## TURKS REPORTED TO HAVE DEFEATED GREEKS

### RUSSIA WILL NOT STAND FOR AUSTRIAN INTERFERENCE IN THE BALKAN STATES' AFFAIRS

#### GREEKS DEFEATED IN BATTLE BY TURKISH ARMY IS RUMORED

STORY FROM CONSTANTINOPLE SAYS THAT TURKISH ARMY WON BIG VICTORY OVER GREEKS AT GANINA—NOT CONFIRMED—MAY BE TO INFLUENCE NEGOTIATIONS.

Constantinople, Dec. 19.—The Turks have defeated the Greeks in a hard fought battle at Ganina, according to reports received here.

London, Dec. 19.—It is rumored that the Greeks were defeated in a battle with the Turks at Ganina, but nothing definite can be learned to substantiate the rumor, which comes from Constantinople. Reports from this source are not always reliable, especially at this time when a Turkish victory might influence peace negotiations.

#### MAYOR WILL TAKE CHIEF INTO HIS CONFIDENCE RE CHARGES

EVIDENCE CAN NOT BE PROCURED IN OTHER WAYS, CHIEF AND CITY SOLICITOR WILL BE TOLD WHO LAYS INFORMATION—LICENSED HOUSE NOT OFFENDERS.

Chief Vickers and City Solicitor Miers, if events occur as they are expected to, will be taken into the confidence of Mayor Newton and Commissioner Bullock-Webster. At least so it appeared at the meeting of the Police Board yesterday afternoon.

His Worship and Alderman Bullock-Webster have been playing detective again. This time they have been gleaning information, which should belong to the chief of police, and not putting any confidence in the head of the force, gave him blind instructions. As a natural consequence, in spite of the assistance of a "spotter," no arrests were made in connection with the charges made.

If Chief Vickers can accomplish nothing by continuing the blindfolded methods imposed upon him, the Mayor and Commissioner Bullock-Webster may divulge the name of the informant.

Commissioner Thompson, who was absent at the last meeting of the board, said that he was in favor of all complaints being properly made to the chief and not to the commissioners.

Dr. Cade's report in regard to selling liquor to Indians and the suffering caused by the misuse of alcohol was considered at considerable length.

Mr. Peters said that he did not think that the illicit liquor selling was being done by the licensed houses but by individuals. It was a hard matter to effectually prevent interdicts from securing drink.

In regard to the matter of men losing big sums of money while under the influence of drink, Mr. Peters said that he was of the opinion that they were "rolled" by men who followed them about until they were in a drunken condition for the purpose of tak-

ing the sums of money, which they had shown or made known they were carrying. He explained at length for the edification of the commission the various styles of getting drunk indulged in by men of different nationalities.

The chief's report for November was read and adopted, after which the bills were submitted for payment.

Alderman Bullock-Webster objected to payment in advance for the purpose of closing the books for the year, but finally, after considerable discussion, agreed to let it pass.

The chief reported that Officer Cargill had resigned to accept another position. He expressed his high appreciation of Mr. Cargill as an officer and a gentleman. In this the board concurred and expressed their regret at his leaving the city employ on the minutes.

The chief of police applied for and was granted a new uniform.

The recent arrest and subsequent punishment of several Indians who had been carrying on a trade in liquor, not only with the natives of this coast but also of Alaska, was cited. The ingenuity of one of the men was explained.

He had his swarthy features made up to resemble an Italian, and with his mustache waxed and in broken English was able to pass at a saloon for a European. He was later arrested and fined heavily.

#### RUSSIA WARNS AUSTRIA TO KEEP NEUTRAL

Speakers in the Duma Say That Russia Will not Stand Idle and See the Balkan States Robbed of the Fruits of Their Victory ---Russia Wants Peace but is Prepared for War

St. Petersburg, Dec. 19.—The Russian Premier, speaking on Russia's attitude in the present European situation, declared it to be one of waiting and watching. She it prepared, however, to use

her utmost strength to protect her interests.  
Other speakers in the Duma made it clear that Russia is prepared to stand behind her Balkan friends and is not going to see them robbed of the fruits of their victory.

