

## WRECK ENQUIRY CAUSES SENSATION AT QUEBEC

MASON-NEWS LIBEL SUIT IN COURT TO-DAY -- SOCIALIST LEADER TALKS POLITICS IN RUPERT

### COMRADE J. PLACE, SOCIALIST, ADDRESSED RUPERT AUDIENCE

ROASTED CONSERVATIVE MEMBER FOR SKEENA—TOLD HIS STORY OF THE VANCOUVER ISLAND STRIKE—AUDIENCE APPLAUDED HIS COMMENTS

J. Place, M.P.P. for Nanaimo, and Socialist leader in the Province, addressed a public gathering in St. Andrew's hall last evening. There was a good crowd present including several ladies. All the seats were full and the speakers got a good hearing and considerable applause. Comrade Robertson, an officer of the Provincial organization, also gave an address on socialism and what it stands for. He was a good speaker, and his speech was very instructive. Ald. Wm. Montgomery was chairman of the meeting. Mr. Place, as is well known, was prominent in the public eye during the strike trouble on Vancouver Island. He was arrested for unlawful assembly and spent thirteen weeks in jail. He told the story of the trouble and said he was arrested for speaking at a gathering while Sheppard, the Conservative member, addressed the same gathering and was not arrested, but had his speech published in the papers. He talked of the miners' trouble at some length and also of the fight he had made in the Legislature for labor. He claimed the miners' strike was not due to foreign agitation as was said by some politicians. He offered to debate the miners' troubles with Wm. Manson any time upon a week's notice. In answer to questions, Mr. Place said the Nanaimo strike was still in existence. The Jingle Pot mine is the only one using union labor. The B. C. Federation have proposed a general strike of all labor organizations. Wm. Manson had never voted for the laboring man's interests since he had been in the House. The revision of the workingmen's compensation act is promised for next year. It will no doubt go through for the Conservatives want to use it for election purposes.

### CITY ENGINEER'S LIBEL SUIT AGAINST DAILY NEWS TODAY

EVIDENCE ALL IN AND COUNCIL COMPLETED ARGUMENT UP TO NOON ADJOURNMENT—WILL GO TO JURY EARLY THIS AFTERNOON

The case of W. McG. Mason vs. the Prince Rupert Publishing Company came up this morning. In selecting a jury both sides used all their challenges and the plaintiff also objected to a number of others on the ground that they were shareholders in the Prince Rupert Publishing Company. The jury finally selected were: W. R. Love, Alex. McRae, W. B. Blyth, R. A. Stalker (foreman), M. C. Mustard, Numa Deemers, W. J. Greer, Geo. P. McColl. Fred. Peters and Adair Cars for plaintiff; Williams and Manson for defendant. Adair Cars, in outlining the case to the jury, claimed the libel was an unsigned letter published in the Daily News which referred to the city engineer without having used his name. Mr. Mason was a municipal engineer with twenty years of clear, clean record behind him and any slur on his reputation even if refuted later is damaging to him. Ald. John Dybbavn gave evidence that McNeill was superintendent of city public works in 1912 and Col. Davis had been city engineer until 1912 when he ceased to act. The plaintiff was assistant city engineer in 1914 and became chief engineer in 1912. He believed the letter published referred to the city engineer. In cross examination he said M. J. McNeill had been discharged during Davis' regime. There was one month in 1912 when Mason was only acting city engineer. The campaign was largely on the question of installing a municipal plant. The plaintiff had advised in favor of the municipal plant. He had read the apology but did not feel it removed all the injury done by the previous article. If he was an outsider reading the article he would not say that it might have referred to the city superintendent of public works. John R. Mitchell had read the article and had heard the apology had been published. In his mind the city engineer's reputation had not been injured. W. McG. Mason, city engineer, is member of the Institute of Municipal Engineers of England; he had to have several years' experience before getting it. He gave

