

At the present time the provincial government is paying local improvement taxes on Prince Rupert property held by it but is paying no general tax on any of the govern-

ment's holdings. 'The provincial government holds a very large number of lots in Prince Rupert which it intends to sell. These lots have been receiving the benefit of the general taxes paid by other properties owned by private individuals ever since the town was incorporated. Why should not these government lots which are held spec-1


