## Canada Unites with States In Effort to keep down Cost of Living in Both Countries

### Board of Commerce Takes Action to Control Sugar Prices Restraining from Export and Deals with Matter of Weights and Measures Urging City Councils to Act.

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Ottawa, August 30.—A system of co-operation has been arranged between the Board of Commerce of Canada and the United States authorities in order to continue a wider campaign against high prices. This has been brought about as a result of a visit of W. F. Connor to Washington. The Board will commence to trace those who, since the enactment of the Combines and Fair Prices Act, have been guilty of overcharging, which is now a criminal offense. Any unreasonably large quantities of goods held for cold storage have been ordered to be put up for sale at reasonable prices.

The Board of Commerce has taken action to control sugar prices by restraining and prohibiting the disposing of sugar in such a way as is calculated to unfairly enhance its cost, particularly restraining from exporting sugar out of Canada.

The Chief Inspector of Weights and Measures of the Department of Trade and Commerce says that one reason for the high cost of living is attributed to the custom of selling by measure. Consumers who purchase potatoes in small quantities do not get proper weight, because the dealers instead of weighing them sell by measure. Investigations show that the peck measure of potatoes is from three to five pounds short of the required fifteen pounds. The chief inspector urges every city council to pass a bylaw prohibiting the sale of potatoes in any other way than by weight.

## CANADIANS IN ENGLAND

Returned From Murmansk Coast  
in Russia Commanded by  
Colonel Leckie.

London, August 29.—Seventy officers and noncommissioned officers loaned by the Canadian forces to the War Office for special duty on the Murmansk coast have arrived in England from Russia. The party is commanded by Col. Leckie.

The Canadian troops of all ranks returned to Canada during August total 11,787, leaving 14,733 yet to be returned.

## RECEPTION TO WORK PEOPLE

Prince of Wales Shakes Hands  
With 2,500 in Forty-five  
Minutes.

Ottawa, August 30.—The common workday people had their innings with the Prince of Wales today. During forty-five minutes the royal visitor shook hands with more than 2,500 people, old and young, male and female, and another crowd of ten times that number were waiting more or less patiently outside the city hall for their turn to come.

The popular reception was arranged at the special request of His Royal Highness.

## GERMANS ABOUT TO HELP GEN. KOLCHAK

## SPEED BOATS FOR THE FAIR

Number Being Built Here and an  
Effort will be Made to Bring  
Silverware to Rupert.

Prince Rupert is likely to become a boat racing centre. For three years past an Anyox boat has been able to come here on fair day and clean up everything in port, taking back the cup to the smelter town. This year things may be different.

J. Myhill Jones has a sixty horse power six-cylinder engine that he is about to install in a fine little hull that it is expected will run rings around anything Granby can produce. It will be ready before the Fair.

Kenny Rood is reported to be building a craft that will possibly make the Jones boat look silly, and there is another mysterious craft under construction on 8th Ave. that may possibly be a winner. Tommy Hooper is building a nice little flat-bottomed affair that may develop sufficient speed to enter, while George Frizzell has just laid the keel for the fastest yet, with a 60 h. p. Winton engine, but it is not expected that it can be ready in time for the big races. Possibly later in the autumn a regatta may be arranged when all the boats are completed at which some real racing may develop.

No word has yet been received from Anyox as to what they will do this year. It is assumed, however, that Superintendent Campbell will have some sort of a craft here and it may be a surprise.

## NO ELECTION BECAUSE OF COMING LOAN

Must be no Politics in Connection  
With Provision for Carrying  
On Affairs of the  
Country.

## RAILWAY QUESTION TO COME BEFORE HOUSE

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Ottawa, August 30.—There is still doubt as to whether or not there will be an election after the session and the latest opinion is that for the present the Government will carry on. This is partly due to the need of unity at a time when the new loan is being raised. It is absolutely necessary for the completion of the war work that an immense loan be "put over" and if there was an election in the offing, there would be a tendency to try to embarrass the government by pulling back on the loan.

It is pointed out by Government officials here that the war is not over yet and that the troops are not yet quite all home. War expenses are still going on and these cannot possibly be met from current revenue.

