In 1910-11, the last full fiscal year in which the late Liberal Government was responsible for the administration of Canadian affairs, the expenditure for militia purposes was \$7,099,822. This year, the Borden Government proposes to spend between \$14,000,000 and \$15,000,000 for military purposes. In the three years since it took office, the Government has practically doubled the expenditures of public money upon unproductive military enterprises.

Between 1896 and 1911, the Liberal Government expended a total of \$63,134,120 for militia purposes. The increase in the amount spent in 1911 as compared with the amount spent in 1896 was only \$4,531,-643, and this included the large amounts incurred through the Canadian Government taking over Halifax and Esquimalt and relieving the Mother Country of this expenditure. So far, the Borden Government has spent no less than \$28,-941,612 for military purposes, and has increased the annual outlay by about \$4,000,000, or not much less than the increase in the entire fifteen years of Liberal rule. For the present fiscal year, the Government proposes an expenditure of between \$14,000,000 and \$15,000,000. In days of decreasing revenue and falling trade in a country which is in no danger of attack and has no need of huge military expenditures, Premier Borden and his colleagues propose to squander this huge sum to satisfy the vanity and meet the military-mad ideas of Colonel Sam Hughes.


