ANOTHER MARINE MYSTERY AFLOAT

Captain of Fishing Boat Sights Mysterious Ship in Hecate Straits

Captain James Batt of the fishing schooner Reef, which came into port with a poor catch of fish, owing to rough weather outside, reports sighting a vessel off Dundas island that acted in a strange manner. The captain has suspicions that it is another Japanese mystery ship similar to the two which came to this coast last year.

The vessel was sighted by Captain Batt off Dundas island on Sunday. She was a schooner with two masts and proved also to have auxiliary power. The vessel was one of about three or four hundred tons, he would judge, although he never got closer than about two miles from it. The local captain's attention was attracted to the suspicious looking craft and he came to the conclusion that she was perhaps in distress. No flag was flying from her. She was under shelter of the island. Captain Batt, thinking that help might be needed, proceeded in the direction of the craft, only to find that his manoeuvres were apparently watched and the mystery ship herself was retreating before him. She made in the direction of Bonilla island.

Captain Batt, finding that the strange ship was not in distress, did not pursue her. He is suspicious that she was a Japanese craft.

Will Build Frame Hotel

Frank Clapp has had plans out for a three-storey concrete building to be used for an hotel which he contemplated erecting on Third avenue near The Daily News office. The structure was neat and substantial, but contained only thirty-five bedrooms. As a result of the decision of the city council to compel the new licensed hotels to have sixty bedrooms, Mr. Clapp says he will change his plans and substitute a frame building with sixty bedrooms. Mr. Clapp admits that such a building would add to the fire hazard of the business section, but it is the only kind of structure that can be put up under present conditions to meet the requirements of the city council.

Court of Revision Today

The court of revision on the city assessment roll is in session today in the city council chamber. The mayor is presiding, with Ald. Dybbavn, Basso-Bert, Morrissey and McClymont as the court. One of the first appeals taken up was the assessment of a corner on First avenue owned by Joe Rosseau. The assessment was reduced from \$17,000 to \$15,000. The Bank of Montreal corner assessment was sustained at \$93,000.

TO DRILL FOR OIL

Revelstoke Syndicate Will Undertake Development

Revelstoke, May 27.—Revelstoke is much excited over the prospect of the creation of an oil well close to the city. Ten miles of oil-bearing land have been staked by R. Smith and W. Pouppore on behalf of a Revelstoke syndicate consisting of S. Kilpatrick, J. M. McKay, Dr. W. H. Sutherland, G. S. McCarter, W. A. Anstie, G. R. Lawrence, Dr. J. H. Hamilton, R. Smith and A. Pouppore. The land consists of six square miles on the Columbia at Arrowhead, and four miles across the Arrow lake at Galena bay. It is the intention of the syndicate to install drilling machinery at the earliest possible moment. There are strong indications that the district contains a large oil deposit and reports from experts are that there is a strong probability that oil will be discovered at no great depth.

Government Sends Literature

A substantial shipment of government literature in the shape of 2,600 folders on British Columbia has been received by the board of trade, together with booklets covering the Peace river land recording division and the south fork of the Fraser river. Many enquiries are being made for pre-emptions in these sections. The new secretary of the bureau of provincial information, Ernest McGaffey, is keeping the local bureau well supplied with government literature.

New Naturalization Act

Hon. C. J. Doherty, in moving the second reading of the bill respecting British nationality in the house of commons, outlined the chief difference between the old and the proposed new law.

The existing law requires a residence of three years, while under the present bill the period is fixed at five years. This five-year period, however, need not be passed by the applicant in that particular portion of the empire wherein he is seeking naturalization, but only twelve months of the period. The other four years may have been passed in any part of the empire, provided this period has been within the last eight years.

The bill also provides that before an alien can be naturalized, he must have an adequate knowledge of either French or English. Another feature of the bill is that distinctions which have hitherto been made between naturalized and natural-born British subjects have been done away with. In future they will be placed upon the same footing. Certificates of naturalization will be issued under the joint authority of the imperial parliament and the parliaments of all overseas dominions which adopt this legislation, thereby providing for uniform naturalization throughout the empire.