The railway policy of the Government will be likely to be to fore a good deal. Since the Liberals have in the past always stood for government ownership it is difficult to see how they are now going to oppose it. They will probably content themselves with criticising the detail of the railway policy rather than the general principle.

## Senate Obdurate.

Prohibition is one of those questions that is not looked at from a party point of view. There is little opposition to it in the Commons except from some of the brewery and distillery interests, but the Senate is in the grip of the brewers and will oppose it in spite of all the Government or the House of Commons may do or say.

Warning has been given by members of the government that the days of lavish expenditure are at an end and that the country must soon get back to a sounder financial basis. There is little fear in this country in spite of the huge debt, for the development of the natural resources is looked to, to provide for the future.

There will be no discussion on the question of the fiscal policy of the Government unless it comes up in the speech from the throne. The Government will not open the question at this session.

## NO DISTILLATE FOR FISHERMEN

Ship Available to Bring Cargo  
Here From Inco But Govern-  
ment Regulations Will  
Not Allow It.

## ACTION BEING TAKEN BY BOARDS OF TRADE

George Woodland, local manager of the Imperial Oil Co., announces this morning that his company will be unable to supply distillate for fuel in large quantities for some days to come. There is plenty of distillate at Inco, near Vancouver, but the Dominion Government fisheries department refuse to allow an American bottom to carry cargo from one Canadian port to another, just as similarly Canadian ships are restricted by the Americans. In this particular case, however, there are no Canadian tank ships on this coast and it is impossible to get them. There is a U. S. tanker, the Atlas, which could be secured for the purpose if the Government would allow her to carry the cargo.

The matter has been taken up by Mayor McClymont, and the Board of Trade and also by private parties in Prince Rupert and Vancouver with a view to having the cargo allowed. Col. Peck and the ministers have been communicated with and doubtless under these circumstances action will be taken by the Marine Department at Ottawa to have the matter righted immediately.

## POST MORTEM HERE TODAY

Investigation Into Death of Alfred  
McKay at Port Simpson is

This morning a post-mortem examination was made of the body of Alfred McKay, the Indian who is supposed to have died from alcoholic poisoning at Port Simpson. Dr. J. P. Cade made the examination and the stomach and contents will be sent to Victoria for analysis.

Joe Villamore who is being held here on the charge of supplying to Indians is connected with the case and following the report of the test, the matter will be thoroughly investigated by the Indian Department, assisted by the Dominion and provincial police.

The body of McKay will be buried here.

## GENERAL ODLUM RESIGNS FROM GOOD POSITION

Labor Day Thoughts By Bishop Du Vernet.

A public holiday in honor of labor should lead all to think of the importance of labor. The goal to be kept before all engaged in industry is not the amassing of private fortunes, but the supplying of human needs. Production is primarily for use and only secondarily for profit. Industry must be organized on a democratic basis. There must be rule and authority but this must be founded upon the consent of all for the benefit of all. The autocracy of the wealthy few must give place to the democracy of the mixed many, where the investors of capital and the investors of labor in the same industry stand upon an equal footing conferring together and working together for their mutual welfare, as well as for the good of the public who use the articles produced.

All over this vast Dominion there are natural resources waiting to be developed by the joint effort of capital and labor, and it is capital which has to take the first move and think and plan ahead. In many parts of this Dominion there are essential industries languishing for lack of capital. Undoubtedly the possessors of private capital have an important social function to perform, but if they forget this function and use the power of wealth to tyrannize over the producers of wealth, the spirit of democracy will at least demonstrate the fact that while capital in some form or other, either public, co-operative or private, is necessary to production the selfish private capitalist is not. He may be eliminated without loss to society. If he would be saved he must get the social vision.

It is easier for a camel to go through the eye of a needle than for a rich man, who lives only for private gain, to enter the democracy of God.

It is the function of religion to keep the social ideal before all classes in the community. The tyranny of the working class, if unchecked, will destroy true democracy, just as much as the despotism of the rich. The domineering capitalist with no thought beyond getting the most out of his sweating brother for the least possible return cannot know what true religion is, for "he who loves not his brother whom he has seen cannot love God whom he has not seen."

