

## CANADIAN BOY MAKES FASTEST TIME AT HENLEY

#### C. E. TISDALL, M.P.P., FORSEES THE FUTURE

Anticipates That Rupert Will Have All the Fishing Business of the Coast

C. E. Tisdall, M.P.P., of Vancouver, recently returned from a trip to the north, taking in all the towns between Dawson and Rupert. He talked of his trip to the Vancouver Province and was frank in his opinion that Rupert will get the fishing business. Speaking with reference to the prospects of Prince Rupert, Mr. Tisdall said: "The shipment of fish as well as the actual fishing and canning will do Prince Rupert a great deal of good. I believe the industry will build up that young city just as it supported Vancouver in the early days. Not only will Prince Rupert derive great benefit from the fishing and canning off its own shores, but it will get all the shipments from Juneau and Ketchikan, which now come south by boat to Seattle and Vancouver. "The fine Alaska black cod, the salmon, the halibut and the herring of the North Pacific will get to Chicago and New York at least two days earlier if sent by way of Prince Rupert and the Grand Trunk Pacific to Winnipeg, thence south. "This will no doubt be a loss to Vancouver, but Prince Rupert in this respect must naturally gain from her geographical position."

#### STRUCK NEW VEIN IN GREAT OHIO MINE

Rich Copper Ore Found in New Tunnel by George Jennings

A letter from Skeena Crossing which arrived last evening states that George Jennings has struck ore in the new tunnel on the Great Ohio group. The tunnel is in about 365 feet and the ore depth is 350, which is 200 feet deeper than the deepest shaft in the Rocher de Boule mine. This is convincing evidence that the copper runs very deep in the great Rocher de Boule mountain. The new ore runs about twelve per cent copper, and the owners of properties in the district anticipate something doing as a result of the new find.

#### OLD SCHOOL BUILDING WILL BE MOVED

ENGLISH CREWS ELIMINATED IN FIRST SERIES—TROPHY IS LIKELY TO COME TO AMERICA—WINNIPEG MADE WINNING

Henley-on-the-Thames, July 3.—The Grand Challenge Cup is going abroad for the fifth time in nine years, with the probability that it will come to North America. In the first series of the races for the trophy, all the English crews were eliminated. Winnipeg won an easy victory over the Thames Rowing Club. Harvard's second crew defeated Leander Union Boat Club. Boston disposed of the London Rowing Club. The German Club of Mayence won from Jesus College of Cambridge. The fastest time of the day was made by Dibble, of Canada, who won his way into the semi-finals of the Diamond Sculls. He will meet C. M. Stuart of Cambridge, the winner to row against E. C. Williams of the Viking Club.

#### MINING MAN WAS ENTHUSED PROSPECTS OF THIS DISTRICT

SPECIMENS OF ORE COLLECTED FOR PANAMA EXHIBITION SHOWS GREAT VARIETY AND MUCH WEALTH—WILL BE BIG MINING CENTRE

Wm. Tomlinson, who has been spending several weeks in this district on behalf of the Canadian Commissioners on the Panama Fair Exhibit, left this morning on the Rupert for Vancouver. Mr. Tomlinson has been gathering mineral specimens from the district to include in the B.C. mining exhibit at the big fair next year. As a result of his investigations, Mr. Tomlinson, who is a practical mining man, is enthusiastic over the mining prospects of this city and the country surrounding. "The exhibits I have procured," said Mr. Tomlinson, "are an excellent indication of the great variety and richness of the ore in the district surrounding your city. The specimens are in many cases very rich and nothing like them has ever before been taken outside for public inspection. After going over the district, I decided the north country should have the exhibit it deserves and I have exceeded my instructions considerably as to the number of samples I should take out. "There is no question in my mind as to the great future mining has in store for your city and district. It is surrounded by good mining country and it is only a question of time until development comes. We are certainly trying our best to give the north a worthy portion of the British Columbia display." While in Hazelton two weeks ago, Mr. Tomlinson, with the aid of C. H. Sawle, the secretary of the Mine Owners' Association, gathered up five cases of representative samples of Hazelton district ore for display in the Provincial ore exhibit at Victoria.