According to the press despatches from Niagara Falls the peace mediators have reached a basis of settlement of the Mexican turmoil; which they hope will prove practical and bring about permanent peace for that unfortunate country which has so long been devastated by the brutal tactics of wicked politics and the greed for wealth.

If the mediators are successful it will prove that President Wilson has been able to accomplish by diplomacy what others have been unable to do by either war or diplomatic negotiations. It will rank him as one of the world's diplomats.

During his brief term of office President Wilson has already shown himself to be a statesman more than a politician. He has been above party popularity and without the United States at least he is looked upon as the biggest man who has occupied the presidency in many years. He has done much to cement the good feeling between the Anglo-Saxon races and he has shunned the trickery which has for generations been the slogan of United States international negotiations. Within his own country he has put through legislation which previous presidents talked of but were unable to accomplish. He has made the United States greater in the eyes of the world.

The city council voted

\$1,200 for a market building shack with a reckless abandon which would give the property owners the impression that the city has money to burn. The purpose of the market building, according to the aldermen supporting it, is to bring the producer and buyer together and cut out the middleman's profits. In theory it is pleasant and plausible, but in practice it will probably prove a failure. Even if the quantity and variety of produce necessary to make a market a success in available in the district, the present shipping facilities make it impossible to keep a fresh stock on hand. Moreover, in these days of telephones and quick delivery, few housekeepers buy in quantity or carry bulk purchases home. The purpose of the building is probably to find some one a job. Later it will be turned into a city junk house.

In the meantime the city will spend \$1,200 on a fad, while the business men of the city have to dig into their pockets to provide funds to answer enquiries sent to the city from persons who contemplate settling in the district or opening business houses or industries within the city. The city council seems to have thousands to squander for fads but not a dollar for publicity.

One of the useful purposes of the Board of Trade and its mineral exhibition is apparent

in the way the mining men of the district interest themselves in the work and make the offices their headquarters. At the present time the Dominion commissioner for collecting exhibits of British Columbia natural resources for exhibition at San Francisco is quartered there. Through the aid of the commissioner he will be able to pick up a collection of samples which will show to the whole world the wonderful resources of this new country now open to civilization. This work certainly deserves public support.

BABINE LOOMS UP ON THE HORIZON

Vast Territory Ready to Present its Wealth to the Pioneer and Courageous Capitalist

(Omineca Herald.)

H. L. Gibbs of the Dominion hatcheries at Babine arrived in town Thursday morning after the season's work. He is now on his way out for the summer, returning about the end of August to be at the hatchery for the next spawning season.

The past season was one of the best Mr. Gibbs has seen. They had 8,500,000 spawn and the outlook is very promising for the salmon industry.

Mr. Gibbs is quite enthusiastic over the Babine country. It is a very big territory and possesses all those sources of wealth which go to make up a prosperous country, such as timber, mineral, agricultural land and fish and hunting. He does not claim that the forests will compete in the markets of the world, but there is a good supply for home consumption and when the development of that country is undertaken all the timber will be required.

In the mineral deposits alone there is a big future before the country. There are native silver deposits, galena and copper of the most promising prospects. Like all northern British Columbia, development has been retarded by the lack of transportation. What work has been accomplished at enormous expense has been justified by results. With the completion of the G. T. P. and a wagon road from Decker lake over a level twelve miles to Babine lake that immense coun-

try will then be in touch with the commercial world.

Babine lake is a beautiful sheet of water a hundred and ten miles long by several miles wide. It is navigable for good sized boats. It is full of excellent fish and surrounded by farm lands and mining properties. It is an ideal new country and is at the present time attracting much attention from capitalists.

