

GOVERNMENT ANTICIPATES PEACEFUL SETTLEMENT

ANOTHER COMPANY WILL DRILL FOR OIL NEAR SKIDEGATE-PUT IT UP TO NORWEGIAN GOV'T

CITY TREASURER'S REPORT ---BURDEN ON MAN WHO PAYS

REARS OF TAXES COMPELS CITY TO INCREASE LEVY THREE MILLS—SINKING FUND MADE UP FROM GENERAL REVENUE

At the City Council last evening the city treasurer presented a statement which shows that the taxpayer who is meeting his obligations to the city is compelled to pay extra because of the arrears of taxes, particularly on improvements.

After the report was read, Ald. Clymont said he hoped the press would publish it in full and the Acting-Mayor hoped the citizens would thoroughly digest it. The report follows:—

These debentures matured on the 1st and 2nd, and this amount was provided out of general fund to take up the bonds redeemed and interest charges:—

Under this bylaw the amount required to be set aside for the payment of the sinking fund is \$8,225.00, and the payment of interest \$2,100.00. It will, therefore, be seen on account of these arrears general fund has had to find \$3,061.35 already to meet the city's obligations, and on December 1 will have to find \$1,050.00 more to pay off interest charges due on that date. These improvements at the present time, owing to delinquent payments, are indebted to the general fund of the city:—

NORWEGIAN GOVERNMENT WILL BE CALLED UPON TO ACT

OFFICER OF STORSTAD RESPONSIBLE FOR THE SINKING OF EMPRESS BEING A NORWEGIAN, CAN'T HAVE HIS CERTIFICATE CANCELLED HERE

(Special to The Daily News)
Ottawa, July 14.—It is up to the Norwegian Government to deal with the man who is responsible for the sinking of the Empress of Ireland.

The court of inquiry found Chief Officer Tuftness, of the Storstad responsible. As he is a Norwegian and an officer of a Norwegian vessel, the Canadian and British authorities are unable to cancel his certificate. Only the government issuing it can do so.

The finding of the board of evidence taken will be forwarded to Norway at once.

ALASKA NORTHERN IS TO BE OPENED TO MILE 71

Line for Use of Engineers Engaged Locating Route for New Railroad

Seward, Alaska, July 14.—Col. Swanitz has announced that the line of the Alaska Northern railroad will be opened as far as Mile 71 this summer for the use of the Government engineers who are working between Seward and Ship Creek, surveying for a suitable route for the Alaska railroad authorized by Act of Congress.

One of the Government crews is now working at Mile 45 but will move out along the line as soon as the railroad has been repaired enough to transport supplies to the front. The telephone is being overhauled and will be in operation as far as Kern Creek, or Mile 71, this week.

General Manager Herbert Tozier, of the Alaska Northern Railroad, and Major John E. Balaine will leave Seward soon for the terminus of the line, going overland to Portage Bay to make an examination of that place during the summer.

TEST CROP REPORTS ARE VERY ENCOURAGING

Aspects Are That There Will Be Exceptionally Heavy Yield

Regina, July 14.—The latest crop reports received by the Statistics Branch of the Department of Agriculture of Saskatchewan are very encouraging and prospects are that there will be an exceptionally heavy yield of grain this year. What is from 15 to 20 inches high and is just starting to head out. In certain districts marquis wheat is 34 inches high and headed out. Crops on summer fallow and new breaking are making the best showing.

F. W. Green, formerly secretary of the Saskatchewan Grain Growers' Association, has expressed the opinion that forty bushels to the acre will be common this year.

SUGGESTED PLEBISCITE ON GRANT OF ROADWAY

City Council Turned Down Proposition and Will Make Govt. Expropriate

The application of the Dominion Public Works Department for the granting of a piece of land on Acropolis Hill Park for a roadway to the armory site was up before the City Council last evening and the Council turned the proposition down.

The Board of Works reported recommending a plebiscite. Ald. McClymont could not see the value of a plebiscite and contended that the natural entrance was up Biggar Place.

Ald. Dybbavn said the road would not enhance the value of city property and he was sure the ratepayers would not pass it.

Acting Mayor Morrissey said the city had already given away a valuable piece of property. The city had been generous to both Governments and had got nothing in return.

The letter of A. Carss stated the city was only asked as a matter of courtesy because if they did not grant the road the government would expropriate it.

The motion to have a plebiscite was defeated.