#### Cabinet Ministers Coming

Hon. W. J. Bowser, Attorney-General, and Hon. W. R. Ross, Minister of Lands, are now en route on their trip over the mountain section of the G. T. P. They go to Edmonton and from there take the G. T. P. to Rupert. It is expected they will arrive here about the end of next week. General Superintendent Mehan will meet the Ministers at Fort George and will accompany them to Rupert. Stops will be made by the party at the towns along the line. Probably the original bone of contention was jawbone.

#### EVIDENCE BEING TAKEN OVER MINE DISASTER

(Special to The Daily News)  
Hillcrest, July 3.—Three witnesses were called in the official enquiry into the mine disaster here. Engineer Hutchison gave expert testimony on the working plan of the mine at Guygat. A miner, one of the rescuers, gave evidence on the location and identification of the body of Harry White, and the Bellevue rescue gang gave evidence as to the probable location of the explosion responsible for the disaster. The theory is that the explosion occurred in room 33 of the old No. 1 south chute. At a special meeting of the school board today the bids for the new school were opened. The lowest bid was that of J. H. Hilditch for a sum in the vicinity of \$13,000. Most of the local contractors had figured on the job.

#### JAPAN WILL NOT PUBLISH DETAILS OF NEGOTIATIONS

Tokio, July 3.—Takaaki Kato, the Japanese foreign minister, today announced that details of the treaty negotiations between Japan and the United States on the subject of the Californian alien land ownership legislation would not be published out of deference to a request from the United States government, and also because the publication was deemed unnecessary. The comment today of the more moderate among the leading newspapers unanimously expresses dissatisfaction with America, but following the lead of the foreign minister, shows a disposition soberly to discuss the subject in the hope of enlightening instead of exciting the public. The fear is expressed that Japan's case is hopeless, and there is evidence of a strong feeling that the time has arrived to fix the status of Japanese subjects living abroad.

#### CITY BUILDING PERMITS SHOW BIG INCREASE

Every Month Higher Than Last Year—Total Aways Ahead

The city building permits for June show a total of \$31,915 as against \$10,250 in 1913, \$19,300 in 1912, and \$29,925 in 1911. Thus June this year has been the best building June month Rupert has ever had. The total for the first six months of 1914 shows \$555,635 as against \$78,902 for the first six months of last year, and \$198,332 for the whole twelve months of 1913. There are also many new buildings in sight and July will show another increase while the total for the whole twelve months will show an enormous increase over any previous year. Considering the financial depression existing elsewhere Rupert shows a remarkable advancement.

Our American cousins to the south as a rule are excellent fellows. The quota that has come to make their homes among us in Prince Rupert are among our most respected citizens. Nevertheless it frequently happens that some light-headed American breaks through the traditional customs and does something very insulting to Canada. Flag incidents are very common all over the country. Indeed a certain class of Americans seem to take pleasure in insulting everything Canadian. Yesterday an American flag was placed on the pinnacle of the dry dock smockstack just above where the football game was played. It is hardly possible that the individual who placed it there was ignorant of the international courtesies that forbade it. In primitive times a lesser incident would be the cause of war. Even now an event like that on the American side would soon raise the ire of the mob. Canadians, however, are perhaps a little too broad minded in the matter and allow the thing to slip. In view of the reciprocal greetings that were exchanged between this city and Ketchikan it is regrettable that an incident of this nature should arise.

Prince Rupert has at last a first class baseball team. The game put up on Dominion Day would do credit to many a larger centre. It looks real bad to have a team come in from one of the smaller centres such as Hazelton and trim the local team. In spite of the fact

that Ketchikan has a first class team, some of them old league players, the Prince Rupert team put up a game that will do much toward boosting the city. Wholesome sport is about as necessary as bread and butter and every city of even ordinary importance is expected to turn out a crack baseball team. A few patriotic citizens have with their own funds brought the team to its present standing, but the public should not expect this to continue. Don't forget to put your hand in your money basket every time the collection box is passed around.

