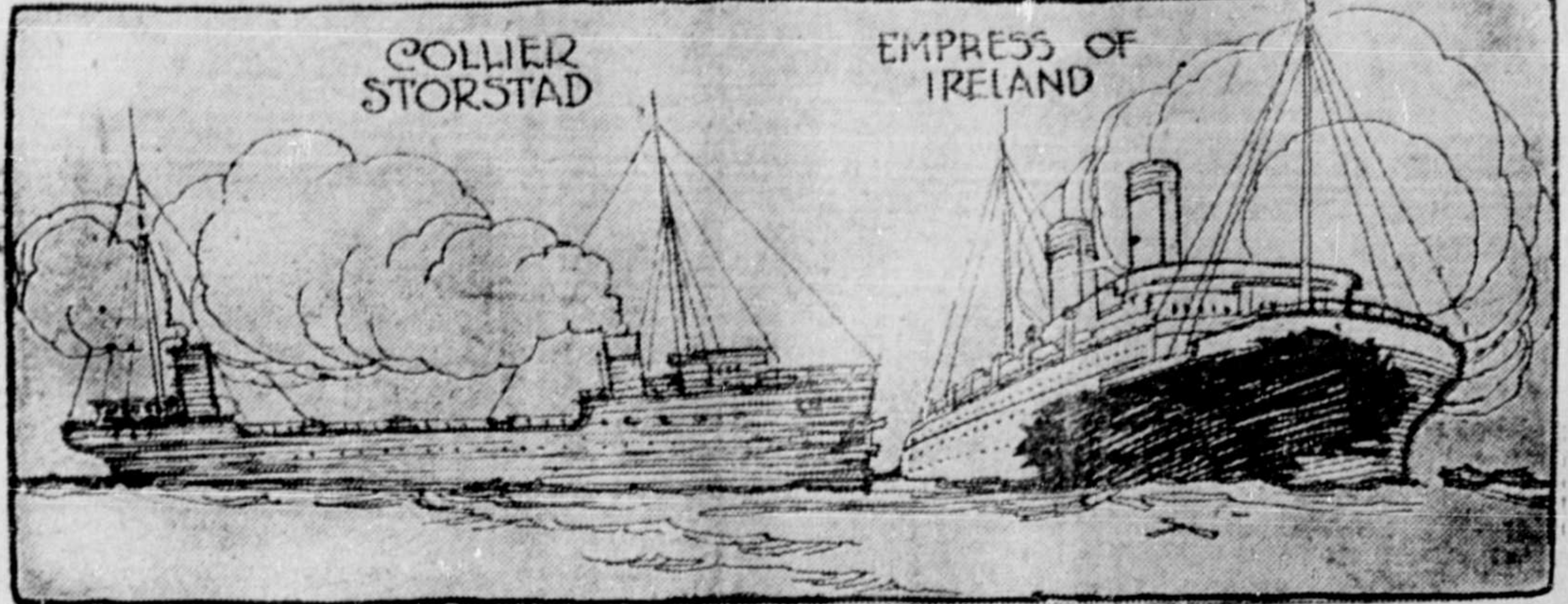

CAPTAIN DONALD OF THE G.T.P. GETS AWARD FOR BRAVERY

MINISTER OF MARINE AWARDS GOLD WATCH SUITABLY INSCRIBED IN RECOGNITION OF RESCUE OF PASSENGERS OF GASOLINE LAUNCH OFF B.C. COAST

Ottawa, June 9.—A signal act of bravery in the rescue of a shipwrecked crew is credited to Captain Donald of the G. T. P. in a report made to the Department of Marine and Fisheries, in recognition of which the Minister has awarded a suitable testimonial to the Captain. Last year a gasoline boat containing 38 passengers was swamped on the northwest B. C. coast. Although the weather was severe and a high sea running, Capt. Donald of the s.s. Prince George ventured to go to the rescue and saved the crew and passengers of the launch. The Minister of Marine in recognition of this has awarded Captain Donald with a gold watch inscribed with the record of his achievement.

The presentation is entrusted to the member for Comox-Atlin, H. S. Clements, who will make the presentation at a public meeting on his return to Prince Rupert.

RECOMMENDED CHANGE IN PLAN OF PAYMENTS

First Avenue Sewer Scheme Discussed in City Council Again

At last night's council meeting the finance committee recommended that all proceedings re the construction of the First and Third Avenue sewer as asked for by Messrs. Lynch and Besner be rescinded and that the work be carried out under the local improvement scheme with four year payments instead of one.