The domineering workman with no thought beyond securing for himself everything which he can take by force, even though it means spilling the blood of his richer brother, cannot know what true religion is, but needs to learn that if he succeeded in securing the whole world for himself he would be socially poorer for he would have lost his true life—the life of service for others. "A man's life consists not in the abundance of the things which he possesses."

Money is the medium through which we exchange commodities. Brotherly love is the medium through which we exchange good will, kindly feeling, and helpful service.

To exercise this practical love in the industrial life is to be truly religious for "he who loves is born of God."

Narrow Escape From Local Strike.

Very few people in Prince Rupert have realized how near we have been to another strike. This time it was an international strike that threatened. A dispatch yesterday showed that the intention was to tie up all the railroads of the country unless the price of food was brought down. As a result the president of the United States is making an effort to bring pressure to bear on the food situation and so far that pressure is shown to be effective. Whether it will remain so will be seen later.

The curious thing is that the head of a big government can under pressure influence a situation which has been declared by everyone impossible of solution. If the president of the United States can do it, why cannot the premier of Canada do it similarly. Had action been taken before, many of the industrial troubles would have been obviated. It seems as if just now the power of recall would be a good thing for the people of Canada to have. Were there a threat to recall the Canadian Government if they did not keep down the prices, it is possible that they too would have seen a way as President Wilson has done when under pressure.

# SALVAGE FROM S.S. MARIPOSA SECURED

The barge "Skookum" arrived at the Alaska Steamship dock yesterday loaded with salvage from the steamship Mariposa which went down off Strait Island in Summer Strait about a year ago, the salvage of the Mariposa is being done by the Deep Sea Salvage Company, of Vancouver, says the Ketchikan Times of recent date.

The barge is loaded with ore, fittings, steam piping, boilers, block and cables ports, davits, life-saving belts, etc., that have been salvaged from the vessel. The ore which they have on the barge is estimated to be worth approximately \$4,000 and was taken from the Kennicott mine, which is at the head of the Copper River Railway. The Mariposa had a cargo of 1,200 tons of high-grade copper ore, 8,000 cases of canned salmon, besides other things.

# PREHISTORIC STONE BRINGS MANY MYTHS

Kispiox Indians Try to Interpret Crude Picture Engravings Recently Dug Up.

An Indian slab of grey sandstone, imbedded in the gravel of a wagon road near Kispiox, was recently discovered by workmen, says the Vancouver Sun. The stone measures 13 inches at the top, 20 inches at the base, and it is 28 inches high and has an even thickness of two and a half ins., it is a hard sandstone and probably comes from either the Nine-Mile mountain or from Kitseucla, 20 miles downstream from where it was unearthed; the carving thereon resembles the modern chip carving and was undoubtedly performed with stone tools. A wax impression was made and is in the hands of F. B. Chettleburgh of Hazelton.

**One Version of It.**  
An Indian by name of Mutlamar says that the heads in the corner represent two big hornets that followed a family for years, stinging them on every possible occasion, this punishment being brought on them for their wickedness of robbing caches. On the right of the stone they are supposed to have control of a trail that is indicated by the crooked line; along this trail the family would never travel. On the left of the stone a bridge is depicted on which the hornets met the family of eight and succeeded in stinging three of them to death.

The number of the party is represented by the circles and the corpses by the eclipses.  
Another tale was furnished by Tutelge to the effect that four big flies poisoned the tail of a salmon which proved fatal to three Indians in one family.

**Another Story.**  
Tommy Jack, interpreting for one of the elders, furnished this story: "It appears that the totem poles are purely a historical account of recent years only, and prior to them the Indians used stones for setting forth the ancient legends and traditions of the families and tribes; this stone, he says, was brought up from Kitseucla when the Eagles moved from that place to take up their residence in Kispiox, it was the property of the chief and symbolic of his chieftainship.  
The stone is well guarded and should a prospector, land-seeker or tourist happen to enter the village, he is attacked by 15 or 20 Indians within equally as many minutes, all of whom offer to disclose the hiding place of the stone for the sum of \$1, and most of them are willing to sell it for "pive thousand dollars, maybe, you wait. I see my farder's sister. I tell you den."  
Kispiox is a village situated at the confluence of the Skeena and Kispiox rivers, about nine miles north of Hazelton. Its surroundings are very picturesque and the village very interesting. There is a well preserved collection of totem poles depicting various animals and fishes, even the cougar