These bold statements are taken to be a direct warning to Austria.

Russia wants a peaceful settlement of the trouble, but will not stand to see Austria unduly interfere with the division of Turkey.

#### TRUTH SAYS LAURIER HAS THE ONLY POLICY

English Paper Claims That Opposition Policy is Only One of Imperial Good.

London, Dec. 19.—The Truth Weekly Review, in commenting on the proposed contribution of three dreadnaughts by Canada to the Motherland, says that the only policy which will be of Imperial good is the naval policy advocated by Sir Wilfrid Laurier.

#### WINSTON CHURCHILL REFUSES TO ANSWER

Questions Asked in the House Are Refused Answer by First Lord of Admiralty.

London, Dec. 18.—Hon. Winston Churchill, first lord of the admiralty, was asked in the Commons the number of fully commissioned battleships owned by Germany, and he declined to reply.

The News, however, states that Germany has twenty fully commissioned ships and Britain nominally twenty-nine, including eight at Malta and six in dock, thus leaving Germany a 50 per cent. superiority. The News even goes further, declaring that Britain has absolutely no superiority in commissioned destroyers either.

#### CAPT. BABINGTON WILL RE-FLOAT THE SANGRA

Little Tug is Not Damaged to a Great Extent—Will be Re-Floated

Nothing daunted by the untoward accident to his tug boat, the Sangra, which, catching fire in an inexplicable manner, it was found necessary to scuttle in order to save from total destruction, Captain Babington immediately made arrangements to obtain the services of the tug boat Regal in order to prosecute the work of fulfilling his contract with the city.

The jovial captain, in conversation with a representative of The Daily News this morning, announced that in a day or two it would be possible to raise his little craft without any difficulty, as particularly low tides rule at this season of the year, making the task a comparatively easy one.

Asked as to whether the Sangra was anchored safely, Captain Babington remarked that he did not fear that she would move very far from her present moorings. No time will be lost as regards the completion of the work of laying the pipe across Shawatans Passage through the accident to the Sangra.

#### CENTRAL GOLD DEPOT TO BE AT MONTREAL

Proposed Changes in Banking Act Provides for Gold Depot Under Three Officials.

Ottawa, Dec. 18.—Hon. W. T. White, minister of finance, introduced a revision to the banking act which provides for a closer audit for the share holders and other safeguards for the public. It is proposed to establish a central gold depot at Montreal which will be presided over by an official named by the government and two named by the banking association.

#### BOILER MAKERS' STRIKE ON THE GRAND TRUNK PACIFIC IS OVER

TERMS ARRANGED BETWEEN THE MEN AND COMPANY ARE MUTUALLY SATISFACTORY—ALL STRIKERS WILL BE TAKEN BACK—WAGES FROM 45 TO 47 CENTS PER HOUR

Montreal, Dec. 18.—The G.T.P. strike of boiler makers and machinists has been settled satisfactorily to all concerned as follows: All strikers will be taken back within 30 days. In the event of employees having a grievance they will in the usual way present their case to the foreman, but should an agreement not be reached, the aggrieved party or a committee of employees representing him, may present the case to higher officials.

The wages for machinists and boiler makers will be 45 and 47 cents per hour, and the company also agrees that next spring, if the majority of the men of the crafts affected by this dispute are not satisfied with their condition of employment, they will

meet a committee for the purpose of arranging the terms of an agreement. Failing to arrive at any agreement, the question at issue will be referred to a board of conciliation, appointed under the Industrial Dispute Act, and the company will agree to accept the decision of the Board, provided the men are also agreed to accept the said decision.

The negotiations were carried on in the most friendly spirit and although the strikers have not secured all their demands the settlement, as outlined above is fairly satisfactory.

The negotiations with the company officials took place after a series of conferences with the Minister of Labor.

#### ALL IN READINESS FOR THE BIG BOXING BOUT TONIGHT

OLMEN AND MORTIMER BOTH IN EXCELLENT SHAPE FOR THE TWENTY ROUND FIGHT THIS EVENING—DOCTOR DECLARES BOTH MEN FIT—GOOD PRELIMINARIES.

