THE BIG EXCURSION LEAVES FOR GRANBY TONIGHT

VANCOUVER HINDUS PREACHING SEDITION — MANY DISTINGUISHED MEN VISITING THE CITY

KOMOGATA MARU TO LEAVE VANCOUVER BY END OF WEEK

VANCOUVER HINDUS CALLING FOR FOUR HUNDRED VOLUNTEERS TO GO BACK WITH PASSENGERS OF THE JAPANESE STEAMER

Vancouver, July 15.—Four hundred Hindu volunteers are called to go back with the passengers of the Japanese steamer Komogata Maru, which has been detained by the immigration officers at Vancouver harbor. The volunteers are wanted to go back and preach sedition against the British Empire. A Mohammedan priest preached in the Sikh Temple here on Saturday evening his hearers to join in the movement. Six Hindus just arrived from London, B.C., where they had been attending a meeting urging the same thing. They propose to start for Vancouver, Victoria and New Columbia, and other centres in British Columbia. According to those who are in touch with and are following the movement, it is intended to raise a thousand seditionaries, including the four hundred volunteers. The 350 Komogata Maru passengers will shortly be deported.

Vancouver, July 15.—The immigration authorities here are now working on the various papers to be served in connection with the formal deportation of the passengers of the Komogata Maru and it is expected that the Japanese boat will leave the harbor within the next two or three days, certainly before the end of the week, unless something unexpected crops up. More Hindus have made two attempts to get into communication with those on the ship, once Saturday night about 8 o'clock and again at about 11 o'clock Sunday night. They went out in their boat, too small to carry any number of men, so it is not supposed that the intention was to take off any of the Hindus on

the boat. There were five or six Hindus on the launch and they carried on a rapid conversation with those on the Maru until the immigration patrol boat spied them and put them to flight. Mr. J. E. Bird, counsel for the Hindus, went out to the Maru yesterday for a conference with his clients relative to the proposed deportation proceedings. A telegram from the Maru was sent yesterday to the Governor-General, according to Sohan Lal, one of the members of the colony here. He states the telegram read: "Have sent many telegrams and received answer that matter was under consideration. Afterwards there was no final and definite answer. We are being shut in on the ship from four months and are becoming sick. There is no good food and water or exercise. Dying. Decide immediately. We are ignorant whether you do not answer or immigration men do not tell us. Committee Komogata Maru."

Mr. Lal also says that the following letter has been sent to Immigration Superintendent M. R. J. Reid: "We have the honor to inform you that we are suffering without water from yesterday morning. There was no light from the last two days. The Japanese are allowed to take water from the shore while we are kept thirsty. The cruelty of the immigration men to allow Japanese water and keep the Hindus thirsty is an extraordinary one. This is a cause of great unrest of which we shall not be responsible."

"We have made many requests but useless. Take pity on our wretched condition otherwise we shall be compelled to get ashore to quench our raging thirst. Committee Komogata Maru."

DISTINGUISHED MEN VISIT PRINCE RUPERT

Several Shareholders of Wallace Fisheries Making Tour of Coast

Col. A. D. McRae, Mr. Howell, father-in-law of Mr. McRae, and Senator Jansen, of Nebraska, were in the city for a few hours yesterday. They were making a round trip on the steamer Chelobin and visited the city while the steamer was in port. All three are interested in the Wallace Fisheries, owners of the Glaxton cannery on the Skeena, the Naden Harbor cannery, the Strathcona cannery on Rivers Inlet, and one on Vancouver Island. The party is making the trip to see some of their plants. Col. A. D. McRae has visited Rupert several times and sees marked improvement each time. Senator Jansen has not been here in a long time. He was here some six years ago and admitted that he would certainly not recognize anything but the harbor. At that time there was just a small wharf and a few docks. Today he sees a city. He expects to see rapid development with the opening of the railway.

INTENSE HEAT IN MISSOURI AND KANSAS

Sunday Hottest Day of Year in Topeka—Relief Said to be in Sight

Kansas City, Mo., July 15.—Some relief from the intense heat that has prevailed over Missouri and Kansas during the last two days was indicated in the latest reports to the weather bureau. Cooling breezes were reported at a number of points, and the temperature generally was several degrees lower than yesterday. Sunday night was the hottest of the year in Kansas. At Topeka it was the warmest night of July 12 in the 28 years the Topeka weather bureau has been in existence, a minimum temperature of 77 degrees being recorded. A slight thunderstorm early today caused the mercury to drop several degrees at Topeka.

