ASSETS OF THE B. C. FISHERIES ARE SOLD

Paper Value Was Over \$1,500,000--Sold to English Buyer for \$300,000

Vancouver, July 18.—The sale of the assets of the B. C. Fisheries Co., Ltd., to Mr. Devereaux for a sum of \$300,000 has been confirmed by Mr. Justice Clement in Supreme Court chambers. The sale had been effected by the receiver of the company in England and has received the assent of the English courts.

Objection to the sale had been made by the British Columbian creditors, who will not get a cent on their claims for \$75,000, the \$300,000 being sufficient to pay only about 75 per cent on the debentures. They had no better offer to make and no hope of obtaining a better offer was held forth, so his lordship said he would not hold the sale open.

Mr. J. E. Bird, for the receiver, stated that the price was the highest obtainable and he gave a denial to a suggestion that Devereaux was merely an alias for the directors.

The company, which was promoted by the late Sir George Doughty of Grimsby, showed assets with a paper value of over \$1,500,000.

INVESTIGATING HABITS AND AGE OF SALMON

Interesting Data Being Gathered for Provincial Fisheries Department

John P. Babcock, Provincial Commissioner of Fisheries, left last evening for the Naas on a trip of inspection connected with his department. He came through from Fort George with the Provincial Ministers and has since been looking over the canneries on the Skeena. From the Naas he will probably go south.

Ms. Babcock says the outlook is splendid for a good season in sockeye fishing. It is equal to the year 1910 so far.

There could be some guarantee Prof. C. H. Gilbert, of Stanford University, Cal., who has been making a series of investigations into the habits and age of the salmon for the provincial department. He has been engaged in this work for several seasons and is furnishing the department with some very valuable data. Prof. Gilbert finds the age of the salmon from the ridges on the scales and the results of his investigations upset many of the pet theories about the fish living only a fixed number of years. He has found coho salmon seven years old.

Last year the professor examined some 10,000 scales taken from the various streams along the coast. He is doing similar work this year checking up some of his previous observations. By the time he makes his final report British Columbia will know a lot more about the salmon than is now known.

THREE THROUGH G.T.P. TRAINS A WEEK

Will Be End of Month Before the Regular Trains Can Be Operated With Speed

In the course of a lengthy interview in Wednesday's Province, Hon. W. J. Bowser had the following to say of interest to Rupert:—

Mr. Morley Donaldson, general manager of the Grand Trunk Pacific, was met at Prince George and again at Prince Rupert. He assured the attorney-general that a tri-weekly passenger service on the railway would be run all the coming winter between Rupert and Edmonton. In the section traversing the Nechaco Valley more than 100 miles of line remain to receive the final touches of ballasting and it will be the end of this month before regular trains can be operated at speed. A mixed service will be put on at first and then in the autumn the tri-weekly trains through to Edmonton will be inaugurated.

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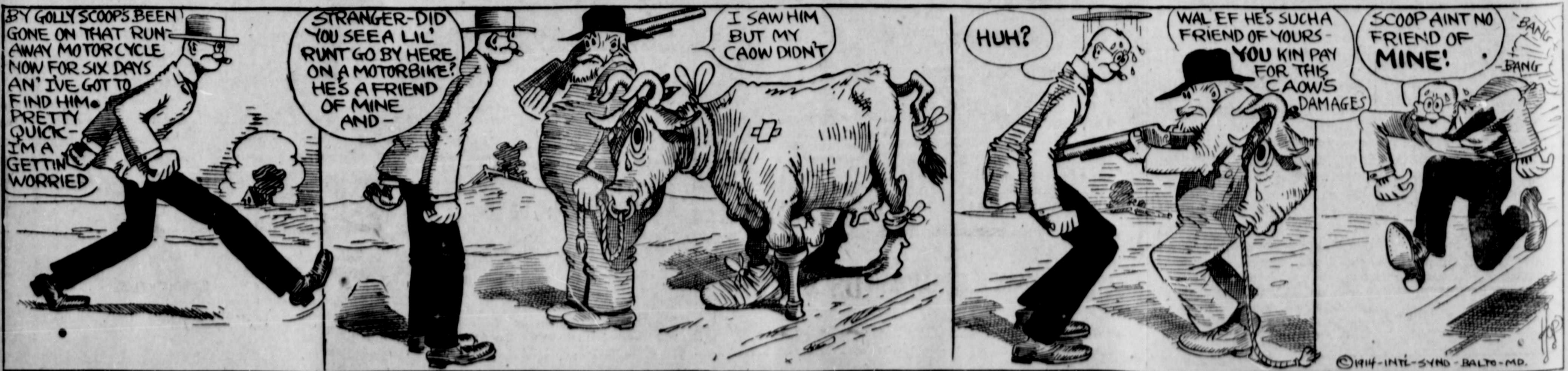
