Cheap Hogs Forces Down Prices of All Foods at Chicago

Yet and Retailers will be Affected Soon. Grain Follows Meat to Lower Levels

Chicago, August 29.—The \$15 hog made its appearance in the Chicago stockyards yesterday. Its advent was immediately followed by a slump in provisions and grain as well as in live cattle and sheep.

The declines were not evident in the retail market, as shopkeepers are loath to lose money on the stocks they have in hand.
