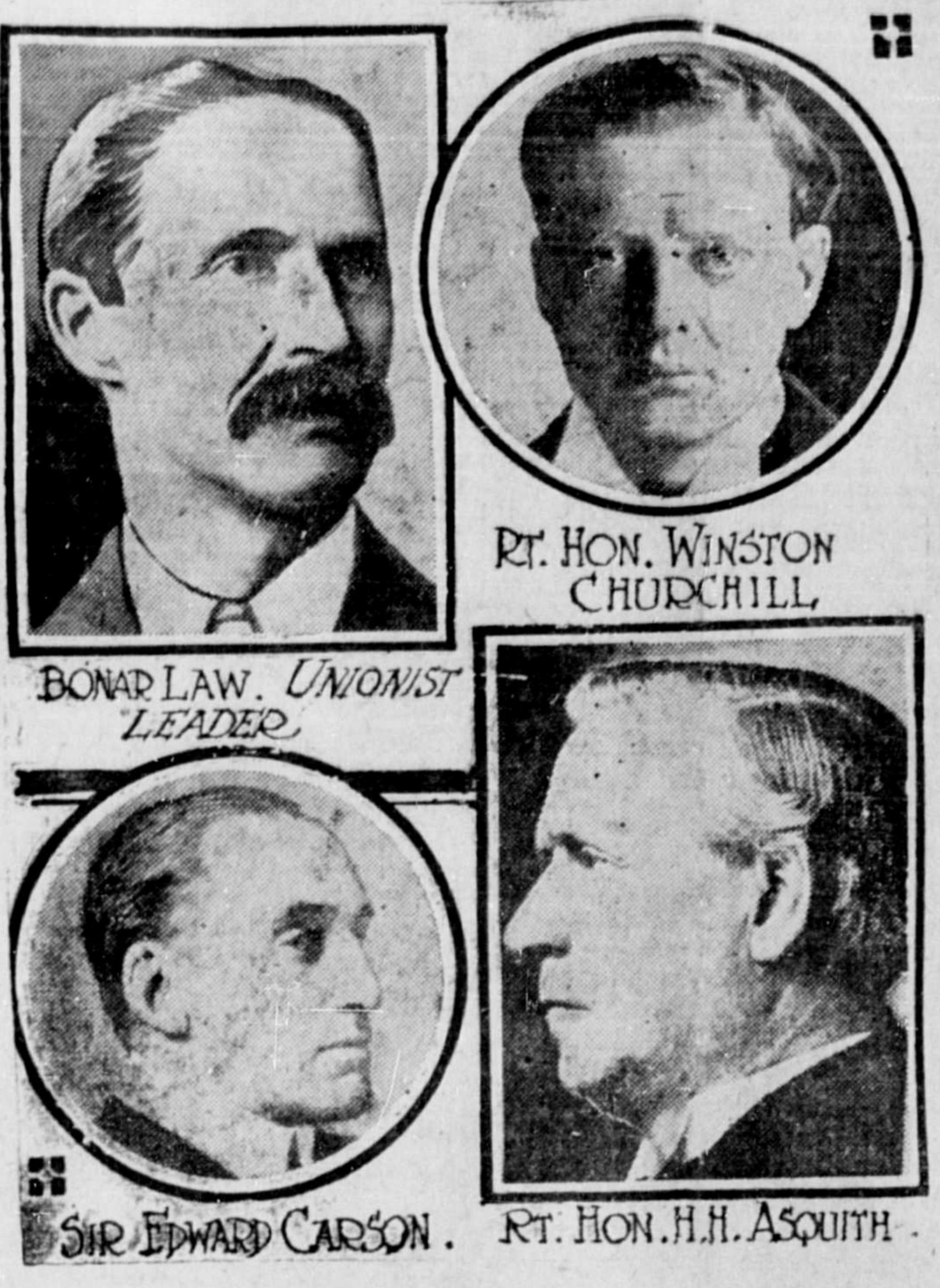

#### HOME RULE THIRD READING PASSES HOUSE LARGE MAJORITY

DEBATE ON QUESTION SUDDENLY STOPPED BY UNIONISTS ON GOVERNMENT REFUSING DETAILS OF PROPOSED AMENDMENT—BOTH IRISH FACTIONS ARE QUIET

London, May 25.—With the home rule bill expected to pass the third reading and become law within forty-eight hours, the eyes of England are turning to Ulster. Threats of civil war in Ireland before parliament sets at Dublin is engrossing the attention of the nation. With a crisis so close to hand in Ulster, it is proposed to assemble a provisional government and mobilize volunteers for resistance. Arms are distributed and plans completed for the calling out of the army at a moment's notice.