HIS LOVE SPURNED, HE TAKES OWN LIFE

Pioneer Alaskan Dramatically Commits Suicide in Fairbanks

Fairbanks, Alaska, July 14.—Benjamin Howland, for 14 years a resident of Alaska, committed suicide by taking poison early Thursday morning last on the street in front of the residence of Miss Barbara O'Connor, nurse at St. Mathew's hospital, after she had refused his proposal of matrimony.

Howland was a widower, had been a resident of Fairbanks since the early days of the camp. He had lived in the Iditarod before coming here. Soon after returning from a trip to the Chisana mining district he met and became infatuated with Miss O'Connor.

Howland went to her home at 3 o'clock yesterday morning and demanded that she marry him. When she refused he went out on the sidewalk and took the poison.

Howland's home was in Kansas City, where he had relatives.

HOW AN EASTERN CITY BUYS POWER IN BULK

Peterborough Alderman Makes a Brief Address Before City Council

F. H. Dobbin, an alderman of the city of Peterborough, Ontario, who was a visitor in the City Council chamber last evening, was invited by Acting Mayor Morrissey to address the Council, and made a few remarks concerning electric energy as now secured in his home city.

Mr. Dobbin said as far as he could see from his short observation that the municipal problems were pretty much the same here as in the east excepting that they were accentuated and magnified here.

In Peterborough the municipality is buying electric power from the Provincial hydro electric commission. The commission gives the city a price in bulk and delivers the power at the city limits. The municipality owns the distributing plants and controls the distribution absolutely.

They have no interest in where the power comes from but as a matter of fact the power Peterborough gets is purchased from a private company.

The speaker believes it is good business to let the private company develop the power and purchase it in bulk. He had heard Prince Rupert had a similar proposition.

The Mayor thanked Mr. Dobbin and said unfortunately his advice was a little late.

WRITERS UNDER ARREST

Warrants Out for Story Appearing in the Sunset Magazine

San Francisco, July 14.—Warrants for the arrest of Charles K. Field, editor of the Sunset Magazine and former president of the Bohemian Club; Robert J. Fowler, an aviator; Riley A. Scott, a writer, and Ray S. Duhem, a photographer, has been issued at the request of John W. Preston, U. S. District Attorney here.

The charge against all four is the disclosure of military secrets, and the penalty is ten years in prison for such disclosures if made abroad and one year if made in the United States.

In April the Sunset published an article entitled "Can the Panama Canal Be Destroyed From the Air?" Reproductions of photographs taken from an aeroplane and showing some of the fortifications of the canal zone and of the San Francisco presidio accompanied the text.

BOND GUARANTEE BEING HELD UP

G. T. P. to Get Money, It Is Said, When It Settles With Employees

Ottawa, July 14.—It is asserted here that the details of the Grand Trunk Pacific bond guarantee, voted by Parliament, will not be arranged until the company has settled its difficulties with its machinists. A board of conciliation named some time ago reported that the men should be paid the same wages as prevail on parallel lines in Western Canada.

It is asserted that, to the regret of the Minister of Labor, the government action is being postponed until the award of the board has been complied with. Pending the settlement of the trouble, it is stated that the G. T. P. is borrowing money on its own security and carrying on its undertakings.

F. C. WRIGHT INTERESTED IN SYNDICATE WHO WILL PUT DOWN WELL NEAR SKIDEGATE—COAL AND OIL PROSPECTS GOOD

F. C. Wright, of Queen Charlotte Islands, who has been in Vancouver for some time in connection with his interests in the islands, came back yesterday and leaves tonight for the islands.

He is manager of the McKinnon Syndicate who are drilling for coal on Graham Island and is very optimistic over the prospects of both coal and oil.

Mr. Wright is an expert diamond drill operator and has been made a partner in a company who have nineteen sections of oil land leases and \$50,000 in cash to prospect them. The company is called the North Pacific Development Company.

They have engaged Mr. Wright to put down a test hole and the diamond drill outfit is now on its way here. Work will be started in a week or two. Mr. Wright says they will probably have to go 1,200 or 1,500 feet. The first well will be put down near Skidegate.

While drilling for coal for Armstrong & Morrison last summer, Mr. Wright struck an oil seepage at a depth of only 288 feet, and again at 380 feet.

Wm. Manson declared on Saturday night that if the government allowed the Prince-Rupert Hydro-Electric Co. to enter this city's streets against the wishes of the citizens he would break with the government and fight them on that issue. This will be comforting news for both friends and foes of Mr. Manson's. The News has been telling him for several years that that was the course he should pursue. It is even good politics and Mr. Manson is not heedless to that motive. But he says that he had put off this fight till now because any time before this was premature. Surely he doesn't mean this. Does he mean to say that it is an honest deal to this company to hesitate in his attitude toward them until they have spent hundreds of thousands of dollars on their scheme. This paper holds no brief for the company, and is delighted to see Mr. Manson at long last take a man's stand in the matter, but he should have done this when the question first came up and before the company had spent a huge sum of money.

