Trades and Labor Suggest Aldermen

W.H.W. Murray, A.H. Allison, Wilbert J. Greer and Mrs. Kirkpatrick Endorsed Last Night.

Four candidates were nominated at the Trades and Labor Council meeting last night for aldermanic honors in the forthcoming municipal elections. Those named were W. H. W. Murray, A. H. Allison, Wilbert J. Greer and Mrs. W. J. Kirkpatrick. These names were recommended by the legislative committee of the council and were endorsed by the council as a body. The list is open for further consideration and may be added to.

The matter of candidates for mayoralty, school board and police commission was left open and no action was taken. If S. D. MacDonald will consent to run for election to the Police Commission again, he will receive the support of the organization.

BANNIER FINED AGAIN; CHARGED LIQUOR BREACH

Is Found Guilty Under Prohibition Act This Time—Costs \$100.50.

Ed. Bannier, appeared before Magistrate McMorde again this morning charged under the B. C. Prohibition Act with having liquor in his possession other than on private premises. He was visited last night by Constables Ackroyd and McGlinchy and moonshine was found in his shoemaker shop.

This morning he pleaded not guilty in the police court and said that he did not know that the liquor was there. The magistrate did not accept his plea and fined him \$100.50, this being his first offence under the Prohibition Act. Some months ago he was fined for supplying liquor to Indians under the Indian Act.

MISUNDERSTANDING OVER WAGE INCREASE

Trades and Labor Thought Telephone Raise Would Start in May.

The question as to the date that the raise of pay for telephone operators will take place was discussed by the Trades and Labor Council at its meeting last night. The Council had understood that the 15 per cent raise would be effective from May, the time of the request for the raise. Evidently the Utilities Committee of the city council had not understood it this way and had dated the raise from the present date.

The matter was laid over until the operators request that it be taken up or dropped.

MUSTAPHA KEMAL HAS BEEN ASSASSINATED

ROME, Dec. 24.—Mustapha Kemal, leader of the Turkish Insurgents in Anatolia, has been assassinated. He was head of the Turkish nationalist movement in Asia Minor.

JOSHUA MACKAY CASE IN COUNTY COURT

Accused Elected for Speedy Trial and Pled Guilty; Prosecution's Witnesses Examined.

Joshua MacKay, the Port Simpson Indian, charged with obtaining money under false pretences, elected for speedy trial before Judge Young this morning. He pleaded not guilty and the witnesses for the prosecution were examined.

On Friday at 3 o'clock the trial will be resumed when the witnesses for the defence will be examined. L. W. Patmore appears for the accused.

GOVERNMENT RETREAT AND BOLSHIES PLOT

Leon Trotsky is Busy With Plans For Drive Against Poland in the Spring.

IRKUTSK, Dec. 24.—All Russian Government troops have evacuated Tomsk, Eastern Siberia.

GENEVA, Dec. 24.—Reports received here say that plans and preparations for a Bolshevik offensive next spring are under way under the guidance of Leon Trotsky, Minister of War in the Russian Soviet Government.

PATROL BOAT "GANNET" BURNT AT WESTMINSTER

The Fisheries Patrol Vessel "Gannet," which is well known in Prince Rupert, was totally destroyed by fire last week in New Westminster. She was moored to a boathouse near the new City Market site, when fire broke out at 6:30 o'clock in the morning, on Saturday. The blaze made such rapid progress that it was impossible to save the vessel, which is a total loss. She is valued at \$5,000.

KNOCKED OUT

CABINET CRISIS IS THREATENED

War Problems Cause Socialist Opposition and Cabinet Resignations.

THE HAGUE, Dec. 24.—The opposition of the Socialists to expenditure on post-war measures and League of Nations problems has resulted in the resignations of two ministers in the Dutch cabinet. It appears that a crisis will be brought about in the Dutch cabinet.

TODAY'S TRAIN WENT THROUGH

Quick Work at Khyex Clears the Line and Traffic is Resumed.

After being tied up for exactly one week on account of the washout of the Khyex River bridge and fill, the G. T. P. railway line is clear again and this morning's No. 2 eastbound train passed over the break. Superintendent McCall and his crews are expected in this afternoon and will bring with them all mail, express, baggage and passengers who have been held up on the other side of the washout. The most of this arrived on last night's westbound at Pacific being relayed down the river this morning by a special stub train. The complete No. 1 westbound will arrive tomorrow evening probably on time.