130 CITIZENS WILL MAKE MERRY PARTY

Board of Trade Excursion Off For Granby Bay Tonight

Leaving at midnight the s.s. Prince Rupert will have aboard over 130 members and guests of the Board of Trade bound for Anxox and Stewart. On the same boat there arrived this morning from Victoria Mr. Ernest McGaffey, secretary of the Bureau of Provincial Information, who is accompanied by his wife, daughter and little son. Mr. McGaffey will be the speaker at the luncheon on board tomorrow at 1 o'clock. This morning he was taken for an auto ride round the city by the Board's Commissioner and also visited the Cold Storage plant and the Dry Dock.

On account of the large number of people leaving tonight arrangements have been made to permit excursionists to board the Prince Rupert at 9.30 p.m.

MAY ELEVATE TAFT TO SUPREME COURT BENCH

Washington, July 15.—Discussion as to whom President Wilson will appoint to fill the vacancy on the Supreme Court bench, caused by the death of Associate Justice Lurton, continued here today.

The names of those mentioned in connection with the vacancy include Former President Wm. H. Taft, members of the cabinet and others.

WESTWARD HO IS TAKING BIG SLUMP

Large Floating Population Leaving Canada This Year

London, July 15.—Emigration westward, which has been gradually falling off since the beginning of the year, has now shown a decided tendency towards a slump. The shipping companies of both the United Kingdom and the continent are feeling the effects very severely. The year 1914 will almost certainly compare poorly with the record of 1913 and not even show up favorably in comparison with any recent normal year. Ship owners are hoping that the autumn season may show better figures and though it is true that the emigrant stream is usually considerably augmented during the autumn, there is every reason to fear that the coming autumn will not in any sense make up for the deficiency of the earlier part of the year.

Emigration's Ebb Tide

Ottawa, July 15.—For the first time in Canadian immigration history it is believed that this year emigration from Canada will be greater than the immigration into the Dominion. However, the emigration from the Dominion will not be of Canadians, but of Ruthenians, Poles, Bulgarians and what are known as "foreigners." During the past couple of months there has been a big emigration of this unskilled labor which ebbs and flows any way and the immigration officials believe that the next few months will see an even bigger emigration of this class. No attempt is made to tabulate emigration from Canada but it is believed that it will be fully as heavy as the immigration. The immigration for the year will likely be about 150,000 which will be a drop of from 65 to 70 per cent, as last year the total was nearly 400,000. However, while the total will drop more than half the class of settlers who are coming are very superior, being almost entirely British and American settlers with money who are buying their own farms.

N. H. STOCKHOLDERS ARE GOING TO SUE MORGAN ESTATE

Boston, Mass., July 15.—Whipple, Sears & Oyden, attorneys representing minority stockholders of the New York, New Haven & Hartford Railroad, have demanded that the directors join their clients in the suit to recover about \$125,000 alleged to have been wasted by the management. The suit, which it is said will be filed this week, is to be directed against the estate of J. P. Morgan, Wm. Rockefeller, Lewis Cass Ladyard and others, who were members of the New Haven directorate at the time that transaction that have been the subject of inquiry by the interstate commerce commission was made.

In a letter to the directors, made public today, the attorneys refer to the testimony concerning New Haven investments which proved unprofitable, brought out by the interstate commerce commission. "We, therefore, in behalf of our clients," the letter reads, "respectfully demand that you institute proper legal proceedings to enforce the liability of directors to the corporation which we have pointed out, and such other liability as may be disclosed as a result of a careful and thorough investigation of the company's affairs."

Notice of the proposal of the minority stockholders to file such a suit was given several weeks ago.

ANOTHER CO. TO DRILL ON WEST COAST GRAHAM

Will Put Diamond Drill in to Develop Their Oil Leases

The Vancouver Daily Oil Gazette says in speaking of F. C. Wright, who recently was in that city:— On account of his reputation as a diamond drill expert, Mr. Wright was consulted by the promoter of the Graham Island Oil Syndicate, being organized here by local men to form a company to develop 1,280 acres of land on the West Coast. There is under consideration by this syndicate the use of a diamond drill to prove the property. Mr. Wright said it could be done much cheaper with a diamond drill. On his advice negotiations have been opened for the purchase of a diamond drill already on the island, which a firm in existence a year ago, was using. If oil is struck as it is believed it will be, the company can then well afford to put down a regulation oil well, and the property will have been proven at a minimum expense.