Mr. Manson it is reasonable to believe would have never taken the stand he now does if the News had not made any other position untenable. For five long years he fiddled and hedged with this question and now he suddenly seeks a death bed repentance, and tells the people he will have his way or fight the government. A good many people will believe that he must have had a favorable promise from Bowser before he said that and that he was just making a grand stand play.

Last municipal election Wm. Manson, the present mayor and a few of their satellites created quite an uproar in opposition to a certain agreement suggested between the Hydro-Electric Company and this city. They opened a committee room, hired theatres and held meetings presumably to denounce the agreement. Instead of an agreement with that company we are now in danger of having them turned loose in this city without any control by the city whatsoever. Those "philanthropic" gentlemen are not holding any public meeting now to oppose their entrance, when a strong expression of public opinion would be of service. The impression this creates is that not only were they insincere in their conduct last fall, but that even now they are not using all the means at their disposal for keeping this company out.

The excuse Wm. Manson gave for paying a president of the Conservative Association \$15,000 for Woodworth Lake water was that it would cost that much to have it expropriated. That's surely some expense for a trifling little case at law. Wm. Manson could give another reason of he wished. What a killing somebody must have made on the "expropriation" of the post office site at that rate.

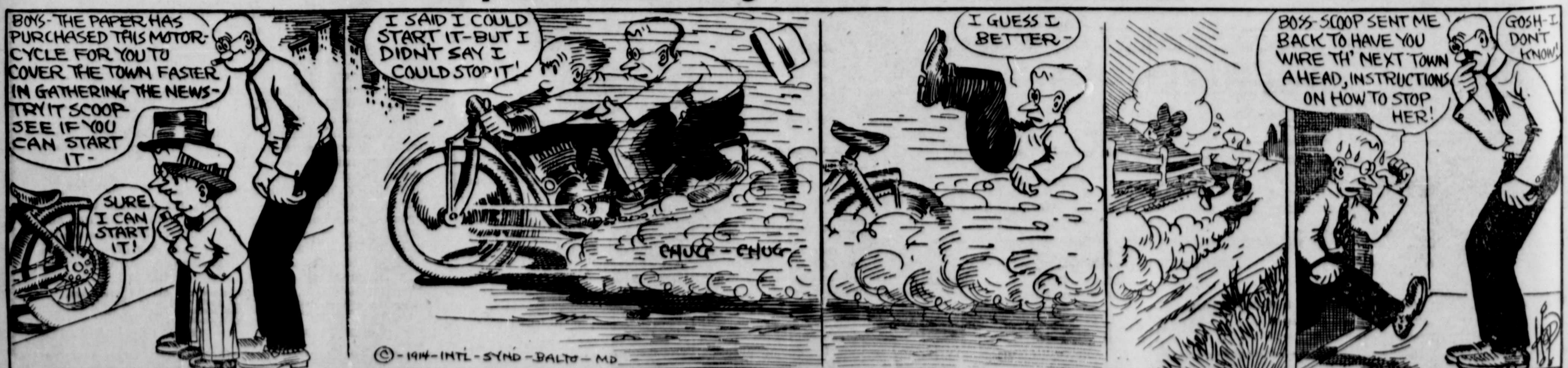

Victoria football enthusiasts have made arrangements to bring a French football team out to the Capital City this fall for a series of games.

Con Jones has also promised to bring out the two leading English soccer teams this fall, and with three touring elevens in the country, Association football should receive the greatest kind of an advance.

Mr. F. C. B. Cave, captain of the Westminster cricket team, has been selected to play on the All-Canada team against a representative American aggregation. He is the only player selected west of Winnipeg. The international matches are to be played in Philadelphia.

The constant kicking by supporters about referees when decisions go against their club, doesn't appeal to the majority of football fans who believe in fair play. If the game is to prosper in Prince Rupert this sort of thing should be conspicuous by its absence.

Ten-men lacrosse appears to be making quite a hit in the East but it is doubtful whether we will ever have the abbreviated out this way. Playing fields are too large to permit of the reduction of the players on a team, and by bringing the team down to ten men each does not speed up the game. It doesn't do any harm to experiment with new rules, but it is not likely that ten-men lacrosse will cause any great furore in the Dominion.