The train this morning left at 11:30, the regular time, but as the diners and sleepers are now at Pacific, it consisted merely of the baggage, express and two day coaches. The rest of the train will be picked up at Pacific and will proceed east as the regular train. After today all trains will run as usual.

Traffic has been rather disorganized by the blockade during the past week and much mail and express has been sent via Vancouver over the C. N. R. This will mean that some Christmas mail will not arrive here on time. However, the quick repair of the break means general relief and the congestion of freight and other traffic will be handled as quickly as possible.

INTERESTING WEDDING AT HAZELTON SATURDAY

Miss Agnes Grant Will Wed David Donaldson in Bride-to-be's Home Town.

None were more delighted to see the resumption of traffic on the Grand Trunk Pacific Railroad this morning than Miss Agnes Grant and David Donaldson. Their reason for feeling grateful to the company for their quick repairs was sufficient. They left this morning for Hazelton where they will be married at the home of Miss Grant's parents on Saturday evening at 7 o'clock. Also they will be home for Christmas dinner tomorrow evening.

IRISH PAPERS DO NOT AGREE WITH ENGLISH

Lloyd George's Scheme Acceptable in England—Not So in Ireland.

DUBLIN, Dec. 24.—The comments in the Irish papers on Lloyd George's Home Rule bill are generally adverse. The Dublin Times says: "For many reasons, some good, some bad, some wise, some mad, three quarters of the Irish people will reject the bill." And Ireland will be no better off than before.

LONDON, Dec. 24.—Aside from one or two irreconcilable anti-home rule journals, London papers, on the whole give a favorable reception to the government scheme for home rule in Ireland.

BARRIEAU SURPRISES FIGHTING GILLAM

Great Interest was Taken in Fight at Edmonton; Won Support in Ring.

EDMONTON, Dec. 22.—In spite of a difference of twelve pounds in weight on Gillam's side Frank Barrieau boxed an excellent draw with him on Monday night. Barrieau had fully an even share of the scrap and his willingness to mix with his bigger opponent won him support of the audience. Barrieau carried a short right swing all the way through which would have won him the better of the bout had it been delivered with his closed fist instead of a half open glove.

A better showing was expected from the Salt Lake boy than was delivered especially as he was in the pink of condition. He entered the ring the favorite of the fans but this feeling soon switched. The fight attracted more attention than a bout has for many months in this city and all seats were taken. There were many visitors in from outside points.

COAL MINES AT LENS MAZE OF DESTRUCTION

French Engineers Cannot Solve the Plan of Ruin.

Birthday of Great Leader.

Tomorrow is Christmas Day, the one day in all the year that is different from the rest. It is the day we celebrate as the birthday of the great labor leader.

To Prince Rupert Christmas has a special significance because the man, Jesus, was a particular friend of the fisherfolk, lived much among them, and often went out in the boats and probably took a turn with the nets.

The pictures we get of Jesus show him dressed in spotless robes, with all the appearance of never having worked. Nothing could be more false. He worked at his trade as a carpenter and as one of the working classes of the time would be just one of the common people of the country. So familiar were the people with him that when he once went into church and stood up to speak the people scoffed at the idea of one of their set being a leader among men.

Jesus was opposed to conventional life. He saw the people falling into a rut, enmeshed in a network of superstition and trying to hold each other back with laws and regulations, while denying the spirit of true religion. It is for each one to decide whether we are more tolerant but only a fraction more. We think we are more enlightened, but yet many of our beliefs and actions will not bear analysis. If Jesus came today he would be just as much an outcast as he was two thousand years ago, and if he were not crucified it would simply be because it is contrary to the custom of the country.

Christmas is Children's Day.

Tomorrow is the children's day. Jesus was the friend of children. As a child he must have had a hard time. He was not one of the smart set. His birth place was in the caravansary among the camels and donkeys. His home in Nazareth where he grew up was an unconventional dwelling, probably a hut. His playmates were the village children. Yet we look on him as a model child and we teach our children to look with regard on him.

With the Christian custom of family gatherings, we have incorporated the heathen custom of gift giving and the stories of Santa Claus. It is a good combination and one that makes for an ideal celebration.