### COUNSEL ARGUED RITCHIE SEWER CASE

Judgment Reserved to Consider Point of Court's Jurisdiction on Reasons for Revoking Permit

The Ritchie-Prince Rupert City sewer case was completed yesterday afternoon, but judgment has been reserved. Mr. Ritchie sued for permanent injunction to prevent city from cutting off his private sewer. The defence offered no evidence but the documents put in and a copy of the permit issued to Ritchie. For the plaintiff, Mr. Patmore argued that the function of the City Council is to act for the whole community and not for an individual. The Council has no right under Clause 158 of the Municipal Act to close a sewer or drain except when it is a nuisance or dangerous to the public health. Having once permitted a drain or sewer they could not block it without providing another. This is common law in the Old Country. Mr. Peters for the City Council claimed Clause 158 did not apply in this case as it refers to a nuisance on private property, or a streets. This case applies to something on the city's own property, and the city is justified in making reasonable conditions in a permit over their own property. The person accepting the permit must take the burden with the benefit. The city has the power to revoke the permit. "Yes," admitted His Lordship, "but there must be a reason for revoking. Your City Council is not performing one of its most particular functions in not providing a sewer. The individual here is helping out the Council." Mr. Peters also submitted that the power to decide where the cause for revoking the permit is advisable and necessary. He held the court had no jurisdiction in this matter. The revocable clause means something. His Lordship said: "Yes it means something, but Mr. Patmore claims it means for reasons other than what apparently moved the City Council in this instance; that is, that Mr. Beveridge would not pay the price asked by Mr. Ritchie." His Lordship contended he was prepared to decide the case immediately, but for the argument that he had no jurisdiction on the question of whether the Council's reason is a proper one. Mr. Patmore contended, in rebuttal, that if the court is not a court of appeal a council could act arbitrarily and there would be no redress. Decision was reserved.

### C. P. R. EARNINGS SHOW SMALLER INCREASE

The traffic earnings of the Canadian Pacific Railway for the week ending June 7 are \$2,171,000 a decrease of \$456,000 from the earnings for the same week last year, which were \$2,627,000. For the last week in May the earnings first showed a decrease of \$806,000 from the earnings for the same period a year ago. The decrease for the first week in June, therefore, is a little more than half of that for the preceding week, which was the heaviest decrease of the year.

### NORWAY'S ARMY AND NAVY NOW "DRY"

Christiania, Norway, June 19. The Norwegian Parliament today adopted a resolution prohibiting the consumption of intoxicating liquors by officers of the Norwegian army and navy during their terms of service. The enlisted men were already enforced abstainers, and the officers' messes on the warships and in the garrisons are now to be made "dry."

### SENSATIONAL EVIDENCE OF QUARTERMASTER DISCREDITED

WRECK ENQUIRY AT QUEBEC IS NOW BRINGING OUT MANY THRILLS OF INTEREST—OFFICERS CONTRADICT GALWAY

(Special to The Daily News) Quebec, June 19.—According to the assertions of James Galway, quartermaster, at the enquiry into the wreck, the Empress of Ireland would not steer well. He said the wheel was jammed only a few hours before the collision. She swerved badly in the river and the crew of the steamer Alden could verify his statements. A denial of these claims by responsible officers of the lost steamer made this session of the enquiry one of quickly changing interest from start to finish. Lord Mersey did not attach much importance to Galway's evidence. A number of questions seemed to indicate that the current of the St. Lawrence was responsible for the Empress' misbehavior. Evidence was given to rebut Galway's theory, also a suggestion was made earlier in the day that the C. P. R. tried to get him to leave the country before testifying. John Murphy, the quartermaster who relieved Galway, contradicted the statement of Galway that he had warned Murphy that the ship was steering badly. Alderd Berlier, pilot in charge when the jamming was said to have occurred, several Empress officers, Robert H. Brennan, and Robert Liddell of the engineering staff of the Empress, corroborated Capt. Kendall's statement that after leaving Father Point the ship was ordered full speed ahead, stop, full speed astern, and then stop.