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SCHOOL BOARD FOUND GUILTY OF MAKING SUFFRAGETTES

QUESTION OF LADY TEACHERS' SALARIES DISCUSSED—UNFAIRNESS OF LOWER STANDARD THAN MEN URGED—SHOULD BE PAID ACCORDING TO ABILITY

Editor The Daily News.

Dear Sir: In the Saturday papers I notice a report of a meeting of the school board at which a salary schedule was adopted which appears to me to be manifestly unfair in its discrimination between male and female teachers. According to the report, in every case a lady teacher receives \$25 less per month than a man teacher of the same grade.

Why? I have heard the matter argued in the past, but I have never heard a logical reason for such discrimination.

It seems that the one test should be efficiency. If it be the case that men are recognized to be always more efficient than women, it seems rather foolish to make sex rather than ability the standard. If the man is higher paid because he is more able, one reason would answer as well as the other, and the efficiency standard rather than the sex standard would be the better sounding reason.

However, all this is granting that men are invariably better teachers than women, which does not appear to me to be true.

There is just ground for argument as to the respective values of men and women as teachers in the upper grades, and particularly in the High school. My own belief is that the ideal plan is separate session rooms for boys and girls in charge of teachers of their own sex with recitations in mixed classes before teachers of both sexes. This is because neither sex appears to me to possess any superiority over the other merely because of sex, but each has some qualities, lacking in the other which are need to make a perfect school influence. But, after all, the influence of a school on character is the most important part of its work.

In the lower grades it seems to me there is no ground whatever for argument. Even here I grant there are some men who are more successful than some women, but they are the exceptions who prove the rule. As a class, women can manage the younger children with less friction than men are able to do. Even the instruction of the lower grades is better given by women. It seems to me quite on a par

with saying that fathers are better fitted to raise a family of little children alone than mothers to say that men are better fitted to teach classes of little children than women. Both are true in isolated cases, but they are very rare.

My conclusion as to the relative efficiency of men and women as teachers are based on rather close observation for many years and in many places, as well as on mere theory.

The reason for paying male teachers more than female is sometimes given as being that men take up teaching as a profession by which they must support themselves and later their families for a lifetime, while for women it is only a graduation and marriage. The difficulty of a general application of this theory is immediately apparent, but, were it true, I doubt if men would care to see it generally applied. It would mean that salaries, not only teachers', but all salaries, must be graded according to the need of the recipient rather than his ability. Not only should a man receive more than a woman, but a married man more than a single one, and a man with four children more than one with two, and so on indefinitely. It reduces the whole system to a sort of charity. Besides this, we cannot insult the men by charging that they fear that the ladies' careless interval of teaching would stand the efficiency test

better than their serious practice of a profession.

In my own school life I can look back on a splendid body of women teachers in the grades who, beside what they taught us from books, nobly supplemented the efforts of our mothers in laying the foundation for strong characters. Later, in the Normal school, I learned to know what a wonderful thing a perfect gentleman can be and what a power for good is a woman whose "life" (not just an "interval") is devoted to helping others. There were others, both men and women, who were excellent, and others, both men and women, who were quite otherwise. Neither sex had a monopoly on success or failure. All those who succeeded so well we needed in our school. If there was no difference in their service there should have been no difference in their pay, and I am glad to say I believe there was none.

Again I come back to the same "why?" Only one possible explanation occurs to me. It must be that our school board are secretly in sympathy with the suffragettes and want to convert us. No reasoning would have the same force as this act of theirs and they must realize it. It seems rather an unfair advantage to take. I am not a suffragette and do not want to be one. No doubt others feel the same. Even in the face of all this some of us will resist the temptation to militancy, but if the members

of our school board find women chained to their door steps shrieking "Votes for women!" they will have to realize that it is a logical outcome of their act.

Recipe No. 11.—Cut out and paste in your Recipe Book.

Stone one package of dates, add a little water and then put on stove for about 15 minutes, add about half cup sugar. Roll dough thin and cut into rounds with a glass. Bake for about 15 minutes. Place date in centre.