SKY PILOT REFUSED IT—MARINE PILOT GETS IT

Prince Rupert Pulpit Is Making Trouble for Skeena Transport

The Laura F., the popular Skeena river transport, the property of George Frazzell, is top heavy these days with super structure. She has a new pilot house that was originally intended for a sky pilot instead of a marine pilot. It does not add to the appearance of the craft but George cannot get rid of it. The cause of the trouble is a big pulpit which was made in the city and shipped to a parson on the Skeena. The parson when he saw it refused to accept it claiming it was ordered made of cedar and this is a fir pulpit. George had to bring it back and the owner of the dock refused to have it back on the wharf. Thus the derelict pilot house stands amidst ships on the Laura F., about as useless an article as a sore appendix.

KENDALL SATISFIED WITH DECISION—ANDERSON ANGRY

TWO CAPTAINS COMMENT ON THE FINDING OF THE EMPRESS ROYAL COMMISSION—STORSTAD COMMANDER SPEAKS STRONGLY AGAINST LORD MERSEY

London, July 15.—The fixing of the blame on the Storstad was what I knew from the first must happen," said Capt. Kendall when seen yesterday regarding the findings of the Commission on the Empress of Ireland disaster. Asked as to the suggestion that the Empress should have given the Storstad a wider berth, Captain Kendall said that if the Storstad had not altered her course, no accident would have happened. It was immaterial how close the vessels were, if each had kept her course. In the upper reaches of the St. Lawrence, ships have to pass quite close, and so long as they keep their proper course there is no danger. "I am satisfied with the findings," said Capt. Kendall, "for I know the enquiry was conducted by brilliant and able men in the most impartial manner."

Regarding his future Capt. Kendall said he had no definite plans. "I am still with the C. P. R., who, I must say, have acted splendidly and most kindly toward me."

Capt. Anderson Indignant

Quebec, July 15.—A very indignant man was Capt. Anderson of the Storstad when he left the courtroom on Saturday after hearing his vessel blamed for sinking the Empress of Ireland, and he was anxious to borrow the

tradition which permits counsel three days in which to express an opinion about the judge after losing a case. "I did not think Lord Mersey would be such a fool," he angrily exclaimed to a reporter, "and you can say so in your paper if you like. He may be Lord Mersey, but I can tell you if he ever had any reputation he is going to lose it over this case. It is my opinion that he was trying to find in favor of the C.P.R., and you can say that, too."

"But," declared Capt. Anderson, "don't you imagine that this thing will stop here. We people in Norway are too much interested in seeing it through. There will be plenty of work in the courts, both in Canada and Britain. We shall start a suit for damages against the C. P. R. here at once. Then we shall take action in the Admiralty Court in Britain, and that is where we shall get at everything out in the open. There will be no Lord Mersey to run things there."

Lord Mersey Returns Tomorrow Montreal, July 15.—When told of the criticisms levelled against him by Capt. Anderson, Lord Mersey remarked: "I am not surprised." Lord Mersey and his British assessors and assistants will return to London tomorrow by the Calgarian.

FAR-REACHING EFFECT OF ALASKAN LINES

Detroit Money Man Optimistic After Trip to the North

Vancouver, July 15.—The building of government railways in Alaska will have a far-reaching effect on the development of that northern country and on the entire Pacific Coast, in the opinion of Colonel Frank J. Hecker, a wealthy retired manufacturer of Detroit, who has arrived in Vancouver from the North.

Col. Hecker paid a warm tribute to the capability of Capt. Mears, one of the members of the United States commission which is projecting the big government railway scheme, planned to cost \$35,000,000 and which will open up large tracts of territory hitherto without regular means of transportation.

\$30,000 FIRE AT NANAIMO YESTERDAY

Loss Estimated at \$30,000 Fully Covered by Insurance—Was Close in

Nanaimo, B. C., July 15.—Fire completely destroyed the mill of the New Ladysmith Company here yesterday. It was erected within three hundred yards of the post-office and within one block of the main business section of the city. The loss is estimated at \$30,000. It was fully covered by insurance.