It is a great thing to get away from the worries of work and surround ourselves with the myths of fairyland and the joys of communal life. The desire to please is given full sway and all benefit from it. Throughout the year we work for ourselves and our families. 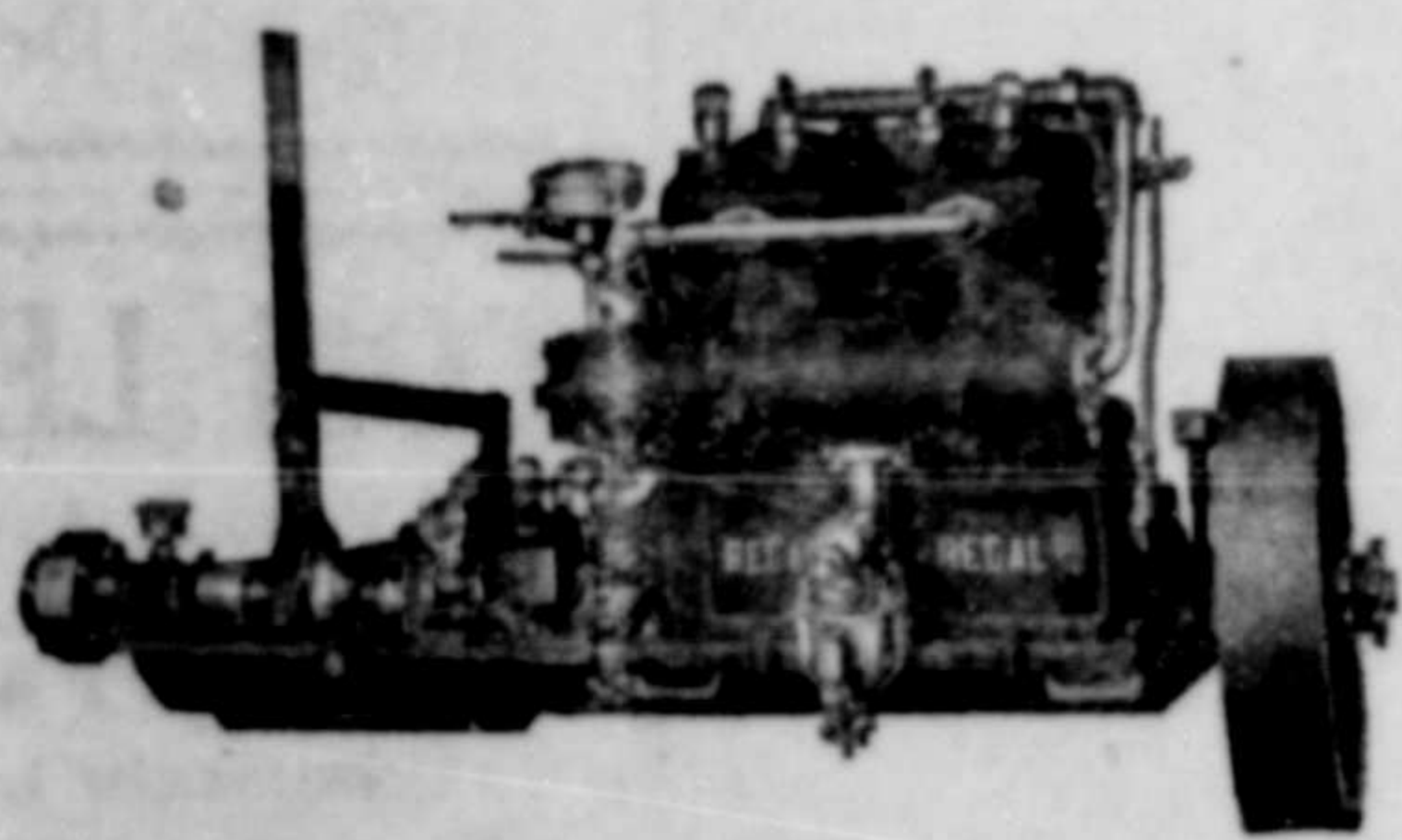

MR. McCAFFERY INTERVIEWED IN MONTREAL

Tells of Disadvantages Under Monopoly Causes to Fishing Here.

An interview with M. P. McCaffery, president of the local Board of Trade, is published in the Montreal Gazette of December 10. He told of the great activity in the fish business in Prince Rupert and of the importance of the city as the centre for American fishermen, being the most convenient point to the greatest halibut banks of the world.