"We were told that we would have a strenuous time playing for the Mann Cup on the Coast, and that we would get everything but fair treatment, but believe me, we will hand them the lie when we get home," declared an official of the Brampton Cup before departing for the East. "We have nothing but praise for the cup-holders and Coast enthusiasts."

The English team accomplished the route of the Belgians in the first preliminary round of the Dwight F. Davis international lawn tennis trophy competition.

H. Roper Barrett, the main hope of Great Britain's team for the Davis Trophy, has announced that he would be unable to go to America to take part in the match in the event of England being successful over France in the next round. His decision was brought about by the pressure of private business.

Tom Flannigan, of Toronto, who trained Jack Johnson for his fight with Jim Jeffries at Reno, and who was in the champion's corner in his recent fight with Moran in Paris, is out with the statement that the remarks about the fight being fixed is a lie, pure and simple.

That soccer football is a paying proposition is indicated by the splendid returns during the past season. The successful season that Liverpool enjoyed ending in their appearance in the final tie of the English Cup, resulted in a record profit of \$43,901, part of which has been invested in players. After giving up the proceeds of three players games, amounting to \$8,844, to three players entitled to a benefit, Sheffield made a net profit of \$16,838, which enabled them to pay five per cent dividend. Of the London clubs, West Ham United made a net profit of \$11,000, also paying out five per cent to their shareholders. The combined incomes of the five Glasgow professional teams—Celtic, Rangers, Third Lanark, Clyde and Patrick Thistle—amounted to \$272,940.

ments of local improvement taxes, and, unless this is done, I venture to say with the additional bylaws just going through that next year the city will be called upon to provide a contingent amount in the estimates of \$35,000 to \$40,000 to meet the delinquent payments. In fact, even this year unless arrears come in liberally before the close of the year I estimate we will require about \$48,000 to keep our sinking funds intact, which we are compelled to do by the Municipal Act.

The total levy for local improvements for 1914 is \$129,923.64, of which \$78,996.02 has to be reserved for sinking funds and \$50,927.62 for payment interest. In addition to the levy we have to take care of \$31,269.39 arrears from 1912 and 1913. Of this amount \$17,800.06 belongs to the capital accounts of the different bylaws (Section One grading and plank roadways authorized in 1911), \$6,005.20 arrears of debentures taken up by city, \$3,420.60 on Market Place grading; \$3,443.53 is accrued interest on long-term improvements through non-sale of bonds and uncompleted work. These figures make up a total of \$161,193.03 local improvement taxes outstanding on May 1, 1914.

Our cash collections to June 8 were \$92,809.75. This total includes Government and city proportion. Of this amount \$11,693.48 was on account of 1912 and 1913 arrears, leaving a balance of \$81,116.27 to apply against 1914 levy. Our sinking funds required \$78,996.02 of this amount, thus leaving \$2,120.25 with which to pay interest liabilities, amounting to \$50,927.62, or a shortage of \$48,807.37.

Assuming at the present time all our local improvement work was completed and debentures sold the present ratio of collections would mean only a little more than sufficient money to set aside as sinking fund reserve and we would be compelled to raise in our estimates a sufficient sum to make our interest payments pending collection of arrears. It would, therefore, be imperative to provide out of general revenue an amount of \$48,800, equivalent to three mills on our assessment.

I respectfully submit this is a hardship on properties where there are no local improvements, because they are being taxed 3 mills on general rate to help out delinquent local improvement taxpayers. Granted it is only a temporary loan to be repaid back

to general fund, but from experience of the past three years it is a recurring charge and the money is practically tied up. Furthermore, properties are continually changing hands and the subsequent holder derives the benefit, not the property holder who was penalized through another's delinquent payment. Then again I beg to suggest it is extravagant finance, inasmuch as the holders who are delinquent force the city to levy an additional millage to take care of an obligation which they have failed to meet, not only therefore have they got to pay an extra amount in their general tax bill, but they have also to pay twelve per cent interest. On a \$20,000 lot at the rate of 3 mills an additional \$30 as well as 12 per cent interest would have to be paid. Assuming the \$20,000 carried a local improvement tax of \$250 per annum, the holder would be paying 24 per cent interest through non-payment—\$30 in general rates to provide for payment temporarily out of general fund and \$30, being 12 per cent interest through arrears on local improvement taxes, as provided for by Municipal Act.

The earliest date on which a tax sale could be held on these taxes is two years and three months after they become due. It is, therefore, apparent that general fund will be called upon to pay a very large amount before the city can enforce payment under this, its only legal procedure.
