RT. HON. JOSEPH CHAMBERLAIN SUCCUMBED TO LONG ILLNESS

HAS HAD A STRIKING CAREER — MADE GREAT SUCCESS IN BUSINESS—BECAME A LEADER IN GOVERNMENT OF THE COUNTRY

London, July 3.—The death of Rt. Hon. Joseph Chamberlain occurred today. His strength had been failing for some time and his death was not altogether unexpected. He had reached the age of 78 years. For several years past he had not been able to take a very active part in politics and a few months ago retired permanently from public life.

He was elected mayor of Birmingham in 1873, and from that time on he became a very prominent figure in the politics of the Empire. He broke with Gladstone in 1886 on the Irish policy and from that time on became identified with what is now the Unionist party. Under the late Lord Salisbury he was Colonial Secretary.

Joseph Chamberlain began his business career with his uncle in the Nettleford Screw Nail Company. This was the beginning of our modern screw nail business.

It was a difficult task to get the people using them, however, and it was only after a clever advertising scheme of Mr. Chamberlain's that the business became a success. He made a study of the colors that appealed to the different countries and then packed the nails in packages of the proper colors. This produced a great demand and a fortune for the company.

Mr. Chamberlain's first public service was in the Manchester Municipal Council. He introduced a system of water sewers and lighting that proved a great success. Indeed he was the vital factor in the making of that city.

Later he was forced to become their parliamentary representative. He joined the ranks of Mr. Gladstone and became his right hand man. A split over the Home Rule bill, however, forced him to part with his leader, and he became one of the leading spirits in forming the new Unionist party. His break with the Irish and with a section of the Scottish people, however, prevented him from securing the premiership. His later advocacy of Tariff reform and Imperial Federation is still fresh in the minds of everybody. Mr. Chamberlain will be remembered as one of the greatest of British statesmen.

PACIFIC GREAT EASTERN RUSHING WORK AHEAD

Working 6,000 Men Now—Start North Soon

Mr. J. Callaghan, chief engineer of the Pacific Great Eastern railway, yesterday announced that construction work was under way along the entire line from Squamish to Fort George. In company with Mr. J. W. Stewart, president of the line, he returned yesterday from an inspection trip. The party went over the proposed line north of Fort George into the Peace River district. They have one locating party in the field and two others will start soon. Mr. Callaghan made the important announcement that they expected within the next two months to start construction work on the first hundred mile section north of Fort George. The company has filed a route map for its proposed line to the Alberta-British Columbia boundary, this going through the Rockies at Pine Pass, 140 miles north of Fort George.

There are about 6,000 men now at work. Within the next four months it is expected grading between Clinton and Lillooet will have been completed, and the line from Lillooet to the railroad, nineteen miles north of Squamish, is expected to have been completed ready for the rails during August. It is likely that in September they will commence laying steel south of Fort George. If possible, a train service from Squamish to Lillooet will be started by the latter part of November.

Their presence means trade, and trade is prosperity, therefore when the home grown products are offered to you at the particular store at which you do business; when you are offered the choicest that can be grown, don't ask the merchant to supply you at an impossible price. At this stage the growers ask and expect to receive a little more than the older settled districts. It costs them more to subsist and their hardships are greater.

THE PANAMA CANAL
This wonderful waterway cost \$49,000,000 and involved a nine-mile cut through a mountain, the erection of six pairs of gigantic locks, and a dam 150 feet high and a mile long.
