

MANY CANNERIES TO OPERATE THIS YEAR

Eighteen Plants Preparing for the Season on Fraser River

New Westminster, July 15 .-Eighteen canneries will operate on the Fraser River this year, although only fifteen cannery licences have been taken out to date. The Glenrose and the St Mungo are already canning every other day.

The B.C. Cannery will not be opened this year, but a camp will be established for the collection of fish to be delivered to the other canneries controlled by the owners of this concern.

Although the sockeye season officially opened July 1st, very little of the king salmon is expected in the river until about July 20th.

Eighteen hundred Dominion fishing licences have been issued already, although this is an off year. As far as can be ascertained this is a record for a small year, and is only 700 less than issued last year, when the big run in the four-year cycle was due.