Exactly upon the stroke of 9:30 tonight Kid Olmen and Abe Mortimer, the two contestants in the twenty round go that is scheduled to be brought off in McIntyre Hall, will enter the ring, each one in the pink of condition.

The greatest interest is being taken on all sides in the event by the sport loving members of the community.

Kid Olmen, who made such an excellent showing a short while ago in the ten round event with George Bronson, getting the decision in the fifth round, will weigh in at 151 or 152 pounds and is in splendid form, according to his backers.

Abe Mortimer is a good deal the heaviest man of the two, and it will take him all his time to train down to 170 pounds in order to fulfill the conditions of the contest, otherwise he forfeits \$100. Abe Mortimer is somewhat of a dark horse, but has a host of backers and admirers who are confident that their man will more than hold his own this evening in the fistic arena. Altogether it looks as if the event should be the best of its kind so far brought off in the city.

Nelson Dunn, so well and popularly known in local amateur sporting circles, will act as referee, whilst Bud Corley will be there in the capacity of official time keeper.

Two snappy preliminaries be-

tween well known sets of local lads, who have been shaping excellently lately, will usher in the proceedings tonight, starting in at 9 o'clock sharp.

This afternoon both fighters were examined by Dr. Tremayne, who attested to their being in the best of condition. Mortimer will make the weight by 9:30 tonight, as he is almost at the 170 mark now.

In the first preliminary Kingston will go four rounds with a dusky skinned boxer named Grey. Kingston is a trifle light for his antagonist and has not had as much ring experience, but he is confident that he can hold his own. Sherman and Todd, the midgets who won so much approbation at the last fistic contest, will make up the other introductory. Both are fast, hard hitting little fellows and have a host of admirers.

**Editorial Notes and Clippings**

**MAYOR NEWTON'S CONSISTENCY.**

"Plank Eighteen" of Mayor Newton's platform last year was as follows: "Seek the advice of the members of the City Council as to the mayor's course as their representative on the License and Police boards."

This with other paper planks of his platform for 1912 was the structure on which the then alderman asked the rate payers for their support, and it is on this platform and his actions as mayor since being elected that he must be judged.

Plank 18, like the rest of his platform, has proved itself to be but paper. Ask Alderman Morrissey how much the Mayor welcomed a conference with the Council in regard to his actions on the Police Board. It forms an incident which has caused mirth for the country, but has not been very creditable to Prince Rupert. When the alderman asked for information the Mayor insulted him and then when he would reply called in the police. Surely this was consistent with "Plank 18."

Not only does he refuse to take the Council into the confidence of the Police Board, but he does not consult the chief of police or the city solicitor; instead, he and Alderman Bullock-Webster glean information and do not divulge the name of their informant but expect the chief of police to carry out the law. How can Chief Vickers work in the dark? And unless he can get reliable information from the Police Commission he cannot carry out the work of his department.

Yesterday, Mayor Newton finally concluded that if other evidence could not be secured he would take the city solicitor and chief into his confidence and let them know who was making certain assertions.

**THE TRUE POLICY.**

Sir Wilfrid Laurier hit the nail fairly on the head in his speech on Thursday when he said:

"What is the remedy? In our humble judgment, the remedy is this: That wherever on the distant seas or in the distant countries, Australia, Canada or elsewhere, a British ship has been removed to allow concentration in European waters, if it must take place, wherever such a British ship is removed that ship should be replaced by a ship built, maintained, equipped and manned by the country concerned. This is the Australian policy; this ought to be the Canadian policy." — Victoria Times.

**A POOR ARGUMENT.**

In his speech on his navy programme, Mr. Borden gave statistics showing how the exigencies of the European situation have caused the depletion of the British fleet on the overseas station. His figures are not disputed, but do they not constitute an eloquent argument in favor of the maintenance of fleets by the dominions? If the Old Country finds herself unable to provide naval protection for her vast interests throughout her world, should not the dominions as a matter of duty take up the burden.—Victoria Times.