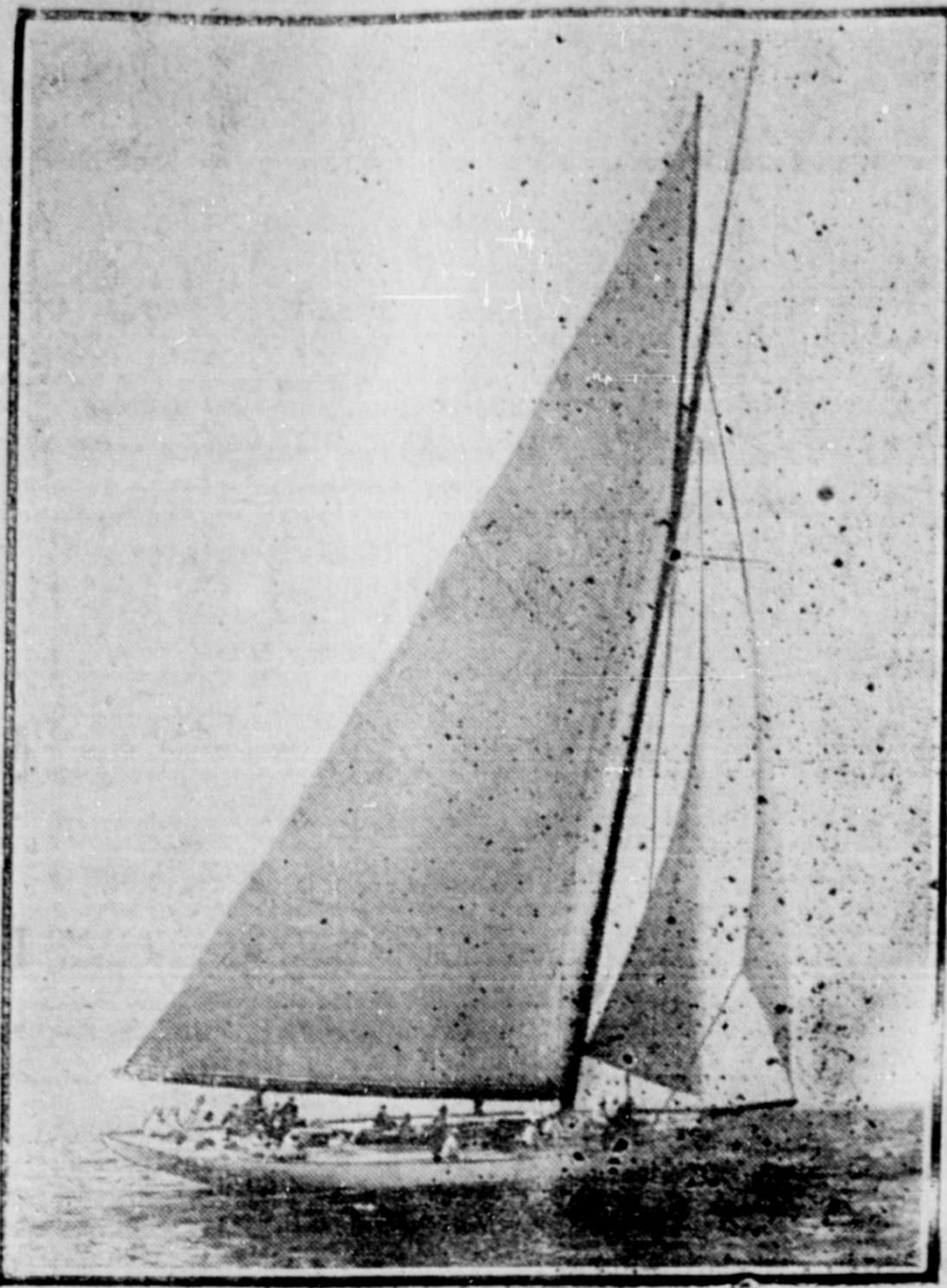
What is the matter with so many of the young women of our age? It surely cannot be that they have joined the ranks of the degenerate, and yet that is the very impression given to the casual observer. Extreme and ridiculous fashions, powder- and paint-daubed faces, and "loud-mouthed" behavior was formerly associated exclusively with the denizens of the underworld. Now, however, it is the craze among people who make a claim at respectability.