He also dealt with the salmon fisheries and mentioned the reforms that were desired in the fishing laws which had taken him originally east. The abolition of corporation monopoly was a matter which would reflect greatly on the increased prosperity of the city of Prince Rupert. The existence of laws allowing such a condition and the privilege being granted to Orientals was working an injustice on 15,000 people who had been attracted to the north by the fisheries.

NEW MILL GOING IN AT TELKWA

Messrs. Chapman, Svenson and McDonald Form Telkwa Lumber Co.

Still another sawmill is to go in up-river. The latest one is to be installed just below the town of Telkwa on the Bulkley River by the Telkwa Lumber Co. The new company has been formed by Messrs. Svenson, Chapman and McDonald. The machinery is now on the ground and timber cutting will be commenced immediately. In the spring the mill will be moved out to the timber. The new establishment will help considerably in relieving the lumber scarcity which has been prevailing lately in the Bulkley Valley.

P. O. RESTRICTIONS ON REMITTANCES REMOVED

It is again possible to purchase postal notes and money orders for remittance to the United States. This branch of the public service has been suspended for some weeks past, on account of the high and fluctuating rates of exchange. The price of money has now been adjusted between the post offices of the two countries, and the inconvenience of not being able to remit small sums through the post office has been removed.

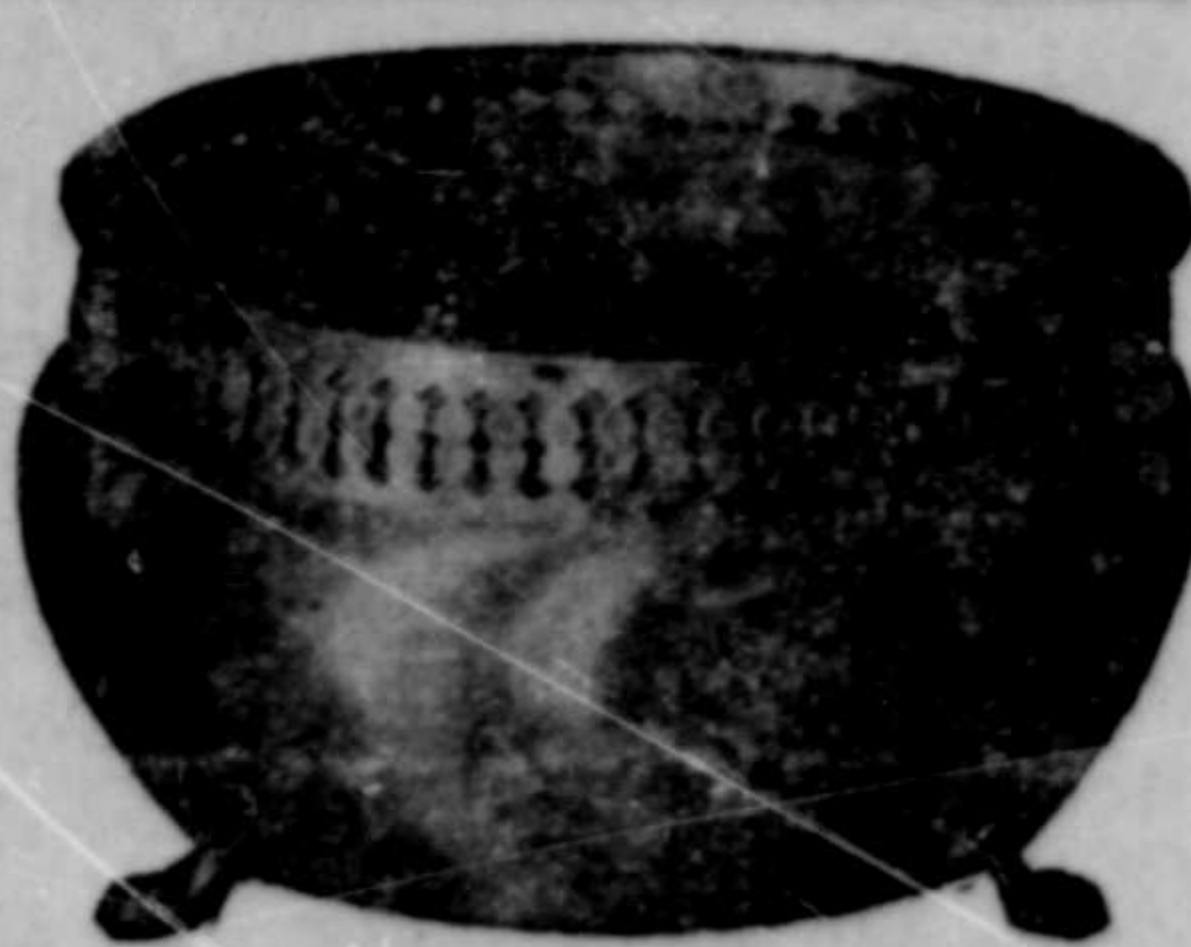

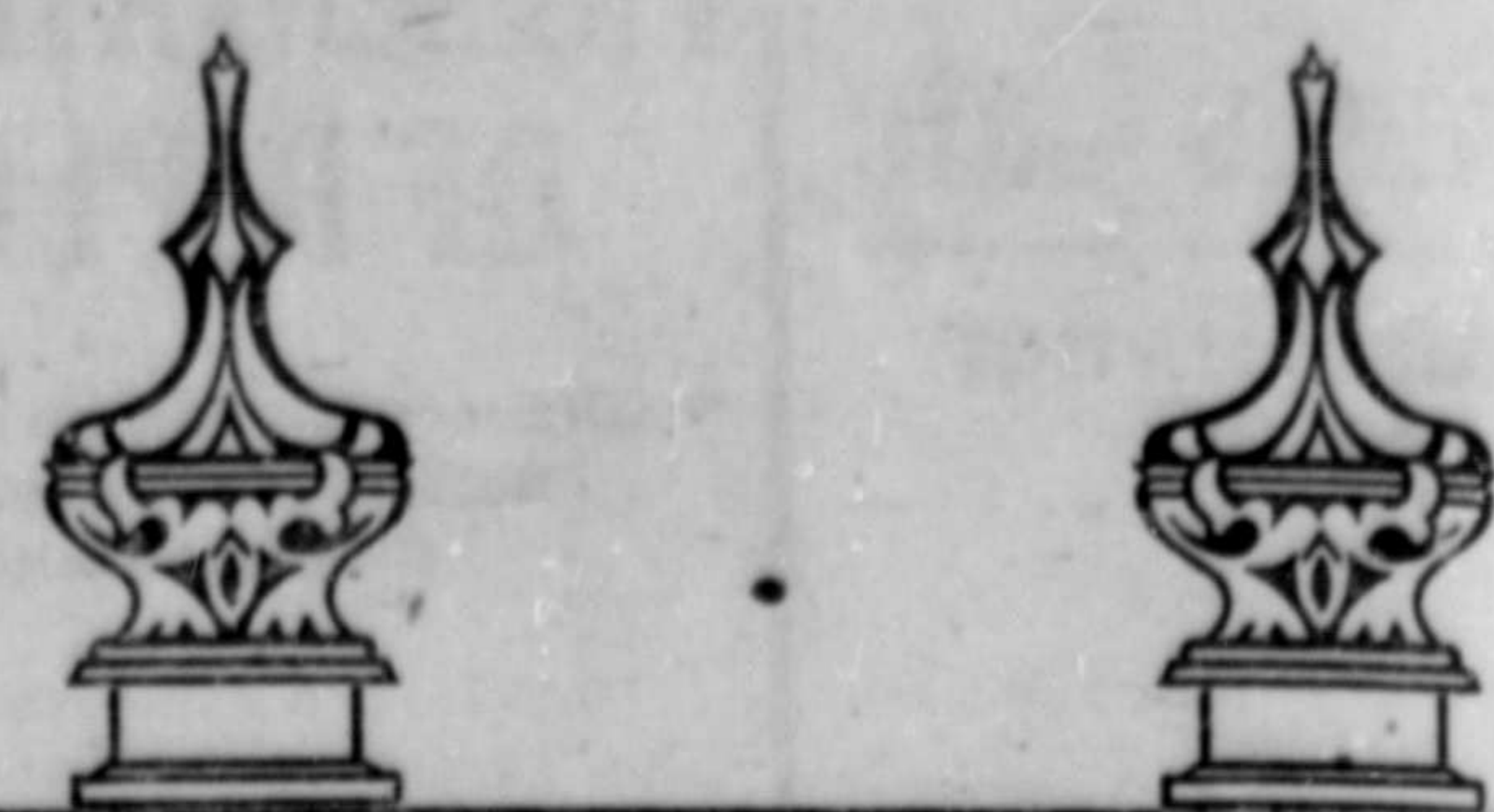
STATES GET RID OF MANY UNDESIRABLES

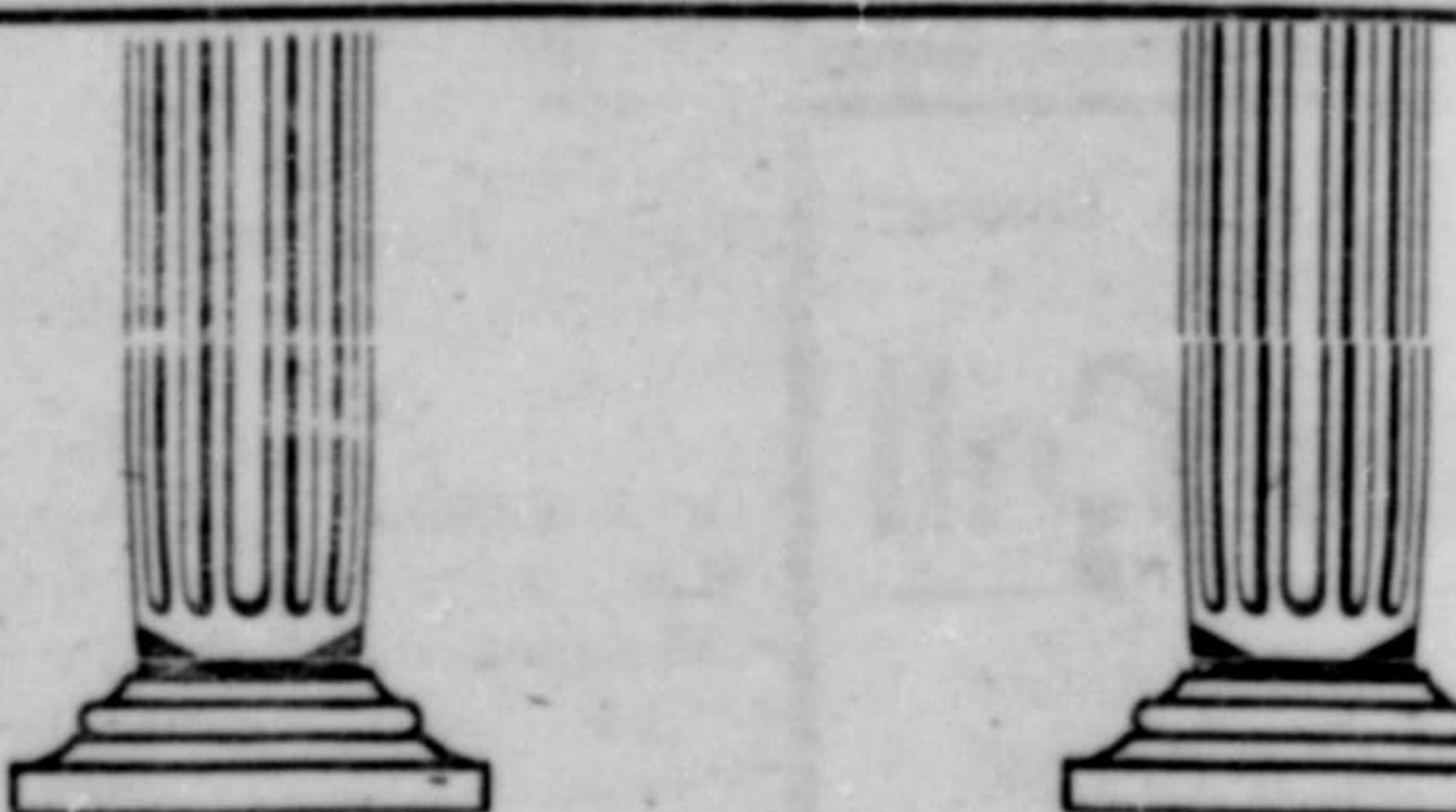