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**ATTORNEY GENERAL BOWSER IS IN DANGER OF GOING TO JAIL**

**EVEN THE ATTORNEY GENERAL CANNOT DISREGARD LAWS OF THE LAND WITH IMPUNITY—TWO YEARS IS SENTENCE FOR AIDING WRONGDOER TO LIBERTY.**

The following list of questions and answers, taken from the Vancouver Sun clearly shows the position in which Attorney General Bowser has placed himself in regard to his campaign for the protection of denizens of the underworld. The magistrates have convicted and sentenced certain lawbreakers to the penitentiary, and Attorney General Bowser has given instructions that they be refused admittance to that institution. One case was brought before Judge McInnes in the criminal county court and the sentence of the police court was sustained. Still the woman was refused admittance to the provincial jail.

Q. Upon what official is the duty cast of seeing that the administration of public affairs is in accordance with law?

A. Hon. W. J. Bowser, attorney general.

Q. Who has the superintendence of all matters connected with the administration of justice and of prisons in this province?

A. Hon. W. J. Bowser, attorney general.

Q. Is it true that persons duly convicted of crimes and committed to gaol with all the forms of law have been refused admittance to the provincial gaol at New Westminster?

A. It is. The attorney general frankly admits it and accepts the responsibility for the action.

Q. Has the attorney general anything to do with the criminal law of this province?

A. He has nothing whatever to do with the making of the criminal law, but it is his duty to enforce the law as he finds it upon the statute books.

Q. Who makes the criminal law of this province?

A. The Parliament of Canada, which has exclusive jurisdiction in this respect throughout Canada.

Q. Can the attorney general legally change or disregard any portion of the criminal law?

A. He cannot.

Q. Has the warden of the New Westminster gaol the right to refuse admittance to properly committed criminals?

A. No. A provincial statute (the Vancouver Incorporation Act) expressly provides that SUCH GAOLER SHALL BE BOUND, AND HE IS BY THAT ACT AUTHORIZED AND REQUIRED, TO RECEIVE AND SAFELY KEEP UNTIL DULY DISCHARGED, ALL PERSONS COMMITTED TO HIS CHARGE OR ANY JUSTICE OF THE PEACE HAVING JURISDICTION IN THE CITY OF VANCOUVER.

Q. Can the attorney general repeal this provision of the Vancouver Incorporation Act?

A. No. Only by fresh legislation can this provision be set aside.

Q. Does the law provide no remedy where a statute is disregarded?

A. Yes. The criminal code imposes a penalty of one year's imprisonment upon everyone who, without lawful excuse, disobeys any act of any legislature in Canada by omitting to do any act which it requires to be done.

Q. Does the law provide no remedy where duly convicted

prisoners are wrongfully set free?

A. YES. THE CRIMINAL CODE IMPOSES A PENALTY OF TWO YEARS' IMPRISONMENT UPON EVERYONE WHO KNOWINGLY AND UNLAWFULLY, UNDE R COLOR OF ANY PRETENDED AUTHORITY, DIRECTS OR PROCURES THE DISCHARGE OF ANY PRISONER NOT ENTITLED TO BE SO DISCHARGED.

Q. If the warden of the New Westminster gaol has disregarded a statute or has directed the discharge of prisoners not entitled to be so discharged, what is the position of the attorney general, who admits that the warden was acting under his instructions.

A. EVERYONE WHO COUNSELS OR PROCURES ANY PERSON TO COMMIT AN OFFENCE IS HIMSELF GUILTY OF THAT OFFENCE.

#### Frank Chance Does Not Know of Rumor that He Will Take Over Team

Los Angeles, Dec. 18.—Before leaving today for his ranch, Frank Chance declared that he had received no official communication concerning the offer said to have been made by the New York American owners.

"I only know what I have seen in the papers," said the former Chicago National manager, "so I will have nothing to say until I learn officially what is going on. If any one has been delegated to come out and see me about managing the Highlanders, I have been given no advance notification."

Chance denied emphatically a statement that he was reported to have made to the effect that he would not return to baseball unless he was offered \$20,000 a year.

"I never said anything like it," he said. "It would be foolish to knock my own game like that, because I might get more," he added with a smile.