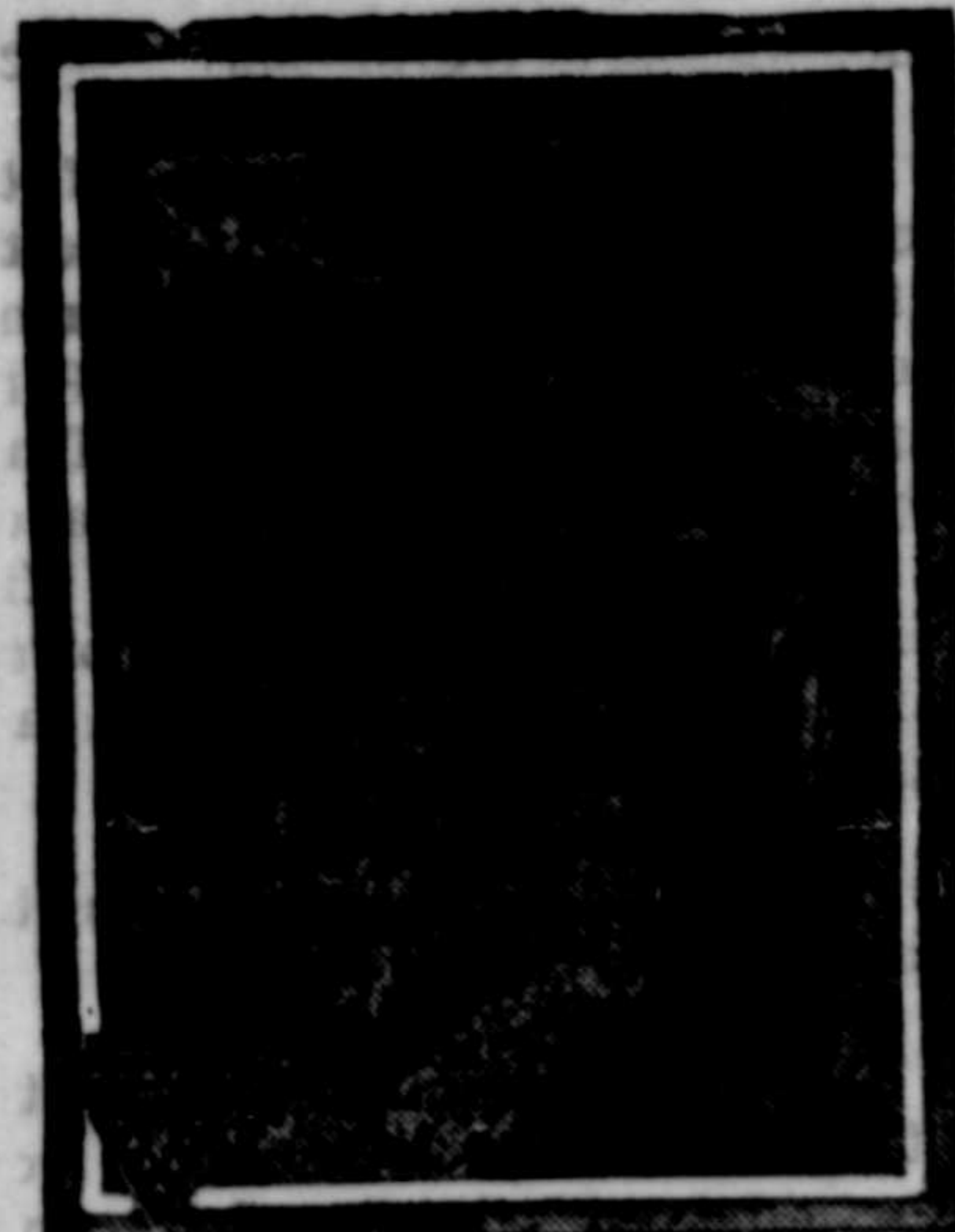
and sharks figure very strongly on the poles, which is a great mystery as the village is 180 miles inland from the coast and the cougars have never been seen this far north.