### REV. DR. GRANT ACCEPTS OFFICE

Special Committee Recommended Against Accepting His Resignation

Woodstock, June 19.—The Board of Home Missions, through the special committee appointed to consider the resignation of Rev. Dr. A. S. Grant, this afternoon recommended that the resignation be not accepted. Rev. Dr. Grant in defending the position he had taken said: "I told the Assembly years ago that I would give the work a fair try and I think I have done so. I do not feel that I am bound to give this assembly or any other a reason. I want very proudly to say that I have no reason to give, but rather a combination of circumstances. Because of the tremendous demands being made on the Church at the present time I do not feel that I can remain in the storm." Dr. Grant asserted that he didn't feel the call of the Master to remain in the work, and while he admitted the call of the church might be the call of Christ, he did not feel that it was in his case. "I was hoping," said the speaker, "that we might pause and get our house in order. I feel that I can easily retire at the present time without causing any injury. You may think that there is a nigger in the fence," he continued, "but I tell you frankly there is not." Rev. Dr. A. S. Grant has accepted the office of general secretary of the Amalgamated Board of Home Missions and Social Service. With him will be associated Rev. Dr. Shearer, of Toronto.

### Local Wrestler Won Decision

P. Sigurdson, the local wrestler, was given the decision last night in the wrestling match at the Westholme Theatre. Hatch, the middleweight champion of Canada, had the misfortune to have his shoulder put out during the progress of the match and had to withdraw from the contest. Sigurdson then being pronounced the victor. There was no fall secured by either of the contestants. They had been 24 minutes 45 seconds on the mat when Hatch felt forced to give in owing to his disabled shoulder.

In 1910-11, the last full fiscal year in which the late Liberal Government was responsible for the administration of Canadian affairs, the expenditure for militia purposes was \$7,099,822. This year, the Borden Government proposes to spend between \$14,000,000 and \$15,000,000 for military purposes. In the three years since it took office, the Government has practically doubled the expenditures of public money upon unproductive military enterprises.

Between 1896 and 1911, the Liberal Government expended a total of \$63,134,120 for militia purposes. The increase in the amount spent in 1911 as compared with the amount spent in 1896 was only \$4,531,643, and this included the large amounts incurred through the Canadian Government taking over Halifax and Esquimalt and relieving the Mother Country of this expenditure. So far, the Borden Government has spent no less than \$28,941,612 for military purposes, and has increased the annual outlay by about \$4,000,000, or not much less than the increase in the entire fifteen years of Liberal rule. For the present fiscal year, the Government proposes an expenditure of between \$14,000,000 and \$15,000,000. In days of decreasing revenue and falling trade in a country which is in no danger of attack and has no need of huge military expenditures, Premier Borden and his colleagues propose to squander this huge sum to satisfy the vanity and meet the military-mad ideas of Colonel Sam Hughes.

Conservative speakers and Conservative newspapers make

much of the fact that the Borden Government proposes to give \$4,000,000 annually for a period of ten years for the assistance of agriculture. So far as it goes, the Government's action deserves commendation though it fails to go nearly far enough. But at the same time that the Government in 1896 was only \$4,531,643 for agriculture it is giving many times that amount to military purposes and to the endeavor to foster the military spirit in Canada. This year, for example, one million dollars are to be spent for agriculture and almost fifteen times one million for military uses—\$1,000,000 for the farmers; \$15,000,000 for militarism.

There must be something mysterious about financing according to the action of the city fathers.

Yesterday the Council held a secret session and as heretofore throughout the year all information regarding the financing of the city's debentures is being kept in the dark. The public would like to know how much actual cash the city has received from the last sale of treasury notes through the Bank of Montreal. They also want details of the bank's and other charges in connection therewith.

Why have the Council withheld information as to offers which they have received on the permanent issues and how do they propose to retire the treasury notes to the amount of close upon a million and a half dollars which mature next year?