This city is about to appeal from the decision of Justice Morrison in the case of the City vs. Ritchie. This is regrettable for, in the first place, the case should have never been tried. The whole fight is over the fact that Mr. Ritchie and his associates insisted on charging an outsider the small sum of \$100 to secure connection with the sewer. The sewer is private property. Why shouldn't they endeavor to get back a portion of the original cost? If the city had left the matter alone it would now be peaceably solved. But to appeal the case is not only foolish but useless. Even if the city wins, what does it get? Simply power to show a little vindictiveness towards Mr. Ritchie and his associates. The city will not have gained in dollars and cents and a similar case need never arise.

at least would even go further than the Mayor in this. They would like to see a new sewer put in on the whole street and compel everybody to join it. There are other portions of the city where they even haven't a temporary sewer while a permanent one is suggested for this district just to show the almightiness of the Council. This certainly looks bad in a Council that hasn't a cent to spend on advertising the city. Lots of money for lawsuits and lots of money for duplicate sewers on Fourth Avenue W., but no money to advertise the city nor to supply the suffering portions of the city with necessary water and sewers.

Another piece of narrow-mindedness is shown in their refusal to allow Capt. Groves, who is willing to pay the price, to connect with the Ritchie sewer. While they are revelling in the courts of law, private citizens must wait and take chances on the life and health of their families. Why don't they get down to common sense and handle that affair as any level headed business man would do.

**LARGE BREWERY IS TO BE ESTABLISHED**

Toronto Capitalists Behind Big Structure for Fort George

The next two months will see the erection of a large brewery building in the district. Although the exact location of the site is not known, it has been given out definitely that it will be somewhere on the Prince George town-site. Toronto capitalists of well known standing are behind the enterprise.

The officials of the new company have had analyses made of the water of both the Nechaco and Fraser Rivers by expert chemists, and these gave the opinion that although both samples were equally good, it would be impossible to find anywhere in North America water better suited for the purposes of a brewery.

It is understood that a four-storey brick structure is in contemplation.—Tribune.

**SEATTLE SHUTS DOWN ON CALGARY PROMOTERS**

Seattle, July 3.—The Seattle P.I. printed the following interview with Mayor Gill yesterday:

"Probably no greater service has been done the people, especially those of small means, than the warning issued by the Post-Intelligencer against Calgary oils. People with money to invest are apt to be carried off their feet by just such methods of promotion and, in their eagerness to secure large returns on their investments, are liable to have their judgment warped under the influence of get-rich-quick schemes. I am personally grateful to the Post-Intelligencer for its service to the community, and I am convinced that there will be little or no trouble in the future with such promoters."

The P.I. is conducting a campaign of education, warning the people of the true character of the Calgary situation. While admitting that the district may some day be a commercial success, it warns its readers against going into the different companies blindly.

On Monday of last week Government Agent T. W. Herne began the allotment of pre-emptions in the district recently thrown open by the Provincial Government on the south fork of the Fraser River.

**A \$2,000,000 FRAUD**

French Financial Agent in Brazil is the Accused

Paris, July 3.—On the formal complaint of the Brazilian Minister legal proceedings have been taken against Wenderly De Mendoca, formerly Financial Agent of France in the State of Alagoas, Brazil.

De Mendoca is charged with defrauding the State of \$2,000,000. He was commissioned to place loans for the State in Paris, but it is charged that he never transmitted the funds.

The police seized all De Mendoca's books and papers in his office, but they have not been able to locate him.

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**ONLY FRENCH HORSES BEAT THE CANADIAN**

London, Ont., July 3.—The Canadian horses at the International Horse Show, which ends in London, England, next Wednesday, have made a better record than ever before. Hon. Adam Beck of this city is the only exhibitor from this country, and after winning seven ribbons he received a cable announcing that his horses, Sir Thomas and Sir Edward, had taken second prizes last night in the "best performance over the course," event for pairs. There were one hundred and fifty pairs from the world entered, and the Canadian horses, which in other years had never succeeded in getting better than third, were beaten last week only by the French.

**BLUEBACK SALMON IN A RECORD RUN**

Portland, July 3.—What is declared the greatest run of blueback salmon known during the last twenty years is now on in the upper Columbia River near Corbets. One boat reported a catch of one ton of this fish in twenty-four hours.

McGowan's cannery, at Corbets, was obliged to wire the cannery at Ilwaco, at the mouth of the river, to send for the surplus fish.