The world is always too free to accept people at their "face value" and if those people wish to be classed among the undesirable they are certainly taking the right way about it. The question, however, is a serious one for the nation, and if those concerned cannot secure a reform it may be necessary for "higher-up" influence to be brought to bear.

On May 1, 3,380 hogs were sent from Calgary to the United States in a single shipment. Altogether the twenty-six cars of hogs represented a value of slightly more than \$50,000 which went into the pockets of the Alberta stock raisers. Moreover, while this shipment was the largest ever made from Alberta, many other thousands of hogs in smaller lots have been shipped across the line from that province, as well as from other provinces, within the past few months. This condition of affairs bringing increased profits to the farmers of Alberta,

and adding to the prosperity of the province, also providing purchasing power for the manufacturers of the East, is the direct result of the removal of the American duty on hogs under the Wilson-Underwood tariff. It provides one more proof of the market for Canadian produce which exists in the United States and of the benefit which flows to the Canadian people from wider markets.

Another piece of evidence as to the value of the American market to Canadians was supplied in the Commons a few days ago by a New Brunswick Liberal who spoke of the export of fish to the United States since the removal of the duty formerly levied by the Washington government. From a single New Brunswick county in the month of February there were shipped to the American market no less than 382 tons of smelts. Under the former United States tariff a duty of \$15 per ton was collected and the profits of the Canadian fishermen were consequently decreased on every shipment across the border. As a result of the removal of the duty the fishermen in this one New Brunswick county gained increased sales and increased profits amounting to thousands of dollars. Why shouldn't wheat and other products be allowed the privilege of this wider market? This is a question the Conservatives will be forced to answer one of these days.

**Napoleon on Power.**

The following words are attributed to Napoleon by the "Strijdkreet," or "War Cry," a Dutch daily paper published by the Salvation Army of Holland: "You speak," he said, "of Caesar, of Alexander, of their conquests, of the enthusiasm they awakened in the hearts of their soldiers; but do you know of one man who made conquests without personal leadership, with an army true to him and to his memory alone? Alexander, Caesar, and I have founded empires. But what was the foundation for the creations of our genius? Violence. Only Jesus founded his empire on love, and even now many millions would be found ready to fight for Him. I have been able to inspire hosts to such a degree that they were willing to fight for me, but my presence was indispensable—the light of my eyes, my voice, my word, kindled their hearts, but now that I am at St. Helena, alone and chained to this rock, who will fight and conquer empires for me? What an abyss between my utter abandonment and the eternal reign of Christ, who is loved, praised and adored and whose kingdom extends over the whole earth."

**English Engineer Honored.**

New York, May 16.—Sir William Wilcox, K.C., M.G., celebrated English engineer, constructor of the famous Assouan dam on the Nile, and discoverer of the original Garden of Eden, was the guest of honor at a luncheon tendered him yesterday by the Pilgrims of the U.S. at the White Hall Club.

**ELOPED WITH STENOGR. AND BANK'S MONEY**

Montreal, May 22.—No clue has been found yet to the whereabouts of Vassal Delmage, a collection clerk of the Merchants bank, charged with embezzling the funds of the bank, or the young stenographer with whom, it is alleged, he fled. Delmage's wife and aged mother refused tonight to discuss his disappearance. Bank officers say they cannot tell yet how much he is short in his accounts, though it is probably not more than a few thousand dollars.

Suspicion is said to have fallen on him two weeks ago and an investigation was started. Evidently he became aware of this for he left hurriedly ten days since, taking with him, it is alleged, besides the stenographer \$1,000. Delmage, who has been with the bank sixteen years, is said to have been speculating in stocks, and also to have been lavishing gifts on the girl.

