It will give a great deal of satisfaction to Liberals all over the country to know that Sir Wilfrid Laurier, though somewhat advanced in years, is as alert both mentally and physically as he was twenty years ago. It appears also that a period of opposition has not done him any harm but that on the other hand it has made him more of a Reformer than ever. His clear cut stand on the tariff question shows that he has grown with the times and that he recognizes that what was good business ten years ago is not necessarily good business today.

Opponents of a lower tariff with the States should remem-1 ber that this very principle, was what laid the foundation for the prosperity of modern Britain. History has shown us that you cannot drive trade into artificial channels, and that it always travels along the lines of least resistence.

The whole civilized world is turning its back on the doctrine of high protection. Protection means privilege and privilege means oppression, and the world doesn't like oppressors. The original intention of a tariff was to enable the home manufacturer to place his wares on the market at a decidedly lower price than a foreign manufacturer could. The manufacturer, however, soon found that with the tariff he had a monopoly and accordingly prices went up. If there could be some guarantee that prices would not be ad-