There are persistent rumors afloat that the bank is pressing the Council into pursuing a

much against the advantage of the city though doubtless it will put a neat sum into the coffers of the bank.

Every dollar lost at this time means nearly twelve dollars during the life-time of the long term issues. What is the Council doing and why is it keeping the people in the dark?

If the members of the Council responsible are too ill informed to withstand the importunities of the bank, they ought to resign. On the other hand if the Council is going deliberately into a course of action which will involve the city in immense loss, strenuous action will have to be taken by the citizens.

## THE ATTITUDE OF COL. SAM HUGHES

The Remarkable Position of the Borden Minister of Militia—A Liberal Member's View

"You could clip from \$3,000,000 to \$5,000,000 off the militia expenditure without decreasing the efficiency of the militia. Of course, you cannot allow all these joy rides and trips; you cannot allow all these inspection trips in private cars; you cannot allow these large entourage to go all through Europe, it is true you have to decrease some of the headquarters staff and the gold lace and gold fringe will have to be curtailed, but you can save the money if you want to."—Mr. Hugh Guthrie, Liberal Member for South Wellington, Ontario, in the House of Commons on June 1st, 1914.

"So long as I am Minister of Militia, the private car is going to remain; as far as I am concerned, I am going to travel in a private car up and down this country. . . . Whether it is militia business or the grand lodge, I propose to travel in a private car. There is no gold lace going to be cut off—not a particle of it. . . . I purpose extending these drill halls throughout the length and breadth of the country. If I had my proper allowance (of the country's revenue) for expenditure on the militia, I would have \$17,000,000." This is Colonel Hughes' reply and the Borden Government applauded him for it.

Already Colonel Hughes has practically doubled the expenditure for military purposes since he took office. He has surrounded himself with gold lace, fuss and feathers. He has spent millions on unnecessary drill halls. He has cost the country thousands on thousands more of dollars by travelling through Europe with an automobile brigade of officers on a junketing trip and by private car trips in Canada almost without number. Now he declares emphatically that none of the gold lace is to be cut off, that the expenditure on unnecessary military buildings is to be continued; that he should spend annually not \$7,000,000, as was spent by the Liberals in their last year of power, and not the \$14,000,000 or \$15,000,000 which he proposes to use this year for military purposes, but no less in a single year than \$17,000,000, or almost double the amount which the Government proposes to spend for agriculture in the next ten years! More than this, he

## A CANADA CLUB PLAN IN LONDON FALLS FLAT

People Who Might Be Interested Turn Cold Shoulder On the Plan

London, June 19.—The movement to form a Canadian Club with premises here is hardly likely to receive any substantial backing from prominent members of the Canadian community in London.

The promoter talks of a membership of five thousand, with one thousand permanently resident here. It may therefore be assumed that a good proportion of the members will be expected to be forthcoming from Canadians who only visit London occasionally. The truth is that the club habit in London is diminishing rather than increasing, and several of the most notable institutions have difficulty now in paying their way. The general feeling in regard to this Canadian proposition is that such an undertaking to be successful ought to be put forward by the present Canada Club, which enjoys the distinction of being the oldest existing dining club in the metropolis. The Canada Club, however, is unlikely to make any move in the direction indicated.

North Bay, Ont., June 19.—A striking evidence of the deep interest that is being taken in Northern Ontario in the abolition of the bar policy was manifested at Mr. Rowell's meeting at New Liskeard. ## GERMAN SCIENTISTS COMING TO AMERICA

## GENERAL NEWS BRIEFLY TOLD

Sir George Macalpine, urging the claims of India at the Baptist Missionary Society's meeting in London recently, said if there was one fact clear today it was that caste in India was breaking up. One learned Indian had told him that he gave caste ten years more life, after which it would no longer exist. And caste gone, there would be a great influx from India into the Christian Church.