Ald. Montgomery wanted to know the whys and wherefores.

Ald. Morrissey explained that it was now possible to finance it by selling four year debentures, whereas when the application was first made it was thought impossible to do it. He said the property owners preferred the four year payments but that the committee did not care whether it passed or not.

Ald. Montgomery thought the committee did care. He hinted that they wanted this work to take up the debentures intended for Summit Avenue which is being abandoned. He believed the four year debentures with the discount and the interest was working a hardship on the property owners.

Ald. Dybbavn wanted to find out whether the property owners were agreeable.

The city solicitor pointed out that it would require a two third vote to carry the adoption of the report.

The question was allowed to stand over for one week.

The tide had gone out leaving the body aground. Beatty had been drinking and about two o'clock wandered into the electric light station on his way to the dry dock where the Albert had been tied up. He was then under the influence of liquor. Later he went out and evidently walked off the wharf, falling about 15 feet into the water.

An inquest will probably be held tomorrow.

WILD ANIMALS IN MOTION PICTURES AT WESTHOLME

Of all the wonders of modern moving pictures Paul Rainie's African hunt which will be shown at the Westholme Opera House on Wednesday and Thursday is emphatically the greatest and most wonderful. It is in a class by itself and has no competitors. Imagine two men perched in a huge tree in the heart of central Africa close to a water hole, where wild animals congregate daily in search of that precious necessity, water. There is no water visible in the water hole but the animals know that it is in there and can be found by scratching in the sand to the depth of twelve or fifteen inches. In this manner these wonderful pictures were obtained and they have produced a sensation wherever shown. Another feature on this program will be the linking up of the G. T. P., taken in the neighborhood of Fort Fraser by artists especially sent there for the purpose. These pictures are of special interest to all residents of Prince Rupert and vicinity.

CITY TRUCK EXPERT RECOMMENDED PACKARD

At the close of last evening's council meeting J. H. Rogers asked the mayor why the city had purchased a Packard auto truck for the scavenging department in preference to his offer of an English truck at a lower price.

Ald. Kerr—Yes, I remember your price was lower but the city officials recommended a new truck which was guaranteed.

The Mayor said the Packard car was recommended by someone in the city service who understood trucks as being a superior machine and it was on this recommendation that the purchase was made.

RAILWAY STEAMER ALLIANCE IS FIRST SHIP THROUGH CANAL

SUCCESSFUL TEST OF ELECTRIC LOCOMOTIVES HANDLING OCEAN LINER—TIME WAS ONE AND HALF HOURS EACH WAY

Panama, June 9.—The first passage through the Gatun locks by an ocean liner was successfully carried out today by the Panama Railroad steamer Alliance, 4000 tons.

The trip was made to test the working of the electric locomotives handling a large vessel. The time was one hour and a half each way.

WOULD CHANGE SITE NEW CIVIC BUILDING

Aldermen Have Another Idea on Place to Plant Telephone Central

Having inherited a site for the telephone central all excavated by last year's council and kept clean by Chief Vickers' boarders, some of this year's aldermen look upon it and are sad. They don't like second hand sites and if the electors are willing to let them erect a new telephone building they would put it on a site of their own choosing where it would stand as a monument to their sagacity, forethought and originality.

At last night's council meeting the mayor reported the plans of the new building ready.

Ald. Morrissey accepted the opportunity to say he and many electors did not approve of the site already excavated at the side of the city hall as there was a lot of rock back of it which could not be taken out once the building is erected. He favored a site on Fulton and Fifth.

Ald. Montgomery also favored a site on the opposite side of the street as it gave two streets to bring in the wires on.

Ald. Kerr said the plebiscite on changing the grade of Fifth Street would affect this question also.

The mayor said both questions would have to be submitted to the electors.

PUBLIC WORKS DEPT. GETS \$26,000 FOR TUG

Supplementary Estimates Include Number of Items for Comox-Atlin

The supplementary estimates for the Dominion include several votes in the public works department for the Comox-Atlin district.

Safety Cove, a settlement on Calvert Island, Queen Charlotte Sound, gets \$4,300 for a wharf. This has been very much needed for several years.

Spiller River gets \$1000 for repairs to wharf there. It is required for renewing of piles.

The sum of \$2200 is appropriated for some much needed repairs to the Stewart wharf.

