EMPRESS OF IRELAND RAMMED BY COLLIER SANK IN A FEW MINUTES

Another Marine Disaster With Terrible Loss of Life --- Steamers Collided in St. Lawrence River--Fog or Smoke Responsible -- 360 Passengers Picked Up by Collier --- 400 Landed at Rimouski---Capt. Found Floating on Driftwood

May 29.—The Canadian Pacific liner Empress of Ireland, with 1,200 passengers and crew, had a collision with the collier Storstad thirty miles east of Father Point in the St. Lawrence early this morning. The Empress sank after flashing wireless calls for help. The lifeboats are being picked up by the government mail tender Eureka.



Man From St. Pancras Looking for Election Campaign Matter in British Columbia

Vancouver, May 28 .- All the way from England, on a political mission as one of business, bent try. on the overthrow of "Fighting Joe" Martin, British Columbia's Liberal, who represents East St. Pancras in the British parliament, J. W. Biggs, a wealthy dry goods manufacturer of London, is at the Hotel Vancouver. He has been there for several days and said last night that he is digging up facts and figures with relation to Mr. Martin' history in this city, and purposes using it against him in the next election in East St. Pancras where the Unionists have put up against Mr. Martin, J. W. Hopkins, a man in whom the Union-I ists have the utmost confidence and a man- of undoubted character and generally popular with every class. Mr. Biggs admitted his intentions last night.

"I thought that while I was here I could get a lot of information about Mr. Martin. He is for taking the land and giving it back to the people. It seems odd in him making such a statement when he made his money out of land speculation. I have not heard in my investigations where he has given back any of the land he owns."

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
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