"At any rate I do not think I would accept any offer until I had an opportunity to discuss the offer with those making it."

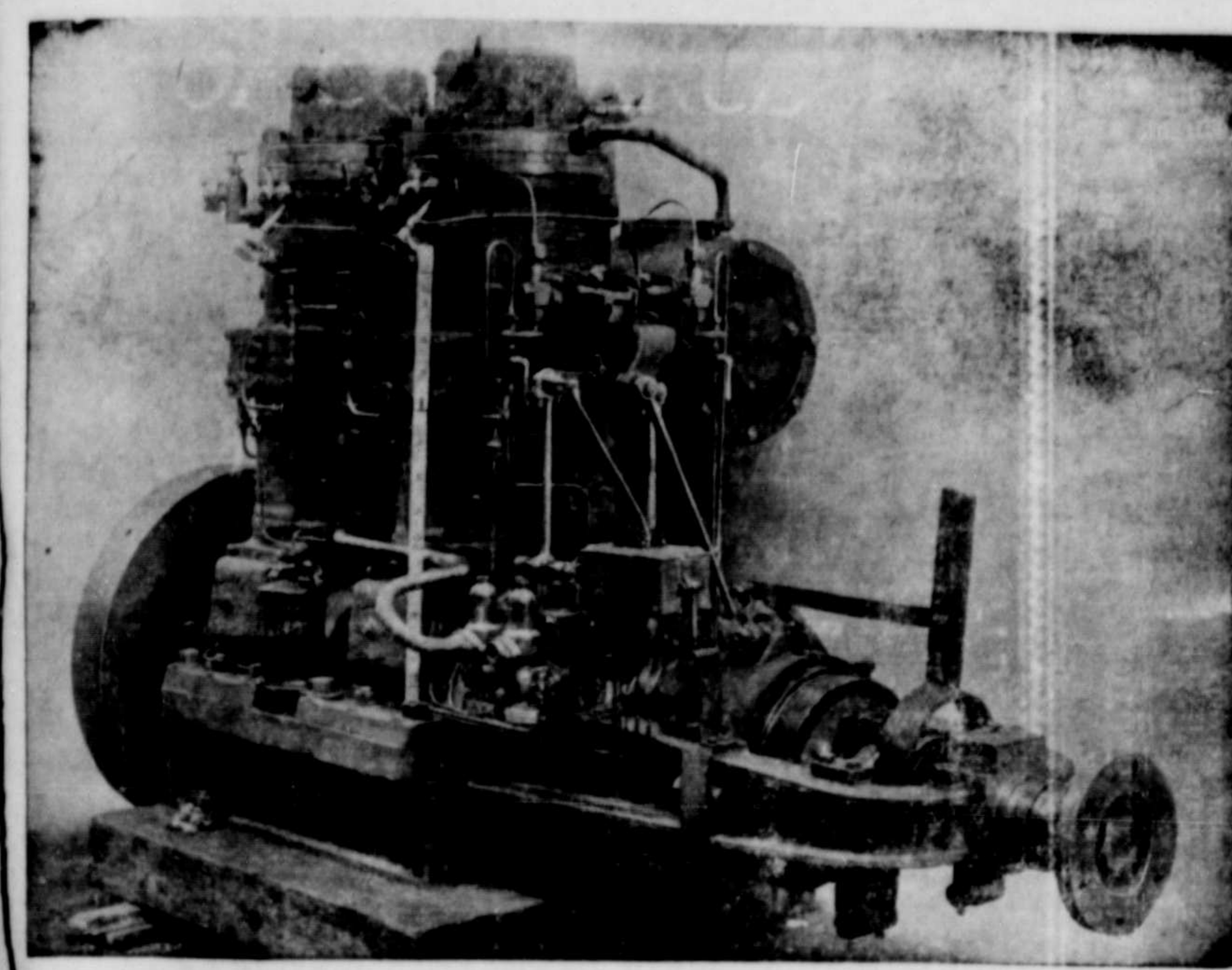

### ISMAY SOON TO LEAVE THE WHITE STAR LINE

Steamship Magnate Who Survived Titanic Disaster to Retire Soon

London, Dec. 18.—J. Bruce Ismay, his health seriously impaired by the Titanic disaster and its aftermath, has virtually withdrawn from his position as managing director of the White Star Line. Mr. Ismay has not been in Liverpool for several weeks. He is living in seclusion on his Yorkshire property.