The biggest item is \$26,000 for an inspection tug boat for the public works department. This tug will be capable of navigating the coast in all kinds of weather and will be able to tow material for department work. \$26,000 will build a big boat.

Another appropriation of some size is \$10,000 for improvements to navigation on the Stikine river. Dan Keen and a gang inspected this river last summer and reported on snags and barriers which required removing. The work will not start until late in the season when the water is low.

It is quite proper that crown lands held for public purposes should be exempt from municipal taxation. At the same time there are many reasons why crown lands held for speculative purposes should pay taxes just the same as the land of private individuals.

At the present time the provincial government is paying local improvement taxes on Prince Rupert property held by it but is paying no general tax on any of the government's holdings.

The provincial government holds a very large number of lots in Prince Rupert which it intends to sell. These lots have been receiving the benefit of the general taxes paid by other properties owned by private individuals ever since the town was incorporated. Why should not these government lots which are held spec-

ulatively pay taxes just the same as all other lots?

We have heard a great deal in the past about the government being the stewards of the people and consequently must handle the property it has in Rupert in the interest of the whole province. If we accept that logic why should Prince Rupert be expected to increase the value of their lands by taxing ourselves and let the land owned by the rest of the province go scot free. If the McBride Government were as much interested in the north as they are in the south this would never occur. They would either sell the land so that some one would pay the tax or they would hold the land for the whole province and make the whole province pay the tax. This discrimination "particularly in the north" is certainly not fair.

REV. H. R. GRANT
PREACHED GOOD SERMON

Rev. H. R. Grant, the pastor-elect, preached again Sunday in the Presbyterian church and gave two excellent sermons. Mr. Grant's personality is so intense that at first you think it is himself more than his sermons that are striking but Sunday he demonstrated that he is a great preacher as well. His morning text was "Rejoice Evermore" and from that he demonstrated that abiding happiness only came from within where God had implanted himself. Friends and prosperity may take wings and fly away and no life was safe without a permanent source of comfort. The only life worth while is the one that sends its roots down to the eternal and draws nourishment therefrom. A man's life could be a reservoir or a spring. A reservoir was only useful when it got its supply from without. A spring has its supply from within and was eternal.

In his evening sermon he dealt with character—the kind that would make Canada great. Every life should have a purpose in it. A man could be like a chip in the water that comes and goes with the tide, or a ship that leaves a port with a purpose and attains its desired haven. "Will you be a chip or a ship?" Mr. and Mrs. Grant left yesterday morning for Vancouver, and the Presbyterians are determined that they will not take "no" for an answer and expect them back permanently about the middle of July.

General News Notes

Rev. James Wallace after a pastorate of 11 years in the St. Andrew's church, Lindsay, has left to take up his appointment on the General Board of Missions in British Columbia.

While trying to board an automobile truck, Harold Brooks missed his step and the truck, weighing three tons, ran across both legs at Dover. No bones were broken and Brooks has resumed work.

Police Chief Hennion of Paris, France, has established a school for policemen, in which every recruit will take a three months course. The idea is to remove ground for charges of incapacity and advancement through favoritism.

The Supreme Court at Washington annulled the Interstate Commerce commission's order in the "Tap Line" case on the ground that it acted arbitrarily in holding that allowance should not be granted on freight of interest owning both the lumber and the Tap Line.

A grand and solemn reception will be given to His Grace, Archbishop Begin, elevated to the dignity of Cardinal at Rome, when he reaches Quebec from Harve, on June 23. Sir Francis Langellier, Lieutenant-Governor, will cablegram of congratulations.

With a thick beard reaching to the waist, a woman who possesses many masculine attributes was presented to the French Academy of Medicine at Paris.

As the result of fining the Canadian yacht Voyager \$100 for not showing her lights when nearing the American side of the 800, the question has been settled as to the jurisdiction of the United States over Canadian boats in American waters.

The German flag that has been hoisted below the Union

Jack in Victoria Park, Berlin, Ontario, for eighteen years, has been found cut down and torn.

Wm. Warner, an aeronaut, fell 1000 feet into Lake Erie and was drowned Sunday afternoon. He was giving an exhibition at Avon Beach Park, Toronto, and his bride was in the crowd which saw him fall when the parachute failed to work.

James Ebert, a farmer, of Campbell's Bay, Quebec, and his 12-year-old son are dead as the result of eating toadstools which they had mistaken for mushrooms. Several other members of the family are in a serious condition.