Sentence has been passed in London on nine of the seventeen defendants, army officers and employees of Lipton's, Limited, convicted of conspiracy in connection with the army canteen scandals which have caused so much indignation in England. Lieut.-Col. Whitaker, of the Second Yorkshire Regiment, the highest in rank of the army officers convicted, was sentenced to six months' imprisonment. The Colonel asked for mercy, insisting that his acts had been the result of persuasion exerted by Col. Fiennes, now Lord Saye and Sele, Comptroller of the King's Household, and who was then lieutenant-colonel of the Royal Scots Fusiliers. A letter alleged to have been written by Lord Saye and Sele was introduced. Referring to this letter, Justice Darling, who presided, said that it showed "sad decadence from the traditions of a great family." "I myself, if I belonged to such a family," the justice said, "would starve rather than get my living by cadging for orders for beer." There were nine military defendants in all; the other eight were put under bonds to appear for sentence later if required to do so. John Cansfield, general manager of Lipton's, and Archibald Minto, former head of that firm's military department, were fined \$2,500 each. The six minor employees were fined \$250 each.

It is announced that Lord Brooke, who was gazetted in recent militia orders as an honorary colonel in the Canadian militia, will again direct the cavalry brigade this season at the Petawawa camp, having as his chief staff officer Major Earl, of the Grenadier Guards.

A court-martial in Tokio on May 29th sentenced Vice-Admiral Wa Matsumoto, of the Japanese navy, to three years' imprisonment on charges of accepting bribes in connection with naval contracts. Capt. Sawaski was condemned to one year's imprisonment, but Commander Suzuki

was acquitted. The existence of corruption in the Japanese navy was brought to light through a law suit in Berlin in January of this year, and eventually led to the fall of the Japanese Cabinet. A confidential clerk employed in the Tokio office of a German armament firm was prosecuted for selling documents, and during the trial a letter was read showing that several high Japanese naval officers were receiving a percentage of the contracts allotted to the firm. When the news reached Tokio, an investigation ensued, and a number of officers were arrested. Questions in the Japanese Parliament led to violent scenes, and the resignation of the Ministry.

Mr. Winston Churchill, first Lord of the Admiralty, has just accomplished the first series of tests required in order to obtain an air pilot's certificate. Mr. Churchill, at the steering apparatus of a naval aeroplane, made a flight over Salisbury Plain.

Dr. D. D. Ellis, of Fleming, Sask., has been elected Grand Master of the Grand Lodge, Loyal Orange Association of British North America, at its annual meeting in Regina. This is the first time that a Westerner has been appointed. The next annual meeting of the convention will be held in Winnipeg in July, 1915.

News has been received in Toronto of the death from fever in Sierra Leone of Lieut. V. Howland, of the West African Regiment, younger son of the late Mr. W. H. Howland, of Toronto.

Greece has purchased from the United States Government the battleships "Idaho" and "Mississippi," which are to be replaced by a modern dreadnought for the United States Navy.

Cable despatches received in Seattle from St. Michael and Nome, Alaska, indicate that, when Stefansson's exploring ship "Karluk" was crushed in the Arctic near Herald Island, northeast of Siberia, on January 16th last, the men saved all their instruments, supplies, dogs and food, and left only the crushed hulk and its coal cargo when they headed east over the ice to camp on Wrangell Island. The experience of the ice sheet from Point Barrow "Karluk" proves that the drift of ice is not northerly, as has been supposed, but westerly. Both Stefansson and Amundsen had believed that a ship entering the pack at Point Barrow would be carried across the Pole and to Greenland.

Mobilization of the aerial force

of the British Army has been completed on Salisbury Plains, and on June 2nd five complete squadrons of airships with 70 aeroplanes and a hundred pilots, commenced manoeuvres that are to last a month.