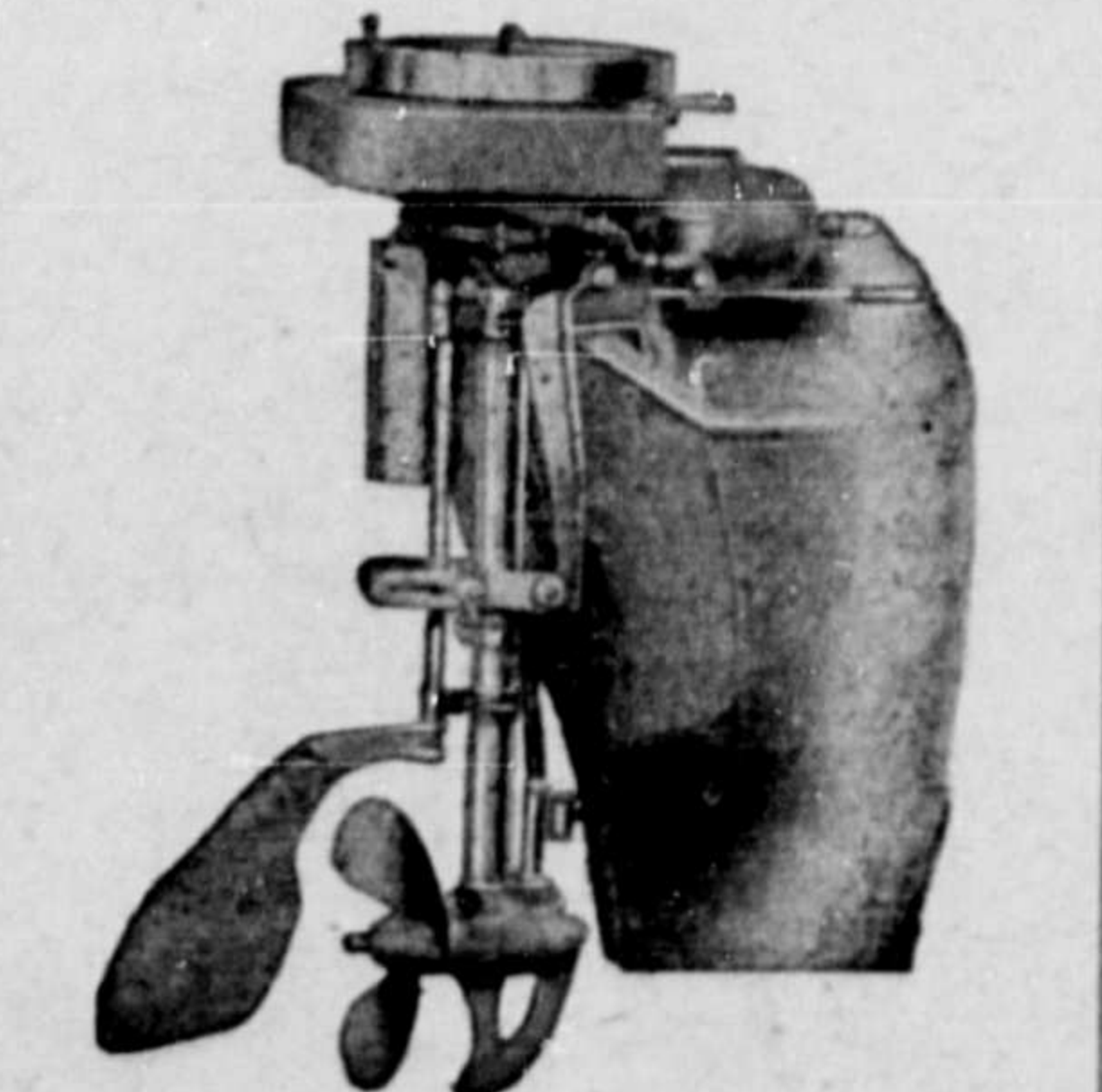

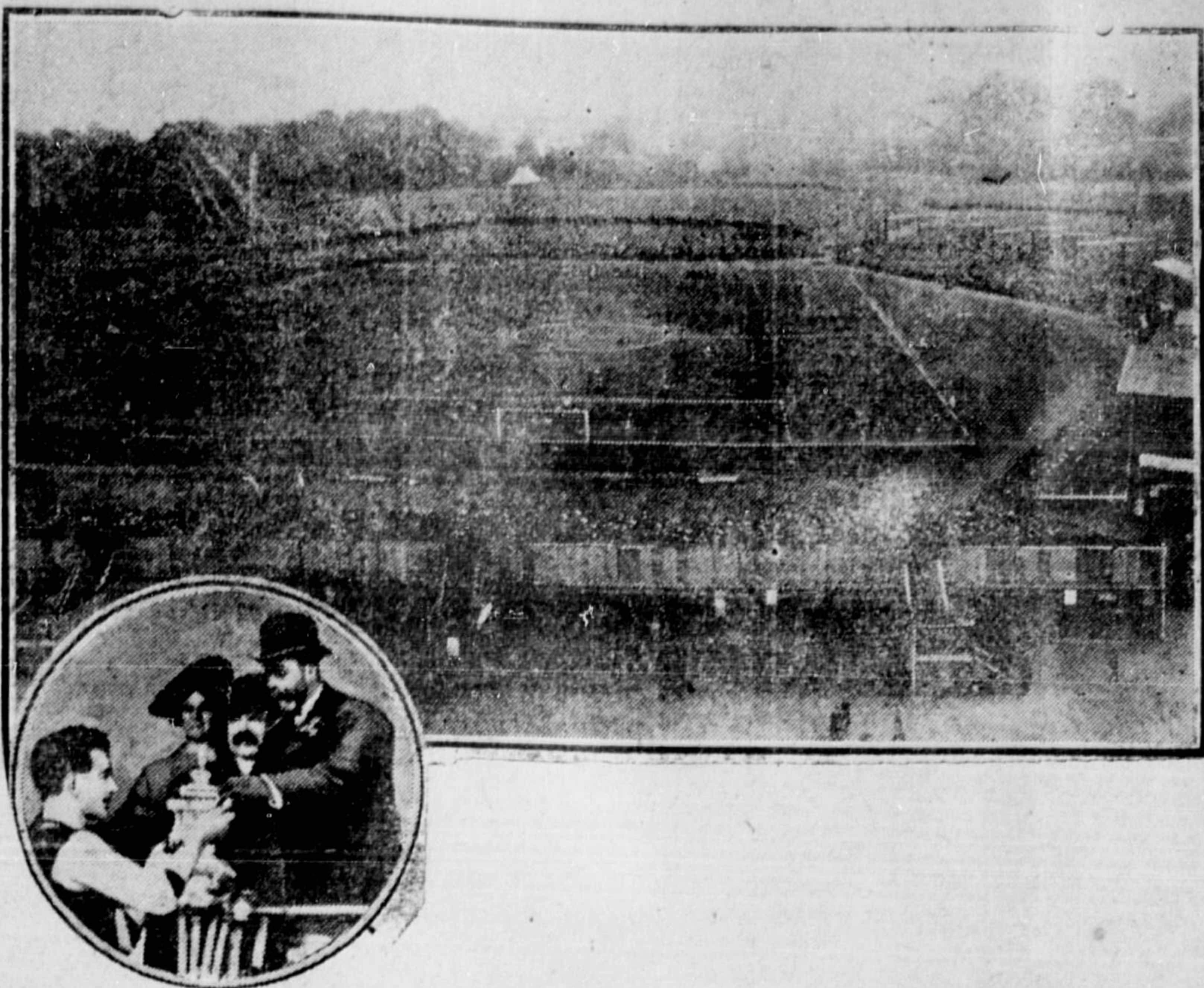

### ITALIAN VOLCANOS EXTREMELY ACTIVE

Naples, May 16.—Mount Vesuvius again is active. Last night a big column of vapor and tongues of flame were seen coming out of the crater. Earthquake shocks continue with alarming frequency. A number of the houses weakened by previous shocks have fallen. Fortunately, however, there have been no fatalities, as the populace of the city and countryside is camped in the open.

#### On Credit of the King

London, May 24.—Queen Mary has come to the assistance of her brother in making his arrangements to go to Canada as Governor-General. The Princess Alexander of Teck needs \$10,000 for her wardrobe and the Prince about \$5000 for his uniforms and state robes. The gowns and uniforms are to be obtained on the credit of King George. The Prince has arranged to pay for them in instalments extending over two years.

### RAIDED CARD GAME TWO MEN ARE DEAD

#### Bandits Open Fire in Saloon and A Rain of Bullets Follows

San Francisco, May 25.—With drawn revolvers two masked men entered a roadhouse on the southern outskirts of the city early today where eight men were playing "Klondike," a card game. A general shooting that followed cost the lives of a player and one of the bandits. The other bandit was probably fatally wounded, and another of the players received a superficial wound in the neck.

The dead—David Williams and James Baily.

The wounded—Edward Donovan and Eugene Galatoire.

Baily and Donovan, the highwaymen, rushed up to Con Regan, one of the players, crying: "We want you," and began firing. Regan tumbled out of his chair quickly enough to escape the bullets.

Williams, who was dealing the game, tried to interfere, and was shot through the head. The other players scrambled to cover.