The Quebec Board of Trade have urged that when the \$12,000,000 is granted to the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway one of the conditions shall be that a freight rate be made of 10 cents a bushel for wheat from Winnipeg to Quebec.

N. Deconza, employment agent on a charge of having failed to keep his books and orders according to government regulations was fined \$20 in St. Catharines at the instance of the Inspector of Employment Agencies for Ontario, J. H. Mitchell. The magistrate said regulations should be printed in other languages besides English.

The British government acting contrary to the hopes of the parliamentary deputation which recently visited Premier Asquith has finally decided not to participate in the Panama-Pacific exposition, deciding to adhere to the original determination.

Francis Kossuth, 73, who took his father's place as leader of the Hungarians, died in Budapest during a crisis in his illness, he was married on his sick bed to Countess Benyorskys, widow of his life long friend at the latter's wish, expressed on his deathbed.

The first big stop of mackerel on the Nova Scotia coast this season took place last Monday at Cranberry Head, Byrns Point and Port Maitland. The haul amounted to over a hundred barrels.

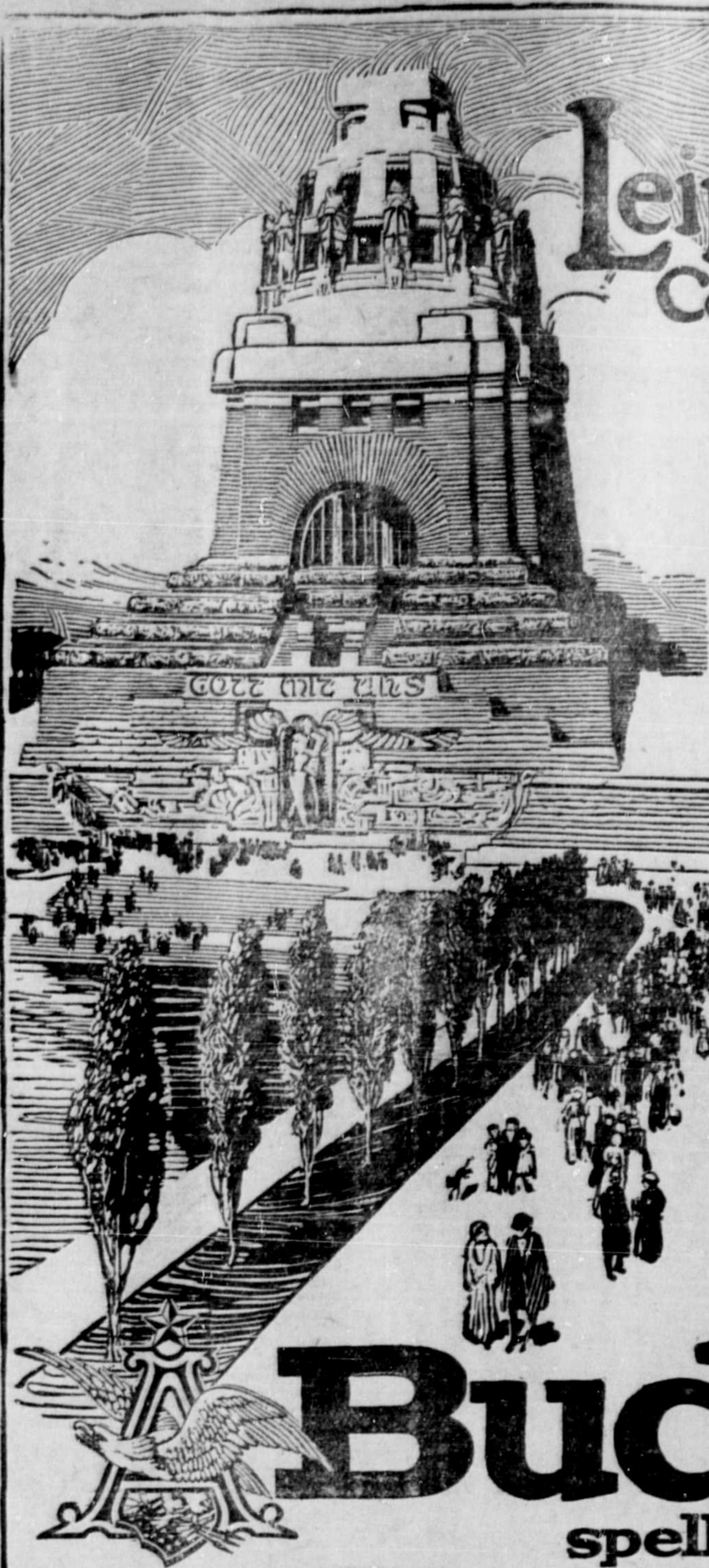

Leipzig Monument Commemorating the "Battle of Nations"