The French Cabinet has resigned, being it is stated unable to agree upon several of the policies of the premier, M. Doumergue, and other members, chiefly financial and socialistic. The recent elections left M. Doumergue with out a stable majority, and as on certain questions he would have to depend upon Royalists, Clericals and the most conservative of the Conservatives, while on other of his policies he would have to rally to his support the Revolutionaries and Socialists, he decided to resign rather than hold on to office by any such makeshift method.

## "TEMPERANCE" BEER WAS THE GENUINE ARTICLE

Col. Sam. Hughes So Finds and Relieves Major Leonard of His Command

Ottawa, June 19.—It is announced that as a result of the discovery of the genuine article instead of so-called "temperance beer" within the lines of the 6th Battery, Canadian Field Artillery, of London, the Minister of Militia, Col. Sam Hughes, has released Major Leonard of his command. An investigation was held at the militia headquarters regarding the seizure of the "temperance beer" a few days ago. It was found that there were nearly four hundred bottles of genuine ale seized, containing nearly seven per cent of proof alcohol.

The militia regulations allow only "temperance beer" to be in possession of the men at the training camps, and this beer must not contain more than 2.46 per cent of alcohol.

Major Leonard, who was held responsible, was accordingly relieved of his command, although the Minister and the Militia Council did so with regret, knowing that he was a most capable officer.

Col. Hughes, in an interview, said that regulations with regard to the non-use of liquor in militia camps would be strictly enforced, and the officers in command would be held responsible for any infraction of the regulations.

## TO FURTHER COLONIZATION TO THE WEST

Winnipeg, June 19. — North Battleford's Commissioner, N. G. Neill, the founder of the scheme to increase Western Canada's population to ten millions in the next ten years, briefly outlined the "aims and objects" of the convention recently held at North Battleford for the purpose of planning ways and means of doing this.

An instructive address on colonization from the early days up to the present time was given by C. W. Speers, general colonization agent of the Dominion Government. Dr. J. G. Rutherford, superintendent of Agriculture and Animal Husbandry of the C.P.R., gave an interesting address on mixed farming.

Charles S. Hotchkiss, chief publicity commissioner for the Government of Alberta, spoke on the "Possibilities of Colonization," touching upon the many advantages that Western Canada has to offer as against other countries. Among other speakers were: Prof. Elliott, of the Olds Agricultural School; A. E. Warren, assistant to the general manager of the C.N.R., and J. G. Smith representing the B. C. Minister of Lands.

At the close of the convention a provisional committee was appointed to undertake the work of securing the co-operation of the various bodies interested in the early formation of a permanent organization.

We could not give him a certificate of character. Mr. McRae did not know anything about it. There was absolutely no malice. The unfortunate letter was on the inside of the paper. The apology was made as prominent and fair as it was possible to do. To one living outside of Prince Rupert no one could guess whom it referred to. Under the statutes the plaintiff could only recover actual damages from a newspaper and there was not a title of evidence to show actual damages.

F. Peters, for the plaintiff, argued the letter was libelous and undoubtedly referred to Mason. When a slander is against a man's trade or profession, it entitles him to recover damages. The person who wrote it was full of hatred and malice. Mr. Manson said in addressing the jury perhaps the man who wrote the letter might have been able to back it up. You cannot show in ninety-nine cases out of a hundred where actual damages are done but you cannot tell what damage is done. It is the insidious way these things work which does the damage. The plaintiff ought to have substantial damages to show that a jury of fellow citizens do not believe the statement. An apology is without effect if there is gross negligence in publication. There was gross negligence. The apology was no apology at all. The letter made a definite statement. The apology said the paper knew nothing derogatory to his reputation. We do not ask enormous damages but such as deprecate the publication of such letters.

Rev. Dr. Stephen S. Wise, the noted New York rabbi, is a man who uses terse and apt phrases to describe men and things. Recently a young member of his congregation puzzled over a charge laid against his stepfather asked Dr. Wise what bigamy was. "Well," said the rabbi, "in some countries it is a crime, and in others a religion."