William Markt, the proprietor of the house, who was behind the bar, picked up a pistol and began shooting. The bandits turned their weapons on him and one of the shots struck Galatoire in the neck.

Having emptied their pistols, the intruders fled, pursued by a rain of bullets from Markt's revolver. They ran up the street and Donovan boarded a street car. Baily was found dead by a crowd that had taken up the chase.

As Donovan entered the car he cried: "I have been shot." He was taken to a hospital, where bullet wounds were found in his neck and chest. His condition is critical.

The regular monthly meeting of the Ladies' Aid of the Presbyterian church will be held in the church hall tomorrow at three o'clock. An election of officers will take place.

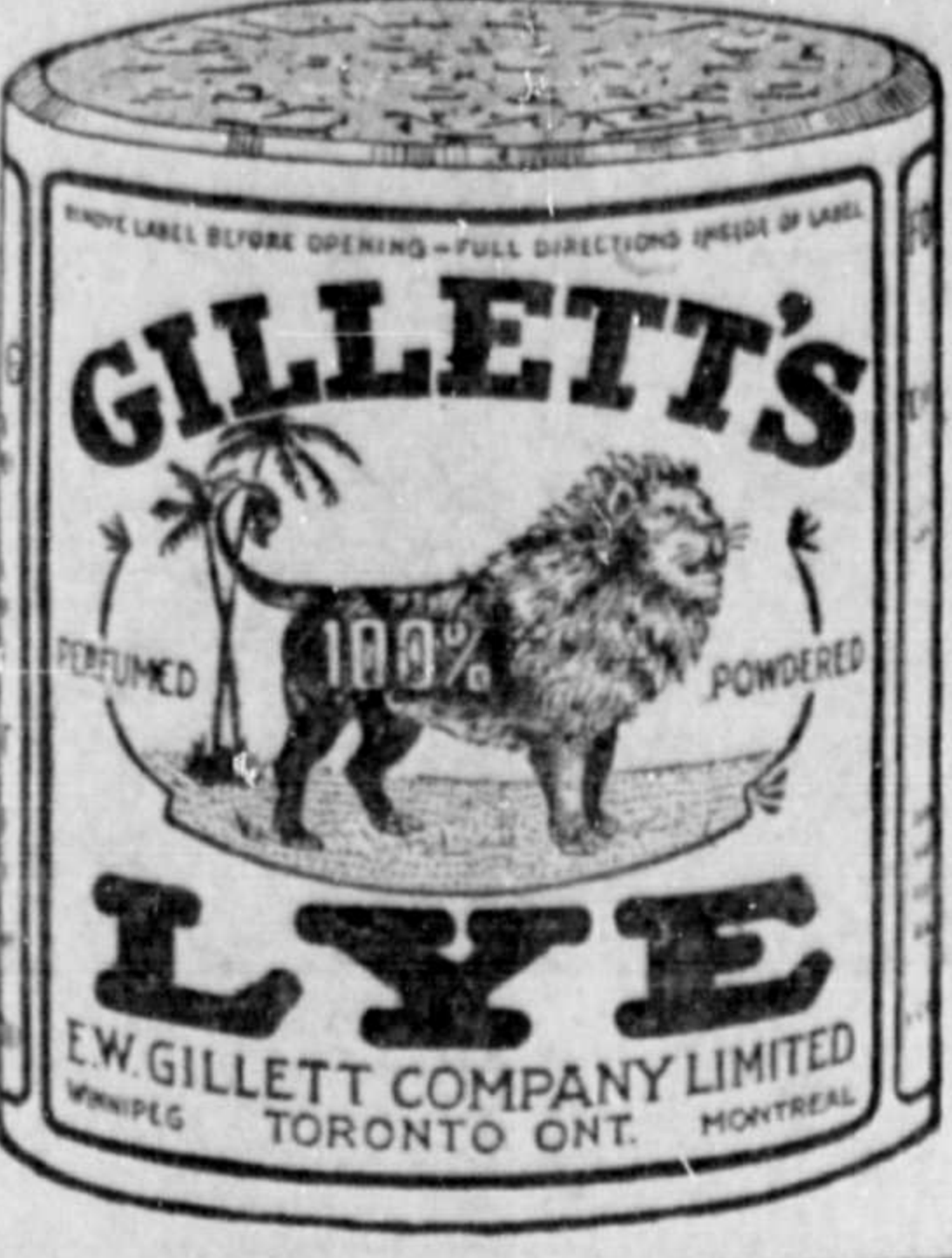