where, 100 years ago, allied Europe shattered the armies of the Great Napoleon. 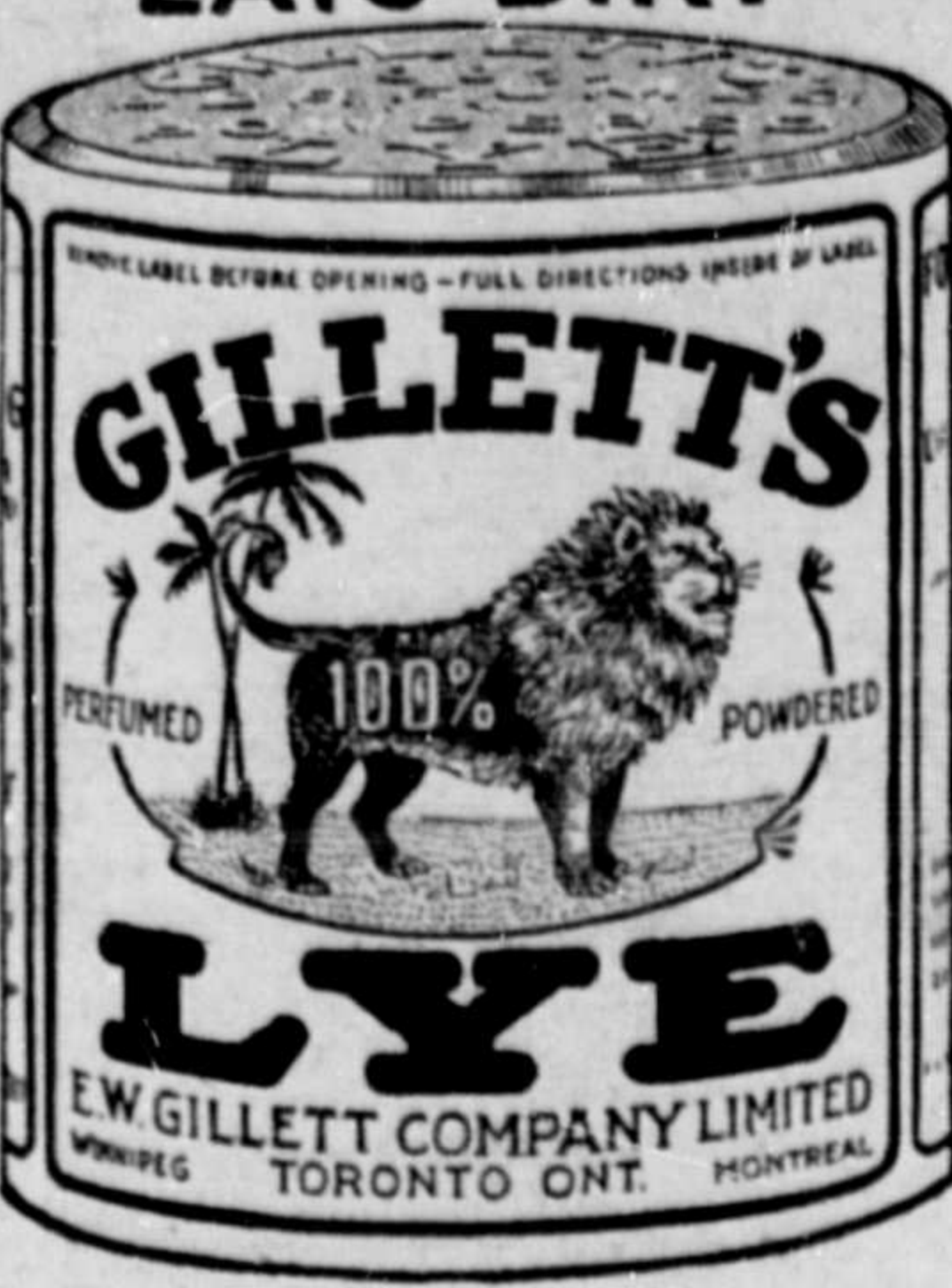