White, in a number of placer gold claims on a tributary of Dean Channel, and is awaiting the return to town of some of his associates when they will leave for the claims. All the interested parties have unbounded faith in the proposition, and intend this summer to make a thorough prospect of the ground, with a view to ascertaining definitely the most expedient method of proceeding with the work of development.

Mrs. and Miss Blayney left by the last steamer. They are on a visit to Mr. A. Blayney at Francois Lake where they expect to remain for several months.

A very pleasant evening was spent by the many people who gathered at the Grand View Hotel on Saturday evening at the invitation of Mrs. J. S. Robinson to witness the drawing for a piano. Mr. M. Hammer, of Nootsatum, visited town early in the week, bringing with him a load of excellent farm produce. He reports that great improvements have been made on the wagon road between his ranch and Hagensborg for which he says credit is due to Foreman Svidsahl.

Mr. and Mrs. Sutherland and the Misses Addie and Phyllis Gibson, returned from Bachelor Bay on Thursday evening.

Work has been received from Mr. and Mrs. O. Fosbak, pioneer settlers of this valley, who are now visiting their old land, Norway, after an absence of over thirty years. They say they have been greatly struck with changes that have taken place during that time. While thoroughly enjoying their visit and meeting with every kindness at the hands of friends and relatives they state that they will have no regrets when the

What was a near approach to being a fatal accident occurred in the survey camp of Mr. H. Idsardi's party a short time ago. A huge hollow tree fell onto a tent which had a second or so before been occupied by Messrs. Carl Nylander and George Dixon. The startled occupants rushed out just in the nick of time, being apprised of their danger by other members of the party standing near. The frame of the tent collapsed like an egg shell beneath the weight of the tree—one of the pine species and especially large and heavy. Beyond the wreck of the tent no damage was done; but the two young men were extremely fortunate to escape without injury or even the loss of their lives.

Another striking remark of Wm. Manson's at the recent public meeting was that "Prince Rupert doesn't need Wark's Channel power." In other words the Woodworth Lake power which will cost some \$250,000 is quite good enough until our population doubles. Then Prince Rupert will "need" Wark's Channel power and a half a million more will have to be spent on the undertaking and the Woodworth Lake \$250,000 plant thrown into the scrap heap. A public man who has that view of economics is not safe to be at large. It is the same point of view that sold and tied up all the choice land in the Province because at that time we did not "need" it. It's surely time that we chose public men with a little more breadth of view and a more liberal conception of economics.

ment and especially for myself, I can say that we came here not to meet townsite agents, but actual settlers, people who have had the courage to come here and get a start, as farmers are the people we want to assist. In the past we have not seriously enough faced the problem of supplying roads and bridges for men who are pioneering. It almost makes me feel ashamed that in the past we have spent money building fine automobile roads down at the coast, when settlers have had to carry their household goods on their backs through the uncut wilderness. The country simply must be opened up. This trip has opened my eyes. I assure you that the seriousness of conditions appeals to me.

After eleven years in office this is the admission which we have from the virtual head of the Government, Mr. Bowser.

Can this Province of British Columbia, rich as it undoubtedly is, afford to retain in charge of the affairs of the Province men who, after eleven years in office, openly admit that they are ashamed both of what they have done and what they have left undone.

Can this Province afford to retain in office men who admit that they have been governing the Province in ignorance of conditions existing throughout the Province?

The severest indictment that has ever been made against the Bowser-McBride Government has been made by Mr. Bowser himself.

If anybody in British Columbia has hitherto had any doubt of the incompetency of the present government at Victoria, Mr. Bowser has himself effectually removed it. Truly it is time for a change.

The people of this city were excepting to hear something from W. J. Bowser about the vital questions affecting the city. His harranque on the fishing question was pointless as he has nothing to do with it. He could at least have given a little encouragement to the city had he assured us that the Provincial buildings would start at once and that the road round the island, and other public works would be proceeded with instead of having them deferred for election purposes. His visit was a frost all over. He didn't even make a decent speech and the public showed him the courtesy he deserved when they in bunches got up and left the meeting.