The fact that Mr. Ismay was exonerated by the British Court of inquiry on the popular charge that he influenced the navigation of the Titanic or the speed she attained, was small comfort to the steamship head. That came three months after he had been criticized all over the world for turning up among the rescued, while so many hundreds of men, women and children, who in the final moments could command no influence because of position were drowned or frozen to death in the waters.

Mr. Ismay was just 50 years old last Thursday but his friends say that since last April 14, the day of the disaster, he has become physically an old man. Time has done nothing to soften the wounds. A formal announcement that Ismay has completely severed his connection with the White Star Line is expected shortly.

#### PROSECUTING ATTORNEY SENT TO PENITENTIARY

Golfax, Wash., Dec. 18.—Paul Pattison, aged 29, prosecuting attorney of Whitman County and son of John Pattison, of Spokane, Wash., Democratic national committeeman for Washington, was arrested recently, pleaded guilty to a charge of grand larceny from one of his clients and was given an indeterminate sentence in the state reformatory at Monroe, Wash.

The charge to which Pattison pleaded guilty was the larceny of \$638 from John Major, administrator of the estate of Mrs. E. H. Knox. It was alleged that the money was given to him to meet debts against the estate and that he kept the money, issuing valueless cheques to the creditors. Pattison was allowed to go to the reformatory without a guard and left immediately for Monroe.

"How can any man, if he loves and respects his mother, refuse to care for her rights as a citizen? I do not approve of the militant, meddlesome course over anxious women have pursued, but why could we expect there would not be women agitators as well as men?"

### WELL KNOWN STEAMER IS REPORTED WRECKED

Thought That Robt. Dollar Was Foundered in Pacific Ocean on Way to Japan.

San Francisco, Dec. 19.—General fear is expressed here in shipping circles that the Robert Dollar, seven days overdue at Kobe from Astoria, is lost. A cablegram has been received by the marine department of the Chamber of Commerce from Japan to the effect that the boat has not been heard from at that port. Her lateness is causing alarm. She is one of the Dollar steamers.

#### Port Edward Contract Let.

The contract for the laying of 23,300 lineal feet of plank walks and 5,000 feet of cleats at Port Edward was awarded this morning to E. Kaufman. According to the terms of the contract, work must be commenced within two weeks and must be completed within six weeks of the time of commencement. The walks will run on the cross town streets of First, Fourth and Eighth avenues. It is expected that work will commence about the first of the week.

Mr. Cook created much excitement in the House of Representatives when he opposed the appointment of additional higher court judges. Attorney General Hon. William Hughes warmly defended the government, declaring that it was necessary for the welfare of the Commonwealth that more judges be appointed.

### HOUSE ADJOURNS UNTIL AFTER HOLIDAY SEASON

Premier Borden presented Murray's report on the civil service. It recommends that the smaller details of their departments be taken from the deputies of the departments. A complete reorganization of the civil service is recommended.

Currie introduced a bill to amend the naturalization act, providing that all aliens speaking either English or French will be required to swear allegiance to the King and forewear their own nationality be accepted as citizens.

Hon. G. E. Foster continued the debate on the naval bill, outlining the events which led up to the naval policy.

New York, Dec. 18.—"Should employers be prejudiced against a girl applying for a position as stenographer and typewriter because of the color of her hair, turn of her nose or shape of her mouth?" "Does competency count for nothing against good looks?" "Should we not be judged only by the character of our work, and not by our looks?" Mayor Gaynor was asked these questions by a delegation of typewriters and stenographers who have a grievance. They complain that employers are not inclined to give work to girls who do not fill their eye as to figure, face, color of hair or complexion.

Mayor Gaynor designated Mrs. Marion, his confidential stenographer, to hear the grievances of the young women.
